

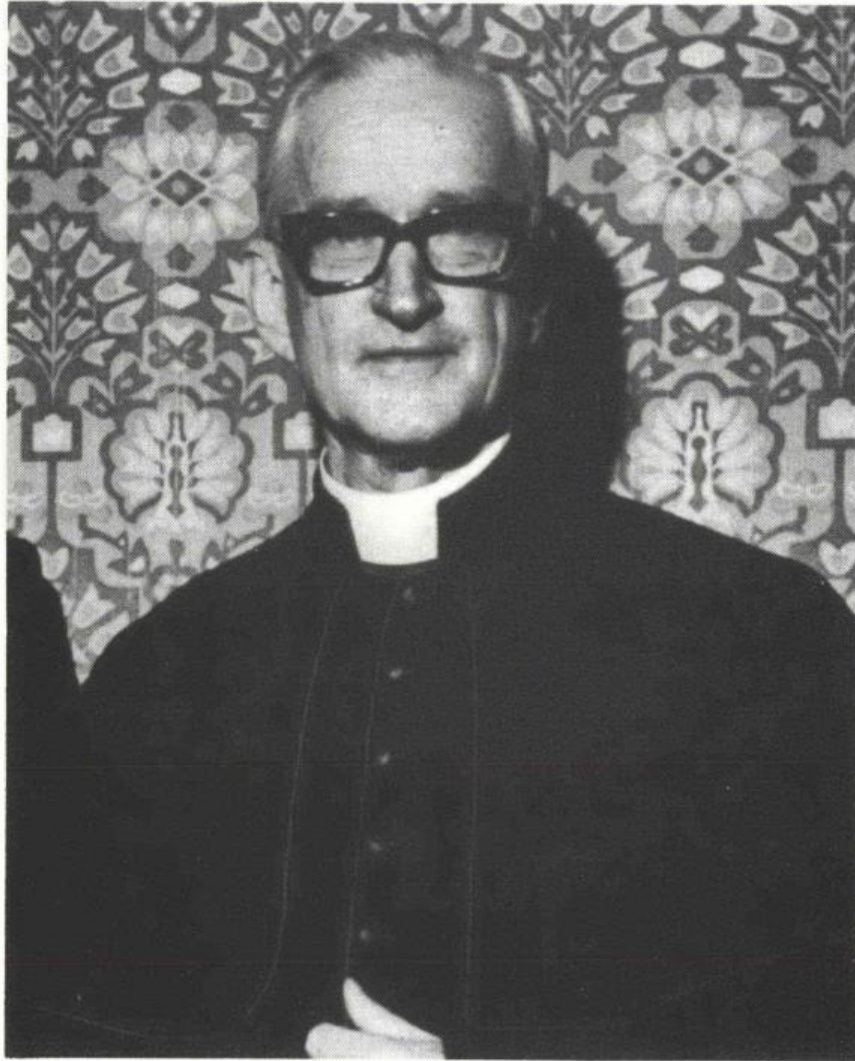

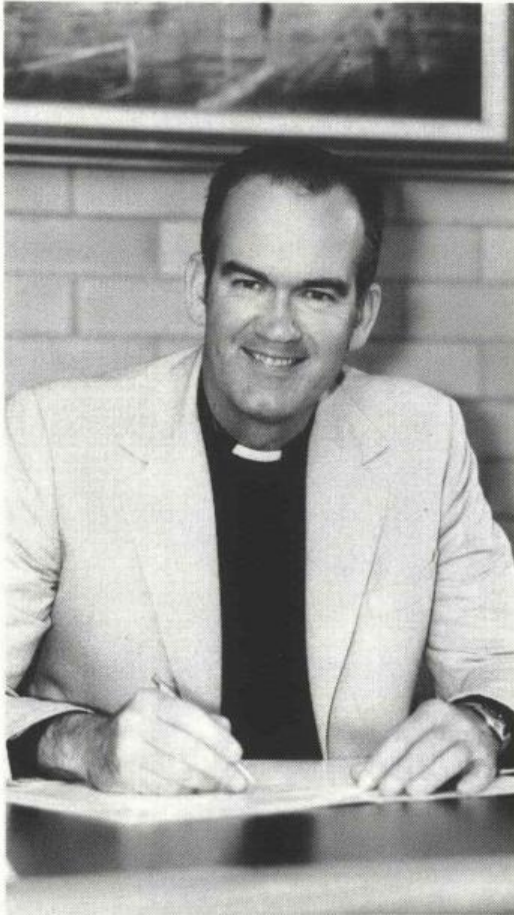

# The Headmaster's Report

## 1981 ANNUAL REPORT:

I have the honour to present to you tonight the Annual Report for 1981, the one hundred and sixth year in the history of the College.

I welcome you all to Terrace this evening and thank you for coming to be a part of "TERRACE" tonight. The presence of each person here adds something to the evening so that the composition and form of this gathering reminds us very strongly of the many aspects of the life and purpose and functioning of our College. All the various activities of the school year should not be seen as being carried on in isolation from each other but rather as parts of the whole life of this institution, this school, which is striving to attain its stated purpose, namely the development of the whole man through christian education.

## CATHOLIC EDUCATION:

I find it interesting to reflect over the nine years that have elapsed since I assumed the position of Headmaster at this school. It would be true to say that the earlier part of that time was a period during which there was a degree of questioning of the real value of catholic education, a questioning of whether in fact the very considerable resources in plant and personnel that were invested in this enterprise by the Church could not and even should not be used more effectively in other ways of spreading the "Good News" and fulfilling Jesus Christ's injunction to "go and preach the Gospel". This period was weathered successfully and today we have a healthier situation as a result. Today we realise much more than home and school need to complement each other (the Terrace family concept in practice), and the importance of our all working towards the same goal in this matter of catholic education cannot be over emphasised. This is well expressed

in Br. Marcellin Flynn's work CATHOLIC SCHOOLS AND THE COMMUNICATION OF FAITH which is based on research in Australian schools.

He says:—

The development of faith within a catholic school builds on the child's faith experiences in the home and takes place through the subtle and often fragile relationships between teachers and students. It flourishes best in a warm, affective environment, or community or faith, which moulds the image of God which students eventually develop.

If the catholic school is excessively authoritarian or hierarchial in structure a student will be more likely to view God as someone distant and mysterious. If the school and its teachers are over-exacting, children will have as their image of God one who is demanding, exacting, a perfectionist. If teachers are unforgiving, the young will find it much more difficult to think of God as a loving Father who readily forgives them.

If the child finds himself in a continual failure situation at school, he will slowly come to believe that God is against him. If he feels that his teachers do not care for him personally or if they are not interested in what he has to say, he will find it more difficult to appreciate that God loves him and listens to his prayers.

If students find enjoyment and happiness at a Catholic school and feel that their teachers are genuinely interested in them, they will be more likely to think of God as kind and gracious, a loving Father, to whom they will want to commit themselves in faith.

Clearly, the image of God that a young person gradually develops will be influenced first of all by his home, and then by his experiences of a Catholic school and its



climate is the christian message as it is experienced by students.

I thank the staff of the College for their part in contributing to the welfare of their pupils and for their genuine interest in them. In this way as Br. Marcellin Flynn indicates, Terrace is endeavouring to meet its responsibilities of christian education of youth.

#### A BRIEF REVIEW:

When compiling previous Annual Reports my thoughts have been restricted mainly to the events of the one particular year. However when coming to the point of composing this 1981 Report, because it will be my last one, my thoughts have tended to run back over the whole of my period here as Headmaster since 1973.

During that nine year period there have been significant physical changes, major developments in certain curriculum areas, and introduction of more cultural pursuits. But what has not changed has been the good quality of the material that we have to work with — the average Terrace boy, and the support and interest of parents, friends and old boys of the College. I would like to thank you all for your support and interest in Terrace during 1981 but more particularly during the whole period of your and my association with the College. The support of the "Terrace Family" has enabled the 1970's to be a period of significant development in the history of the College. Equally, and really more importantly, this support has been extended to members of that Family at times of personal difficulty and many people have expressed to me how much of a support they have found this to be.

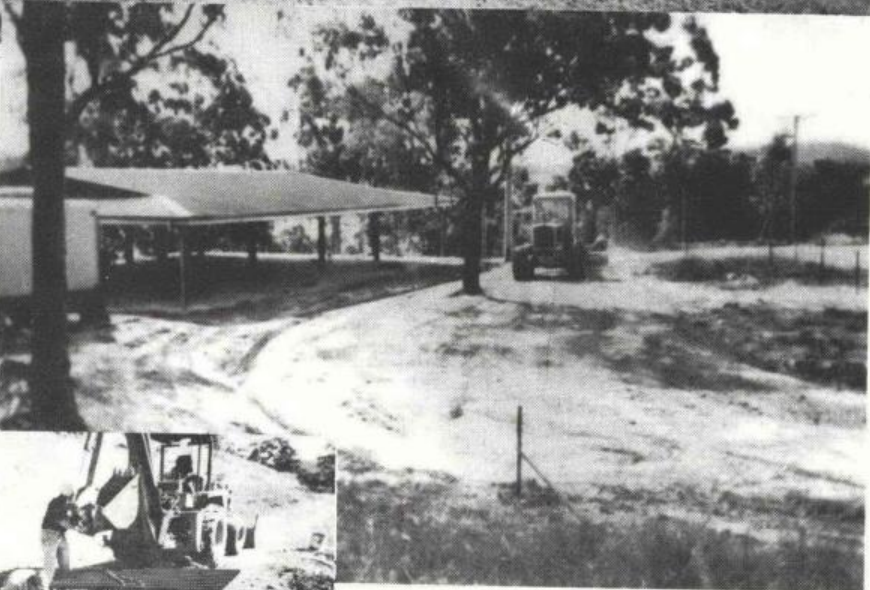
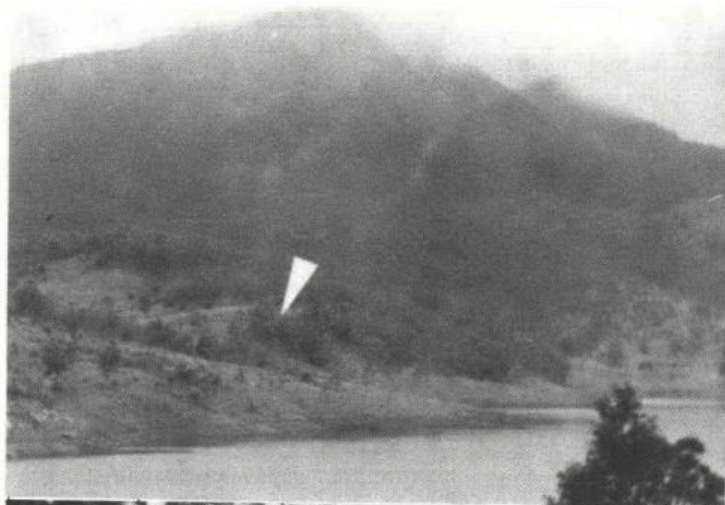
In 1974 we commenced our Centenary Building Fund Appeal to request \$400,000 from Terrace supporters to enable the Centenary

Building Project to be undertaken. At that time the College was situated on three separate blocks of land separated by private property and by Billet Street. We were able to acquire the private property and obtain a lease on Billet Street so that with the construction of the Centenary Building the College was on a single campus. In 1977 we commenced using our newly established Outdoor Education Centre at Lake Maroon and development of this facility has been continuing since then as finance has become available. With the completion of a large boatshed about a month ago and of a kitchen/dining room in the near future the site is at a good stage of development. An outline of what has been required to provide this facility may be of interest:—

1. Acquisition of the site (17½ acres) and surveying of it.
2. Purchase and transport of five huts to the area, foundations previously being measured and prepared for the huts. Three huts came from Emerald, one from Maryborough, one from Wacol.

3. Renovation of these 5 huts, one to be a shower/toilet block.
4. Purchase of a mobile field kitchen.
5. Installation of a large septic system.
6. Bringing power on to the site.
7. Bringing water on to the site (a distance of 1.5 km), installation of a 5,000 gallon tank and reticulation from this tank.
8. Installation of a telephone.
9. Purchase of a bus by the Terrace Parents and Friends' Association.
10. Construction of an all-weather access road.
11. Levelling and grassing of a playing area.
12. Purchase of a 4-wheel-drive safety vehicle.
13. Erection of a boatshed.
14. Erection of a kitchen/dining room.
15. Purchase of suitable equipment for the activities undertaken at the Outdoor Education Centre. These activities include orienteering, archery, canoeing, abseiling, map reading, rock climbing, camping, and other suitable pursuits.
16. Engagement of qualified outdoor education staff.





Thus it can be seen that the provision of this Outdoor Education Centre is a major undertaking on the part of the College and has absorbed a good deal of College resources, but the opportunities it provides for our students make it well worthwhile.

### OTHER CURRENT PROJECTS:

The last five weeks have seen a start made on two other major projects for the College. The first one is the Manual Arts/Art and Craft Building which is located at the corner of Victoria Street and Water Street, and with fencing, landscaping, etc., this will cost about \$650,000, of which a grant of \$80,000 is coming from the Schools Commission. The second is the construction of a tunnel across Gregory Terrace from our old swimming pool area to Victoria Park. This tunnel is an exciting project as it opens up for us the possibility of increased use of Victoria Park. In view of the restrictions of space we have at the school this is a good prospect.

The main benefit from the tunnel will be the very great increase in safety for boys crossing Gregory Terrace which has become a busy thoroughfare with more than its share of heavy vehicles. Our boys cross this road a good deal especially for Physical Education periods, swimming in the Centenary Pool and sports training at Victoria Park. The tunnel is being constructed by Thies Brothers and will cost about \$130,000.

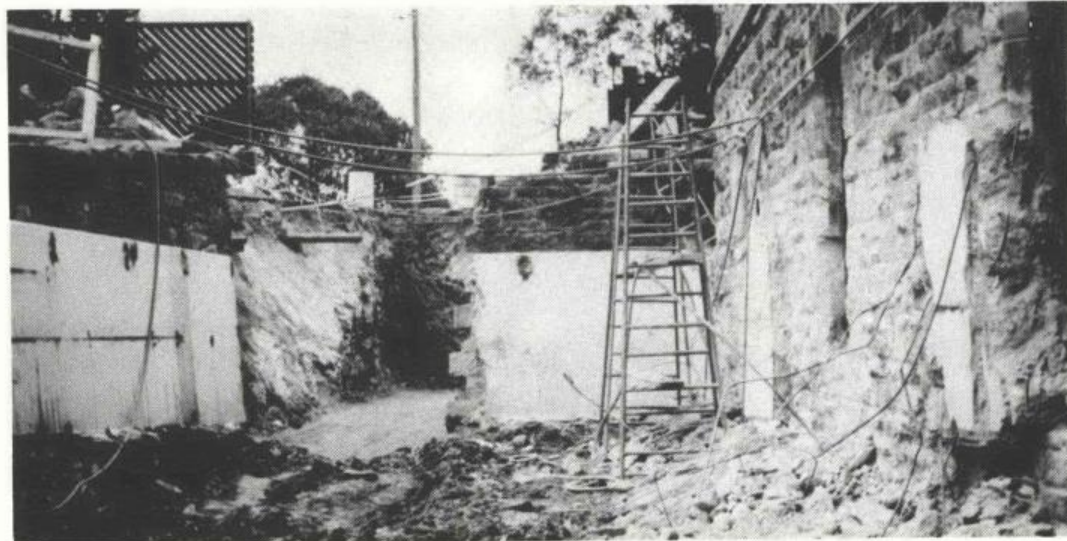
### FINANCIAL:

Not uncommonly in the media now one hears the statement that "school children in government schools are receiving less in federal funds than children enrolled in private schools". This statement is **literally correct** but is quite **misleading**, as State schools receive most of their finance from the State Government. The correct picture can be gained only by considering **TOTAL** government expenditure on State and on non-State schools. The facts of the matter are that in **TOTAL FUNDING**, the governments, Federal and State together, allot an average of \$1,790 to each child in the

government system and only \$770 to each child in the non-government sector.

Further, in 1980 the Schools Commission (a Commonwealth Government body) reported that all state school systems had reached or in some cases had exceeded the resource targets set in 1973. This is equivalent to saying that the average government school has resource levels equalled by only about 10% of non-government schools. For supporters of government schools to talk about funds going to the "wealthy" private school system at the expense of government schools is therefore demonstrably incorrect.

I consider it is very important that catholic parents and other parents with children in non-government schools understand this position of funding very clearly so as to be able to argue their case for justice in this matter of government support for schools. We cannot assume that because the principle of government funding of private schools is currently accepted that this will always be the case.



**Library Grant:** During the year the Secondary Library received a grant of \$2,480 from the Schools Commission for library resources. The Primary Library received a grant of \$700 for the same purpose.

#### THE SCHOOL:

The school continues to enjoy the confidence of the Brisbane community and the demand for enrolments is high. Our numbers this year total 911 overall, with 212 boys in the primary and 699 in the secondary.

Captain of the College is JOHN MATSON and he has given very good service to the College in this capacity. John was a member of the First XV and the First VIII so the additional demands made on his time were considerable.

Vice Captain is Luke Brannelly and the other Prefects are: John Devereux, Mark Holmes, Mervyn Kiley, Michael Lynagh, Greg McGrath, Hugh Morrison, Brendan Nasser, Robert Pozzi, Mark Ryan, Peter Steele, Dominic Wood. The Prefects have worked very well this year in

endeavouring to fulfill the responsibilities inherent in their role. I thank them for this and also thank the Deputy Headmaster, Br. Reardon, and the Year Twelve Form Master, Mr. Harvey, for encouraging and supporting the Prefect body in these endeavours.

There are 133 boys in the Year Twelve class and as a group these lads have contributed positive leadership to the life of the College. For the first time a SENIOR badge was struck and its ready acceptance and popularity with the Seniors is a healthy sign of their wish to be identified as the 1981 Senior class of Terrace.

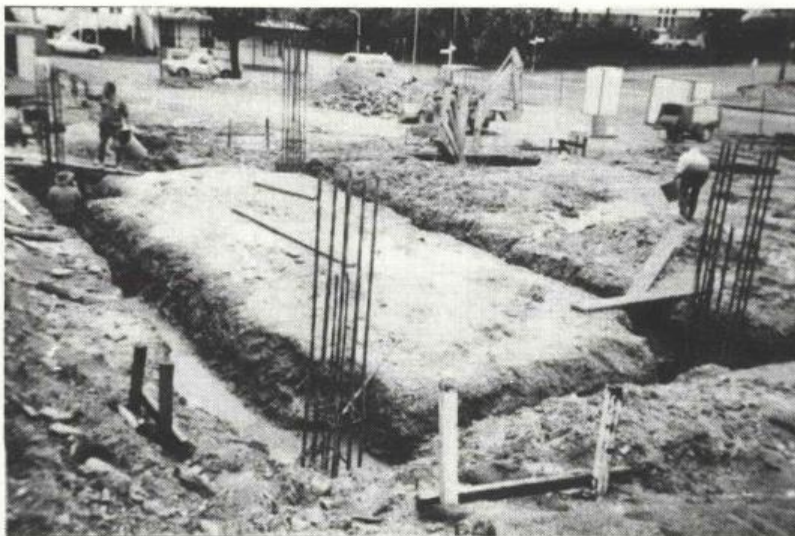
**Staffing:** At the beginning of the year we welcomed to our secondary school teaching staff several new members. These included Br. X. Robinson, Mr. M. Broad, Mr. J. Connolly, Mr. P. Hogan and Mr. T. Young. Br. B. Sorensen and Br. A. White joined the staff later in the year.

We farewelled Brother J. Sayer and Mr. R. Robinson. We thank these for their contribution

to the welfare of the College while they were on the Terrace staff.

#### SPIRITUAL TRAINING:

As we move to a more and more technological society the fact that man "does not live on bread alone", becomes more obvious. Technological advances may be making life easier for some people, but that does not necessarily mean they are making life better. We need today to address the **moral** issues associated with the use of technology and for this, the question of our **values** is critical. It is in this context that the spiritual training imparted by the catholic school needs to be viewed today. Only if man is imbued with a correct view of his relationships with his fellow man will he be able to approach a just and dignified solution to the problems currently confronting the world, problems that it will be the responsibility of the present generation of school children to try to continue to solve. During 1981 continued efforts have been made in all classes to fulfill the fundamental purpose of the school, namely to help all pupils come to a deeper understanding and appreciation of



their religion and a closer relationship with God. I thank the priests who have helped in the school and at other times such as on days of recollection in this aspect of spiritual training. We thank especially Father John O'Shea for his ready and cheerful ministry in saying Mass and in making the Sacrament of Reconciliation available to our boys.

I thank particularly Br. P. Murray for his work in encouraging and co-ordinating the Religious Education program and for fostering the Christian atmosphere of the school.

During the year we welcomed back to the College our most recently ordained old boy priest Father Brian Thompson who was in the 1972 Senior class. It was a source of joy and pleasure to have Father Thompson with us and to congratulate him on his ordination. He is a member of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart.

#### **OUTDOOR EDUCATION:**

The commitment of the College to this activity is clear from an earlier section of this report. Part of the reasoning behind this development is to provide our students with further opportunities for personal development in both character and interests. This latter is becoming all the more desirable as our society anticipates increased leisure time with the introduction of a shorter working week. Challenging and interesting programs are conducted by our outdoor education specialist Mr. Kerry Thomas, assisted by Mr. John Kerrisk and other members of the Terrace teaching staff. The emphasis in these activities is always on safety and the correct gear and equipment is provided for each activity. I regard the introduction of Outdoor Education as an important curriculum development for the College.

#### **COMPUTER EDUCATION:**

Another curriculum innovation was the introduction of a Computer Awareness Course as part of the Year Ten Citizenship Education course.

#### **SPORT:**

The College makes a considerable commitment in the form of both personnel and financial resources to sport. To realise the truth of this we have only to consider our playing fields at Tennyson and our boatshed and its contents, and to recall the hours of coaching and managing on the part of staff and interested helpers. Such a commitment can only be justified when sport is used for the development of character as well as for physical development and as part of the whole process of the education of the boy. It is with this justification that Sport is conducted at Terrace.

A boy who chose not to participate in school sport would be depriving himself of the opportunity to take part in an enjoyable activity and to learn useful lessons. In team games for example, a boy learns that he cannot participate effectively unless he has developed the requisite skills and physical fitness both of which require self-discipline. He learns to work as a member of the team to achieve the goal and this requires the development of a certain degree of maturity. For reasons such as these, games, especially team games, are an important part of the activity at Terrace.

#### **CONCLUSION:**

To one and all who have helped the College in so many ways during the course of 1981 and during my period here as Headmaster, I express my thanks and gratitude.

During 1981 a lot of good things have happened and a lot of good things have been achieved. These are important and deserve to be recognised and that is what I have endeavoured to do in this Annual Report.

Along with this we need to remember of course that the most important things and the most important achievements are not the trophies we win or the recognition or congratulations we receive no matter how well merited these are. The most important thing is what is within the heart of man. If the heart, the "spirit" of the individual man is strong, then the society to which he belongs is strong. During my years here I have been impressed by the individual young men who compose the student population of St. Joseph's College, Gregory Terrace. I consider it has been a privilege to have been in some way able to serve them and to watch them grow and develop.

It has been a privilege to teach with a capable and concerned teaching staff and to come to know such a fine body of parents and old boys and to feel that I had their confidence. I thank you all for the support you have given me personally during my period at Terrace. I ask that you keep me in your prayers as you will be in mine.

May the Divine Child through the intercession of His Blessed Mother and of St. Joseph, Patron of our College, grant all of us His peace, joy and blessings.

He made his first profession with the Missionaries after completing his novitiate at Douglas Park in 1977, and was finally professed on March 8, 1980.

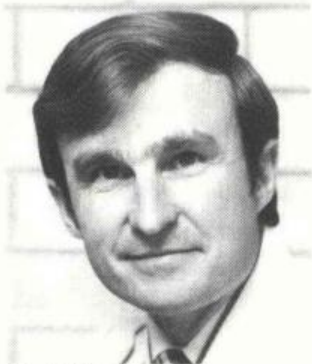
He was ordained to the priesthood at St. Thomas' Church, Camp Hill by Archbishop Francis Rush on August 29.

We wish Fr. Brian God's blessing. May he have the strength to be a true shepherd to his flock.

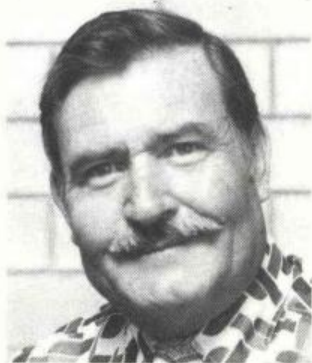

## TRANSFER

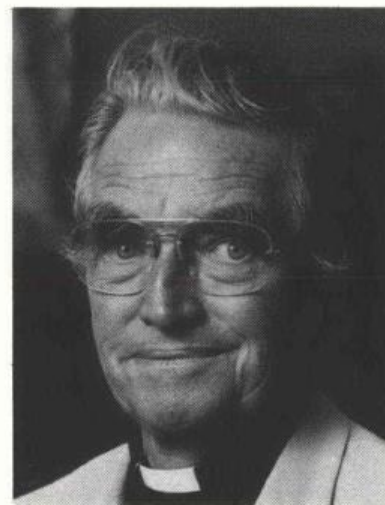
Br. L.R. Maher, after nine years as Teacher/Librarian at St. Joseph's College, has transferred to St. Joseph's College, Nudgee. On 2nd December, the friends of the Library attended a commemoration Mass in the College Chapel. Fr. F. Moynihan celebrated the Mass during which the congregational singing was led by Alec Raymond on the organ. In a memorable address Fr. Moynihan reviewed the impact made on the mind of the Church by the dedicated 'book worms' of the middle years of this century. These men spent long years in prayer and library research before their works were published: in the instances of Fr. Jungmann and Fr. LeGrange these published works were received by the 'official' church with less than enthusiasm. As obedient sons of the Church these men did not take the common modern method of exposure in the current media; rather, they retired to their books and prayer to work more diligently. Upon the work of Jungmann and LeGrange the epochal guidelines of Vatican II were built. On the literary stage, in the publishing world, on the street corners Catholic 'book worms' made a lasting impact on men and cultures. Such men and women as Maisie Ward, Frank Sheed, Douglas Hyde (of an older generation), Chesterton and Knox were mentioned. Our regret at the present time is that today and during the '50s and '60s the Catholic voice was not argued by the literary men in the cafes, on the campuses and in the daily press.

After the Mass the participants moved to the Library annexe where a pleasant morning tea was served. On behalf of the friends of the Library, Mary Donatiu

presented Br. Maher with a travelling rug. Br. Maher replied briefly thanking all of those who had assisted over the years in making the Library at the College what it is today.

Br. Maher came to St. Joseph's from St. Brendan's, Yeppoon. He was able to bring with him a wealth of experience for he had spent some fifteen years in Technical instruction, including five years in Asansol, West Bengal. He transferred to academic classes for the next twenty years, teaching top secondary English, Economics and Technical Drawing in St. Brendan's College, and English at Gregory Terrace. While at Terrace he was able to put his ideas of a Library to the Headmaster, Br. Buckley, and see those ideas coming to fruition in the present Library in the Centenary building.

It is anticipated that Br. Maher will assist in the Terrace Library for a while each week in the coming years.

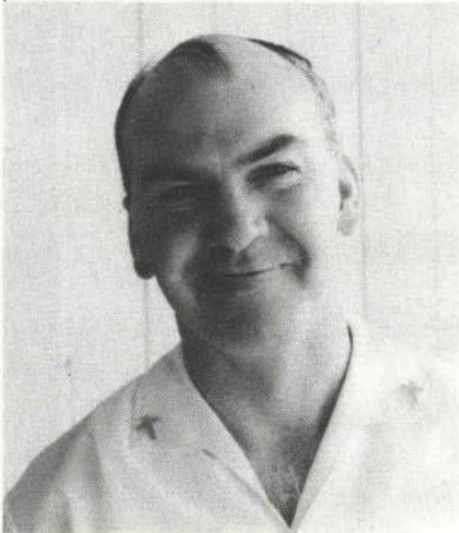

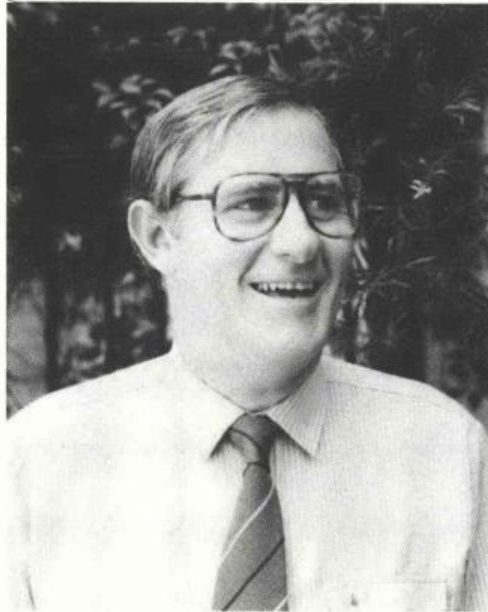

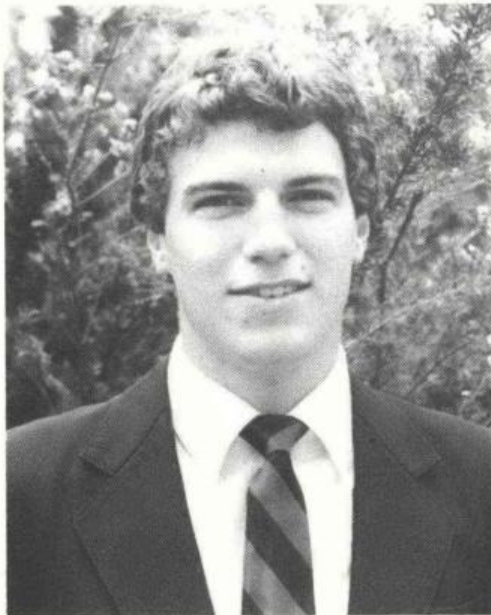
# College Captain's Address

help us in later life. So, in effect, the school and the individual will benefit from each person putting in an extra effort.

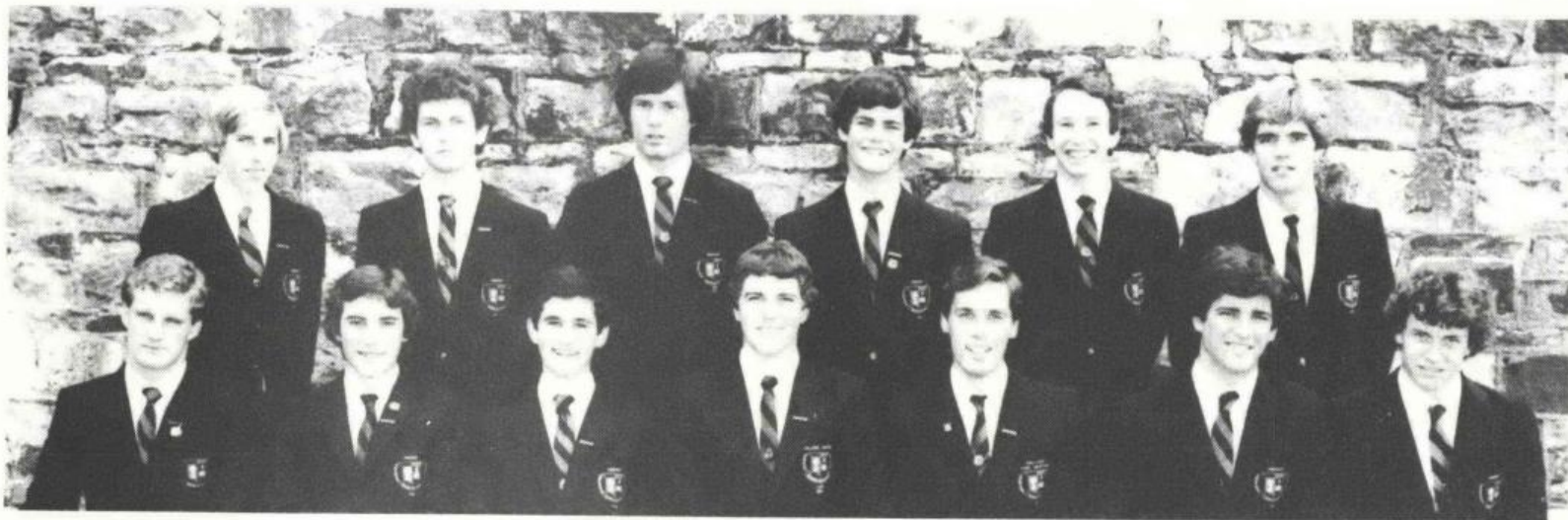

# Bye-Bye Birdie

With three successful seasons behind them, the Terrace/All Hallows acting company decided it was again time to unleash their talents on the world at large and so set about producing their fourth successive hit. After several months of work and various promotional appearances on television, radio and publicity in newspapers, the time had come for the dress rehearsal, the first time the cast would view the Kelvin Grove Auditorium. The cast arrived at the hall with great expectations and found it a hive of activity as backdrops were hung and workmen constructed sets. The dress rehearsal was



plagued with bad luck as actors forgot lines, entered from wrong sides (having not yet orientated themselves) and tripped over the scaffolding that was to be the Mac Afee's house. Injuries and illness were not an uncommon occurrence as actors fell through holes in the scaffolding (leaving them more shocked then hurt), and sets, in various stages of completion, collapsed onto unwary stage hands.

As the running of the show drew closer, sore throats and colds were common and with Sean Fox seriously ill, Mr. Raymond (assistant director), prepared himself to step into the role of Mr. Mac Afee.

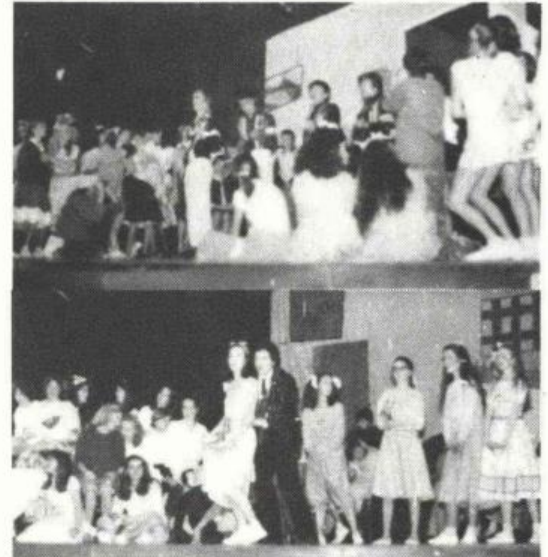
However as the band started tuning up on opening night, all illness and other problems were forgotten as the cast entered the hall and began to warm up and get made up. A full

# Counselling

Counselling at Terrace has been continued as an individual confidential service available to reach students on request, and I thank Mrs. Rhonda White for the very effective assistance she has given to so many boys and their parents in her role as Student Counsellor. The overall aim of counselling at Terrace is to demonstrate a "valuing" of each and every individual student and his family. School counselling originated out of a concern for the individual student who was seen at risk of failing in the academic situation for other than academic reasons.

Counselling at Terrace has three main concerns. These are (1) giving relevant and accurate information with the aim of facilitating the decision-making process, and (2) career counselling, which can be broken up into the areas of vocational guidance and career-related counselling such as job hunting and interview skills, and (3) personal organisation and development, e.g., study planning, study techniques, and personal counselling. Personal Counselling is an area of great sensitivity where every effort is made to keep problems reality-based and in correct perspective. Good decision making for life and careers are inter-related and crucial for the positive development of the "whole" person.

The Schools Commission has indicated its opinion that career education should be a continuous service through the formal curriculum as well as through such areas as Counselling Services. This year the Year Twelve staff assisted with and participated in a Guest Speaker career program. This program was part of the Year Twelve curriculum and included twenty five guest speakers from tertiary and technical institutions throughout Brisbane covering over forty career areas. A number of information sessions for Year Twelve throughout the year including a workshop on "job hunting and interview skills" helped broaden the students' awareness of options open to them after Year Twelve.

Career education was also incorporated as part of the Year 10 curriculum for Citizenship Education. Further focus was made on career education by the visit of Year 10 students to the Career Reference Centre.

This year the college library has introduced the Queensland Career Inventory Index which provides exhaustive career reference material for students. The system is also available through the Counsellor's office.

Through measures such as these it is clear that Counselling has become integrated into the school. Good use is made of this provision not only by present students and parents but also by past students who of course are still considered part of the Terrace Family.

**PETER WEST** (breakaway) — The ideal compliment for David and Tim. His speed to breakdowns and his harassment of opposition backlines made him one of the most feared No. 7's in G.P.S. His rise from the 15C's to the First XV showed how REAL his ability was.

**JOHN MATSON** (second row) — A very popular choice as best forward was John Matson. Very few players worked as hard as John for such little recognition. **STEVEN GRANT** (tight-head prop) — Steven, or "Cavie" as he was known, would have to get the encouragement award for the year. Steven had a lot of problems with his game and to his credit worked very hard to overcome these. This determination made him a real asset to the team. His moment of glory was at Nudgee where he caught a ball on the full and then passed it safely; this incident will be remembered by all who know him.

**STEPHEN PARTRIDGE** (full-back) — An exciting player from the U.16's Stephen produced many magical moments. His blistering raids into the backline; his soaring punts to relieve pressure; his faultless defence was magnificent and his goal kicking ability made him a most dangerous player and thoroughly earned his position in the team.

**MARK ENGLISH, MICHAEL POZZI, ADAM ROLFE** and **BRENDAN NASSER** were all called upon to play with the First XV during the season and distinguished themselves by their enthusiasm and strong play when included in the team.

To coach these boys to the undefeated premiership was a superb thrill and the memories and friendships will last forever with me. Thanks guys. Congratulations to you all; you worked hard for it and so deserved all the praise. Many thanks to Mr. Lester Hampson for his never-ending help and support.

### THE GAMES:

Terrace were clear victors in the first clash of the season and stirred the embers of hope for yet another successful season. The first half belonged to Terrace and remains memorable for three fine tries. After five minutes of play a precision-timed move opened a massive gap for Michael Lynagh who, with perceptible relish carved through the defence to score beside the posts. Fifteen minutes later another well timed move sent Stephen Partridge flying past the defence to score untouched, and shortly before half-time a move and quick passing culminated in Michael Robson scoring in classic style in the corner. State High figured more prominently in the second half, but Michael Lynagh brought them frustration with two accurate field goals while the Terrace defence was unbreachable.

The Terrace defence held firm throughout the opening fifteen minutes when T.G.S. held most of the initiative and mounted several probing incursions into the Terrace half. Then in a mature piece of two-phase play in which all the backs handled the ball, it swept to the left and then to the right across the field with Michael Robson out speeding the defence to score in the corner. The tide had turned and the Terrace back rowers and inside backs exerted telling pressing on the opposition. As a result Michael Lynagh scored at a canter from a charged-down kick and Peter West forced another try by smartly diving on a ball which rolled loosely from a T.G.S. scrum. In the

second half wave after wave of Terrace attack was turned by the defence and T.G.S. salvaged some honour with a last minute try.

Terrace won this game virtually at will with each of the six tries scored being quite clear-cut events. Michael Lynagh capered cleverly through fifteen metres of bemused defence to set the scoreboard ticking and shortly after, neat, two-phase lead up work, sped Simon O'Kane into the corner. As the match progressed the forwards took control of the opposition and began to initiate attack with strong-running bursts. Michael Robson scored twice by being on hand to support Tony McNamee, in the first instance, and Damian Kelly, in the second while Simon O'Kane in scoring a second try profited similarly from the initial break by Peter West. Peter posted the final points by diving on a loose, unattended ball over the defenders' goal line.

In this game the Terrace team matured greatly; so much so that, despite a first half of frustrating errors and continually conceded possession and a half-time deficit of six points, they walked victorious from the field to a standing ovation. It was an inspired Terrace XV who took the field in the second half and set about the task of pegging back the Churchie lead. As a team they were hungry for the ball and played with purpose and, at times, flair. First points were posted by Michael Robson as

he won the race to the loose ball over the Churchie line. Michael Lynagh put Terrace in the lead when he scorched fifty metres along the touch line, kicked ahead and regathered to score a try which he duly converted. He put the match beyond doubt late in the game when he kicked a penalty goal to give Terrace the seven points "magic margin" lead.

This was a quality game from start to finish, with the Terrace XV attaining the pinnacle of performance just when it mattered most. Again it was Michael Lynagh who set the Terrace turbines turning when he thumped a mighty fifty-metre penalty goal in the third minute of the game. Inspired, the rest of the team set to work with a will, won quality ball in masterful fashion, and built up great momentum which never waned throughout the entire match. The first try was scored twelve minutes into the game as Stephen Partridge accelerated onto a cut-out pass at the half-way mark, sped through a gap, kicked ahead over the gathering defence and regathered to score. The conversion was successful. Tremendous Terrace pressure kept the Grammar ground attack in check, but conceded two penalty goals. Minutes from half-time, with Terrace deep in Grammar territory, Brad Anderson reversed play to James Keim who clapped on pace, stylishly stepped around a defender to plunge over and score. The second half was scoreless but for a timely field goal by Michael Lynagh which brought up the final seven-point margin. This was a grand and truly historic game and was essentially a team effort by the victorious Terrace boys.

On the first occasion, Brad Anderson plundered the ball from the T.S.S. half-back and sent it to Michael Lynagh who, having drawn three defenders, enabled Ian Ralph to beat the fullback with a pass to Simon O'Kane who scored unopposed. Michael short kicked at the kick-off after half-time, regathered, drew two defenders and deftly sent the ball to David Porter who sent James Keim in to score under the uprights. The third try resulted as Michael out-manoeuvred the defence in an attacking movement and a metre from the line fed Ian Ralph who scored. All tries were converted and the final kick sealed the match. The sad note was that Michael Lynagh broke a collar bone as he fed Ian Ralph for that final try and finished the season on the side-line.

All points were scored in the first half with James Keim blasting his way through the defence and sending Stephen Partridge bullet-like to score and convert his own try. The second half took on a different complexion as Nudgee dominated possession and sought to pound their way to advantage per medium of

their heavy forwards. But the Terrace pack, for the essential struggle was in the "boiler-room", matched the Nudgee threat with vigour of their front row, the strength of their second row and the crisp efficiency and speed of their back row.

A planned forward manoeuvre had Tony McNamee barrelling his way over from metres out. These quick points rallied the "Reds" and the forwards lifted their game and set about running their opponents ragged. Ball began to flow regularly along the Terrace backline. Mark English scooted in from twenty-five metres out, Simon O'Kane clung to a widely flung ball and sped successfully for the scoreboard corner, and, a minute before full time, the three quarters, at full throttle, fired an accelerating Stephen Partridge through a gap in the weary defence to score in the corner. 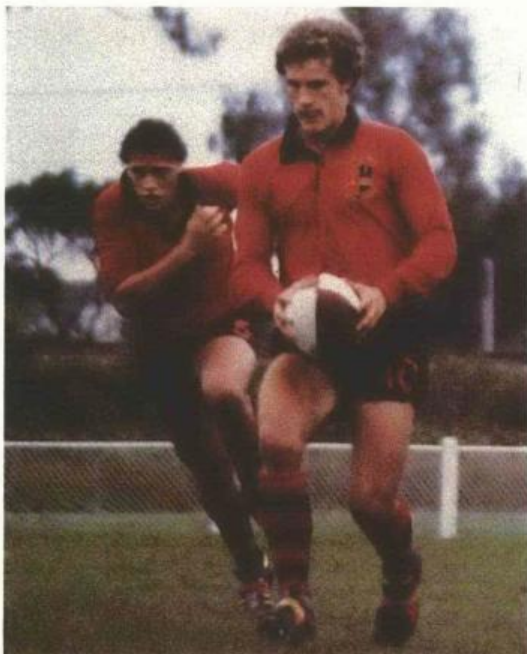

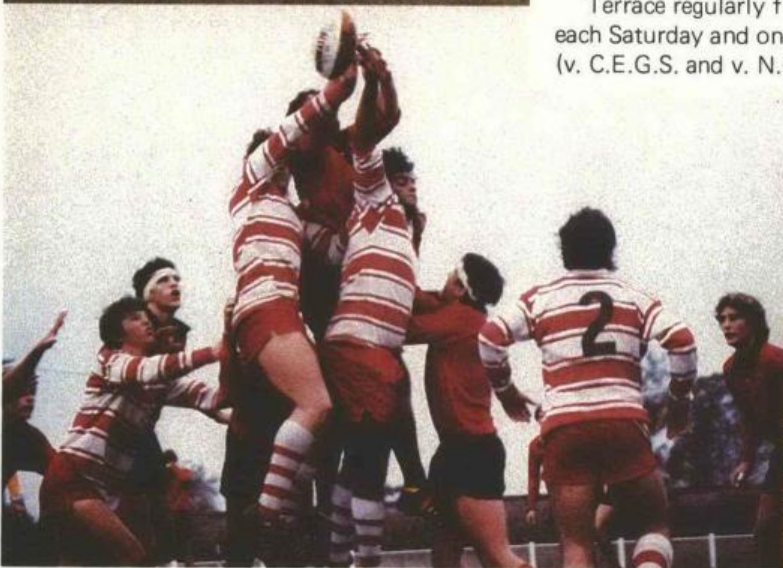

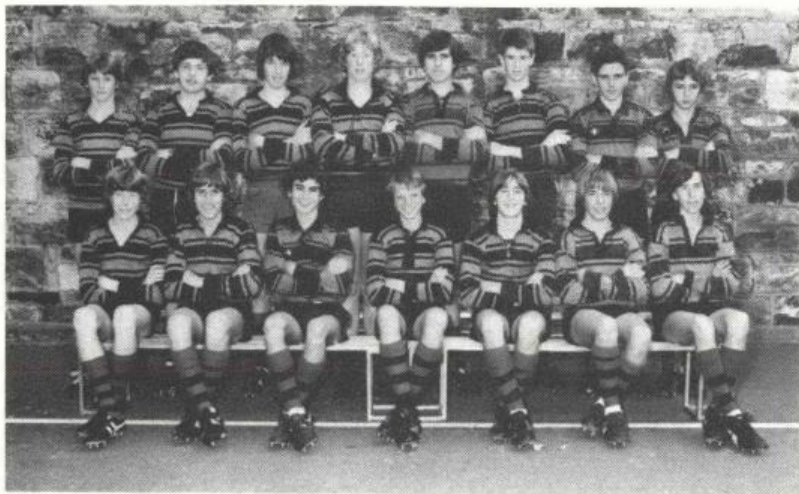

## THE PLAYERS:

**LUKE BRANNELLY** — Bowling average 5.3 and batting average of 12.1. Luke provided stability in the lower order batting and proved himself to be an effective change bowler. His excellent fielding included 5 catches in G.P.S. competition.

**MARK ENGLISH** — The only left-hander in the side. Mark helped in some aggressive lower order partnerships and provided the necessary variation as a left-hander in both matches and practice sessions.

**TIM GALVIN** — Batting at No. 6, Tim played straight and technically correct. His average of 20.2 was the highest for G.P.S. games. He completed a fine season with good fielding, mainly in the point position.

**GERALD KEIM** — A determined opening batsman who took the brunt of the opposition bowling and seldom failed to provide a foundation for his team. An excellent fielder in most positions. His 42 runs in his marathon 3¼ hours innings against B.G.S. was the seasons highlight in batting.

**JAMES KEIM** — As Vice Captain, James had an outstanding season with both bat and ball. He was awarded the trophy for the best bowler in the Christian Brothers Carnival and followed this up with 30 wickets at an average of 6.7 runs in G.P.S. Competition. Batting at No. 5, James had an average of 18.8 with the highlight being his 43 against T.S.S. Bowling highlights included 9-23 against C.E.G.S. and 5-11 against N.C.

**MICHAEL LYNAGH** — As team Captain, Michael showed the value of 4 years experience in the 1st XI cricket. As wicket keeper or slip fielder, he took some memorable catches, the highlight being a full stretch desperation diving catch to dismiss one of the T.S.S. star batsmen. His major contribution was his ability to have the Terrace team apply constant pressure on opposition batsmen by well placed fields combined with sensible use of all bowlers.

**BRENDAN NASSER** — An aggressive opening batsman who seldom failed to give his team a reasonable start. Brendan had an average of 18.7 with the highlight being 67 against T.G.S. made in cyclonic conditions on a damp pitch with frequent interruptions due to rain. An aggressive and reliable fieldsman whose experience and approach proved invaluable.

**STEPHEN PARTRIDGE** — Developed as an opening bowler and fieldsman during the season. An aggressive batsman who should develop into a fine all rounder next year. His 28 runs in 16 minutes against B.B.C. on a wet wicket will long be remembered.

**SEAN REMEDIOS** — A talented leg spin bowler and middle order batsman who gained valuable experience for next season when he should develop into an excellent all round player.

**JOHN THONG** — Perhaps the team's most improved player who as wicket keeper gave consistently better performances than his opponents. He took seven memorable catches in G.P.S. competition and showed ability as an aggressive batsman. His enthusiasm and general approach made him a fine team player.

**DAVID VEIVERS** — Will benefit from his experience as opening or first change bowler. Next season he will be a bowler to be feared. David took one of the seasons most memorable catches when he leapt into the air at cover to take a sensational two handed catch to dismiss B.G.S. hard hitting star batsman.

**JIM WILKIN** — Had an outstanding season with the highlight being a superb 85 against C.E.G.S. Batting at No. 3 Jim had a fine average of 17.8. His fielding was always of a high standard and his 2-5 against B.B.C. showed his potential as a change bowler.

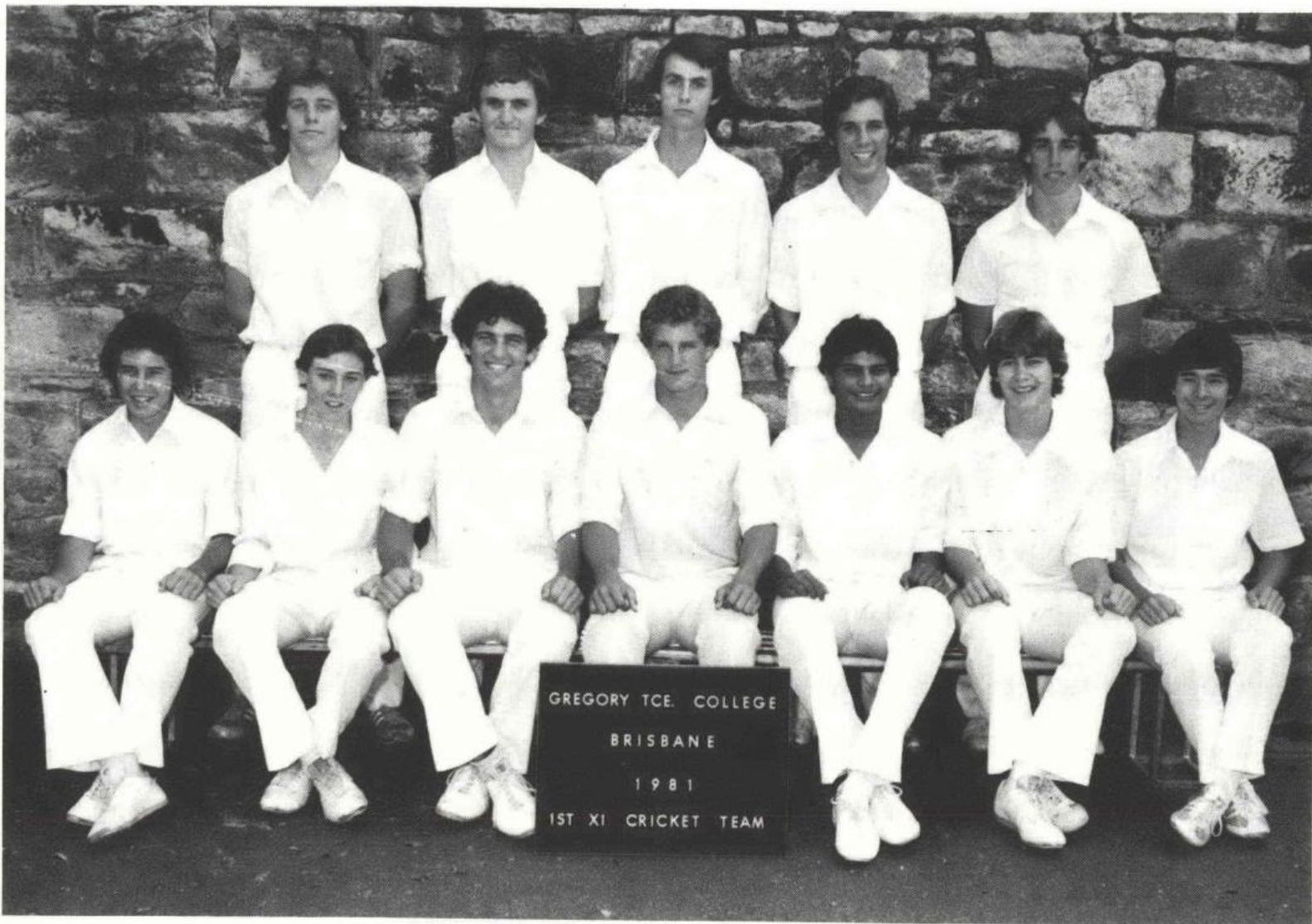

T.G.S. won the toss at Tennyson and sent Terrace in to bat on a very "doubtful" wicket after start of play was delayed because of rain. Under the bonus points system a wicket is worth the equivalent of 15 runs. To win the game, which could have been stopped at any moment as cyclone "Cliff" moved closer, our openers had firstly not to get out and then, secondly, to make sufficient runs as a buffer in bonus points to any subsequent batting collapse. This they achieved, ably supported by a powerful 33 runs in 23 minutes from team Captain, Michael Lynagh. Terrace then declared at 3/150 giving T.G.S. 150 minutes to score the necessary 151 runs to win. David Veivers and James Keim each bowled a T.G.S. opener but with their score at 2/21 heavy cyclonic rain finished the match.

At 6/50 we were in trouble but the seventh wicket partnership of 14 between Luke Brannelly (12) and our left-hander Mark English (6), gave Terrace a winning chance. Our total of 72 was reasonable under the conditions, but would it be enough? During the next 2 hours, the Terrace team gave a sustained exhibition of "pressure" cricket. 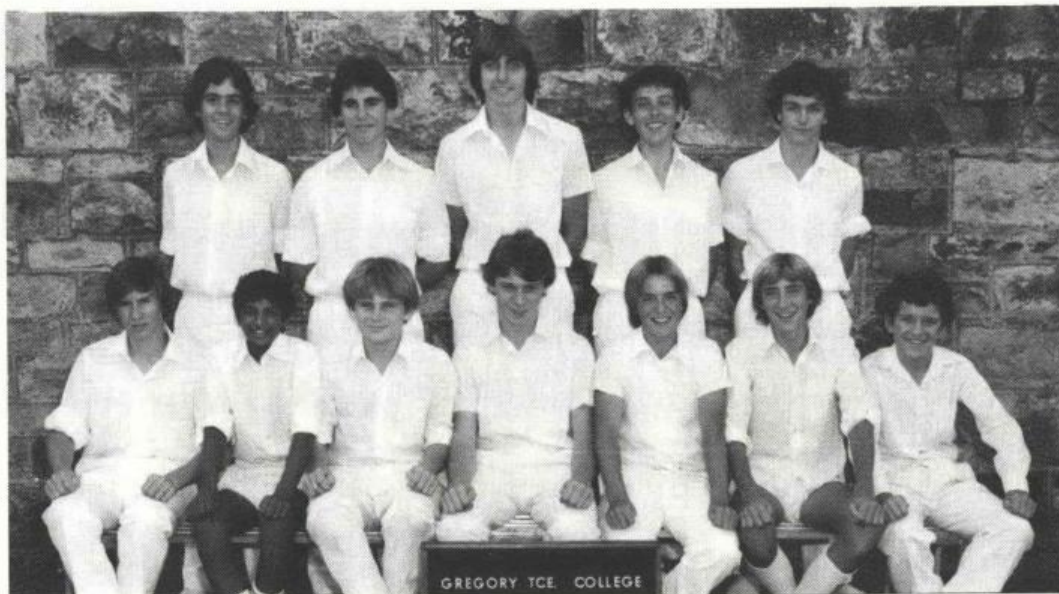

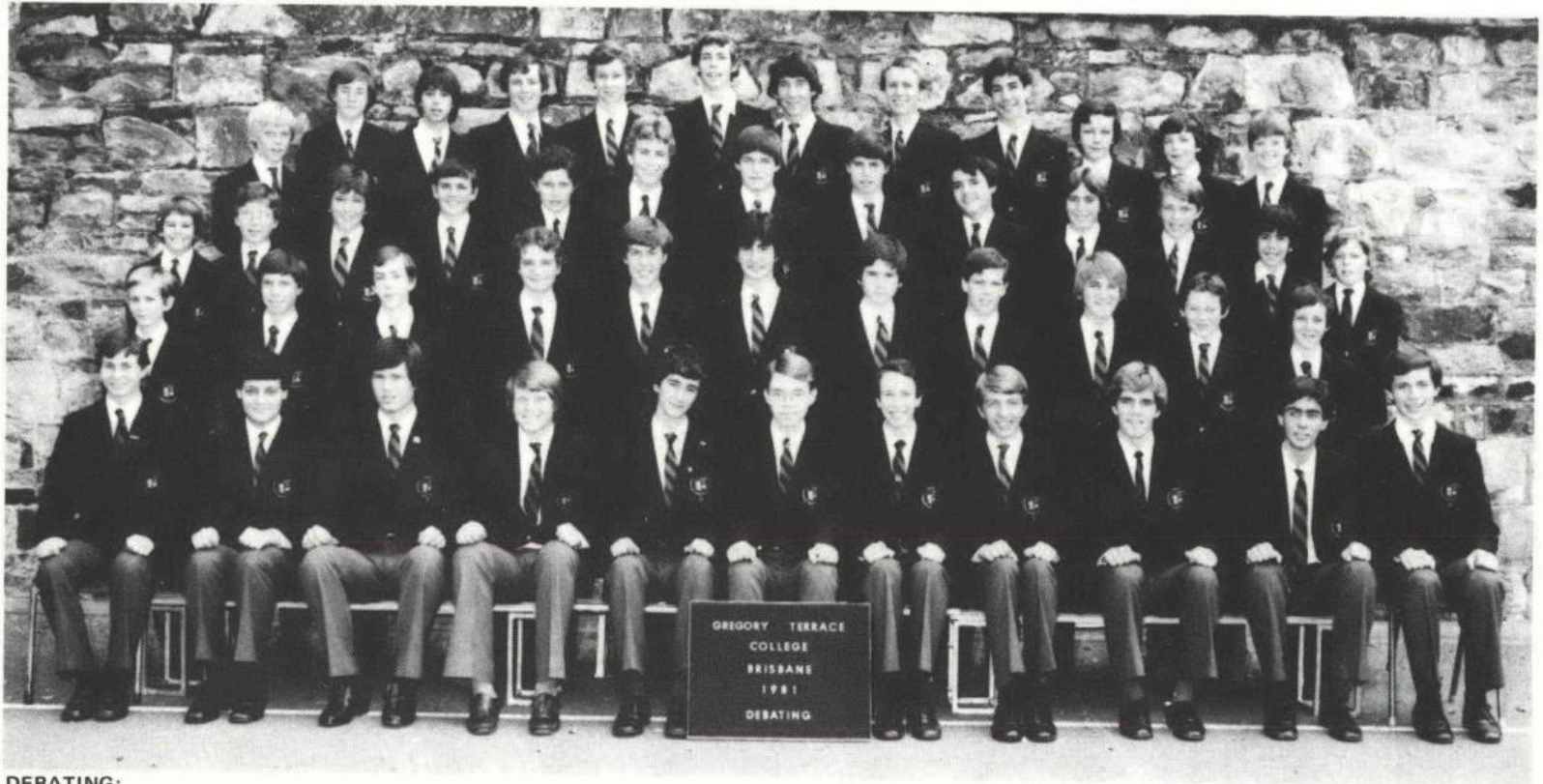

For the first time we entered a Year 8 team in their division of this competition, and Nicholas Musgrave, Andrew Douglas and Declan Kelly (Capt.), came through undefeated also.

The Senior A (2) team of Sean Fox, Stephen Vivanti and Michael Rackemann (Capt.), and the Year 8 (2) team of Ben Gardiner, Paul

McCrossin and Anthony Weigh (Capt.), reached the Preliminary Finals. For the second successive year a Terracian received the Noel Wilson Memorial Trophy for the best debating performance in the finals of the Wales/QDU competition. This year it was awarded to John Phelan.

# Swimming

The G.P.S. Championships were held this year for the first time at the Chandler Aquatic Centre, the site for the 1982 Commonwealth Games. The Terrace team scored a total of 236 points for third place behind B.S.H.S. (368) and B.G.S. (264).

Highlights of the night for Terrace supporters were four wins, all in G.P.S. (and College) record times. Three of these were by Warwick Mortensen (Under 15 50m Freestyle, 50m Backstroke and 100m Freestyle). The fourth win was by the Under 16 Freestyle Relay team (Simon Neill, Cal Malouf, Simon O'Kane, James McNamee, Michael Holmes and Brad Mulvihill). In addition, Michael Malouf set a new College record for 50m Breaststroke Under 15, as did Tim Dodson for 200m Freestyle, Open. Tim also equalled the College Record for 100m Freestyle, Open.

The Eisentrager Cup for the most creditable performance by a Terrace swimmer at the G.P.S. Carnival was presented, for the second successive year, to Warwick Mortensen. Warwick had been absent for part of the pre-G.P.S. season because of his selection in the Queensland team to represent the State at the Australian Titles in Perth. Warwick won 3 gold and 2 silver medals. Two of his first placings (100m Backstroke and 100m Freestyle Under 14) were in Australian record times. Warwick was also chosen as a member of an Australian squad

which entered a national training camp at Chandler in May. Subsequently he toured the West Coast of the United States as a member of an Australian team selected from the National Titles.

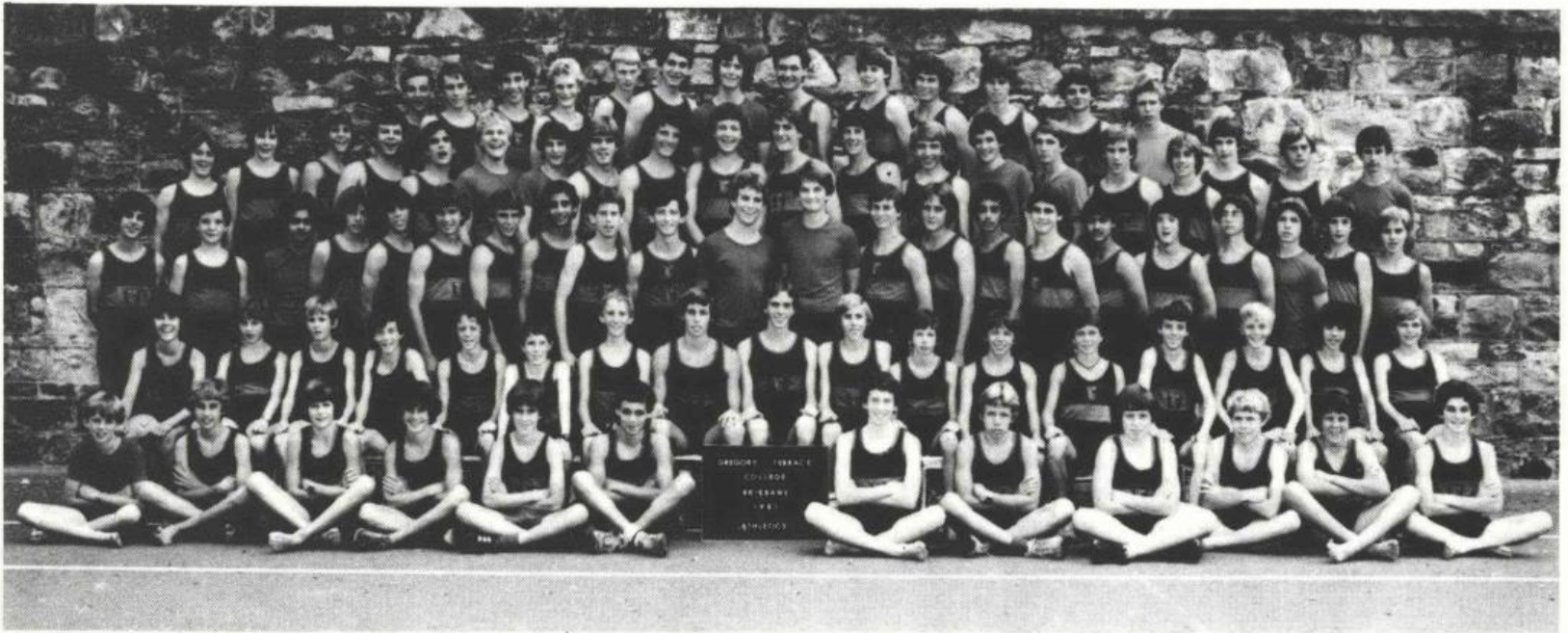

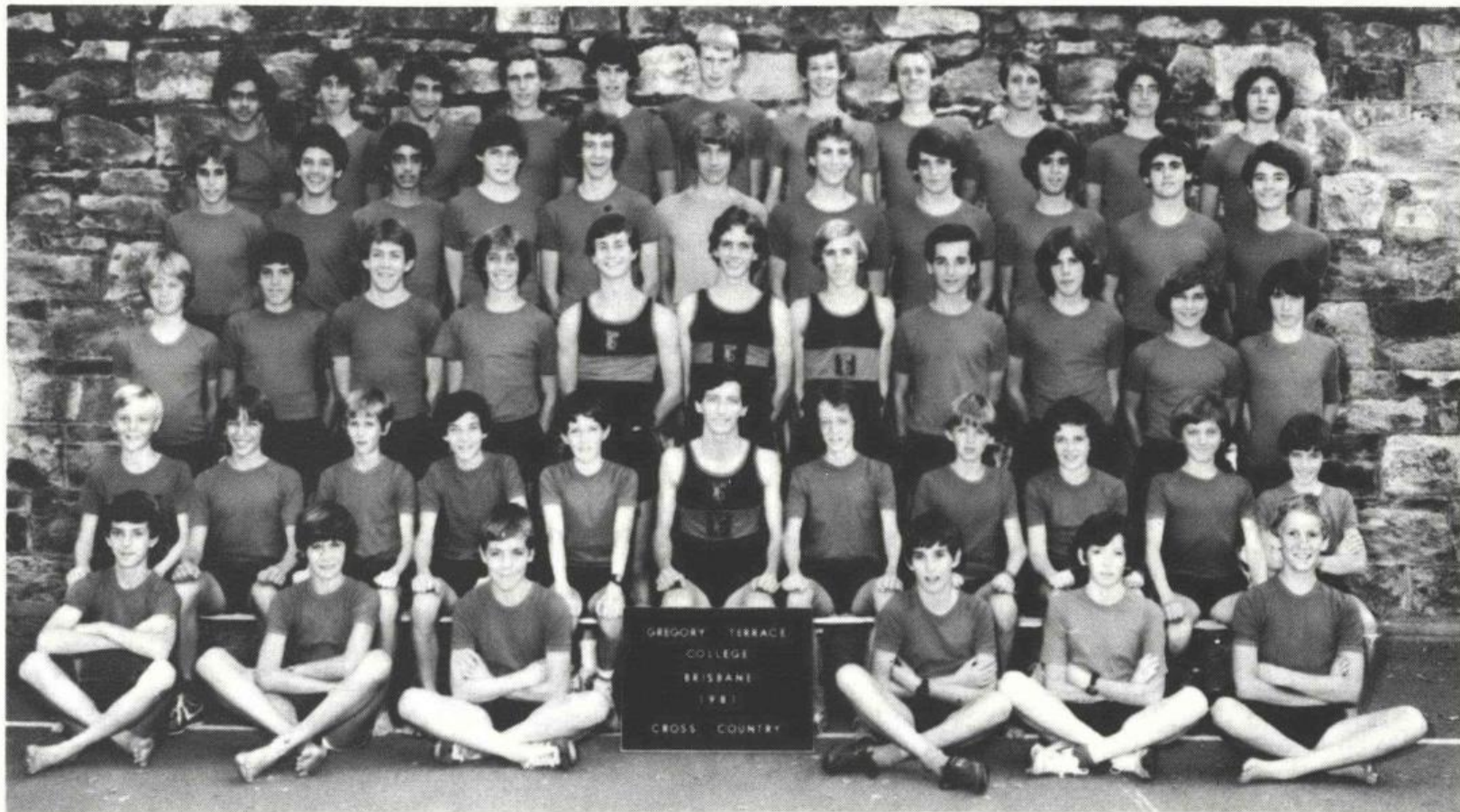

By 26th August, coaches had selected a representative squad of over 60 runners to compete in the G.P.S. Championships.

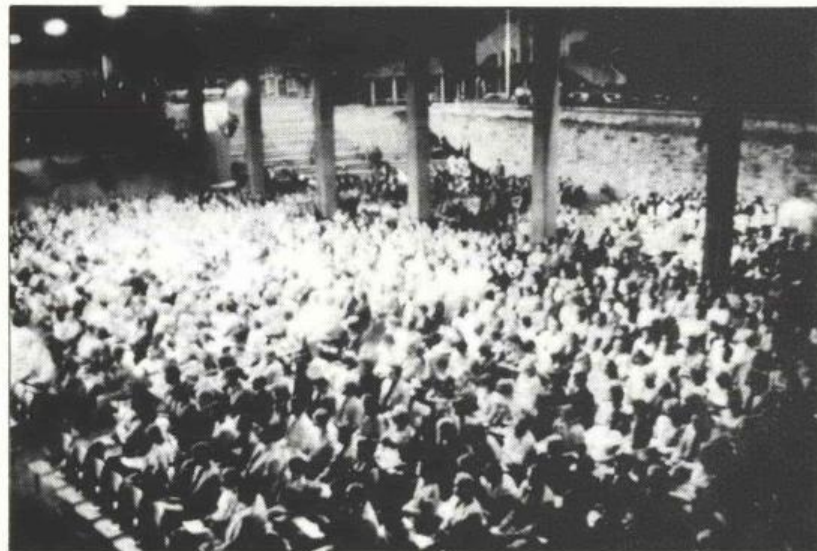

## **FROM THE 1981 HEADMASTER'S REPORT — STAFFING:**

At the beginning of this year we welcomed Mr. David O'Brien from Rosalie Convent School to our teaching staff as a replacement for Br. John Thomas who was transferred to Aquinas College, Southport. We thank Br. Thomas for his work with our primary school boys during his period here.

## **RELIGIOUS EDUCATION:**

The Religious Education Curriculum followed in each class continues to be the "Guidelines for the Education in Faith" as required by the Catholic Education Office. Each class has been able to participate in Masses and Reconciliation and we thank Father Ashley Warbrooke for making this possible for us.

The year commenced with a "Family Mass" where the primary boys, parents and staff joined together to dedicate the work of the school to Christ, our teacher. The boys are encouraged to make visits to the Brothers' Chapel at least once a day.

A special Confirmation program is conducted each year for the Year 7 students. These boys spent a few days at the end of March at Lake Maroon in discussion, prayer and suitable activities. This was followed by a school based program for about 7 weeks till Pentecost Sunday.

## **ACADEMIC:**

No major changes in academic work or the approach to it were introduced during 1981. The importance both of good study habits and of the achievement by pupils of satisfactory standards in academic subjects was recognised. The policy of diagnosing weaknesses in academic areas as early as possible and referring boys in need of specialised assistance to Mrs. Routh, our Remedial Teacher was continued.

The Reading Program arranged by Mrs. Routh with the assistance of mothers of the boys was continued, with pleasing results.

The **Primary School Library** has continued to support the research-based teaching and learning program as well as catering for students' leisure time reading. Each class visited the library at least once a week to receive lessons in the use of the library and to develop an appreciation of the materials available.

Mrs. P. Lynch has worked two mornings a week to help improve the card catalogue system. The size of the catalogue has been doubled during this year.

Book-week had as its theme, "Operation Booklink", and students participated in a competition based on this theme.

Pupils from Year Seven have worked as library monitors and their assistance with the loan system and other work is appreciated. Mothers of pupils have assisted voluntarily with covering of books, sorting and filing and typing and we wish to thank them for their help.

A grant of \$700 was received from the Schools Commission to help purchase resources for the library. This was supplemented by College funds and approximately 500 new books were added to the collection. These books were for both the fiction and non-fiction areas. A new general Encyclopedia was purchased to replace an out-of-date set and our video recording system was updated to the V.H.S. system.

## **REPORTS:**

This year saw the culmination of the work of compiling a new form of report for the Junior School. After the final draft had been made, parents were invited to view the Report with their class teachers. Reports are distributed at the end of each semester, and parents are encouraged to see their son's teachers whenever

they feel it necessary, to discuss progress in school and also aspects of social growth and development.

## **COMPUTERS:**

Another aspect of Terrace keeping in tune with the times is the introduction of the Computer in the Junior School. We have at present three Sinclair ZX-80 computers in constant use. Year Six teacher, Mr. Bob Maidens, has initiated this aspect of the boys education and is teaching Basic Computing to Years 6 and 7. The aim of this program is to give the boys an awareness of the Computer and its uses in our modern society. This has generated a lot of interest among these boys. Thanks are extended to those parents who assisted by donating old, useable T.V. sets.

## **CULTURAL:**

**Art** classes have continued as a part of the school curriculum for all students and we thank Mrs. Billie Eisentrager, herself a well-known Brisbane Artist, for her assistance in this important cultural activity.

In the area of **Music** each boy in the primary school has again received instruction in the recorder. From this a Year Six Recorder Group was formed and these lads performed at two of our musical evenings. The Junior School choir was continued and it also performed at musical evenings. We thank Mrs. Lenore Bateman for the assistance she has given in this field.

## **CAMPS:**

All classes are involved in a camp program. This gives the boys the opportunity to experience community living with their class mates and teachers. Year 5's go to Warrawee, Year 6's to Tallabudgera and Year 7's to the Terrace Campsite at Lake Maroon. Year 7's



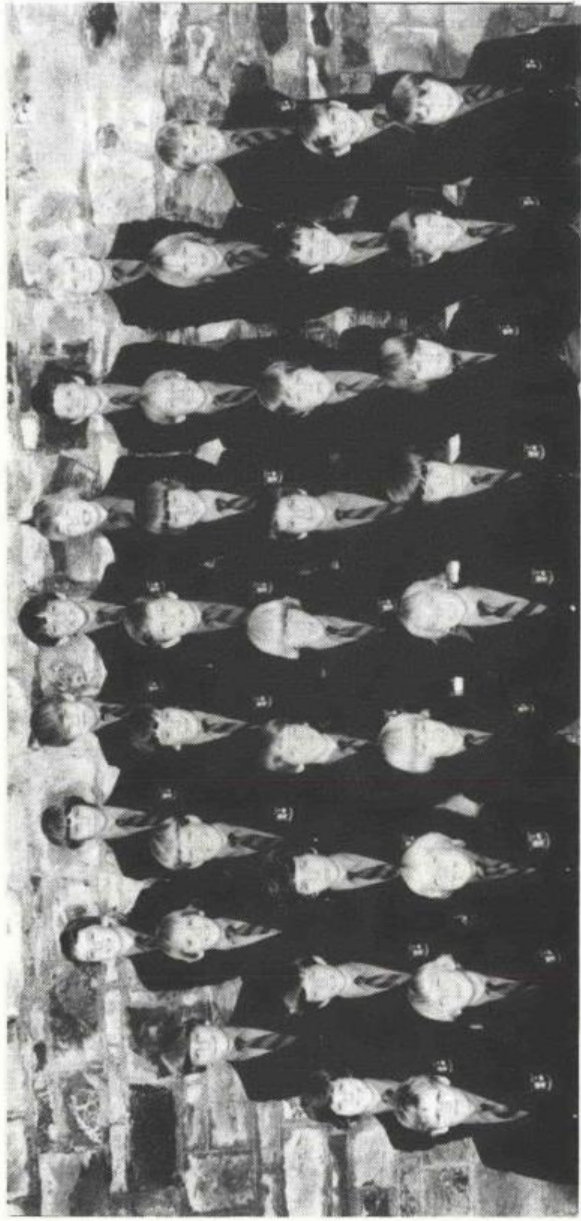
