The Headmaster's Report

Excerpts from the Headmaster's Report:

To any school, a change in Leadership is a very significant event. 1981 was the end of Br. Buckley's term of nine years. Materially, his work of those years is most evident. While the new buildings — both on this campus and at Maroon, the planning, the properties all bear mute testimony to his foresight, courage and meticulous organisation, more significant are the things that cannot be measured, things that could well be termed matters of the spirit. I notice these in the sense of cohesion throughout the school family, the great spirit of discipline and of belonging, the high standards that students, parents and staff have of themselves and of one another — all of those matters that are covered under the title of Terrace Family. Indeed, Brother Buckley was a builder, but not only of things material but of something more important — the school community of Terrace. The dedication of the testimonial Cross at Maroon last week was but a small token of our esteem.

To Brother Buckley, your friend and my friend, I pay tribute and express our heartfelt thanks for the heritage he has passed on to us.

FUNDING OF NON-GOVERNMENT SCHOOLS:

It is true that today, we at Terrace would not survive financially without the assistance we receive from both Commonwealth and State Governments. You will be aware that the whole concept of Government funding of non-Government schools is at present being questioned in some quarters. I believe that tonight it is opportune that I remind you of some facts so that, being aware, you can better understand and appreciate the situation.

The sixties saw Governments beginning to recognize the justice of the cause of parents

with children in non-Government schools in getting some share in their taxation payments for education. Throughout Australia, in the seventies, there developed a wide community acceptance of the concept of Government funding, but the eighties, with the changed economic climate, have seen an attempt by some in the community to disrupt the current efforts of Governments to assist these schools. It appears that among others, leaders of Teachers' Unions are endeavouring to open again the divisive issue of State Aid. The community at large has been exposed to some fallacious attempts in the media to discredit Government funding of non-government schools. Ill-founded and unproven suggestions of misuse of funds by non-government sectors, and a persistence in placing only part of the truth about funding before the public have been typical tactics of the critics.

Relevant to the issue are the following points:—

- There has been a shift of students away from Government schools throughout Australia for whatever reason (the threat of industrial disruption to classroom teaching could well be one) and this has tended to cause a job concern among teachers in some states.
- In 1981 non-government schools educated 23.1% of all Australian school students and received 12% of the total education budget.
- It is estimated that students in non-government schools save Governments and the community approximately \$1200 each.
- Before 1972, apart from a few years of gratefully received assistance for science laboratories and libraries, there was no capital help from Government.

As parents, you need to keep well-informed about the educational platforms of our political parties in order to influence them and to protect

your own interests. It needs to be said and to be recognized that it was a massive effort by parents, religious orders and the Catholic community that provided the Catholic schools we now have.

Tonight I congratulate the Federation of Parents & Friends' on their initiative in establishing a full-time office and in appointing an executive officer, Mr. Leo Dunne. I thank them for their work on the funding issue, for their representation to Government on behalf of Catholic and other non-government schools, and for their continuing efforts in fostering the growth of the parent/teacher partnership in education.

While we acknowledge that any group in the community has the right to lobby Government for further support, we cannot accept that lobbying should be such that it causes rifts in the community and develops a mentality of government school versus non-government school.

While independent schools are 'money-savers' to the Government, they also provide parents with a basic right of choice of an education for their children, independent of that offered by the state systems.

TERRACE IN THE EIGHTIES:

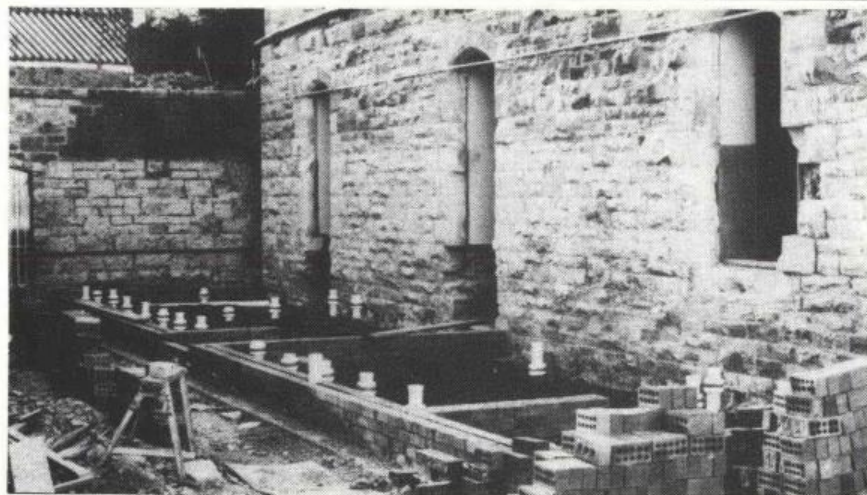
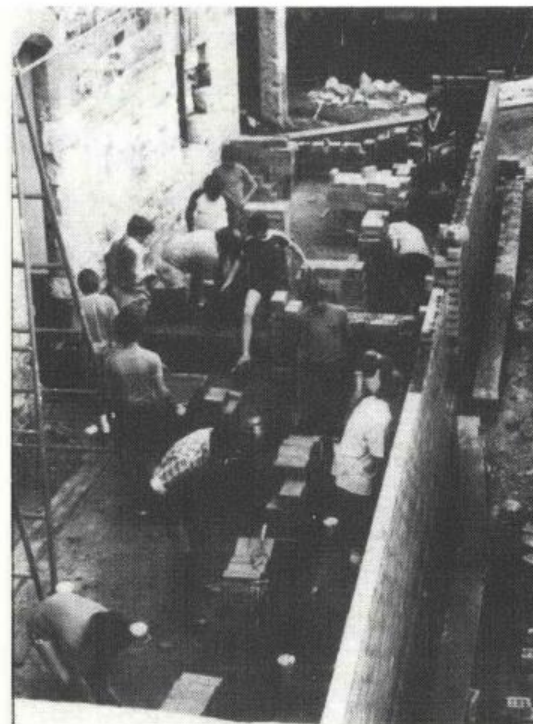
When we, at Terrace, say we are an Independent school, we are really claiming to be different, to be offering something special, and this raises the question: What is the unique role of Terrace as we march together towards the 21st Century?

There is a danger that we can become so engrossed in our varied school activities at which we perform so well, that we don't take time to look beyond our narrow school horizon to society at large. When we do reflect on our society, none of us is likely to be very satisfied with some of what we see. The recent Bishops'

Social Justice statement on Housing and Poverty highlights just one issue of concern.

For years, Terrace students have been going into society and some have been filling influential positions. Many have made and are making a positive impact, and it is safe to say that without their Christian influence our society would not be as good as it is today. However, there is a danger that, faced with the seemingly overwhelming complexities of societal problems, any of us can shrug our shoulders and retreat into our private worlds, because "It's too big out there, and you can't do anything about it. You can't beat the system".

What society needs today are **upstream** helpers — people who are aware that they can make a difference. Society does need downstream helpers to respond to individual troubles, but even more so, today's society is in need of helpers whose care-giving horizons are expanded to include not only individuals but also their social settings, and these are the upstream helpers.



Our students of today have the potential to be the Christian leaders into the next century, no matter which professions individuals choose to enter. Rather than look upon knowledge as an end in itself or as a means of employment, our students must see it in relation to the whole of life. They must come to realize that they can make a creative contribution to the ongoing development of man and his world in the framework of global consciousness and with a sense of world citizenship in the context of Christian values.

This, then is the challenge we face at Terrace. To have our young men involved with the ideals and real possibilities of being upstream helpers, of being convinced that they can make a real difference, a difference that is sorely needed today and that will be even more necessary in the years ahead.

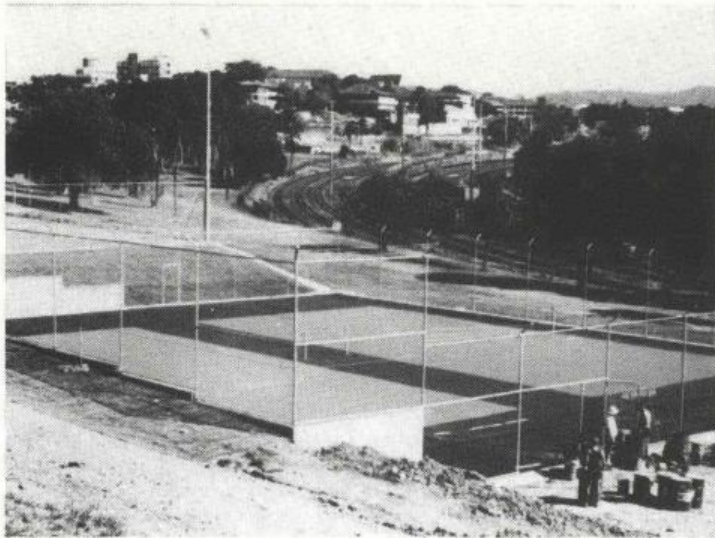
CAPITAL DEVELOPMENT:

This year has seen the completion of many projects:—

- The Manual Arts building has been in use for three months, and while more equipment is to be added, it is proving its worth to students and teachers alike. The assistance of the Commonwealth Government with a grant of \$80,000 for this project is gratefully acknowledged.
- At Victoria Park, a large storage facility for sports and grounds/maintenance equipment is making our use of this area much more convenient.
- Ten concrete practice wickets are now in use and are a great asset to our cricket teams.
- Two new tennis courts have given our tennis players additional and much needed playing areas.
- The kitchen/dining/teaching complex at the Terrace Outdoor Education Centre is in use with final completion imminent.

- The long awaited tunnel under Gregory Terrace is providing safe access to Victoria Park.
- A new shower/toilet block at the Tunnel entrance will soon be finished.
- An office for our second Deputy Headmaster has been built.
- The installation of a new micro-reader-printer allows better use of the micro-film library.
- The Computer facilities have been further developed with the bringing on line of a central memory storage unit for program loading and personal program development.

Projects presently being planned include the building of a residence at Maroon, the remodelling of the White House and the provision at Tennyson of public toilets and a dining area for visiting teams.



THE SCHOOL:

The high demand for enrolments during the year indicates that Terrace continues to enjoy the confidence of the Brisbane Catholic community. Most classes are completely booked for many years ahead and have long waiting lists. This year, the enrolment was 958 with 220 in primary and 738 in secondary.

SECONDARY SCHOOL:

Staffing:

The quality of any school is determined, to a large degree, by the quality of its staff. During this year I have been most impressed by the dedication, concern and competence of the Terrace staff. We could easily take for granted the fine efforts for our students by this committed group of men and women.

Our beginning of year seminar was a large help in our staff-community development process, and we will have a further seminar in early 1983. This year we welcomed several new staff members:— Mrs. P. Barry, Mr. P. Beggs,

It is a tribute to our staff that in a year with such a large turn-over, the school continued to run so smoothly. Mr. Earle Denning is the first non-brother to fill the role of Deputy Headmaster at Terrace. Already his influence is apparent. His years of experience, his concern, expertise and approachability are characteristics that we have come to appreciate. Mr. Brian Kent has joined our staff as school accountant, a most important position in such a complex organisation. He has also assumed responsibility for our non-teaching staff.

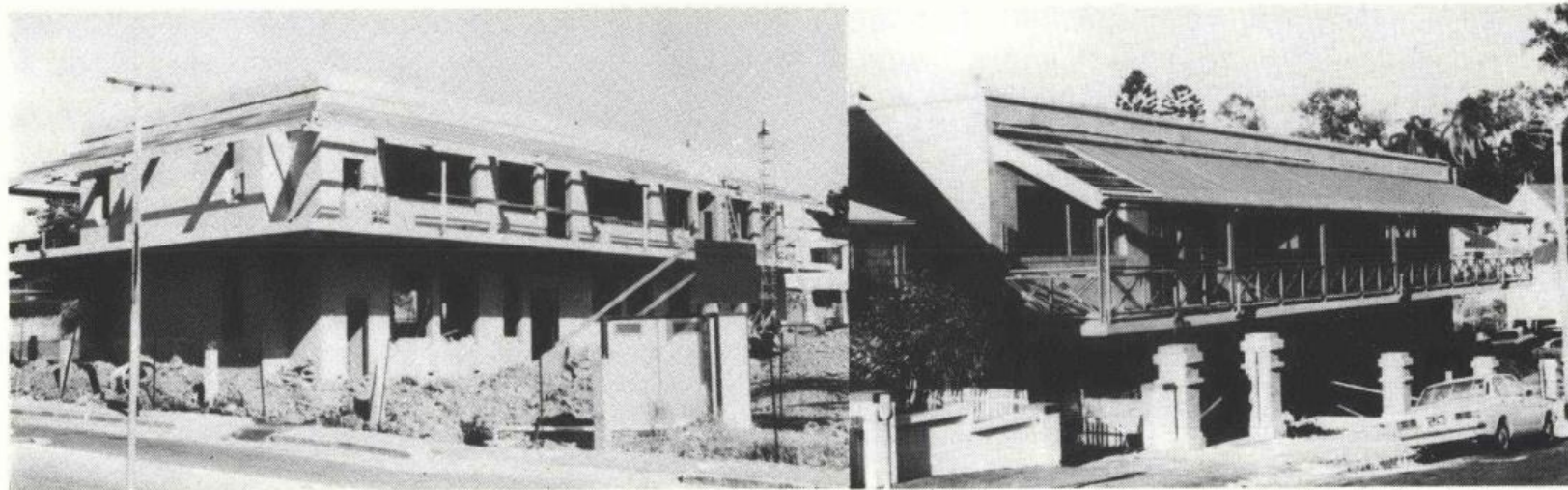
Seniors:

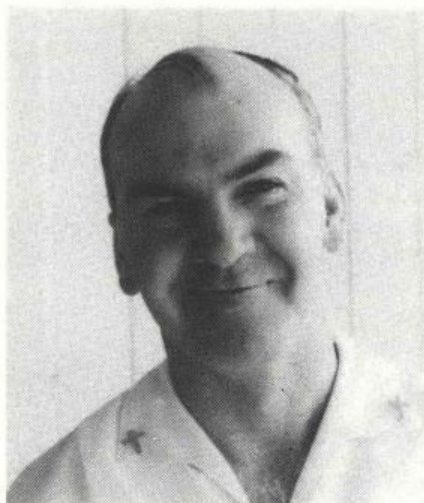
On behalf of the Terrace Family, I thank these young men and the rest of the Senior class for their service to the College during the year. They have been a good Senior class, maintaining the standards of the past and setting an example for the future.

SPIRITUAL TRAINING:

It would be easy to presume that only the formal Religious Education classes contribute to the spiritual training thrust of the school and that teachers so involved are the only staff charged with this responsibility. However, at Terrace, without under-rating the place of Religious Education classes, we do see all staff as being involved in Religious Education and Spiritual Training. In all of our dealings with our students, we are constantly exerting an influence. This influence has great impact on student values and attitudes and contributes largely to their formation. Only as we try to be aware of this and then to carry out our duties accordingly, are we really fulfilling the purpose for which Terrace was founded.

Our thanks go to our priests who have made themselves available at our many requests. In particular, I would like to express our gratitude to Fr. John O'Shea for his regular availability to the students for Reconciliation. Each class had the opportunity for retreats during the year — some residential. The aims of these retreats — to provide the chance for a religious experience that is not available in the classroom but that is essential for religious growth — were achieved, thanks to the great participation of the boys and the assistance received from staff and many others.

Br. Murray, our R.E. Co-ordinator has done much to encourage and assist the teaching of the programs through the school and deserves our gratitude.

Community Service:

As an exercise in active, practical christianity, the students participated in many charity appeals throughout the year. The MITHRA Appeal for the handicapped in India captured the compassion of many and over \$500 was raised.

The senior citizens at Burdeu House, close to the College, have been thrilled with visits from the band and choir. Several classes also had the privilege of spending time with these grand people. A group of Senior Students volunteered their services at the Royal Brisbane Hospital to assist during an industrial stoppage.

Library:

The Br. J.S. Campbell Library continues to be the nerve-centre of much of the learning in the school. Sr. Gabrielle and her library staff have been kept busy catering to the needs of school departments and students. The Audio Visual centre has had a continuing growth in hardware, software and usage.

OUTDOOR EDUCATION:

This year has seen the Outdoor Education program include the Year 11 students for the first time. Now all students, from Years 7 to 11 attend the Centre for a 4-day experience. Some Year 12 and 11 students attended camps in leadership capacities, taking responsibility for the general welfare of a group of younger boys. The whole Maroon exercise is regarded as an integral part of the school curriculum and is seen as an invaluable asset in the total development of our students.

1982 has been rich in growth, both in program and facilities. More than 700 boys used the Centre and have had the opportunity of learning at first hand many of life's skills.

Mr. Kerry Thomas, our Outdoor Education specialist and his assistant, Mr. John Kerrisk with our Year and Class Masters are to be congratulated for their enthusiasm, care and interest in making the program work so well.

SPORT:

None of you needs to be reminded that the Terrace sporting commitments are many and energy-consuming and that there is a need for us all to maintain a careful balance, so that one element of a student's life does not suffer at the expense of others. On the whole, it appears that this balance is being found. When a student, himself, examines his priorities and then adjusts his commitments so that each facet of his life receives due concentration, he is really preparing himself for the more unstructured years ahead when, away from the promptings of parents and teachers, he has to fend for himself.

Participation in sport carries with it a large hidden agenda. Performance is only part of it. The lessons of accepting both wins and losses, the value of self-discipline, the learning of

co-operation with and commitment to others are some of the life-long benefits from sport that are of much more value than the fleeting glory of a few victorious moments. For these lessons to be learnt, sport must be approached with correct motives. In 1982, as in the past, the conduct, sportmanship and spirit of Terrace sport have evidenced a healthy and commendable approach, remarkably demonstrated in the dignity of the 1st VIII in claiming their first ever Rowing Championship and in the maturity of the 1st XV in accepting their first Premiership loss in six years.

Besides providing ample opportunity for the students to participate in a large range of activities, the sporting program gives parents and staff and other members of the Terrace Family the chance to come together. The familial spirit evident at the various venues is a most valuable by-product of Terrace sport and is something that I trust we never lose.

Much of the credit for a fine sporting season must go to our Sportsmaster, Mr. Tony

McKinnon. His expertise, dedication and care have been evident to all, and Terrace sport has benefited from his presence. Our teaching staff gratuitously give many hours of their own time in coaching and supervising teams and without them and the many involved Old Boys, Parents and Friends, the aims of our sport program would not be achieved.

PERSONALLY:

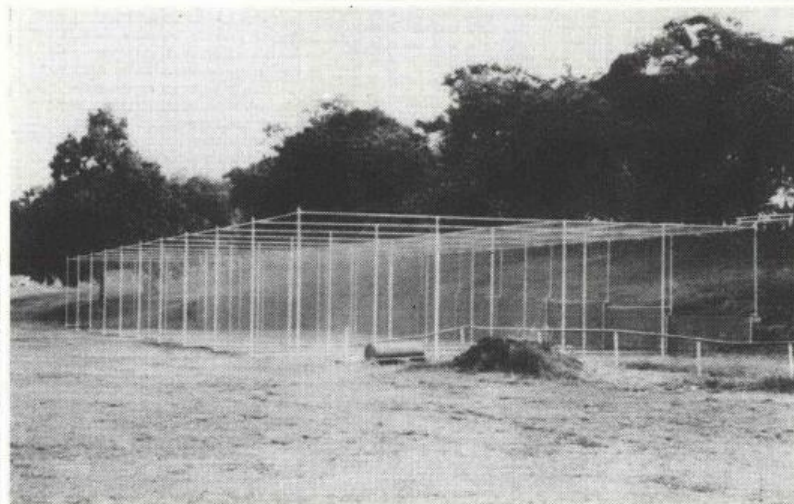
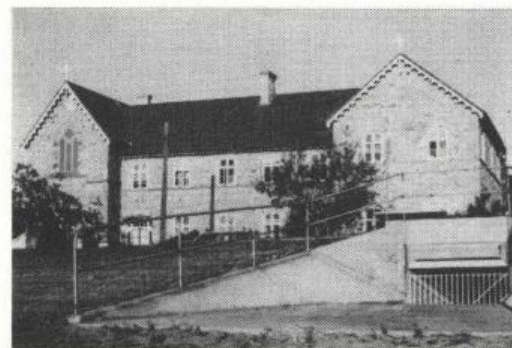

Our school is a complex place. For it to run smoothly, many people have given of their expertise and energy.

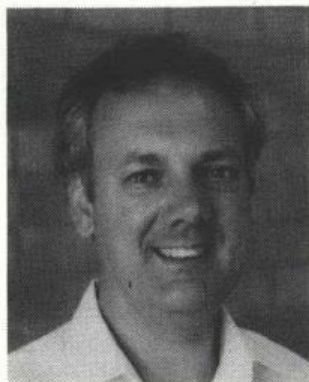

May the good Lord, through His Mother and St. Joseph, our patron, continue to bless us and the work we endeavour to do.

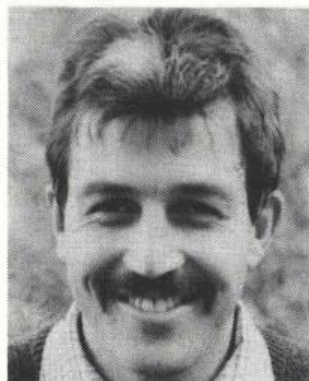

1982 ANNUAL REPORT:

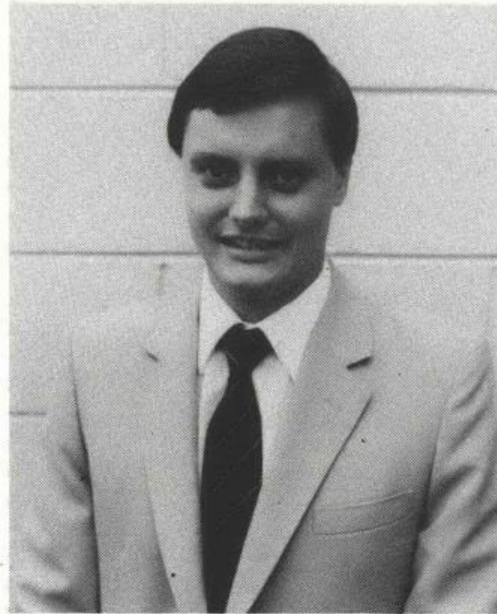
Old Boys' in 1982 continued to support Terrace, formally through the Association and informally by giving assistance in various forms including coaching sporting teams, giving guest lectures to students, and commissioning a painting of a former Headmaster to name but a few.

MEMBERSHIP:

1982 was an excellent year for memberships; a record number of 34 Old Boys' took out life membership. Seventy Old Boys' renewed their ordinary membership including five student members. The 1981 senior class enjoyed the status of honorary membership during their first year out of school.

FUNCTIONS:

Old Boys' functions in 1982 were well patronized. The year commenced with the holding of the Annual General Meeting and Annual Mass celebrated by Reverend Father Peter L'Estrange. Old Boys' at the meeting were addressed by Reverend Brother Buckley, the school's former Headmaster, who is now engaged in the administration of Christian Brothers' Schools throughout Queensland. The meeting also provided an opportunity for those present to meet the new Headmaster, Reverend Brother White, who left those present in no doubt that the school's Headmastership continued to be in good hands. If numbers were down a little at last year's Mass and A.G.M., it may have been due to the celebrations the day before when Terrace won the Rowing Championship for the first time in the history of the competition.

The tradition of fine after-dinner speeches was continued at the 1982 Annual Dinner. The guest speaker, His Honour Judge Broad regaled the 120 members present with anecdotes after the style of previous great speakers such as Sir James Killen and Professor Mahoney. A particularly pleasing feature of the evening was the large number of family groups represented.

Unfortunately, the luck was not with the Irish at last year's Race Day; the favourite for Gregory Terrace Cup being unable to carry the Red and Black colours across the line fast enough to be in the major placings. Nevertheless those present ensured that the day was a

success and that it be continued as a major function on the Old Boys' calendar.

The present boys won the cricket trophy at the Old Boys' Sports Day held at Tennyson in October. Some of the more energetic members took part in the cricket, golf and touch-football arranged for the day.

The Old Boys' Association also took part in the Mass and Picnic at Camp Maroon organized in conjunction with the Parents and Friends' Association and Terrace Ladies' Group. The main reason for the open day at Terrace's Outdoor Education Centre was to commemorate the construction of a cross erected for outdoor Masses. The plans for the cross were presented to Brother Buckley as a gift at the function to farewell him held in December, 1981.



FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTION TO SCHOOL:

With the profits made from our functions, interest derived from bank deposits and members' subscriptions and donations, the Old Boys' Association contributed approximately

\$5,000 to the school. \$1,000 was donated to the Primary School's Resource Centre. The money was used to purchase material for children who are slow learners and for the particularly bright students. Old Boys' funds will also be used to buy a new computer terminal for the school and some prints by well-known Australian Artists which will be hung in classrooms.

OLD BOYS' ACHIEVEMENTS:

It was a year of achievement for our Old Boys' in their personal life. The Queen's Birthday Honours List saw recognition given to four Old Boys':—

Reverend Brother Adams (former Headmaster) — made a member of the Order of Australia for service to Education;

Norbert Byrne — made a member of the Order of Australia for service to Rugby Union Football;

Ashley Goldsworthy — made an Officer of the Order of the British Empire for service to computing; and

Ted Howard — given the Medal of the Order of Australia for service to the community.

1982 also saw the appointment of another Old Boy as a Judge of the Supreme Court with the elevation of the Honourable Mr. Justice Glen Williams.

At the beginning of 1983, Neil Buckley from the senior class of 1972 (now the Honourable Mr. Justice Buckley) was appointed to the Bench as a Judge of the Family Court of Australia.

Also in the field of law, congratulations were in order for Peter Wadley who was elected President of the Queensland Law Society and for Gerry Murphy who became President of the Law Council of Australia.

Of the younger Old Boys' who distinguished themselves during the year, Mr. Bryan Horrigan (College Captain 1979) was awarded the Youth Excellence Medallion by the Queensland Government.

CONCLUSION:

On behalf of the Association, I wish to express my gratitude to the Headmaster, Reverend Brother White for the assistance and support which he provided both personally and through his staff. The Association's administration is dependant to a large degree upon the secretarial staff of the college. In that regard I wish to thank all the ladies in the school's administration centre particularly Miss Rose Metcalfe for her tireless assistance.

In conclusion I wish to thank my Vice President Michael Slater, and Secretary Joe Mangano and Assistant Secretary Michael Broad for their support throughout the year. Members can be assured that the Association's finances continued to be capably managed by our Treasurer Simon Dyer. I commend all the other members of my committee and thank them for their support, particularly the 1981 senior representatives, Peter Steele and John Devereux.

The Committee undertook two fund-raising functions in 1982 – the TERRACE 'AT HOME' and the TERRACE CARD LUNCHEON.

The TERRACE 'AT HOME' was held on Friday, 12th March at 7.00 p.m. in the College Centenary Hall. This function, attended by some 490 Terrace supporters was both a social and financial success and resulted in a nett profit of \$4,787. As a result of this function a cheque for \$3,200 was presented to Brother White to cover the cost of new curtains for the College Hall. The Committee catered for this function and, under the direction of Nancy Thong, the Mothers presented this food magnificently

despite the limitations imposed by a school situation.

The annual TERRACE CARD LUNCHEON was held on Wednesday, 21st July. The record number of tables booked necessitated a change of venue from the College Hall and it was with overwhelming relief and gratitude that the Committee accepted Brother White's offer of the newly completed Manual Arts Building. This building was the ideal setting for a card luncheon – indeed for any Terrace function – but the machinery and equipment now installed means the building has now taken on the character for which it was intended.

Nett proceeds for the card day amounted to \$1,850. Out of this amount, the Terrace Ladies Group was required to pay one-third of the costs of the erection of the cross at Maroon; erected as a testimonial to the dedication and foresight of our previous Headmaster, Brother Buckley. The Terrace Ladies Group shares these costs with the Old Boys' Association and the Parents and Friends' Association.

DEDICATION DAY was held at Maroon on Sunday, 24th October and took the form of a Family Picnic Day.

The annual DAY OF RECOLLECTION was brought forward this year to Thursday, 26th June. Directors for the day were Father Kieran Dalton and Sister Joan Sutherland of the Catholic Family Welfare Bureau and the day was held at the home of Lorraine and Andrew Douglas. Lorraine and Andrew, thank you for your kind offer.

On the 5th and 6th August of this year, a conference of Independent School Headmasters and Teachers was held at this College. At the request of the Headmaster, the Committee undertook to provide morning and afternoon tea and luncheon on each of these days. With the exception of a threatened collapse of the marquee on the final day, all went well with these arrangements.

The Committee has also been pleased to assist the Parents and Friends Association with their presentation of FAMILY DAY held at Tennyson Playing Fields on Sunday, 1st August. The Group again undertook to conduct the Cake and Sweet stall, Devonshire Teas, and this year, provide luncheons of 'Chicken in the Basket'.

The various end of year PARENT/TEACHER nights are concluded and the YEAR 8 ORIENTATION EVENING and YEAR 5 ORIENTATION MORNING have seen new parents and students welcomed to this school.

The GRADUATION DINNER was held here in the College Hall on Friday, 12th November, and the boys who attended this dinner have now joined the ranks of the Old Boys' of this school.

And so the activities of the Terrace Ladies Group for 1982 are now brought to a close.

On behalf of the Committee, I would take this opportunity to thank all who have assisted us in our activities over the past year.

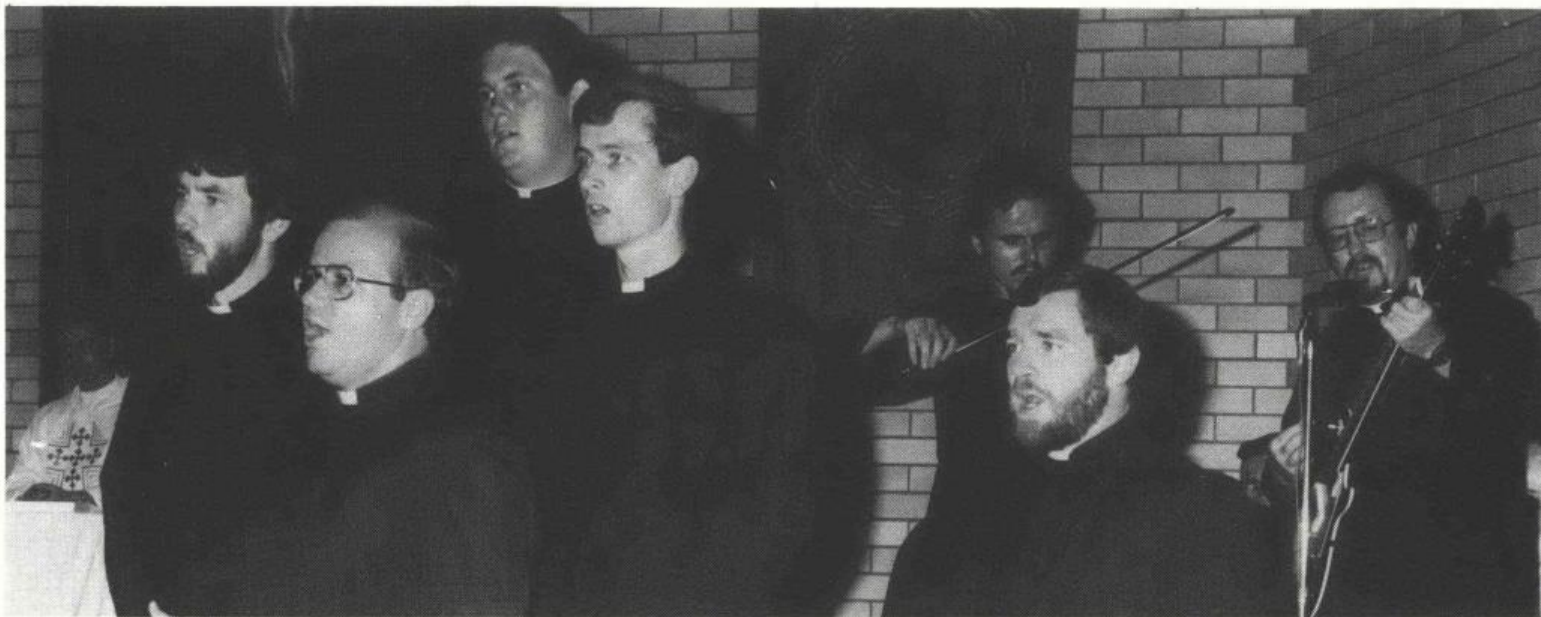
the school printer; the members of the Office Staff and all who have met our requests for assistance with unfailing courtesy and consideration.

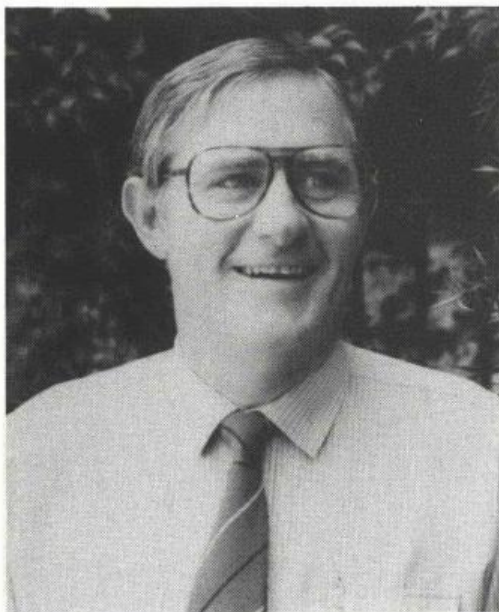

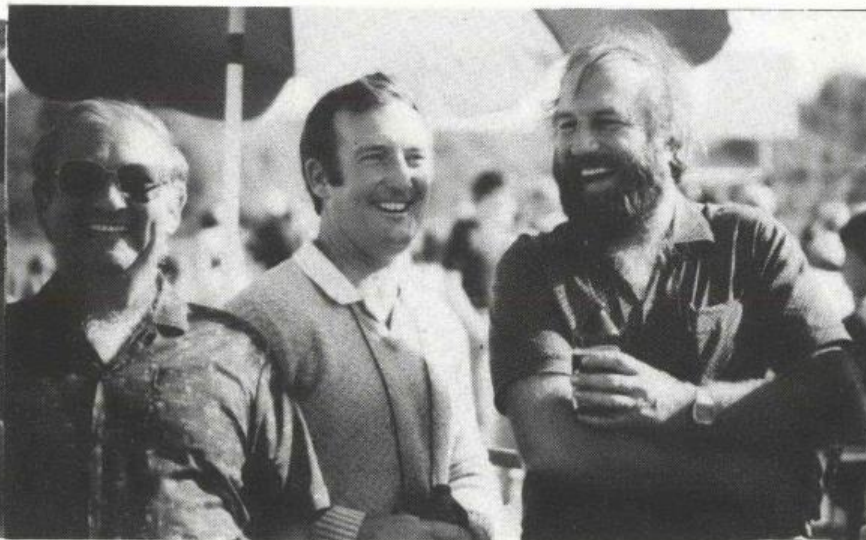
Family Day was again an enormous success in every aspect. Family Day brought the Terrace Family together for a social day beginning with

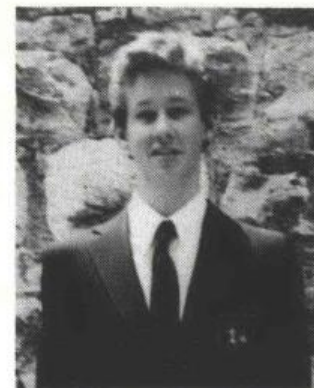
College Captain's Address

1982 signals the end of the 7th year of the 2nd century of Terrace. It has been a year of great endeavour in many diverse fields. It is significant that when I spoke to the school for the first time at the Prefect's Inauguration, the whole senior class was assembled on the stage. In that sense, it has been a year contributed to by the seniors as a whole and who led the school as a whole.

At the beginning of your last year at Terrace it is a unique experience to suddenly find yourself as the top class of the school. In spite of being told what to expect, it is a position which you cannot practise for. This year I believe the senior class have every reason to feel proud of the manner in which they occupied and exercised this position, as leaders of the school.

As well as application to work in general, the year has been characterised by much dedication to activities outside the classroom. A student will learn as much after school hours (at training and in competition), as he will from any curriculum. At Terrace everyone has always been encouraged to be involved. Terrace offers a range of activities that allows no-one the excuse that they "do not have the ability". Most students will never make a first representative team in any sport but by playing in other levels and supporting others, you will become just as much an integral part of the school as anyone.

Activities as separate as Football, Debating, Swimming, Chess and Rowing and Choir, mean that there is a broad spectrum of opportunity for people to be involved. Terrace has always shown itself to be mutually supportive. The fact that people will come along to support practically any activity proves that an effort for

In terms of achievement, the school put a distinctive stamp on 1982 with a first-ever and compelling win in Rowing and a second in Swimming. In other activities, we may not have been as successful but we learnt how to win in style and lose with grace while, in both cases, doing the best we could.

It would be misleading if I were to assess the success of this year in terms of wins versus losses. The real lesson that Terrace teaches us is that there is no victory like trying your hardest and playing the fairest.

The example of others always acts as an inspiration. The dedication of the seniors to what they were doing at, whatever level of competition (1st or 6th) would have been noticed by many younger students. It was heartening to see Terrace crowds responding to performances by Terrace competitors at any level.

A crucial factor in the lives of all students at Terrace is the support of their parents. The sacrifice of finance, time, but most importantly,

interest, could never be measured in terms of academic or sporting success. Basically the parents of students at Terrace are interested in their sons becoming part of the school and emulating its values.

It is this same regard which one meets from all quarters. Br. White and the staff have shown that their concern extends much further than the school hours. As seniors we have had much to do with the staff who look to us to give example. They, themselves, play a significant role in setting the tone and attitudes of a school such as Terrace. This year saw the first time where representatives were sent to a staff meeting from the senior body. Hopefully this is a precedent which will continue to improve communication and relationship.

This attitude of enthusiastic support extends also to the old boys, many of whom give up time to coach teams and take an active role in life at the College.

Looking back at my years at Terrace it would be that atmosphere of encouragement and support in the present students from all members of the Terrace family that really stands out.

Everyday, every class says the "Founder's Prayer" devoted to Edmund Rice. It is a reminder of the origins of this school, why it was established, and what the aims were of the Christian Brothers. The work of the Brothers today and the keen interest from all people connected with Terrace bear witness to how important those aims are still held to be. Hopefully, our connections with those ideals and that humble beginning will always be a major factor in the Terracian attitude.

To next year's seniors, particularly, I would encourage them to look to past years at Terrace for inspiration but look to themselves, as a year, for the dedication to make 1983 exactly what they would like. Terrace never has and hopefully

never will, exist on its past record. I have confidence that next year's seniors have the potential and the attitude to carry on the traditions of Terrace.

In the final analysis, it is impossible to say that all students come to Terrace for the same reasons. Parents select this place for the education of their sons, perhaps because of the school's impressive academic record or the father's connection as an old boy, or some other motivation. 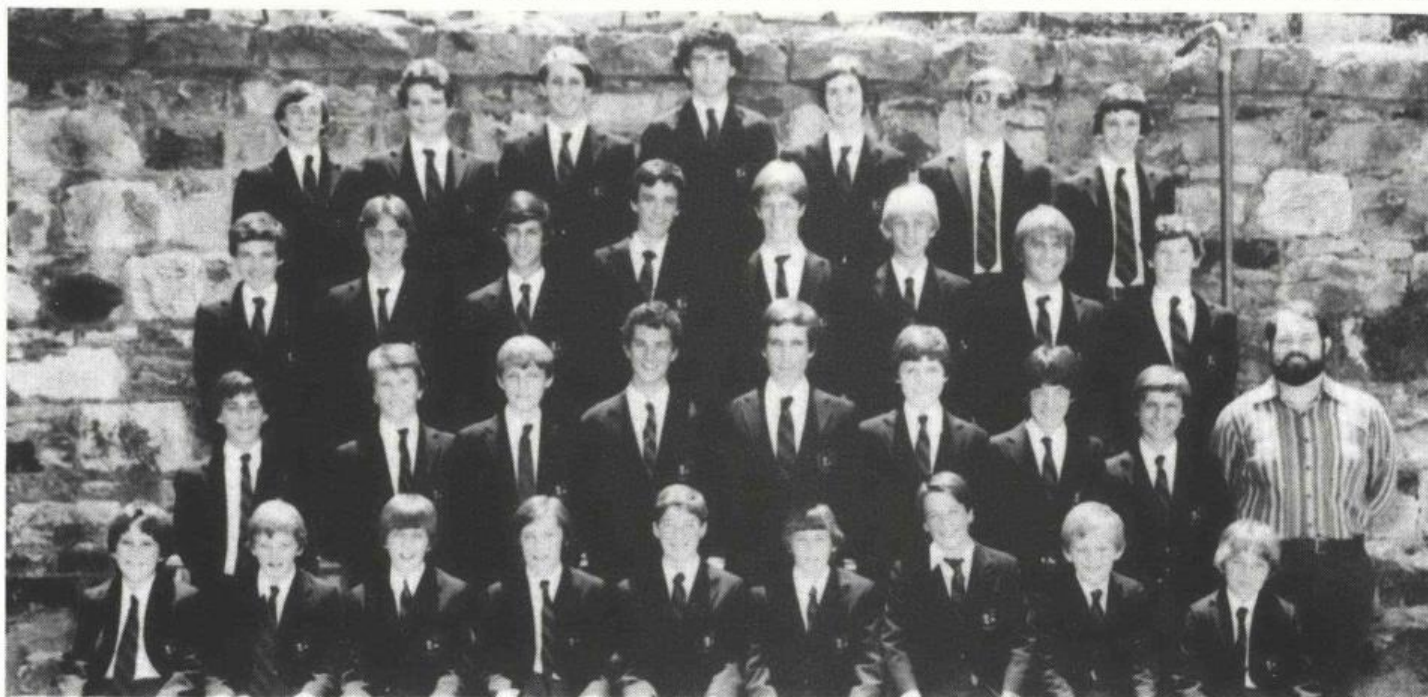




Band

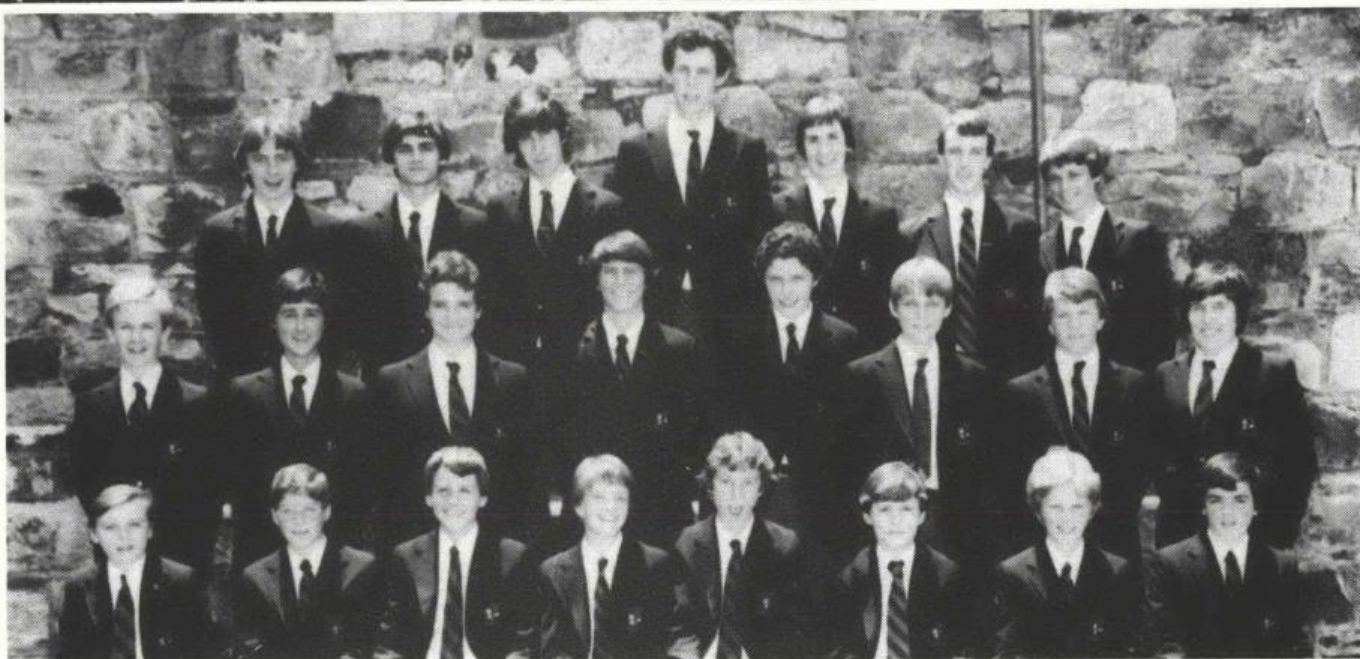

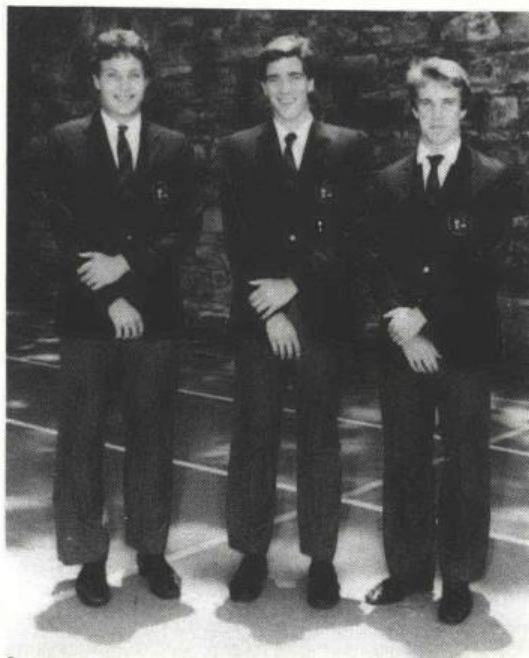

Counselling

The Counselling Department conducted by Mrs. Carole Hunter, a new appointee this year, has aimed to continue the high quality of assistance given by Mrs. Rhonda White over the last three years in providing an individual confidential service, available to boys and their parents. The overall aim of the service is to respect the worth and dignity of each individual student and encourage him to achieve his own unique potential. This, in broad terms, is carried out by assisting the student to achieve an increasing understanding and awareness of his choices whether he be faced with a personal, vocational, or educational decision.

In addition to counselling on an individual basis, services have also been incorporated into the formal school curriculum with the co-operation and assistance of teaching staff across all secondary school grades.

A Guest Speaker Program for Year 12's was held during First Term. It included 32 speakers from tertiary and technical institutions and also direct from commercial industry. These talks covered more than 40 different career areas. A number of former Terrace students also spoke during the program about the changes and problems they have encountered in their transition from school to tertiary study and work.

Career education was also incorporated as part of the Year 10 Citizenship Education curriculum, which included a visit to the Career Reference Centre.

In respect to Study Skills Education, a number of activities were carried out across all secondary grades. Early in Term 1 a Study

Habits Survey involving Year 11 students identified a number of areas in which study habits tended to be poor. Consequently a series of Study Skills Talks were given to Year 11 students on Time Planning; Effective Reading; Notetaking and Listening; Learning and Memory; and Examination Techniques. Similar talks have also been given to Year 8 in Term 3/4, and four after school workshops, open to students from Years 9 to 12, were also conducted during Term 3. The Department was involved in the College's personal development program. Year Nine's participated in a full day workshop which focused on goal setting, self-awareness, motivation and factors contributing to learning.

Additional activities to the Counselling department included two research surveys involving past Year 12 students who have left Terrace in 1978 and 1981. The aim of this research was to acquire information as to which tertiary courses were most commonly undertaken and what type of full and/or part time employment students obtained. Old boys were asked to comment on satisfaction in their career choices, the strength and weaknesses they saw in their schooling at Terrace, whether they felt any other subjects should be introduced into the school curriculum, and what more could be done to tailor the counselling services to their needs. Other questions assessed the means by which they had obtained employment, and the qualities in students which employers looked for most when offering them employment. The feedback from these old boys is most appreciated, and has proved a rich pool of valuable information.

Work Experience in a number of industry areas was also organized in specific instances for students considering employment in the work force next year.

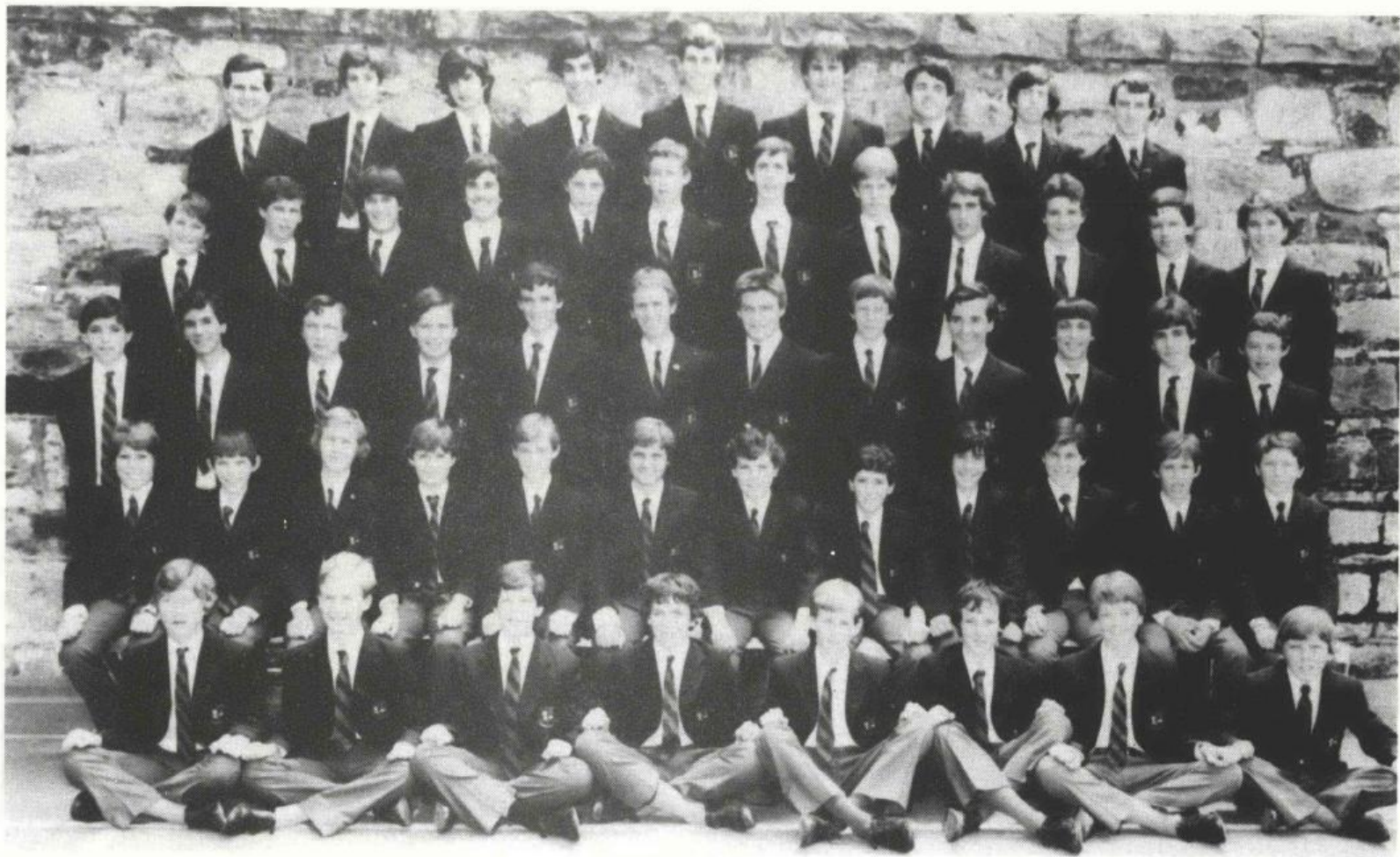
St. Vincent de Paul Society

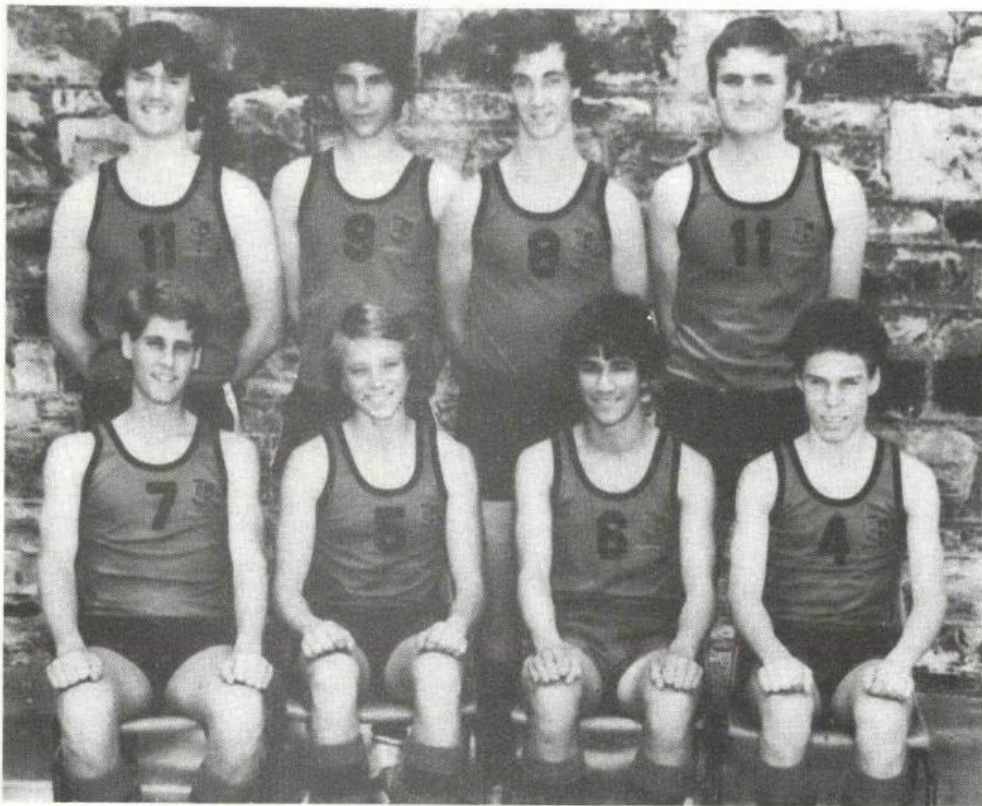

Buckley'. I was very pleased to see the family aspect of the day promoted so well and the fact that the old boys' race was contested by three old boy crews was a sign of growing concern.

While the Terrace win at the Head received ample publicity, the 1st and 2nd VIII's notoriety was at a peak on 6th December when they achieved major media coverage for their 'attempt' to row from the Terrace shed to Southport. A front page photo in the "Sunday

Mail" with the caption "Sinking Feeling" told the story adequately. The first attempt was halted 2 km off Cleveland Point. However on Wednesday, 30th December, the full journey, with minor mishaps was completed in 10 hours 10 minutes. Thanks to major sponsors, Lee Cooper Jeans and Mills Transport, along with sponsorship from other companies and individuals, the \$4,000 raised made the effort well worthwhile.

As part of the preparation for the 1982 championships a touring party of twelve oarsmen, two coxes and two coaches made a trip to New Zealand. The famed N.Z. hospitality, especially from Tauranga Boys' College, was the outstanding feature of the two weeks in New Zealand. The Principal, Mr. Norm Morriss, the Rowing Master Mr. Malcolm Browne and their famous Rowing Coach Mr. Bill Eadie were very generous with their time and assistance. To Allison and Bernie Rowe goes the gratitude of the whole squad for the arrangements of

billets and the wonderful entertainment during the two weeks. The new training ideas, the race experience and the intensive training were valuable aids in the total preparation. The two regattas at the Blue Lake and Lake Karapiro gave the Terrace squad a new insight into the sport, with regattas starting at 9.00 a.m. and finishing at 6.00 p.m. with races every five minutes. Thousands of competitors created an atmosphere which made Brisbane pale by comparison.

The return to Brisbane and the school regattas meant the race for G.P.S. honours was on in earnest. The Terrace club began the season slowly with a great deal of organisation delaying top performance in the fours. The C.E.G.S. regatta saw a small representation, but with a convincing win to the 1st IV, schools were aware of our presence. With the Terrace Regatta held at Lake Kurwongbah on the 20th February the club began full participation with moderate success. While places were achieved by several

The remainder of the season saw a steady climb in performance from the Terrace crews with many of them finishing in places prior to the G.P.S. Championships. As the day of the Championships approached the spirit of the club was growing in confidence with all crews peaking for their top performance.

On the day most crews recorded their best results for the season. The U.15 crews performed creditably to see the U.15 2nd IV and 3rd IV both row into third place. The U.16 crews all rowed with purpose and a keen competitive spirit, but it was left to the U.16 3rd IV to gain a good second and the U.16 2nd IV to claim a third place in a very close finish. Undoubtedly our strongest age group was the Open, where all

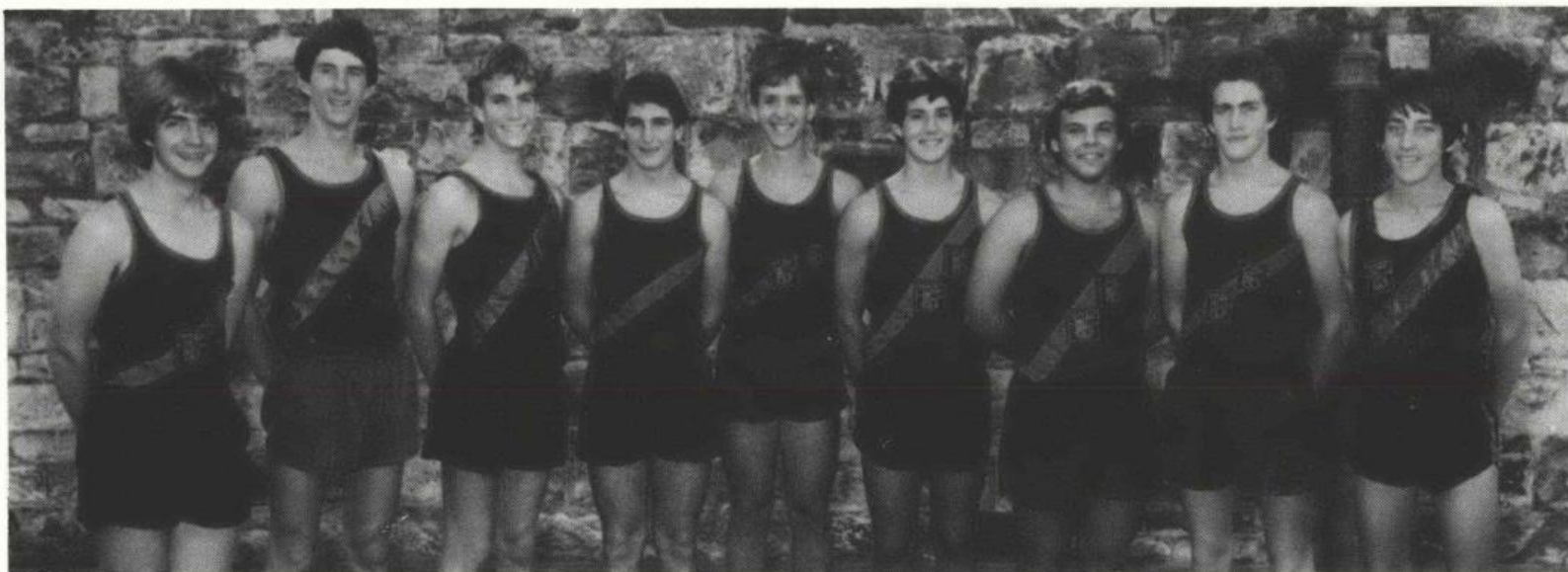
of the fours gained a place. The 4th IV's third place should be judged in the light of only two weeks of coaching — a fine effort. The 3rd IV rowed into third place also. The 2nd IV's unexpected win was thoroughly deserved as they lifted their ability for the big occasion. In the 1st IV's race the Terrace crew led from start to finish to leave no doubt as to their supremacy. After injury and forced crew changes, the 2nd VIII's result was understandable though very disappointing.

The crew would like to thank all the rowing schools for the competition and the opportunity it gave them. There was little separating the G.T. and B.G.S. crews at the finish. Two good crews gave of their best. I personally was very sorry to see the T.S.S. crew finish in 5th place — they were, and in my opinion, still are, an excellent crew who had a nightmare experience on the day.

In a strong year (all three placegetters rowed faster than last year's winners), the quality of Terrace's win was terrific. To snatch victory over the final stages from a crew which was leading by more than a length with 700 metres to go, showed the spirit and determination that makes for champions.

When a crew wins by 0.5 of a second, the winning edge cannot be attributed to any one factor. To the Terrow Committee whose support materialised in the purchase of the "B.M.

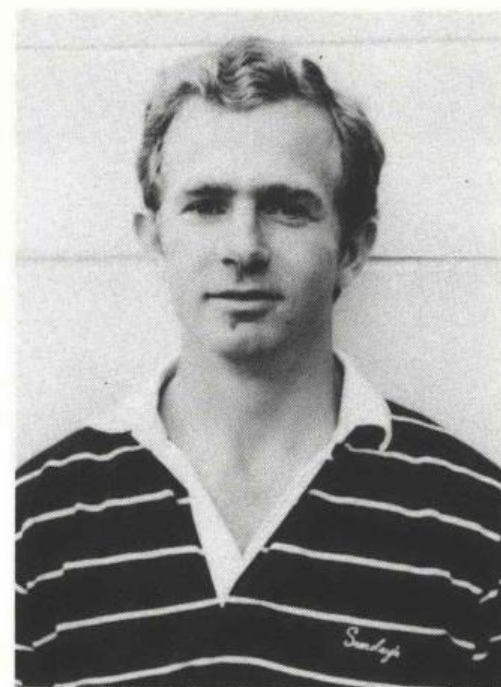

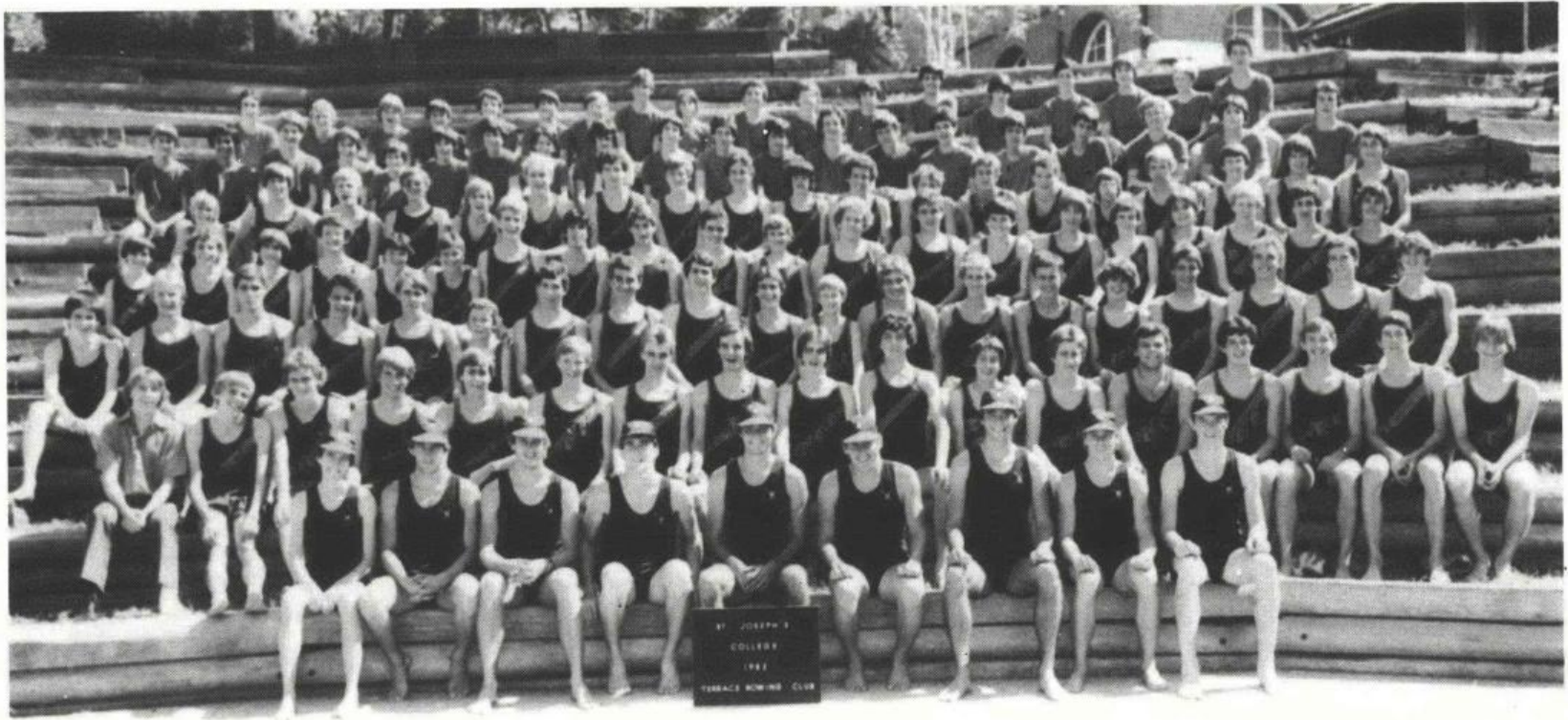

Rugby

1982 marked the end of Terrace's record breaking run of 1st XV Premierships in the G.P.S. Competition. The 1st XV finished fourth in the premiership, a creditable performance. Captain of the 1st XV this year was David Porter. Stephen Partridge was Vice Captain, and both boys, along with all members of the 1st XV, bore the pressure of a difficult season with dignity and maturity.

The pressure on this year's team to maintain Terrace's record-breaking run of premierships was enormous. The way they accepted that pressure and the subsequent disappointment of defeat, speaks volumes for the character of the boys and their coaches, Mr. Michael Broad and Mr. Lester Hampson. After losing three games, the team was able to come back and play magnificent Rugby against Nudgee College to register a record win in the last game of the season. This achievement epitomises the great calibre of the 1982 1sts. Many lesser teams would have folded to mediocre performances under similar pressure and disappointment.

Michael Broad coached the 1st XV again this year, with Lester Hampson helping when other commitments permitted. Terrace is indeed fortunate to have the services of two such knowledgeable men, in this position, as in the past years both did an excellent job.

At representative level, Justin Nasser was selected in the Queensland Schoolboys' U.15 side, Stephen Partridge and Tim Dodson were selected in the Queensland Schoolboys' team. Stephen was later chosen in the Australian Schoolboys' side which toured New Zealand in September.

However, 1982 held many other rich and

memorable moments for Terrace. The historic performance of the 2nd XV must be unique in the 54 year history of the code at Terrace. The 2nds ably lead by Captain Peter Welch became the first Terrace 2nd XV to win every G.P.S. game. Constantly being unsettled by the loss of players to the 1sts because of injury, they overcame this adversity to record some outstanding wins.

The 4th XV and 13C's both had excellent seasons winning every game they played. The 6th XV, playing in the 2nd Division, started the season in shaky fashion, but ended it in glory, undefeated. A highlight of their season was a 16-10 win over the Terrace 5th XV.

The 15D's after losing unexpectedly to C.E.G.S. finished their G.P.S. commitment as leader of their division.

The 14D's not only were undefeated but scored more points (210) than any team from the 9 schools in the G.P.S. competition. Not to be outdone the 13B's ended the season without a point being scored against them — a unique distinction!

Looking at the season in its entirety Terrace won more games than any other G.P.S. School and ended the season with more teams top of their division than any other school. An incredible performance by a school of Terrace's size and a fitting tribute to the effort and skill of the boys as players and the staff and Old Boys' as coaches. The dedication, commitment and knowledge of the staff who were involved in the coaching is second to none.

The performance of the Terrace 'D' teams this season indicates remarkable depth of talent and knowledge of the code. Of the five 'D' teams, Terrace ended top of three age groups

and runner-up in a fourth. While the depth of the talent is unquestionable the faith of supporters in the ability of the top teams could not have helped but be restored this season, with the improved performance by the 'A' teams. The U.15A's and 14A's finished runners-up in their divisions. The 15A's improved performance was indeed a highlight of the season and a credit to their coaches, Br. Xavier Robinson and his small band of Old Boy helpers. The 14A's after losing every game last year had an up and down season this year, but ended with three wins and three very close losses. The 16A's had a disappointing season losing every game, but with an ounce of luck could have won five of their games.

Terrace this year fielded 26 teams, a record number for the College. This in particular is an extremely pleasing aspect of 1982, because at the base level of Schoolboy Rugby 'participation' is the prime objective closely followed by development of basic skills and finally nurturing, encouraging and coaching of excellence. The first two of these aims have in every way been fulfilled at Terrace this year. While development of excellence is measured by 'A' team performances, has made an impressive improvement. All these achievements are in themselves great things. But it is very easy to emphasise the pure performance aspect of inter-school Rugby and neglect the educational benefits. From this point of view as well, 1982 has been an excellent year for Terrace Rugby. The team and school spirit displayed by the boys on and off the field has always been of the highest possible calibre. The conduct and sportsmanship of the boys during their games has been devoid of major incidents and like their spirit, excellent at all times.

Results such as those achieved this year, do not just happen, they are the result of many

hours of hard work, by all members of the Terrace family. The boys themselves devote many hard hours to vigorous training, particularly at 1st XV level. Staff, old boys and friends of Terrace give their time tirelessly as coaches to instil into the boys the appropriate skills and attitudes of sportsmanship and fair play which are an inseparable part of the traditions of the game of Rugby. Parents and friends of Terrace spend many hours in support roles. These roles take many forms from support as spectators at games to helping with the many services that are provided for our lads and the visitors from other schools at Tennyson on home games. The mothers of the 1st XV served lunch for coaches, staff and referees for all our home games. The mothers of the 2nd XV served afternoon tea to the 1st XV and their parents. Both groups did a superb job and Terrace valued your generous help.

To Mrs. Gauld and her tuckshop helpers, the thanks of the Terrace family is extended for a great job well done.

Mr. Basil Porter and the members of the Rugby Supporters Committee are to be commended once again for the support they gave to all teams. This year the Committee financed scrum machines and the 1st XV tour in the South. The most successful and perhaps the major project of the Committee was the staging of the Terrace Harlequins (Old Boys') versus 1st XV game, at Tennyson. The College offers its thanks to you all for your continuing support.

This year marks the retirement of Mr. Basil Porter as President of the Committee after a five year term. Basil's term as President has been marked by an unselfish and tireless commitment to the development of Rugby at the College. Terrace has certainly been the greater for its efforts.

THE PLAYERS:

DAVID PORTER (Captain; Flanker) — This was David's second year in the 1st XV and this was by far his most successful season. He improved dramatically over the two years and became a most feared flanker. David led the team by example and was a superb team man. He was a very worthy recipient of the 'FORDE' trophy. David was a pleasure to coach and one who would never let you down.

STEPHEN PARTRIDGE (Vice Captain; Fullback) — Stephen would have to be one of the most exciting fullbacks to play schoolboy Rugby for some time. His powerful running, bone crunching defence and superb kicking were a feature of his game. Stephen was a dynamic player who was heavily marked during the season. Although he suffered a serious injury, Stephen went on to gain the best back award as well as selection in the Queensland Australian Schoolboy Rugby sides.

LUIGI DI CLEMENTE (Loose-Head Prop) — Luigi played his first year in the 1st XV this year and did so with great maturity. His scrummaging was most creditable but his forte was in the rucks and mauls. Luigi was a consistent and dedicated trainer and was always willing to learn. Luigi will be of great value to the squad in 1983.

STEPHEN MURRAY (Hooker) — Stephen was playing his second season in the 1st XV and he did so with distinction. As in 1981, Stephen showed that size of body is no limitation to the size of performance and heart. His non-stop efforts were encouraging to all who watched him and played with him. A REAL team player who was a pleasure to have in the side.

JOHN TYQUIN (Tight-Head Prop) — John playing his first year in the 1st XV performed extremely well in a very important and difficult position. John was always keen to learn and always played to the best of his ability. John capped off a good season with a match winning performance against Nudgee.

MICHAEL POLLARD (Second Row) — Michael was one of the biggest improvers of the year. Michael had plenty of problems at the beginning of the season but worked very hard and soon became a very accomplished No. 2 lineout jumper. With Mark Frawley, Michael formed a very competent second row combination.

MARK FRAWLEY (Second Row) — Mark (not the tallest of second rowers around!) made up for his lack of height by his work rate. Mark was a very honest worker who always drove himself to a stand-still. He was never far from the action and never let his mates or school down.

PETER WEST (Flanker) — This was Peter's second year in the 1st XV but his form was not up to his standard of 1981. Peter's speed and harrassment of the opposition was a strong feature of his play. Peter will be a very important and valuable member of next year's squad.

TIM DODSON (Lock) — Tim was head and heels above any No. 8 in the competition. Tim was totally dominant at No. 6 in the lineout; was a devastating runner with the ball and was a sound defender. Tim was very loyal to his team mates and was a reliable trainer. Tim was one of the stars of the side who gained selection in the Queensland Schoolboy side.

JAMES DOUGLAS (Half-back) — James was one of the most improved players in the team. Not in the original side, James took his chance (through an injury to Simon Neill) and grabbed it with both hands. A thoroughly reliable player who always gave of his best.

MARK ENGLISH (Five-eight) — An injury early in the season denied Mark of a successful season. Not the most noted trainer, Mark did give of his best but never regained his form of last year.

JOHN THONG (In-Centre) — John was one of the late bloomers in the 1st XV. John has an exceptional side step and running talent, but lack of confidence early denied him from producing his best. He did show his true form later in the season however, ending in a super performance against Nudgee.

MICHAEL ROBSON (Out-Centre) — Michael was another player to suffer an injury early in the season which restricted him greatly and so was not able to retain his dazzling form of 1981. Michael's keenness of overcoming his injury was to his credit and he played the first half of the season before being injured once again.

BRENDAN LUMB (Wing) — Brendan was the real find of the season. He is a dynamic runner of the ball and an excellent defender. Unfortunately Brendan didn't get enough opportunities to show his best but he will be a most valuable member of next year's squad.

PAUL LANDY (Wing) — Paul was a strong starter in the 1st XV but he soon made his mark with very strong and powerful running and block busting defence. Paul was a consistent trainer and improved greatly as the season progressed.

DAVID O'SULLIVAN (Utility Back) — David performed extremely well during the year playing in three different positions. He showed great maturity and understanding in playing to his best in all positions.

SIMON O'KANE (Wing) — Simon had a mixed season during 1982 but eventually made his way back into the side with some strong performances. Simon left his best till the end when he played very well against Nudgee. His strong running and fierce determination was a feature of his game.

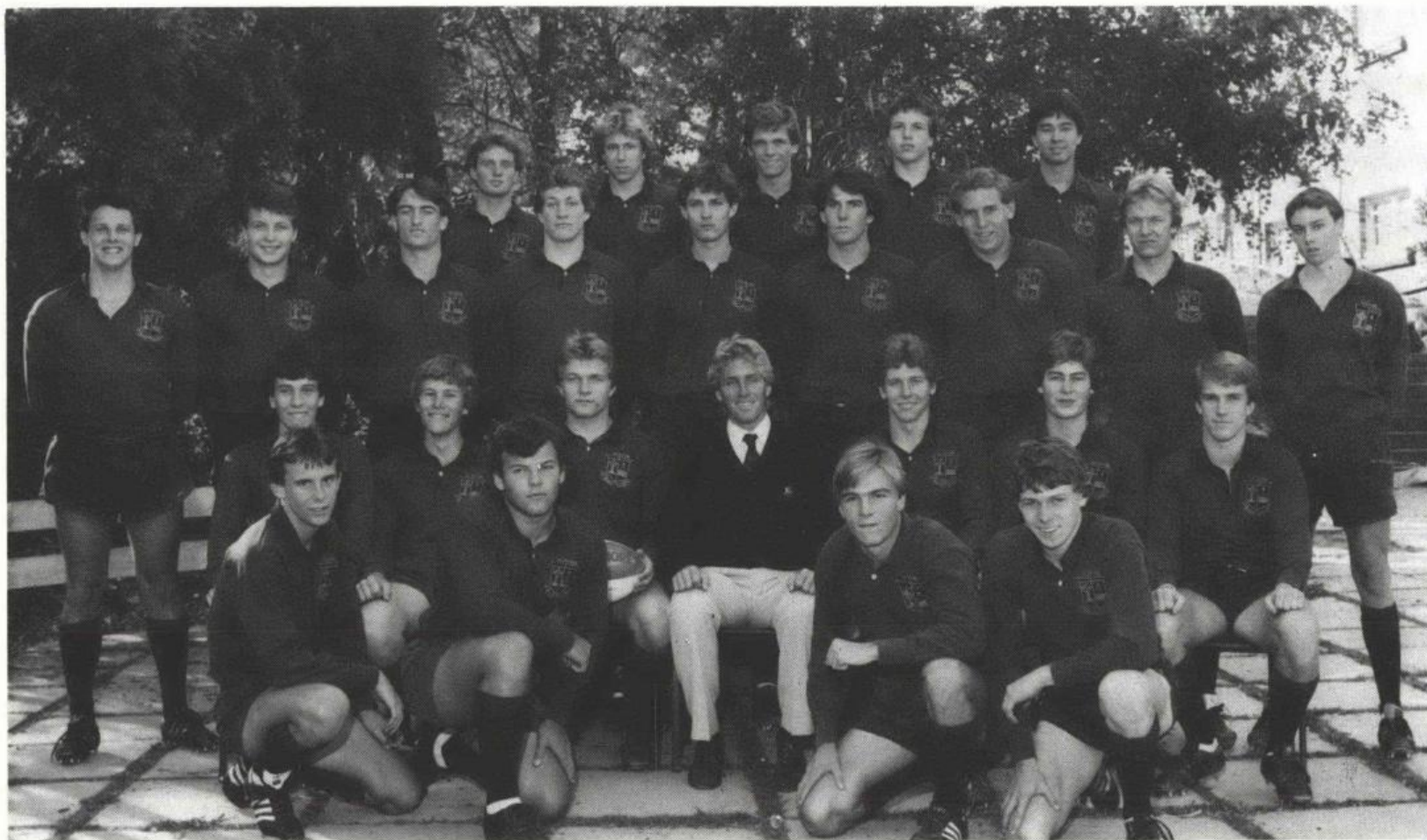

back row of Tim Dodson, David Porter and Peter West put in another big hearted effort, while newcomer James Douglas acquitted himself creditably at half back, with a sound game and good service to this three-quarters.

The game developed into a tight defensive encounter, with neither side giving an inch. The match see-sawed between the 22m lines with the defence of both sides more than equal to the opposition's attack. The only Terrace points came from a Stephen Partridge penalty goal from B.S.H.S. offside in a lineout.

G.T. 24 defeated T.G.S. 6 (2 penalty kicks)
(S. Partridge try, 3 conversions & 2 penalty goals; S. Murray, D. Porter tries).

The 1sts had a very comprehensive win over a very light but nevertheless very committed T.G.S. team. The forwards had their usual hard working, honest game despite some early and unexpected opposition from a very plucky Toowoomba pack. The backs had perhaps their best game so far this season. A much improved three-quarters ran the ball with more confidence and determination than we have seen all season. It was an encouraging performance by the three-quarter line.

Terrace led 12-3 at half time. Stephen Murray had scored minutes before the break from a charged down kick. Half way through the second stanza Stephen Partridge scored once again by coming into a backline movement. The final try was reward to a hard working skipper, David Porter, who scored wide out after taking the ball in support of a backline sortie in the T.G.S. 22m.

G.T. 12 defeated I.G.S. 7 (try & penalty goal)
(S. Murray, P. Landy tries; S. Partridge 2 conversions).

In appalling conditions at Ipswich the 1st

XV recorded a desperate win with the winning try coming only minutes from the end of play.

The conditions favoured the spoiling, bustling type of Rugby which I.G.S. sides traditionally play. This advantage was used extremely well by I.G.S. as they played ten man Rugby the entire game, with the three-quarter line rarely handling the ball, let alone running it. During the first half the spoiling tactics of I.G.S. paid dividends with 70% of the play taking place in the Terrace half. Terrace's first try came after 15 minutes of play, when hooker Stephen Murray took the loose ball from an I.G.S. dropped pass over the line to score.

Midway through the second half a hassled Terrace XV found themselves trailing I.G.S. 6-7. Finally after some fifteen minutes of consistent pressure, a switch in play by the back line sent winger Paul Landy in for a try four minutes from full time.

G.T. 4 lost to C.E.G.S. 11 (2 tries & a penalty)
(P. Landy try).

In a fast, furious, hard game C.E.G.S. defeated Terrace's 1st XV 11-4 at Tennyson. The game was dominated by a well drilled C.E.G.S. back line, two very swift C.E.G.S. flankers and a dogged never-give-in commitment by Terrace.

The Terrace forward pack dominated the first 25 minutes of the game, and our mauling and control of set plays dictated the terms of play for this period. In particular the mauling of Luigi Di Clemente and David Porter the line out work of Michael Pollard and Tim Dodson and the cover defence of Peter West contributed greatly to the control Terrace asserted over the game during this phase of play. This dominance manifested itself in the form of a 4-Nil lead for Terrace after some 28 minutes of play. The try was scored after 7 minutes of play by Paul

Landy, from a Stephen Partridge chip over the Churchie backs. Several injuries to key Terrace players unsettled the side towards the end of the first half. This allowed Churchie to post 11 quick points before the break. The second half remained scoreless, with the resolute Terrace defence being the main feature of play.

This was a game in which the final scores do not reflect a true indication of the encounter. B.G.S. won 22-8 after both sides had scored two tries a piece. In the end accurate goal kicking presented Grammar with a very easy victory even though the reality of the struggle was far from easy for the boys in blue. Terrace asserted an immediate superiority in both forward and back play, from the outset of the game. The forwards combined well in both tight and loose play, with Luigi Di Clemente, Tim Dodson and David Porter contributing manfully to this Terrace domination in the forwards.

The three-quarter line had several excellent early runs, culminating in the first try of the match after ten minutes of play. From a lineout, Terrace sent the ball along the back line, where fullback David O'Sullivan, came in to make the extra man. This opened the gap which allowed David to score.

The half-time score was 13-4. Terrace forward dominance early in the second half led to the second try from a fumbled ball in a lineout. Stephen Murray was able to gather and score. Injuries to key players seemed to unsettle the team and allowed Grammar to coast to an easy win.

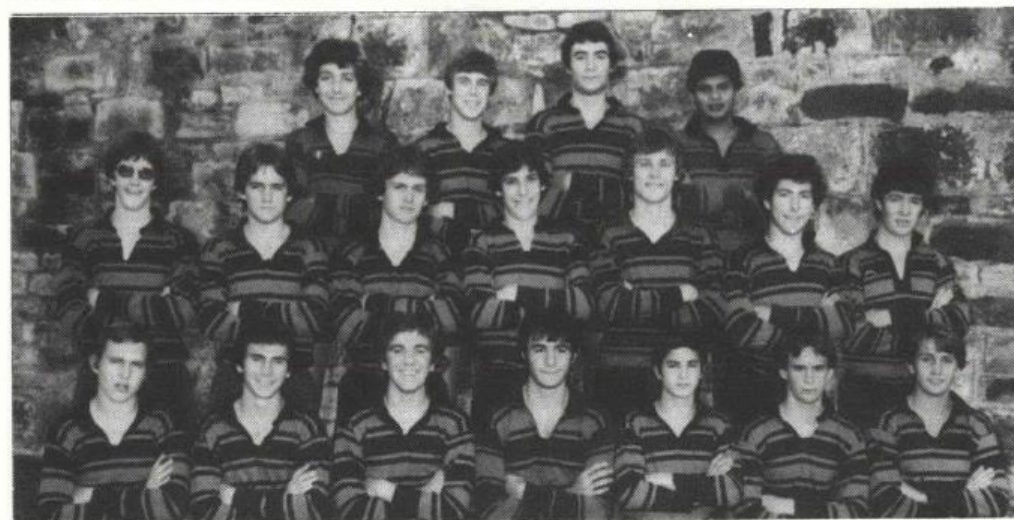

Dogged resolute defence laid the foundations for a very close Terrace victory in the 1st XV match against T.S.S. at Tennyson. The closeness of the encounter surprised many Terrace supporters. A determined T.S.S. put immense pressure on an unsettled Terrace team and Terrace were unable to put the finishing touches to many promising attacking moves. Once again some splendid lineout work from Tim Dodson and Michael Pollard, good loose ball control from the back row of Dodson, David Porter and 1st XV newcomer Gavin Reynolds and excellent scrumaging from the whole forward pack laid the foundation for the backs to score the points. Both tries came in the later stages of the first half from classical back line play. One each to Stephen Partridge and U.15 newcomer Nigel Walsh. The half time score was 18-9. The second half was dour stuff with Terrace managing to hold out (except on one occasion) a much improved T.S.S. attack.

This match ended the 1982 season on a high note when the 1st XV defeated Nudgee by the biggest margin in over 50 years of Rugby clashes between the two Colleges.

During the first half Terrace gradually wore Nudgee down and at half time lead 6-0 as a result of two penalties by Stephen Partridge. The Terrace pack controlled the game for the entire match. Once again Michael Pollard and Tim Dodson performed well in the lineouts,

Stephen Murray, Luigi Di Clemente, John Tyquin and Mark Frawley played magnificent support Rugby, running off each other from short passes and mauling superbly without a let up. All of this work is the stuff of which all great historic Rugby victories are made.

The back row of Tim Dodson, David Porter and Peter West showed once again, that they are without peers in G.P.S. this season. The three of them worked relentlessly and brilliantly to pave the way for the ultimate Terrace win over Nudgee. Stephen Partridge added a penalty a few minutes into the second half. Play then settled in the Nudgee 22 for 90 per cent of the rest of the match. The Nudgee defence could not match the pressure of an inspired Terrace forward pack. Eventually the gaps opened and the Terrace backs finished off the work of their forwards with two fine tries. The back row combination of Peter West and Tim Dodson added another try to complete a total Terrace victory.

The first try came from a line out 10 metres from the Nudgee line. From the subsequent maul Terrace won the ball and half James Douglas fed his backs – where quick distribution of the ball created the gap for hard running fullback Stephen Partridge to score in the corner. Fifteen minutes later Terrace was in again. From a scrum 5 metres from the Nudgee line flanker Peter West took the ball from the side, drew the Nudgee inside defence and distributed a short pass to No. 8 Tim Dodson who was backing up. Dodson raced over almost unopposed to score.

Minutes from full time Terrace won a scrum on the Nudgee 22 and in-centre John Thong dummied, switched to out-centre Simon O’Kane and then passed to Stephen Partridge who broke the Nudgee line with a withering burst of speed. Winger Paul Landy who followed Partridge through the gap, had positioned himself perfectly to receive the pass and ran 10 metres to score a copy book winger’s try in the corner.

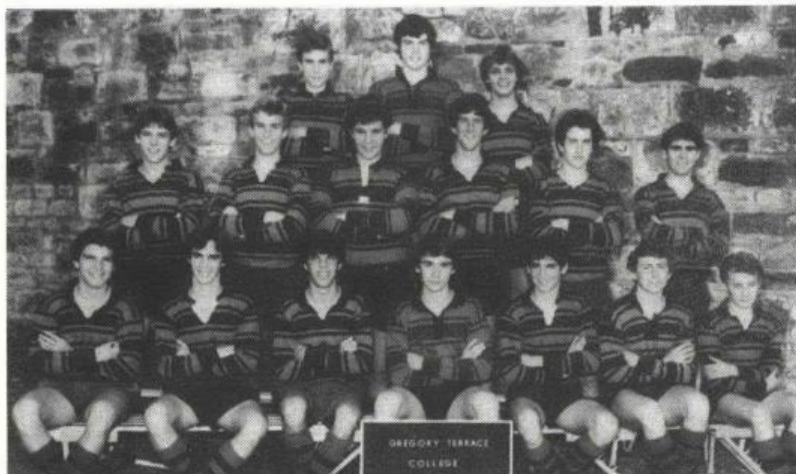

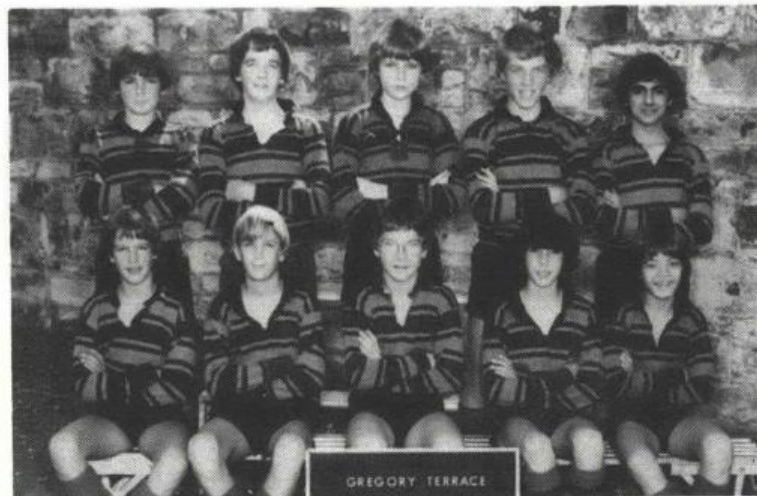

JAMES GORMAN — An excellent fieldsman and fine stroke player who added strength to the middle order.

GERALD KEIM — A true all round cricketer. His 45 against B.S.H.S. and 38 n.o. against T.S.S. were memorable innings in a season complicated by illness and two unnecessary self run-outs.

BRENDAN LUMB — A brilliant fieldsman both in the air and on the ground. He gained valuable batting experience for next season.

His major contributions were his 31 and 2/3 (B.S.H.S.); 31 n.o. (B.G.S.); 10 and 3/19 (T.S.S.) and 47 and 2/27 (Nudgee). These efforts combined with his 5 first innings catches and team leadership made Sean a Captain who will long be remembered by all who played with him.

PAOLO SALERNI — An excellent fieldsman with potential as an all rounder. He should show out well next season.

B.B.C. sent Terrace in on a wet Tennyson No. 2 wicket. Left hand opener Mark Ponniah gave a match saving performance with a determined 17 in 95 minutes. At 12.05 p.m. Terrace were all out for 68 and in deep trouble.

B.B.C. had 15 minutes to bat before lunch on which was now a firm dry pitch. A superb outswinger from Stephen Partridge found the edge and keeper John Thong was seen at his brilliant best. B.B.C. 1/0 at lunch. They were 4/20 soon after, thanks to accurate bowling from Jonathan D'Arcy and Peter Welch. Their fifth wicket partnership of 14 was looking dangerous for Terrace but quick thinking by Captain Sean Remedios obtained a run out. At 7/41 B.B.C. were cracking but the following

13 run partnership had Terrace supporters deep in prayer. At 8/54, Thong took his final catch.

Our three pace bowlers had bowled "over and above the call of duty" but were now tiring. A loose delivery from D'Arcy and the resulting 6 from the unconquered B.B.C. Captain brought prolonged screams of delight from the B.B.C. supporters. B.B.C. at 9/61 needed 8 to win. D'Arcy responded to the challenge. He broke the bail with his next ball!

v. B.S.H.S. (draw). G.T. 9/145; B.S.H.S. 155. Bonus points G.T. 5.95; B.S.H.S. 5.90.

B.S.H.S. batted on a good wicket. They were 5/39 after two hours play. Aided by dropped catches and a missed run-out, State High fought back with a sixth-wicket partnership of 49 and a ninth wicket of 47. They were eventually dismissed at 3 p.m. after 4¾ hours for 155. Stephen Partridge's effort in bowling 29 overs, 11 maidens and taking 3/41 is best described as "Herculean". Terrace came off the field exhausted and the stage was set for a "quick kill" by State High. Compared to their 4¾ hours we only had 2½ hours to make the 155, almost an impossible task on the large heavily grassed Tennyson oval.

The opening partnership between Gerald Keim and Mark Ponniah for 25 lated 40 minutes and gave the Terrace team time to recover mentally and physically. Captain Sean Remedios (31) and then joined Gerald Keim (45) and together they attacked the State High bowling. Stephen Partridge (28) then made his usual hard hitting contribution. When Partridge was out at 6/140, Terrace required 16 runs to win from the 5 remaining overs. We had received 43 overs compared to High's 72. Our batting collapse from 6/140 to 9/145 resulted in the match ending in an exciting draw from Chris McKenna and Gerry See "hanging on".

Terrace travelled to Toowoomba and sent T.G.S. in to bat on a pitch with early moisture. Sean Remedios won the early tactical battle. Acting in his new role as opening pace bowler (leg spinner in 1981) he took two wickets for 0 from his first five overs. At 6/74 T.G.S. were on their knees. Our excellent fielding had kept us in the game. John Thong, Gerald Keim (left-handed running back), James Gorman, Sean Remedios and Mark Ponniah (2) all took quality catches. Ponniah's first was a brilliant diving airborne effort which had T.G.S. 5/69 and should have won the game. T.G.S. were eventually out at 2 p.m. for a moderate 145. Only Mark Ponniah (14) looked professional and stuck whilst our score fell to 5/45. Stephen Partridge (19) had shown that the bowling could be hit but when Ponniah fell l.b.w. after 2½ hours Terrace crashed to 6/52. Toowoomba's score of 145 appeared to have two noughts on the end of it as Vice Captain John Thong came to the wicket to join Andrew Forbes who was playing his first game in the First XI. Forbes (26 n.o.) and Thong (32) did not throw in the sponge. From the first ball he faced Forbes showed his class. Thong played intelligently. When the field closed in, he hit a four and a six from successive balls. Theirs was a match saving stand and gave Terrace a victory by .16 on bonus points.

v. I.G.S. (loss on 1st innings). G.T. 134; I.G.S. 7/148. Bonus points G.T. 3.39; I.G.S. 8.98.

Terrace batted first on their home wicket. Paul Crowley (10) did his part as opener by staying around for 90 minutes. We were in trouble at 4/44 when Andrew Forbes came in to play his second innings in G.P.S. First XI. His innings of 30 was a lesson in concentration

and temperament. The 25 run partnership with Brendan Lumb (10) which took Terrace up to lunch was invaluable. Jonathan D'Arcy (17) hit out after lunch and with Chris McKenna figured in a 19 run last wicket stand. Terrace all out for 134.

Terrace failed to exert real pressure during I.G.S. first hour of batting in spite of Ipswich having spent 4 hours in the field.

Chris McKenna got Terrace back in the game when he had one opener caught behind by John Thong from his first ball and shortly afterwards clean bowled the other. The last two hours saw Terrace make a strong bid for victory. At 4/70 we even had them toppling thanks to an inspired spell of bowling by Stephen Partridge. His figures of 23 overs, 5 maidens, 4 wickets for 41 runs speak for themselves.

Ipswich Grammar were not to be denied. They caught our score with three overs to go. Our opponents played the game well and deserved to win.

Terrace won the toss and sent C.E.G.S. into bat on their surprisingly lively wet wicket. Stephen Partridge made full use of the conditions and his bowling figures: 13 overs, 6 maidens, 7 wickets for 20 runs again speak for themselves. The Terrace fielding gave valuable support. Mark Ponniah (2), Brendan Lumb (2), Andrew Forbes, Gerry See, John Thong, Sean Remedios and Stephen Partridge all took splendid catches. The last wicket partnership of 15 runs by C.E.G.S. was a gallant effort and gave their side some hope. C.E.G.S. all out for 42 with the wicket still 'sticky'.

Terrace were soon in trouble, but Gerald Keim (13) showed the value of his experience and concentration until he ran himself out.

Terrace then slumped to 4/19. Andrew Forbes (8) for the third game in succession was holding up his end. With 20 minutes to go before lunch, Chris McKenna our No. 11 was sent in 'to hold the fort'. He did better than that by making 7 quick runs when runs were more valuable than gold. At lunch Terrace was 6/27, chasing 42 and it was anyone's game. Forbes and Partridge (5) got it up to 7/37 when Vice Captain John Thong came to the wicket. Unlike most others, he did not seem affected by the 'hysteria' generated from the Keim run out and the 'give Churchie catching practice' syndrome. Thong kept his cool and waited for the loose ball. It came. Whack! Straight drive along the ground for 3. Scores were level 42 all. A few balls later, Thong pulled the ball through square leg for another 3 and the match was ours.

Play was delayed for 1 hour because of a wet spot at one end of what otherwise was a good Grammar batting wicket. Terrace sent B.G.S. into bat. Jonathan D'Arcy, 26 overs 6 maidens 3-47 and Stephen Partridge 22 overs 3 maidens 2-46 both gave of their best. B.G.S. on their small oval made 70 runs in the first two hours, only 30 runs in the first hour after lunch and then 78 during their fourth hour of batting. After receiving 71 overs B.G.S. declared at 5/178 leaving Terrace 2 hours to bat.

Gerald Keim, as per previous week, ran himself out. Sean Remedios then played a great captains knock. He had bowled reasonably well with 14 overs, 2 maidens, 0-37, and had fielded brilliantly taking 2 of the 3 catches and generally kept his team going during the four hours of fielding. He was off the field for 20 minutes then came back to bat for the next 1 hour 50 minutes. His 31 not out included

some classic shots and made sure that B.G.S. could not pressurise a win. Cameron Taylor (10 n.o.) coming in at 4/35 justified his selection with good defensive and attacking cricket. At close of play Terrace were 4/58 after 36 overs with the match ending in a draw.

The 1981 premiers and so far unbeaten, T.S.S., won the toss and sent Terrace into bat on 'the village green' wicket badly wet at one end. Sean Remedios (1) ran himself out but a determined stand of 31 by Paul Crowley (14) and Andrew Forbes (11) held Terrace together. Throughout the day heavy rain squalls passed over the ground. Covers had to be rushed on and off and batting, bowling and fielding became increasingly difficult. T.S.S. trying for their third G.P.S. First XI premiership in succession, struggled manfully against the elements and kept the pitch playable.

Rain during the luncheon interval delayed the resumption but we then saw a determined, intelligent and unbroken partnership of 65 between Gerald Keim (38 n.o.) and Cameron Taylor (21 n.o.).

At 4/108 with 2¼ hours of play remaining, Terrace took the gamble and declared. The wicket, thanks to the covers, had improved, but the bowlers run-ups and outfield had become treacherous. We immediately floundered as both star opening bowlers failed to adapt to the conditions. Their short pitched, poorly directed deliveries of the wet slippery ball were hopelessly inadequate and T.S.S. raced to 30 without loss from 5 overs. Rain at 4.00 p.m. saved further embarrassment and the diplomacy began. With conditions now even worse for bowlers, there was no point in wading out again in a hurry. Eventually, at 4.45 p.m., the umpires

decided it best to call the match off as the bowling approaches were impossible. They were right. The whole ground was impossible. The only dry spot was the pitch. Small players would have drowned in the out field. Then the tactical move from Terrace Captain, Sean Remedios — Terrace would 'play up and play the game'.

With 15 mandatory overs, T.S.S. needed 79 runs to win and Terrace were back in the game provided our bowlers could somehow stay on their feet to deliver the ball. Anand Shah (from the Third XI to First XI) was then brought on to bowl his first ball in G.P.S. First XI Cricket. What a Baptism, especially as the stars had already been belted around the ground! In his first over the ball was hit high into the air. Five Terrace players called, but four dropped back as keeper and Vice Captain John Thong strode confidently towards the ball and held it. T.S.S. 1/31, Shah 1/1. In Shah's third over, their star left-hander pulled a good-length delivery hard and fast to deep mid-wicket. Cameron Taylor, playing only his second game in First XI and not previously renowned for his fielding ability, lumbered towards the flying ball. Miraculously, he somehow got his hands to the ball in the middle of the dive. Cameron hit the ground on his left shoulder, rolled and slid 10-15 metres in the muddy water and HELD THE CATCH!!! T.S.S. 2/45, Shah 2/9.

T.S.S. then called for a quick leg-bye. Ever alert John Thong raced 15 metres to the ball, ripped off a glove, turned and threw down the wicket. T.S.S. 3/50. Sean Remedios, bowling fairly good line and length from a five pace run up then got an l.b.w. T.S.S. 4/67. Paul Crowley dived and caught a close-in sharp glance to give Shah 3/13. T.S.S. 5/68 and starting to crumble! Remedios then clean bowled the next batsman. T.S.S. 6/70.

The Terrace Swimming team this year worked hard at training, performed well at Carnivals and developed an outstanding team spirit. These three ingredients combined to make 1982 a vintage year for Terrace Swimming.

Terrace finished second at the G.P.S. Championships; the College's best performance in this sport for over a decade. The first three places were as follows:—

(1) B.S.H.S. 372 (2) G.T. 262 (3) B.G.S. 239

Terrace gained 5 firsts; 9 seconds & 5 thirds. The five wins included three relay wins, two in record times. The Under 15 Freestyle team of Martin O'Brien, Ken Carroll, Colin Robertson, Jon Breene, Mark Hansen and Richard Blanshard won in record time as did the Open Freestyle relay team — which comprised of Tim Dodson, Cal Malouf, Brad Mulvihill, Michael Holmes, Simon Neill and Gavin Stacey. Terrace's other relay victory came from the Under 13 freestyle team of Andrew Sole, John Fredericks, Tim Russell, Robert Cullinan, Denis Sheahan and Roderick Harding.

From an individual viewpoint Tim Dodson (Open) and Martin O'Brien (U.15) were the outstanding performers for Terrace. Tim won

the Open 50m Freestyle and gained a further second and third in other individual events. Martin also won his 50m Freestyle and was placed second in both the 100m Freestyle and 50m Backstroke events in his age group. Worthy of special mention was the effort of Warwick Mortensen. Warwick last year was an Australian age Champion, in May 1981 he broke his right arm seriously in several places. During the recovery phase of his treatment he suffered several complications, as a result Warwick returned to the water only weeks before the G.P.S. Championships. To his credit Warwick gained two seconds and a third in the Under 16 Age Group.

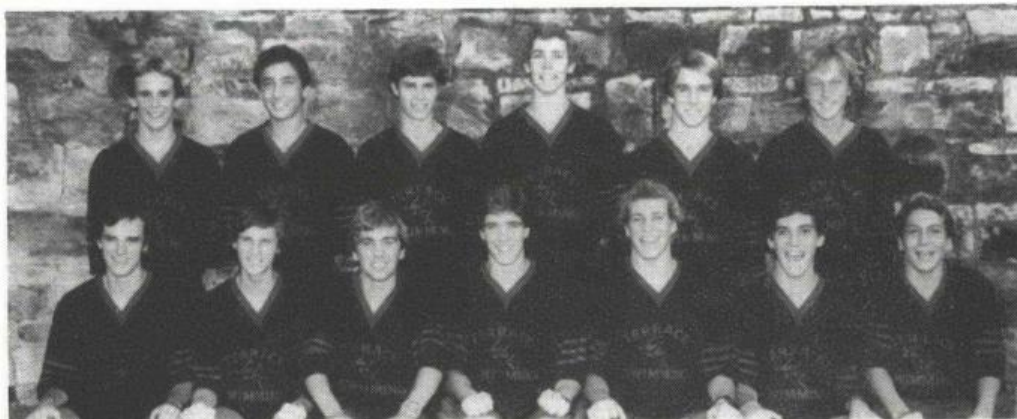

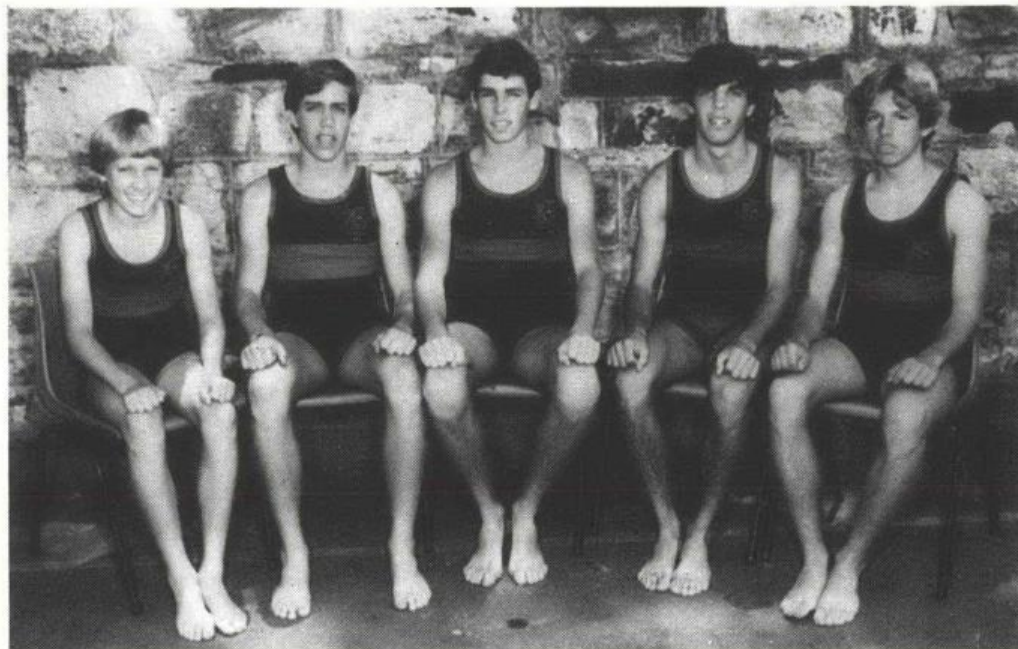
At the State Schoolboy Championships, Colin Robertson finished third in the 400m 15 years and Ben Robertson second in the 400m 12 years.

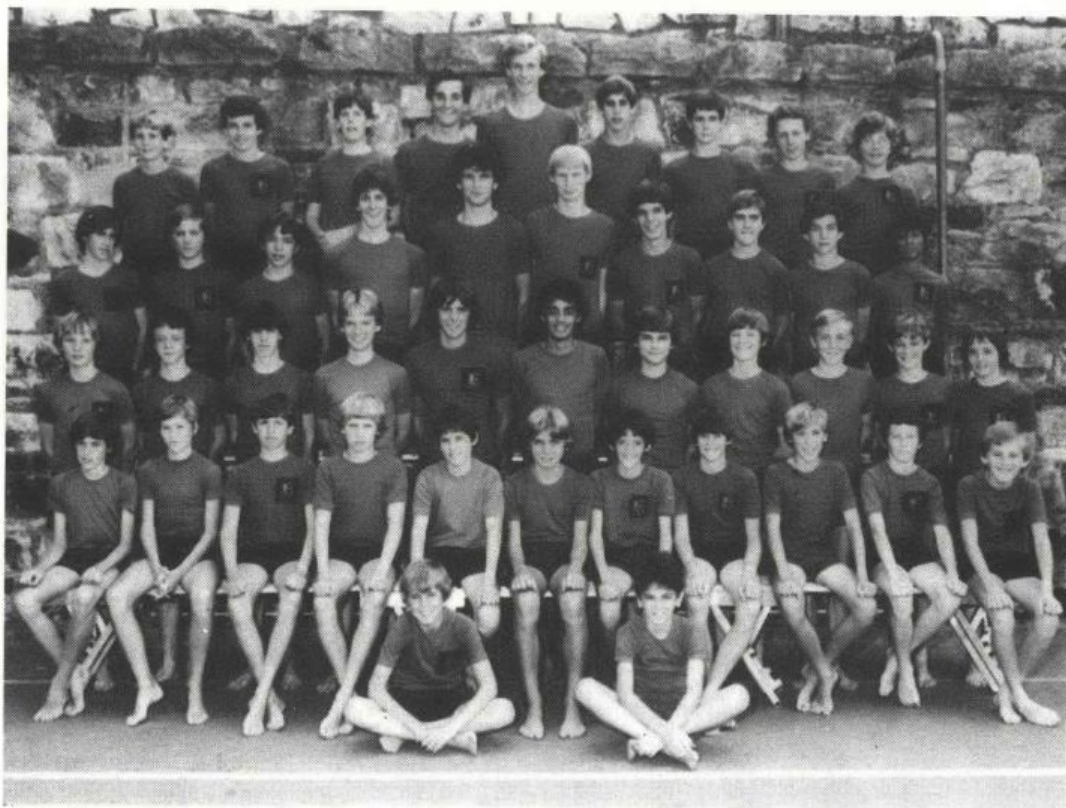
Cross Country

From the 1982 Headmaster's Report:

JUNIOR SCHOOL:

Over the past few years the Primary School has been undergoing a 'silent revolution'. With the release from the demands of public examinations, an approach, laying particular stress on individual discovery, and on firsthand experience, has been possible.

While giving them a balanced diet of emotional security, routine and novelty, the primary staff endeavour to treat their students as 'children' and not as 'little adults'.

During 1982, Terrace Primary has been a happy, exciting and busy place.

STAFFING:

At the beginning of this year we welcomed to the staff Miss Kathleen Casey and Mr. Terry Sullivan. The school farewelled Mr. John Robertson and Miss Kristin Anderson and we wish them well for their future. We thank them for their contribution to the welfare of the College while they were on the Terrace staff.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION:

Each class has followed a program of studies which has been supplemented with special observances. During the year each class has had the opportunity to celebrate a class Mass at least twice. Each boy has also had the opportunity to prepare for and participate in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. We wish to thank Fr. Warbrooke for his loyal ministry to the boys in these areas. The Year 7 classes spent much of their time in preparation for the reception of Confirmation. Part of this preparation involved a camp at Lake Maroon. Other classes have taken special times to help pupils to become more aware of their Christian responsibilities to each other.

Easter was observed with presentation of small plays based on the Easter story by each of

the classes. Some of the boys have participated in the special devotions held in the Senior School to observe the months of May (Mary) and June (Sacred Heart).

Concern for helping others has been shown through contributions to the missions and other charities. The Junior School also contributed to activities run by the St. Vincent de Paul Society for the observance of One World Week.

Camps:

Camps gave the boys an opportunity to experience community living with their classmates and teachers. Year 6's went to Tallabudgera, and the Year 7's to the Terrace camp site at Maroon. Year 7's begin their Outdoor Education Program and it is continued through their secondary years.

ACADEMIC:

Reading Programme:

Assistance continues to be given to those boys needing extra help with Reading or Mathematics. We are grateful for the help of the Mothers with both our Reading and Writing Programmes. Enthusiasm for writing grew after a few of our boys went to a Writers' Camp last year. Three books of writings have been published so far and this year many boys have applied for the next Writers' Camp. In addition, our own Writing Camp will be held at Lake Maroon in mid-November.

A Maths extension programme has been working in the Primary School with many of the Resources being purchased from a generous grant from the Old Boys.

Primary School Computers:

Primary School Students have become aware of computers in many facets of their lives. It is generally felt that students should be adequately prepared to cope with an increasing technological society.

At present our two Sinclair Computers have provided the foundations for BASIC programming. This offers the stage of learning about Computer operation. Computer Assisted Instruction (CAI) follows by students learning from the Computer.

An Apple II Computer is soon to be installed.

Primary Library:

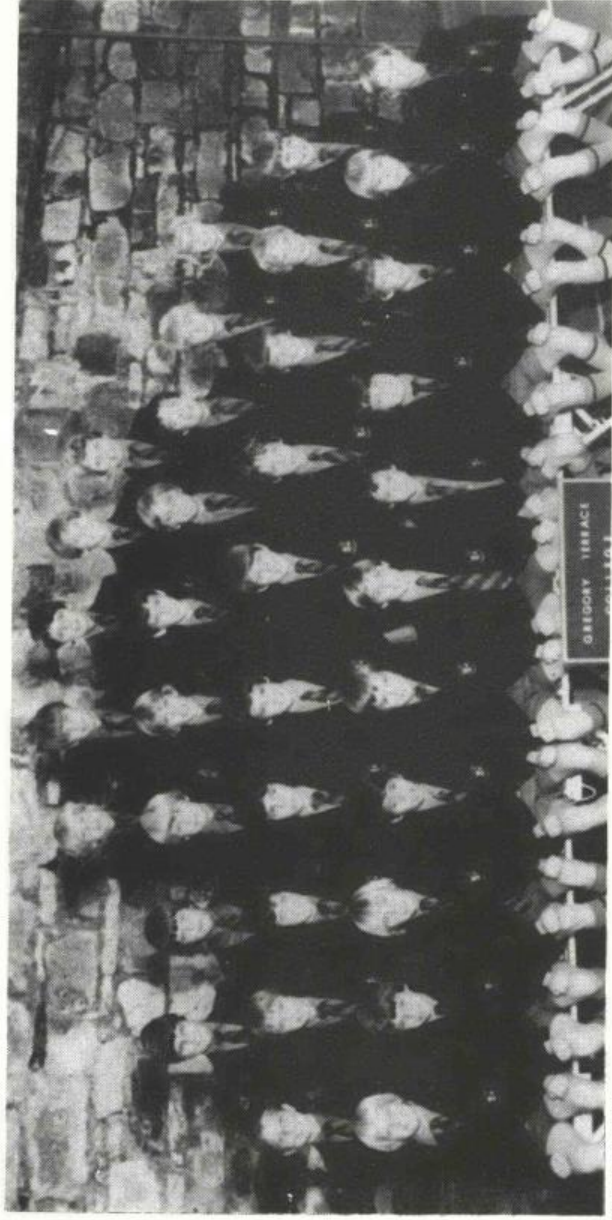
The Primary Library has been used extensively by all classes in their studies during the year. Each class has at least one formal lesson a week in the library and during this time the boys have developed their skills in the use of different media to gain information. Pupils also have the opportunity to borrow and read from a wide variety of fiction books.

Mrs. Pat Lynch has continued to work on keeping the catalogue up to date. A number of volunteer helpers have helped with typing, covering and filing and their assistance has been greatly appreciated. Pupils from Year 7 have acted as library monitors for a semester at a time. These boys have helped in the day to day running of the library.

CULTURAL:

Music:

In 1983 the Primary School will introduce into the curriculum a scheme whereby each student in Year 5 will have the opportunity to learn to play a musical instrument for a year, with the option of buying an instrument and continuing tuition after that year when the instruments are returned and given to the next intake of students. This scheme required a fund of \$25,000 to buy the necessary instruments, and through the generosity and hard work of the Parents and Friends' Association, the Ladies' Committee and the Terrace Music Association,



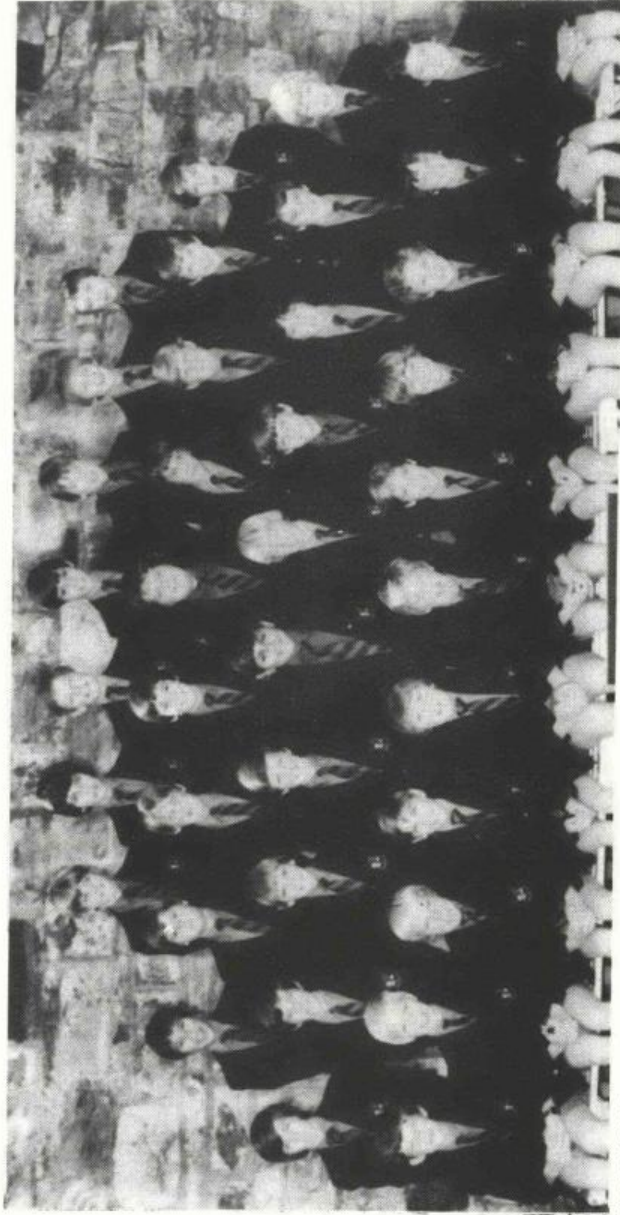

The boys gained a good measure of success with always very favourable and positive comments being offered by adjudicators.

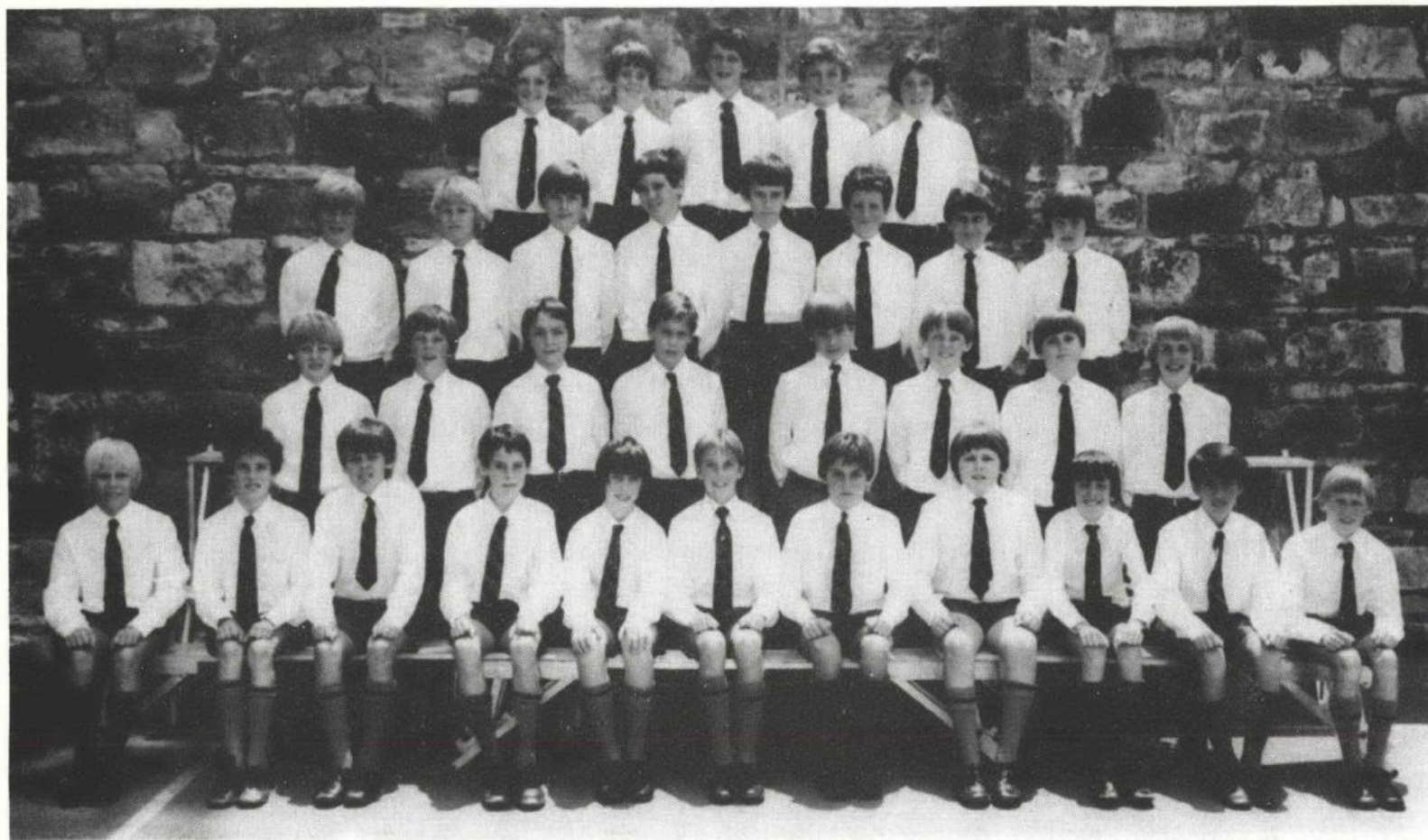
In the finals of the Public Speaking our two representatives, Chris Conley and Paul Therksleson, gained equal fourth place and performed in an extremely capable and mature manner.
