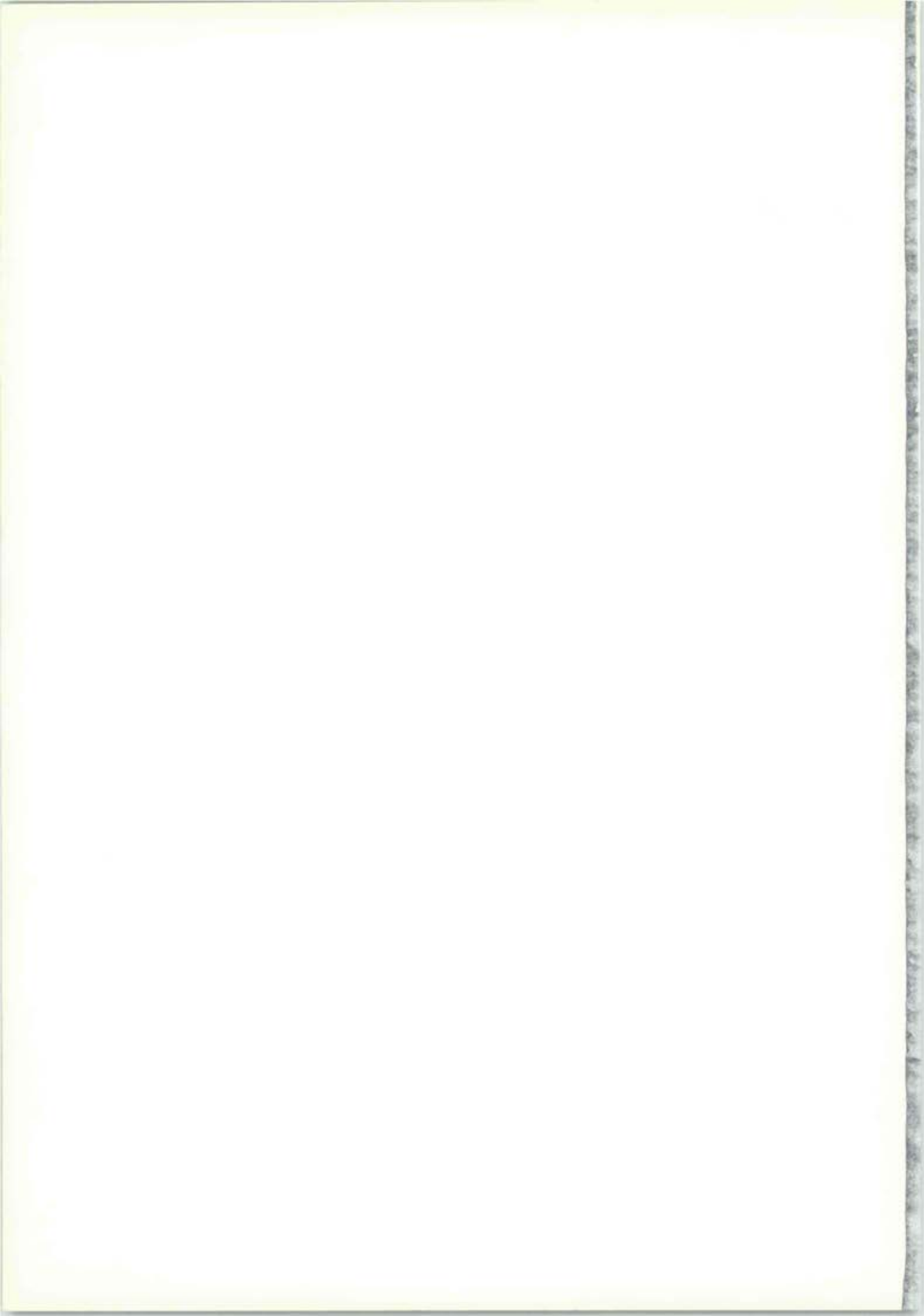

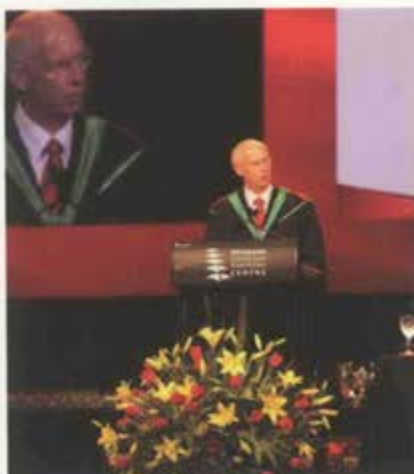
We seek excellence in teaching and learning, with a commitment to curriculum, academic challenge and renewal.

The Principal



During my recent period of leave during Term 3, I was privileged to attend an extraordinary professional gathering of Principals at the International Confederation of Principals' Convention in Toronto. Coming from Australia, I was conscious of the many schools and varied communities from around the globe. It was a wonderful opportunity, over a week, to network, to share experiences and best practices, to form friendships based on our common passion, and to do what is best for every student in our care.

The symbol of the Inukshuk was chosen by our Canadian hosts to represent the theme of this global convention, which was Leading Student Achievement: An International Odyssey. The Inukshuk represents recognisable landmarks along the journey of life. Such landmarks were considered sacred by the first nations who lived in this part of the world.

What was clear in the many discussions were the landmarks along the journeys of the varied educational communities – the loss of human life and the destruction of property through various natural and man-made disasters – which have affected millions of young people around the world since our last gathering two years ago in Singapore. Heartrending pictures from the depths of Africa show us countries ravaged by drought, as aid agencies struggle to feed and care for thousands of displaced people. In places such as Haiti, Christchurch, Japan, the Ivory Coast, Libya, Egypt, Bahrain, Syria, Palestine, Queensland and Norway, the normal expectations of daily life were suddenly upended, leaving whole communities devastated.

In other parts of the world, corrupt banks, greedy property developers and incompetent politicians have bankrupted entire countries leaving future generations to pay the price. Yes, we are living and preparing young men to live in a world which may be coming more socially divided than ever before – a challenge addressed in the revised Charter, a document used to describe the culture and focus of a Catholic School in the Edmund Rice Schools' tradition.

This document calls us, as a community of privilege and opportunity, to develop global citizenship in our curriculums and ministry programs with a focus on the greater good of all society.

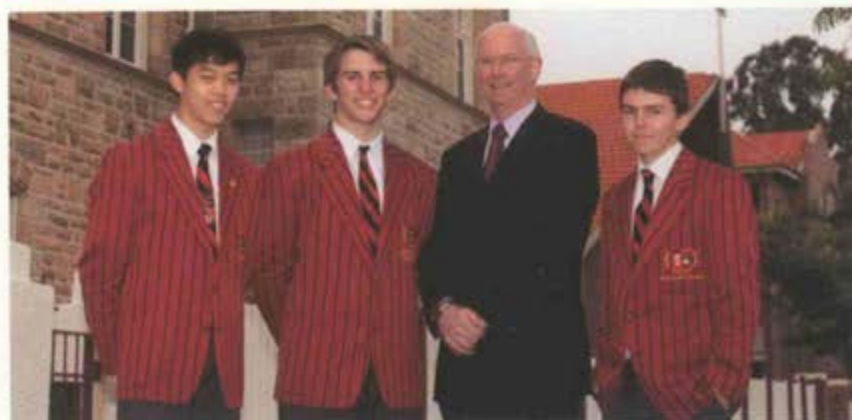
This growing division is not just socio-economic. Access to technology and, in particular, to the internet is becoming a determining factor in a young person's life opportunities. In addition, issues such as clean water and primary healthcare will become major equity issues.

The political and economic contexts of the countries of conference participants varied significantly. While it is true that poverty is always relative to the local context, it is undeniable that many people are born into circumstances of deprivation. While many Principals and their respective associations struggle to convince their governments that education should not suffer cutbacks, and that investment in education is a key agent towards economic recovery, Principals in many other countries struggle on a daily basis for basic resources and staff levels that others take for granted.

A different challenge that many education systems now deal with is the issue of accountability. While I strongly believe governments and other stakeholders have the right to know what return they are getting on their education investment, we need – as a community – to see education as more than an instrument of narrow-focus: high-stakes testing to measure schools' effectiveness. Standardised tests are but one instrument to a greater picture as to what schools do. The Irish have a wonderful saying: "Repeatedly weighing the pig does not make him heavier" or "Not everything of worth can be measured."

NAPLAN results are but one instrument within the bigger picture of the balanced education we offer here at Terrace. In reporting to the community on this dimension of your sons' education, the College has again achieved exceptionally well against the national benchmarks.

Twenty-three of our students were awarded an OPI, seven won Australian Students awards and one young man – College Dux Jonathon Ho – was awarded the Queensland Government's TJ Ryan Memorial Prize for outstanding academic excellence in Queensland.

The results presented don't just happen. They come as a result of a community's appreciation of the value of what a quality, balanced education is in our context as an Edmund Rice School. This balance includes academics, culture, sport, emotional intelligence and a contemporary spirituality. Central to well-educated students in a balanced context are good teachers. The process of recognising quality teachers is an area that has received much focus and debate by governments and communities during 2011.

Whether a school is a positive or a negative experience will be determined by many things, but the most significant is the quality of the teachers. This finding is confirmed by research undertaken by the Australian Council for Education Research. Teachers who can laugh with their students, who can paint great pictures in their students' minds and create a sense of wonder are special, and they deserve to be recognised and rewarded. It matters little if a school is government run or private, free or expensive, co-ed or single sex, a great teacher can make these things irrelevant. A great teacher is not necessarily the friendliest teacher or even the most popular teacher. The great teacher is the one who inspires and disturbs until a new level of possibility is seen.

To provide a balanced education, teachers must do more than grind through course content. They must build relationships and enter the world of their students to assist them become citizens of the world. Humour and approachability will help; over familiarity will not. Some strictness is allowed in a teacher, providing it is clear to the student that they are valued. A teacher who has lost the love of teaching will portray this through low energy and low tolerance. At best, lessons will become a stale-mate, born of a mutual non-aggression policy. "I won't disturb you if you don't disturb me".

Teachers in our context need to be transformational, dedicated to changing their students and moving them from one state to another in their development as global citizens. Teachers need to be optimistic, believing that this transformational process is possible. It takes a school Principal about a year, a staff room about a month, and a student about a week to identify a good teacher. Good teachers are a school's greatest resource.

Much discussion in the public forum has taken place in recognising good teachers. Should we bother to identify the better teachers or is it all too hard? Giving equal esteem and equal reward to all is seen to be unfair. As a society we need to recognise and reward teachers who are making a real difference. As this public debate continues, it is right and proper to recognise and reward good teachers. As the impasse is sorted, our focus remains to develop young men who

are prepared for the world of constant change, and who are equipped with a set of values to become global citizens. We must be forever mindful that we need to prepare young men for their future and not for our past.

This has been a very challenging and very productive year as far as building goes at Terrace. In May we opened both the Treacy Centre and the Br White Building. All up more than \$12 million was spent on these two marvellous facilities, which would not have been possible without the generous support of the Federal Government, through the Building the Education Revolution funding, and the Terrace Community, in particular the Foundation.

When the rebuilding and rehabilitation of Tennyson is complete, a further \$4 million-plus will have been spent. This amount includes that covered by insurance and the very generous contributions from the Terrace Community, including the Foundation and Supporter Groups. Added to these exceptional facilities, the technology roll-out will see in excess of some 1600 network devices across the campus. The College is in the fortunate position of having some of the very best facilities and technology of any school in Queensland.

The College also has undergone an extensive review of all sports and sporting programs. The changes that will be made at Terrace as a result of this review will place the College in a strong position in anticipation of changes to the rules and regulations to the GPS competition, expected to be announced early next year.

Our College is committed to playing a competitive role in the GPS competition in all sports and, after a full examination of the recommendations from the Terrace Sports Policy Group Review, I will announce what changes will be made to our future programs.

Finally, I want to thank a number of people who have played a significant role this year. I would like to thank the College Board, and in particular the outgoing Board Chair, Mrs Helen Mahoney, who has been simply outstanding in this governance role. The Board's assistance has been invaluable during a year in which

much has happened – from the flooding of Tennyson and the ongoing rebuilding, to the opening of the Treacy Centre and the Br Tony White Building.

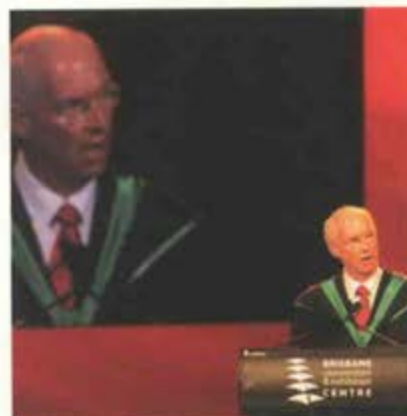
Thank you also to the Foundation Board and its Chair, Mr Paul Tynan. Their generosity combined with that of the Terrace community ensures that we have buildings and facilities of which we can all be very proud. To Dr Michael Wilson, Chair of the Gregory Terrace Old Boys' Association and to the Association, I appreciate your ongoing support, and the continued interest shown by our Old Boys. The theme for this year's Celebration of Excellence evening was 'building'. There are quite obvious connections between this theme and the physical changes that have occurred with the development of the Br Tony White building, the refurbishment of the Treacy Centre on the main campus and the significant rebuilding and refurbishment that has occurred at Tennyson. However, this theme was also meant to highlight that these changes are also part of a bigger picture in that the Terrace community also is building for the future. Whilst we have been very fortunate to have been able to build and refurbish our buildings and facilities, the notion of 'building' encompasses far more than highlighting just the physical nature of the campuses.

Building for the future also incorporates the educational and community aspects of the College. Like all schools, our future planning is also influenced by external agencies and factors. In 2015, all secondary schools in Queensland will welcome Year 7 into their cohort. Furthermore, primary schools across the State will include compulsory prep classes and some schools also will include kindergarten classes. To align these changes with educational expectations, Queensland schools will commence preparing for and implementing the new Australian Curriculum from next year. St Joseph's College, Gregory Terrace has developed, over time, a strong culture and expectation of academic excellence. Consequently, one such future challenge will be to ensure that these standards and expectations

are maintained with distinction when developing and implementing new programs to allow for the introduction of the Australian Curriculum. Terrace is committed to introducing the Australian Curriculum into the College in 2012. Much hard work already has been done and will continue to be done to ensure a smooth transition into the new curriculum for both students and staff.

From the College community perspective, there are two main tasks that need to be considered when planning for the future. Firstly, with the introduction of Year 7 in 2015, the student population will grow. We have given much consideration to maintaining reasonable numbers that are in keeping with the size of the College campuses. Over its past history, Terrace has developed an enviable reputation for pastoral care for the student body. This has been more recently accomplished through the introduction and enhancement of the House system; therefore, it is important that any changes don't adversely affect the current House system. Pastoral care of students and staff will still have high priority in any new initiatives considered or changes made by the College Leadership Team.

Secondly, all of these changes need to be made within the context of being a Catholic school in the Edmund Rice Tradition. A part of that context is to recognise and celebrate the proud tradition and legacy of the Christian Brothers. As each new year passes, the time increases from the last presence of a Christian Brother within Terrace. Consequently, another key task of building for the future is to ensure that we maintain the ethos and mission of

the Christian Brothers without their physical presence about the College. This is quite simply done by Terrace accepting and enacting the Charter for Catholic Schools in the Edmund Rice Tradition. The first Charter for our schools was developed in 2004. This year, Edmund Rice Education Australia (EREA) introduced a new and updated Charter – an important document to the College because it 'signposts' our College Mission and future strategic directions.

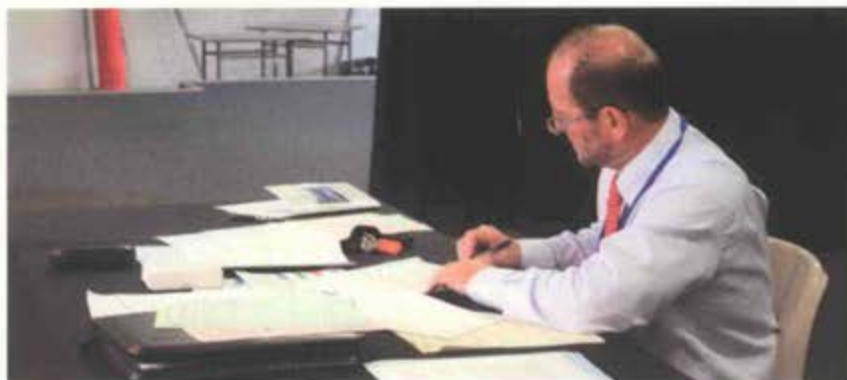
The Charter does this by providing a practical expression of what is expected of our EREA schools and is therefore crucial to the decision-making and planning at Terrace. The new Charter requires us to aspire to and be faithful to four touchstones:

1. Liberating Education
2. Gospel Spirituality
3. Inclusive Community
4. Justice and Solidarity

Terrace will continue to be true to the legacy of the Christian Brothers of the past by ensuring that this Charter becomes a living document in our actions and practices. This work has already commenced with the formation programs and activities for staff, students, parents and the wider Terrace community. These programs will continue throughout this year and into 2012.

Whilst we are building for the future, we also are conscious of the great foundations laid over the past 136 years, and that the key mission of the College will always be to produce Terracians of great character – Men of Faith and Learning.

A single flame is capable of anything. If uncontrolled, a flame can spark into a roaring fire, destroying everything in its path and leaving a trail of destruction in its wake. But when a flame is controlled, it can create moments of pure brilliance. It can light even the darkest of places, can bring smiles to people's faces and can become a source of power that all depend on. To amplify a flame even further, some dare to fashion it into a torch, to lead them into an uncertain future and to be passed on from generation to generation. In 2011, Terrace dared to light the darkness of adversity through a simple yet effective motivation, the Terrace Torch.

It was clear through the flood that destroyed much of Brisbane that our year would not be without darkness and adversity. Our home fields and boatshed at Tennyson were lost, but this would not destroy the flame that led our school; rather, it would strengthen it. Steered by our Seniors, the students tirelessly travelled from away venue to away venue and battled through obstacle after obstacle.

However, Terrace's greatest victory of the year emerged from our response to sport. Someone once told me that on the battlefield, true courage isn't just in competing. True courage is knowing that you will lose to a greater opponent but fighting to the end nonetheless. Our First XV displayed this courage week after week, with no home grounds, no training grounds, and under constantly changing conditions. The courage that these men displayed had an impact on the school. Perhaps

some schools would have folded under the pressure and disappointment of defeat. However, the Terrace Torch was simply too strong in 2011, and the flame never burned out of control. The students met adversity and darkness face first and supported our athletes across the board.

There are so many memories of 2011 that cannot possibly be described or forgotten. Who could forget screaming our lungs out at GPS swimming or debating in Term 1? Who could force the image of Tom Sellwood in women's clothing at House Choir out of their minds, or hate the sound of the intense orchestral music that played while the Seniors walked through the QCS tunnel, or even the feeling of lifting the GPS Cross Country Premiership trophy? These are all moments that will shape the Terrace Torch for years to come, but the ones that impacted on it the most were the seemingly insignificant ones. The first words from younger students to older students, the intense games of handball in the yard, the contributions to the Lenten appeal, the smiles, the tears, and everything in between. All these moments are what defined our flame, and what made 2011 such an incredible year to be at Terrace.

I cannot begin to fathom how much gratitude is owed to so many individuals. To our Principal, Mr Peter Chapman, I thank you for your unwavering selflessness, courage and kind-heartedness. To the three captains, Liam, Lachy and Pat, thank you for your originality, your determination and your resilience. You have been

three of the most exceptional examples of what it means to be a Terracian, three outstanding and unforgettable leaders, and three of the best friends I could ask for. To the Senior class, your leadership and spirit was simply amazing, and it was through your constant support that so much adversity was overcome. Finally, I want to thank every current Terracian, from clarinet player to mooter, for your unbreakable spirit and love for this school. On behalf of the Seniors of 2011, I would like to thank the Terrace community for the opportunity to serve this school. For many of us, it has been the greatest honour of our lives.

So, with the torch passing over to a new and exciting generation, we must ask ourselves, one last time, what is Terrace? If 2011 has taught us any lesson for our future years, it is this: Terrace is not many things. Terrace is not bricks and mortar, nor is it grass and trees. Terrace is much, much more than these. Terrace is the early morning starts, or the late night functions. It's the hot Saturdays spent shoulder to shoulder with mates, screaming war cries and munching down pies. It's the endless car trips and constant drive to succeed in all areas. It's the ability to never let go, to never surrender, and to fulfil happiness. Terrace is a flame, and it never, ever dies.

College Board

The College Board has 10 members. Nine are current or former parents, or Old Boys of Terrace, and one is a Christian Brother – all bring a wide range of professional expertise and experience. The Principal, Mr Peter Chapman, is an ex-officio member, one member is also a member of the Board of the Gregory Terrace Foundation, and one is Chair of the Finance Committee. We are indebted to Mr Adam Read, Director of Finance, for his dedication to this important area of Board responsibility.

The annual Board Mass, held in March, was well attended this year. At our monthly Board meetings, we covered areas of strategic planning, sports review, master planning the Tennyson rehabilitation, policy review and risk management.

This year has been particularly busy and challenging. Our two construction projects – the Br Tony White Building and the Treacy Centre – which commenced in the second half of last year, were well under way when excessive rain in January caused flooding in many parts of Brisbane. Our playing fields at Tennyson were so badly damaged that a decision was made to close them for the year whilst rehabilitation took place. The Board has now signed off on the completion of the Br Tony White building and will see the completion of the Treacy Centre

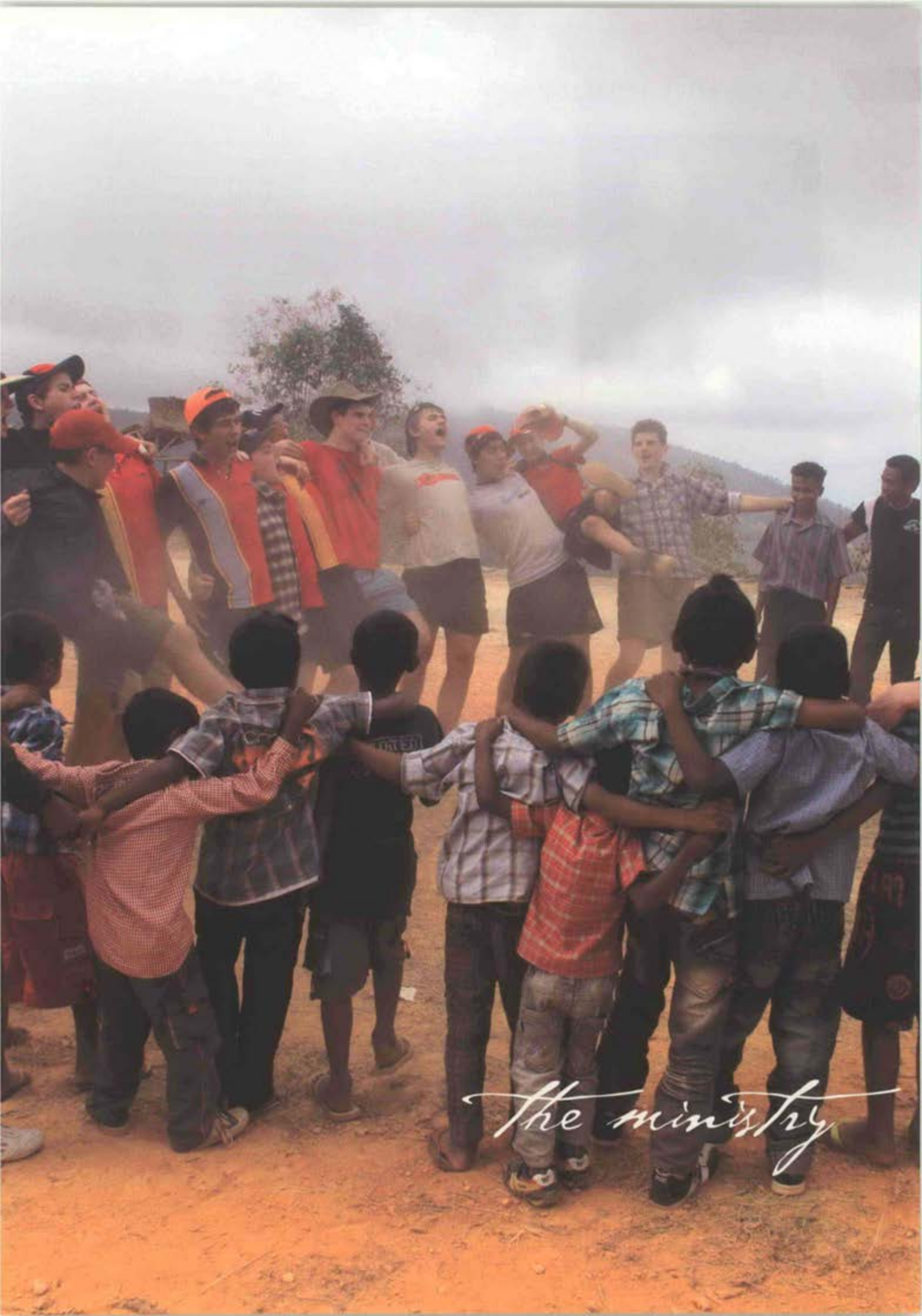

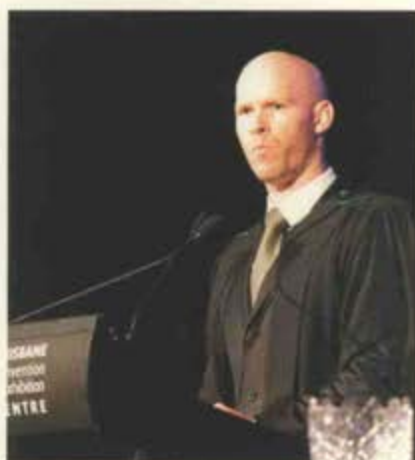

Jesus and Blessed Edmund Rice continue to be accessible and inspirational through the Campus Ministry initiatives that strive to honour their legacy as we continue to build an Ark that represents their charisma and courage. Terrace is called to be an Ark of faith, life and decency, and its members are called on to be charismatic missionaries within a culture of secularity. The Campus Ministry Team is granted the challenge and privilege of developing and growing the spirituality of our students. We aim to connect with students through retreats, service learning, and masses and liturgies.

Retreats

All students in Years 5 to 10 participate in retreats throughout the year. While on their Leadership camp, the Year 11s had a retreat with their House and House Dean to reflect as a group before moving to Year 12. Each retreat has a different theme and focus that lead up to the Kairos retreat offered in Year 12.

Service Learning

Students are challenged to live the Gospel through service to the marginalised and less fortunate. Students learn through interacting with people in different communities and reflecting on such programs as the Big Brekky, Year 9 Milpera Exploration, Matthew 25 Immersion, Timor Leste

Immersion, the annual Lenten Appeal and House Friendship group activities.

Mass and Liturgies

There are a number of masses and whole-of-school liturgies throughout the year in which we come together as a community to pray and give thanks. Every Tuesday morning we celebrate mass in the chapel with students, staff and other members of the Terrace community.

Few people have the opportunity to see the selflessness of our boys when interacting with homeless people at our Big Brekky, witness a Year 12 student reflect on his Kairos experience or hear a Year 8 say a prayer in front of his year-level house group for the first time. I wish everyone in the Terrace community could experience the transition that takes place as the students grow spiritually from boys to young men. It happens over time and isn't always obvious but it is special.

Many people work tirelessly behind the scenes to offer the opportunities we provide through Campus Ministry. I'd like to say a special thanks to:

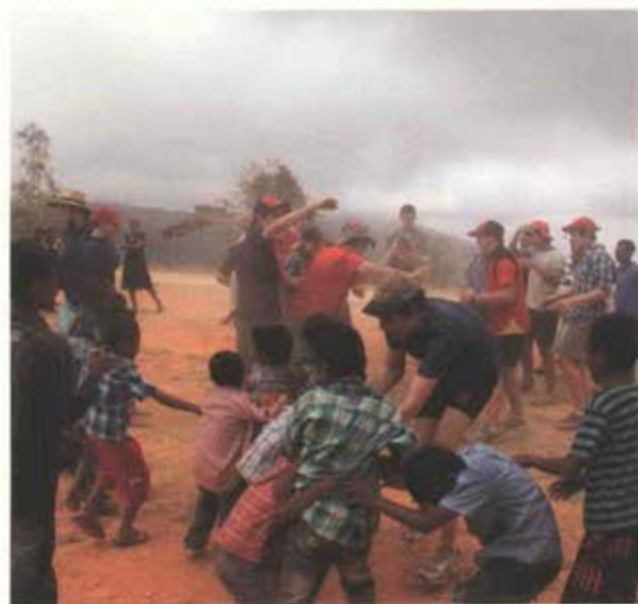
- The House Deans for their involvement in retreats, fundraisers and other Campus Ministry initiatives

Terrace Timor Network



Moving forward in times of change.

This year has, once again, been a year of growth and discovery for the Terrace Timor Network (TTN) as our work with the people of Timor Leste continues to evolve. Our group, formed in 2006 to facilitate a partnership between Comunidade Edmund Rice (CER) in Timor Leste and the Terrace community, continues to spread with networks spanning Edmund Rice communities across Australia. In times of change for the Timorese people, we are also experiencing an evolution of our own as we prepare for a year of change within CER in 2012.

During 2012, Br Bill Tynan, the inspiring leader of the CER community in Timor, will return to Australia after 10 years of incredible service to the people of Timor. While we will love being able to work more closely with Br Bill in continuing to support our Timorese friends, we know there will also be great joy and some sorrow as this incredible man returns to Australia and says goodbye to his friends and colleagues in Timor. We congratulate Br Bill and once again acknowledge his outstanding achievements over the past decade. At a local level, we will

also be sad to say goodbye to Mr Conor Finn, our key contact with the Terrace staff community. Conor has provided guidance and friendship for many years and we know we will stay in touch with him as his new adventure begins.

In terms of our achievements for 2011, we have seen enormous growth within our health focus group. Members of our health team visited Timor and offered their services within the CER communities, as well as with Dr Dan Murphy, an American doctor who runs the Bairo Pite clinic. This growing partnership between health practitioners is resulting in some amazing projects in support of better health outcomes for the Timorese. We are grateful to all of our health practitioners who give of their time and expertise in support of this great work.

The Year 10 immersion was, once again, a great success. These young men, with the support of the teachers and parents who travelled with them, represented the entire school community as they deepened the relationships between Terrace and our Timorese friends. On returning to Brisbane, their reflections were filled with stories of hope, of difficult circumstances and of a strong

desire to stay connected with their new friends from Timor.

In 2011 TTN continued to provide funds to pay wages for many preschool and primary school teachers and other workers. This year, our second group of fourth-year Australian Catholic University (ACU) students completed a placement in the schools associated with CER. As 2012 approaches, we continue to talk with ACU and other educational institutions about future student placements across a range of professional disciplines.

Our Justice Products have again been successful in sharing the story of our Timorese friends. We acknowledge the incredible skills of Kate Kelly-Duke in leading our sustainability groups. Through our ongoing friendship with BlueSky Coffee, we roasted and sold over one tonne of organic coffee in 2011. St Patrick's, St Edmund's, St Peter Claver College, St Laurence's and Rostrevor College in Adelaide are just a few of the schools who continue to support us in sharing the story of Just Coffee within their communities. Through the generosity of BlueSky we also have a fantastic coffee machine in the Campbell Centre that will next

year be used at school functions to help share the Just Coffee story.

In June this year, we were excited to host a reverse immersion with two of the leaders from the card cooperative – Olinda and Esperanca – visiting Brisbane for two weeks. After a slightly slower start, our Christmas campaign has again been a great success with a number of corporate clients continuing to support us. The friendship of the Christian Brothers' community – in particularly the ongoing support of Br Ted Magee and Br Peter Clinch – is extremely important and we are particularly grateful for their ongoing interest in our work.

So we look to 2012 as a year of growth and change, knowing that the work we do will continue to evolve. We are constantly amazed and grateful for the generosity of the Terrace staff and the broader community in supporting the work of TTN, and always have room for more volunteers as our work expands and the need for resources grows. Whether you're interested in education, health, special projects, coffee, cards or just offering some encouraging words of support, TTN would love to hear from you.

Big Brekky



The 'Big Brekky' program aims to develop a 'Relational Spirituality' between the staff and students of St Joseph's College and poor and marginalised people in the greater Brisbane area. By this we mean that we hope to go beyond a 'charity model' of relating with people in need to a model whereby the students (while serving) develop a deeper understanding of these people and hopefully even a friendship.

The educational aim of this program is to develop a pedagogy that is immersed in service learning. The rationale for service learning is quite simple: that via interacting with the homeless and impoverished communities of Brisbane, students feel the presence of God through helping others.

Logistics

Each morning a team of students accompanied by adult supervisors meet at Waterford Place at 6:00am. The team preps for breakfast, packs the necessary equipment and piles into the van to head to that morning's designated location (Botanical Gardens or Albert Park). The team cooks sausages and eggs to feed 20-50 homeless people. After serving and interacting with these people, the team heads back to Waterford to clean up and talk about their experiences.

Service Learning

Without guidance, a student's view of justice issues may lead to

misinterpretation, discomfort, the promotion of harmful stereotyping, or fear. Curriculum that assists in the examination of these issues is essential to the student's discovery of fact over fiction, acceptance over fear, knowledge over ignorance, and compassion over selfishness. The curriculum that integrates an academic and service education will be the curriculum that truly empowers its graduates. Substantial research and documentation support the very real benefits of service learning.

The following is a simple rationale for the service learning model of learning.

1. Provide a simple meal to help begin the day for people who make the parks, gardens and boarding houses of the inner city their home.
2. Invite students into a regular but simple ministry.
3. Challenge students and staff into a relationship of 'presence' to people who are fragile.
4. Challenge students and staff to critique the reasons behind poverty in our society.

Thank you to all Year 10 and 11 students, but especially to the Year 12 Big Brekky veterans, some of whom have served since Year 11.

A special 'thank you' to the staff and Old Boys who served as leaders for the students. Without your support and selflessness, this wouldn't be possible.

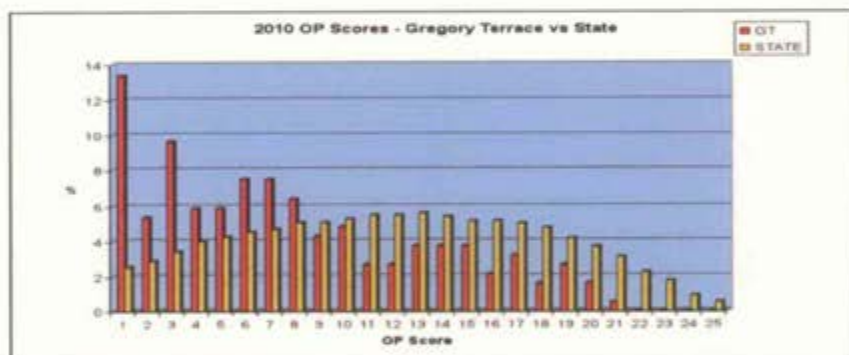
2011 has been another strong year for academic work at Terrace. As in the past, our primary emphasis this year has been on tracking academic outcomes each term and conducting follow-up meetings with identified students. Many students made significant improvements, and this justified an increase in the number of students receiving academic medals. Our NAPLAN results reflect strength both in numeracy and literacy as well as an improvement in tracking students across successive years. Most importantly, it reflects the exceptional dedication of our staff, and the efforts of the many students who volunteered their time to tutor others.

We conducted our Year 9 Exploration and Year 10 Immersion programs again this year. The programs offer experiential learning opportunities in unique environments, and continue to be a great success. Exploration units were: The Scientist, Blokes Who Cook, Carnarvon Gorge, National Explorer, Milpera/Our Lady of the Rosary, Carnarvon Gorge, CSI Terrace – Forensic, Rockstar, Impact Study – Moreton Island, and Saving Surf Life Saving. Immersion units were: Cracking the Code, Robotics, Be a Scientist, What's Good for You, Indigenous Awareness, Outdoor Education, Come Fly with Me, Timor Leste, Try a Job, Matthew 25, Fraser Island, and Photography. We are particularly grateful to staff at the Australian Catholic University and the University of Queensland; the programs could not run without their time and dedication.

Most importantly, I must thank sincerely all of our academic staff. Terrace is very fortunate to have teachers who place student welfare – both academic and pastoral – at the forefront of their efforts. We simply could not achieve our academic successes without their exceptional dedication. In particular, I thank the Heads of Faculty for their efforts and their support; the Heads of Faculty lead the development of curriculum and learning, and play a central role in the academic outcomes of the College. On a personal note, let me also thank Mrs Kathy Wilson, Mrs Colleen Watson and Mrs Teena Gooding for their support and their sense of humour in such a busy working environment.

Next year, we will begin the first phase of the new Australian Curriculum. This will present many challenges and many opportunities, and we look forward to delivering revised curricula in English, Mathematics and Science, from Year 5 to Year 10. Hard work. Without it, it is impossible to achieve your best.

Sometimes we see students like those behind me and mutter to our friends – he's not smart, he just works hard. But that's the thing; a killer work ethic is a talent. It's something to be proud of – the ability to open your books and

grind like you would on an ergo. At Terrace, I was often asked "Can I have your brain?" I told them NO, explaining that there was simply no substitute for honest hard work. If they wanted to achieve their best, they had to get it for themselves.

If you are prepared to "delay gratification", to live a life of no regrets, if you are prepared to work until your brain hates you, then the limit does not exist.

You only get out what you put in and you only put in how much you're willing to sacrifice.

Finally, I'd like to take this opportunity to thank the school and, most importantly, the teachers – without them the journey would have been much more difficult. Not to be forgotten are our parents, who have undoubtedly read many drafts and comforted us during our toughest times.

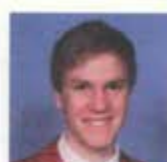

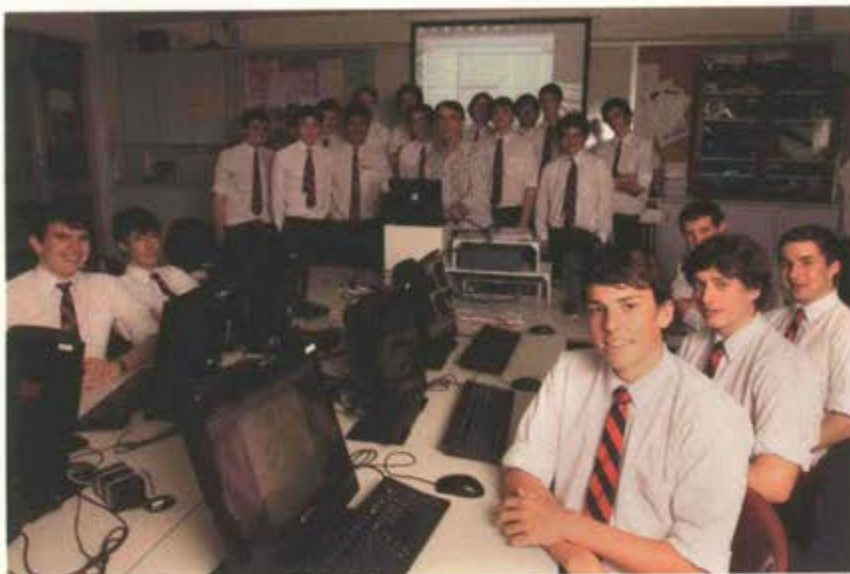

Business and Technology

ICTE - Mr P Whitehouse

The opening of the Brother Tony White Building saw us using the new Mac labs and sparked a renewed interest in ICT across the curriculum. Our Lower Middle School ICTE program is designed to dovetail into class work, and Mrs Amanda Rablin and Mrs Paula Thomas worked with class teachers to enhance presentation skills and incorporate multimedia into everyday class experiences.

ICTE in Years 8-10 continued to be an interesting spiral of skills including presentation, animation, web publishing, game making, virtual environments and robotics. 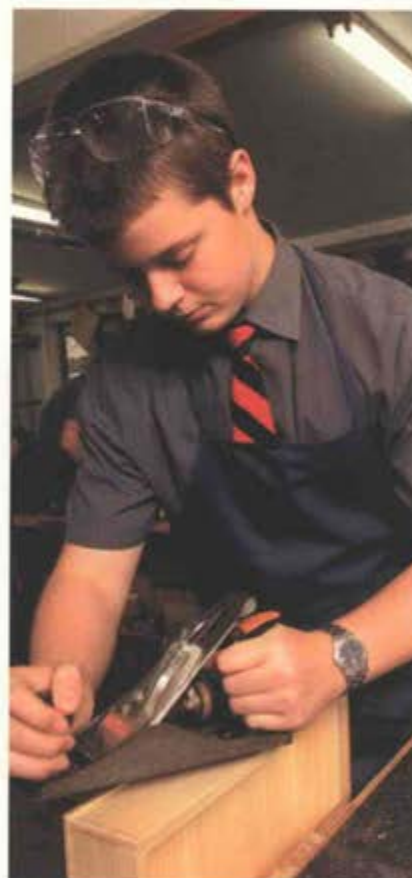

Visual Art

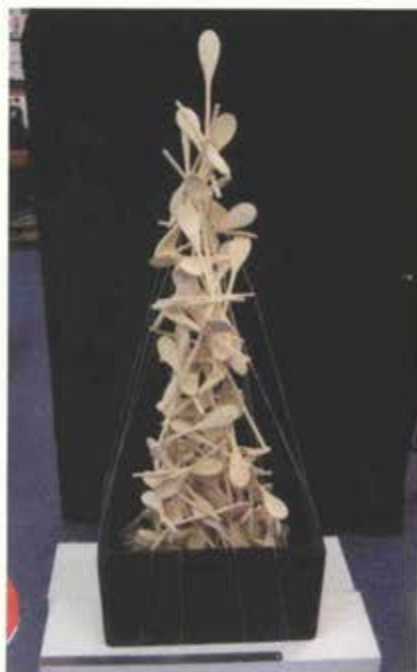

Exceptional Learners

Thinking about Thinking! Developing Successful Learners!

The more students are aware of the way that they think and learn, the more they can control their focus and academic outcomes.

Metacognition is the ability to monitor your learning and make changes, or adapt your strategies, if you perceive you are not doing well. Developing students' metacognitive skills is a key focus of all programs implemented by the Faculty of Exceptional Learners. Students are encouraged to reflect on their own learning processes before, during and after learning experiences. Self-questioning forms a major role in the reflective process.

In activities developed through **The Challenge Program** the students engage in self-reflection with a plan to improve their understanding and performance on given tasks. The Maths Honours students have participated in a number of competitions including MCFYA (Maths Challenge for Young Australians), MTC (Maths Teams Challenge), APSMO (Australasian Problem Solving Mathematical Olympiad), AMC (Australian Maths Competition), Year 8 QAMT Oral Competition and AIMO (Australian Intermediate Mathematical Olympiad). At the completion of each session or competition, students talk through their solutions, evaluate their performance, and make decisions about how they might attack a similar problem next time.

The Future Problem Solving Competition provides students with the opportunity to use their creativity and higher level thinking skills to solve problems set in 'future scenarios'. Students are constantly using their



metacognitive skills to plan and monitor their answers as they complete their scenario booklets. Once the booklets are scored and returned, the students self-evaluate and reflect on the feedback they receive, and adapt their responses in the next booklet. These strategies are extremely effective. For the fifth year in succession, Terrace represented Queensland in all three divisions of the booklet section and also in senior scenario writing at the Australian Finals held at the Gold Coast in October. The Year 10 'Booklet Team' of Tom Wong, Connor Cashman, Alex Komarowski and Pat Cook will travel to the United States in 2012 and compete in the International Finals to be held at the University of Indiana.

Terrace students have represented Australia at the International Finals for four consecutive years.

The development of metacognitive skills plays an integral role in all learning support programs. Over 200 students have participated in learning support programs throughout 2011. Students are encouraged to ask questions to ensure that they have a complete understanding of task requirements and then plan how they will approach the task. They are assisted in monitoring their progress and helped to change tactics if they are experiencing difficulty. At the completion of an assignment, task or exam, students are given the opportunity to actively reflect on their

learning outcomes and comment on how their performance could have been improved. If they have had a successful learning experience, to identify what worked for them in order to use the same strategy on another occasion.

Metacognition is the key to empowering students to take an active role in their

own learning processes. It relies on the students to personalise their learning and make conscious decisions about how they think and learn. It is in this way that we are able to develop 'life long learners' who are cognisant of the strategies that work for them, and have the ability to modify their learning behaviours when necessary.

My thanks go to the staff of the Faculty of Exceptional Learners for their untiring efforts in supporting the students at Terrace, and for their professionalism and collegiality.

Health and Physical Education (HPE) is a key component of the curriculum at Terrace, equipping students to develop knowledge and skills that will enable them to have a lifelong engagement with good health and physical activity.

This year has seen students engage in a wide range of movement skills, games and activities. The HPE curriculum has focused on movement skill development (Years 5–8) and a game sense approach (Years 9 & 10) in sports such as European handball, ultimate disc, Futsal, touch, badminton and waterpolo. This practical learning is coupled with a theoretical program that has covered a wide range of HPE topics.

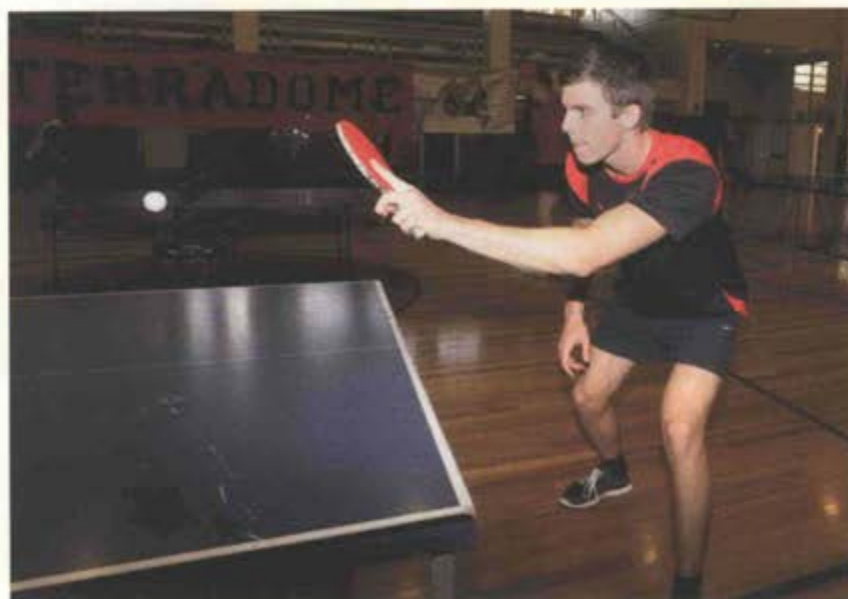
The senior Physical Education (PE) program remained strong with large numbers of students choosing PE as a senior subject – 78 students in Year 12 and 88 in Year 11. The 2011 Year 12 PE cohort was an exceptional one with 22 students attaining a VHA (28%) and 45 attaining a HA (58%). Congratulations to this group on their strong performance and enthusiasm for the subject.

Recreation was again a popular subject, with the group partaking in activities such as white water kayaking and climbing. The highlight of the year was the kayaking camp in Term 1

where the group travelled to Goolang Creek in northern NSW for a week of white water adventure and camping. Thanks to Mr Mat Fairley and the Maroon Outdoor Education staff for their assistance with this camp and the Recreation program.

But words are things, and a small drop of ink,

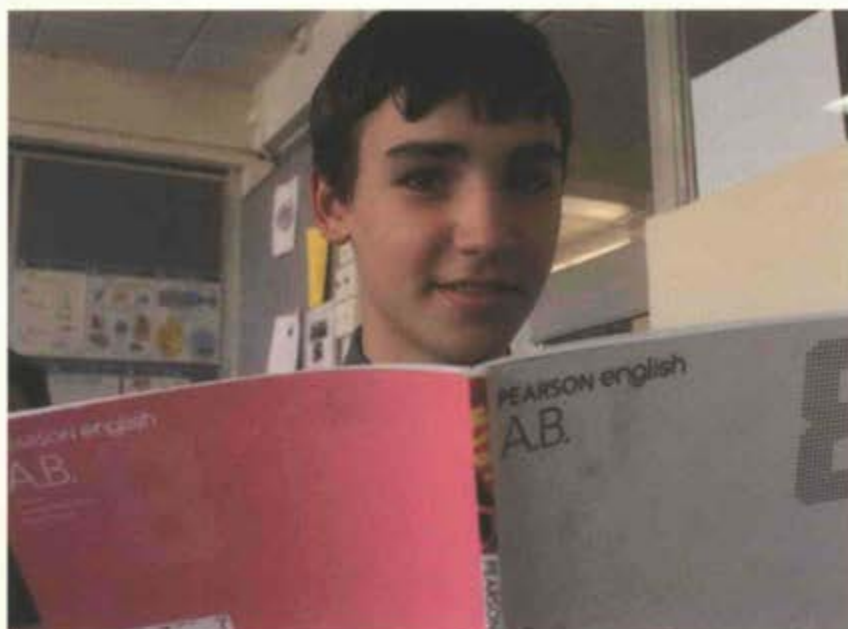
Falling, like dew, upon a thought produces

The enduring power of Byron's poetry testifies to the power of his observations about the power of words. Lord Byron's observation articulates the message that all teachers of language strive to communicate: words have tremendous power. Learning language equates with acquiring a tool that is multifunctional: it builds interpersonal relations, facilitates thought and deepens our understanding of the world. As well as enhancing our abilities to relate to another person, the cultural dimension of language, be it English, Japanese or French, helps an individual to understand his own identity. As Kenneth Hale reminds us, "Language embodies the intellectual wealth of the people who use it."

Faculty teaching staff have engaged students in a range of activities in 2011. Year 8 English students were introduced to Shakespeare with a performance by the Bell Shakespeare Company, while French and Japanese



students extended their learning beyond the confines of the classroom. Years 11 and 12 French students participated in a seminar at QUT which offered intensive grammar activities, while Year 9 and 10 students were participants in French Cluster days joining students from other Brisbane schools. Celebrating Gallic cuisine, Years 9, 10, 11 and 12 students spent some pleasant evenings of conversation and gourmet fare. In the same vein, but with an entirely different cuisine,

Japanese students tasted the culinary delights of a foreign culture with the Year 9s dining at 'Little Tokyo' and the Year 10s visiting 'Bishamon' where they sampled authentic dishes and ordered their meals in Japanese.

The highlight of the year for many boys is the various Immersion activities. Although the Year 10 Japanese immersion program was cancelled because of the tragic events in Fukushima, the College hosted visits from students from sister schools in Konan and France. We would like to thank Terrace families for extending their hospitality to our visitors and in particular, for making our two Japanese exchange students Shoto Tamura and Kazuma Yoroze feel a part of the Terrace community. In the spirit of cultural exchange, two of our French students, Sam Holt and Isaac Pincus, will spend nine weeks in Switzerland, and six of our students will travel to France in December with Mme Thaïs Morgan-Pertus to participate in a five- week exchange. I extend congratulations to Ms Rachelle Daniel who, as winner of the Endeavour Language Teacher Fellowship, will travel to Aix-en-Provence in January to attend an intensive language course.

As I reflect on 2011, it is clear to me that the English department has been particularly industrious in managing curriculum development. The national curriculum heralds a substantially heavier workload for English teachers.

The annual Terrace-All Hallows' trivia afternoon enabled the Year 7 students to pit their knowledge against fellow avid readers.

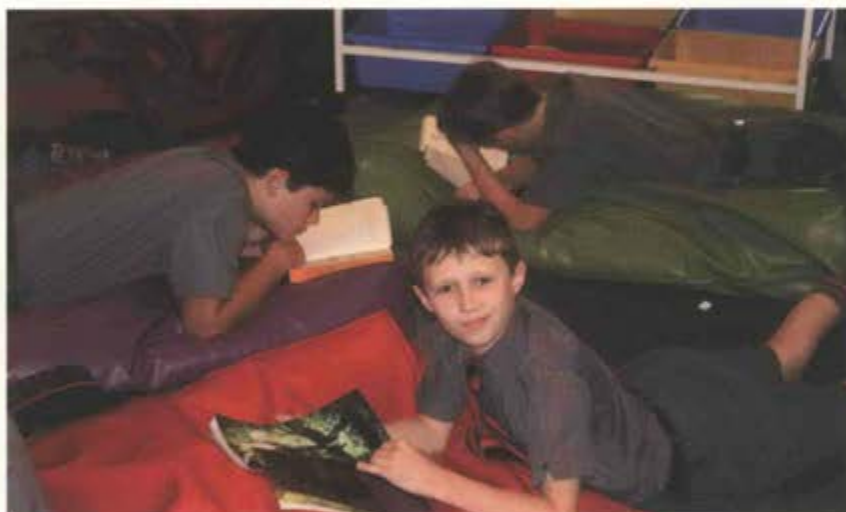

STUDENTS AT TERRACE HAVE BEEN EXPOSED TO CHALLENGING OPPORTUNITIES AND RIGOROUS LEARNING OVER THE COURSE OF THEIR 2011 STUDIES IN MATHEMATICS. ASSESSMENT FORMS THE PRIORITY FOR COMPARISON OF STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT, BUT TO SUPPLEMENT THIS, TERRACE STAFF OFFER STUDENTS THE OPPORTUNITY TO ENTER COMPETITIONS AND UNDERTAKE TESTING BENCHMARKING THEMSELVES AGAINST STUDENTS LOCALLY AS WELL AS NATIONALLY.

Generally, these competitions are a learning experience to supplement work that students investigate in the classroom and are assessed on. These included:

Mathematics Teams Challenge (18 May)

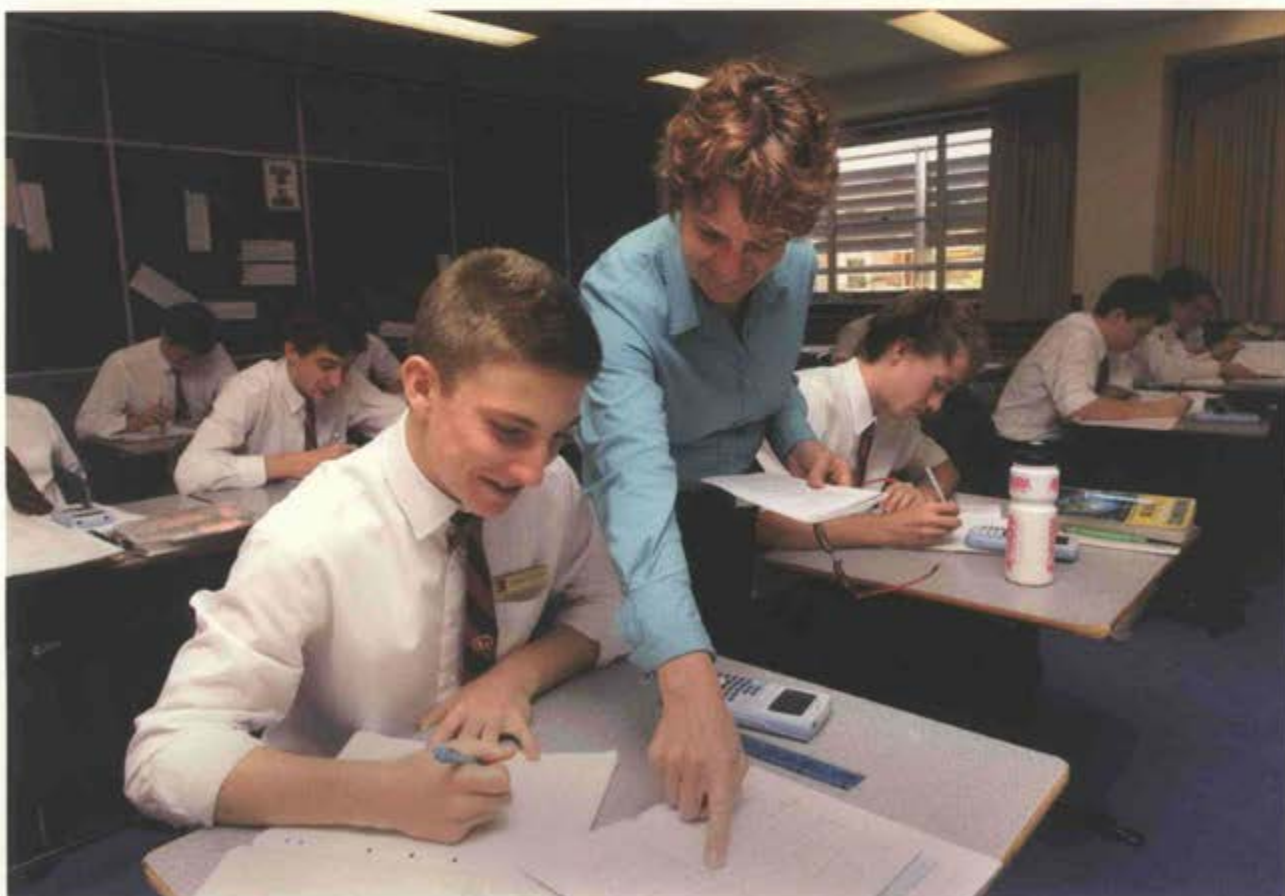
The Met North Maths Teams Challenge attracts approximately 300 keen and enthusiastic mathematicians from across Brisbane. Teams consist of five students each and Terrace sent seven teams on the day. Students representing Terrace were from Years 8–12 within three divisions: Junior (Year 8), Intermediate (Years 9 & 10) and Senior (Year 11 & 12).

A typical problem from the Year 8 division was: The ratio of girls to boys at a party is 5:3 and there are 12 more girls than boys. How many people are there altogether?

Answer: 48

Terrace teams performed very well, finishing in the top three in all divisions.

The Australian Mathematics Competition (4 August)

This is the largest single mathematics competition in the southern hemisphere. Terrace entered 904 students from Years 5–12 in the competition, which had a national audience of over half a million students.

Five Terrace students gained a prize, 32 attained a high distinction, 152 attained a distinction and 360 attained credits. Only 1500 students in Australia were awarded a prize.

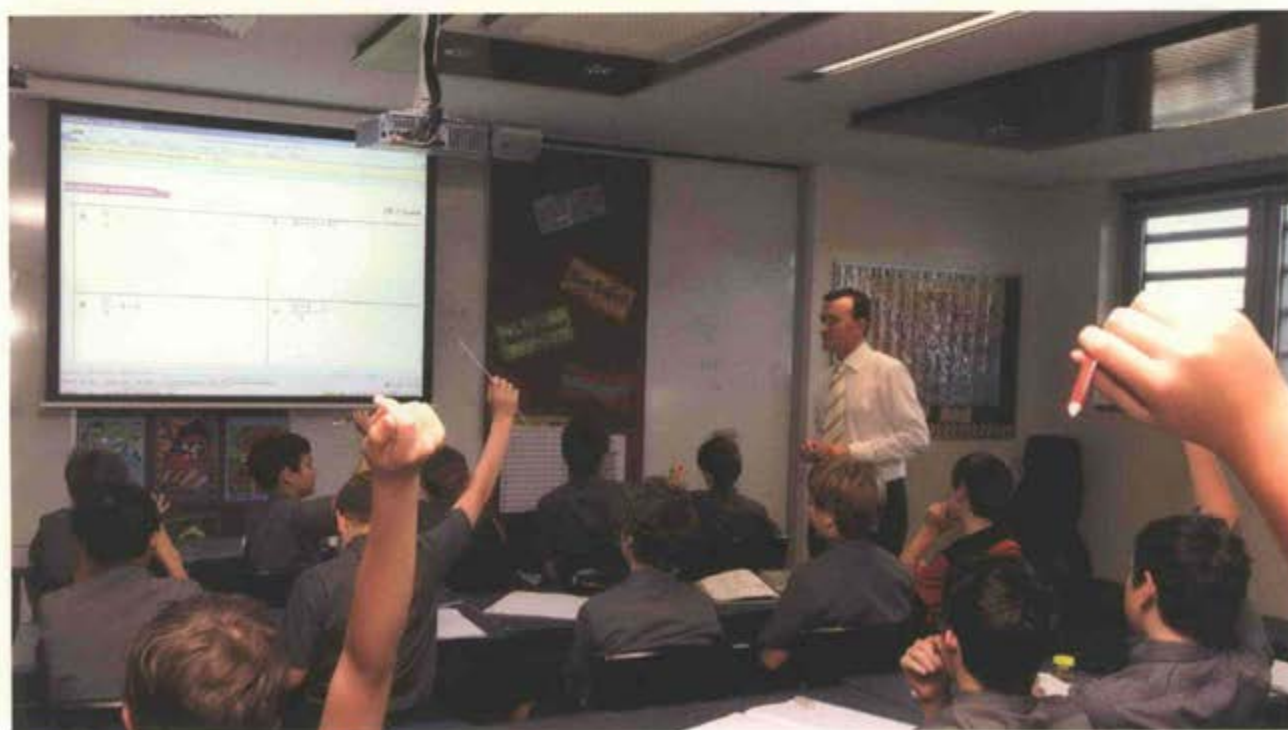


Middle Schooling – Lower

Middle Schooling is a brief but nonetheless significant part of the Terrace boy's learning journey. Here, he consolidates what he has learned in primary school and develops many new skills in preparation for the years of senior schooling ahead. The skills he develops during this time range from straightforward organisational skills and study practices to higher order thinking strategies to solve complex problems or apply to new situations. He also acquires a good deal of knowledge during this time – facts and processes about how the world works, why the world is the way it is and why we believe what we do. He does this, not only in his core subjects of religious education, mathematics, english, history and geography, science and HPE, but also in subjects like music, shop, japanese and business education.

Our Year 9 students are provided with unique learning experiences outside the classroom through the Exploration Program. This year, the program was enhanced by the introduction of three new units – 'The Scientist', 'Who will save Surf Life Saving?' and 'Moreton Exploration'.

Learning new skills and acquiring knowledge in a secure environment are the primary goals of the Middle School journey. We share this journey with parents at events such as the Middle School Exhibition Day and at various information evenings including the Middle School Evening in Term 1 and the Subject Selection Evening in Term 3. There is no shortage of future challenges as we work toward implementing the Australian Curriculum, introducing Year 7 as the

first year of secondary school, and consolidating our excellent NAPLAN results.

Critical to this learning journey is the core teacher who works with one class across several subjects, monitoring the intellectual development of the Terrace student. We are so lucky to have several House Deans perform this role in Years 8 and 9. My thanks to the team of core teachers for their dedication to our Middle School students and for the many and varied gifts they bring to their classrooms each day. My thanks also to the large team of teachers and support staff who design and execute

Exploration units. Mrs Suzanne Cook fulfilled the role of Head of Faculty during Term 3 with grace and precision – my sincere thanks for her outstanding leadership.

Sadly, Mr Chris Cawley Head of Faculty, Lower Middle School, is leaving us after 24 years at the College. It has been a joy to work so closely with Chris for so many years and I will miss his devotion to our students, his passion for learning and his enduring support and friendship.

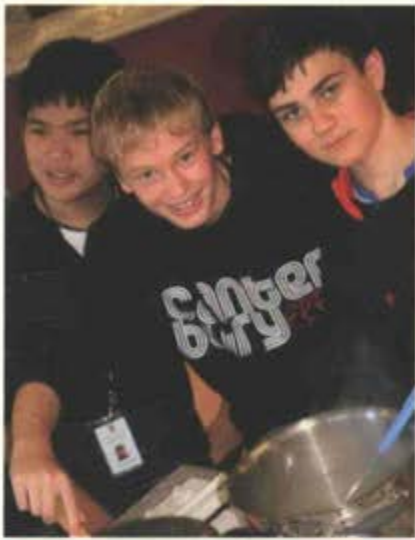

Outdoor Education



EARLIER THIS YEAR I TOOK THE TIME TO GO THROUGH OLD PHOTOS AND INFORMATION COVERING THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE MAROON SITE. I DID THIS WITH THE AIM OF DEVELOPING A HISTORY OF THE SITE FOR A NEW WEBSITE. OVER MY TIME AT MAROON I HAVE SPOKEN TO PARENTS WHO HAVE THEIR OWN MEMORIES OF MAROON FROM WHEN THEY WERE STUDENTS. FROM 1976 WHEN THE SITE WAS PURCHASED, WE NOW HAVE 35 YEARS OF EXPERIENCES AT MAROON, COVERING FOR MANY FAMILIES TWO GENERATIONS.

The facilities have changed and the programs continue to develop, but the main aim – giving the students of Terrace worthwhile, challenging and memorable experiences – has not altered.

Thinking back through this year there are several memories that readily come to mind:

Entire house groups out on the oval sharing a game of touch football, just enjoying their time together.

Several Year 8 students being very nervous at the top of the abseil but with encouragement from staff and housemates showing the determination to continue.

The laughs enjoyed by Year 7 students sitting around a campfire.

The screams of enjoyment as Year 10 boys jumped into the cold water at the upper and lower portals.

The views from the top of Montserrat, and the effort to get there for sunrise.

The immersion group working with the disabled young people from Gold Coast Rec and Sport.

The enjoyment of a four-day expedition down the Nymboida River in canoes with the immersion group.

The change from being exhausted walking up Mount Maroon to the enjoyment of the amazing view from the top with the Year 9 groups.

It's no secret that we look to challenge every student in some way whilst they are on camp. This can be physically or socially – just being away from home, having to navigate or solve problems, interact socially with fellow housemates or simply show the independence to get organised throughout the week. The fact that we have a sequential Outdoor Education program at Terrace means that the challenges are achievable and can be increased each year whilst still being realistic.





It is at these times of challenge that we learn lessons about ourselves and those around us. This starts from Year 5 camp, which is one night, where the focus is on forming new friendships, building support within the class, gaining some independence by being away from home, and taking on some personal challenges with a small hike and a rock climb. Through to our Year 10s, where the focus is on leadership, independent thinking, taking on challenges, and working as part of a group. The boys do this by navigating themselves through a three-day expedition with limited staff assistance, and being responsible for the safety of others during the high ropes day.

During the camps in between, students take part in the following activities:

Year 6: Mount Edwards hike, campout at Waterfall Gully, gorge walk and rock climb, treasure hunt, Zulu and capture the flag.

Year 7: Mount Greville Hike, campout at Yarramalong, prussicking, low ropes, flying fox and Maroon Team Challenge.

Year 8: Little Toowoonaan hike, campout at 85V, canoeing on flat water, junior pole jump, glider possum, abseiling, low ropes, flying fox, team initiative challenge Mohawk walk and Camelot.

Year 9: Mount Maroon hike, campout at Paddy's Plain, canoeing on moving water, moving water skills session, rock climbing and crate stack.

The maturity and enthusiasm displayed by the young men involved

in this year's immersion program epitomises everything we value in our programs. They are to be congratulated for meeting every challenge, and I know they will draw on their experiences in the years ahead.

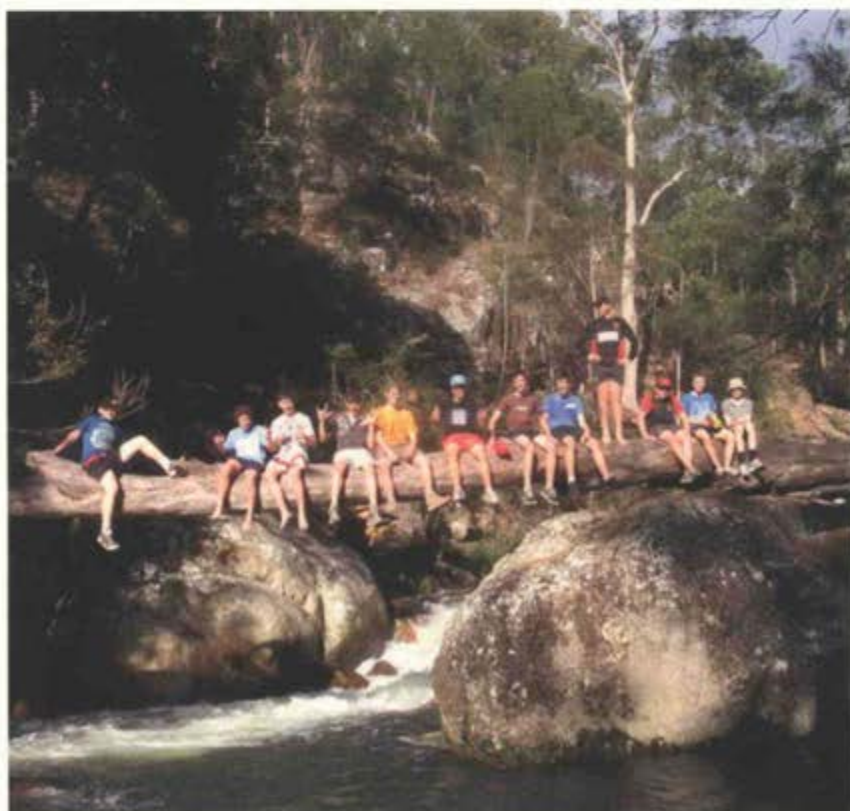

Religious Education



AS THE YEAR COMES TO A CLOSE, IT IS TIME AGAIN TO REVIEW WHAT WAS STUDIED AND ACHIEVED IN RELIGIOUS EDUCATION CLASSES, AND HOW EFFECTIVELY TERRACE'S RE FACULTY SUPPORTED THE PURPOSE OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION IN CATHOLIC SCHOOLS IN THE EDMUND RICE TRADITION.

Religious Education is a vital component of the College's curriculum. Apart from the fact that, as a Catholic school, the College is required by the Catholic Archdiocese of Brisbane to teach students its Religious Education syllabus in a classroom setting, the Edmund Rice Education Australia's Charter for Catholic Schools in the Edmund Rice Tradition (2011) explicitly demands its presence. For instance, this Charter's touchstone 'Gospel Spirituality' invites people into the story of Jesus and strives to make his message of compassion, justice and peace a living reality within our community.

Religious Education's vital place at this College is reinforced by the Charter's insistence that a Catholic school in the Edmund Rice tradition must provide religious education in line with Diocesan guidelines and faith formation experiences as fundamental components of a Catholic School curriculum.

The Religious Education staff worked hard this year to meet these requirements. Without such highly dedicated, flexible and patient teaching professionals, the Charter's

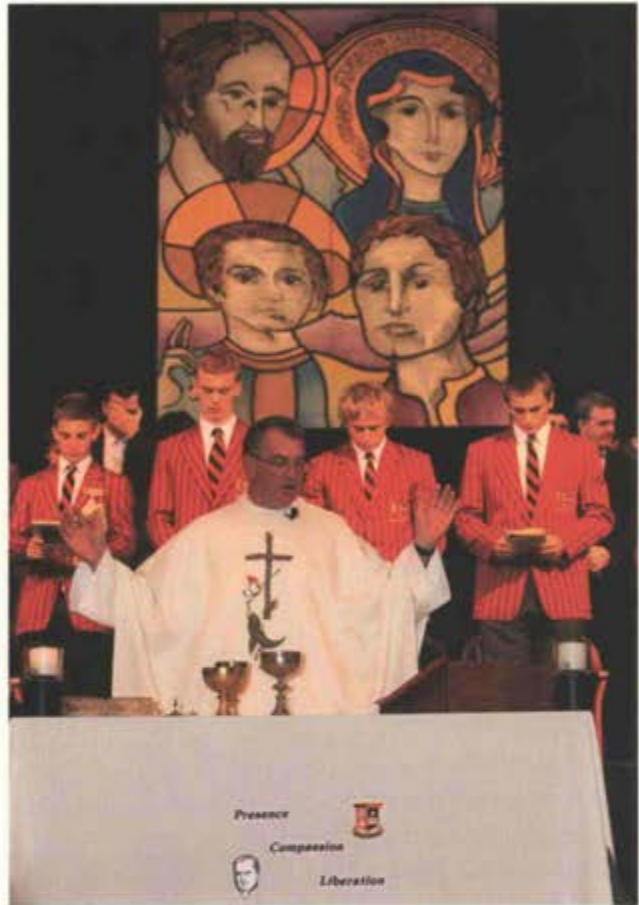
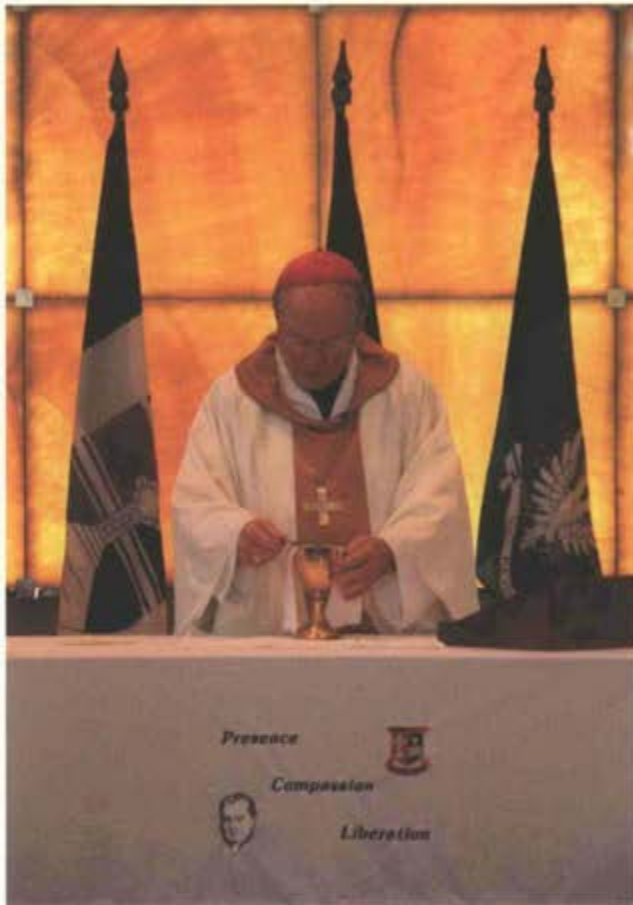

requirements and the aims and objectives of the Brisbane Catholic Archdiocese's RE syllabus (1997) would never have been met. I am very grateful for such tremendous support.

Theology

The current Year 12s are the first group at the College to finish studying the two-year Certificate III: Christian Ministry and Theology course. This competency-based Vocational Education and Training (VET) course is nationally recognised under the Australian Quality Training Framework (AQTF). The vast majority of Year 12 students have satisfactorily demonstrated all of the course's competencies and, as a result, will be issued a certificate recognising this achievement by the Institute of Faith Education (Catholic Archdiocese of Brisbane). Furthermore, all course competencies achieved by students will be recorded on their respective Queensland Certificates of Education. I would like to commend the Year 12s for their constructive participation in Theology this year.

In Year 11 Theology, the students were provided an excellent opportunity to engage with interactive and thought-provoking learning activities about Catholic spirituality and biblical interpretation. Students demonstrated competences by completing course work and assessment tasks. In Semester 1, they considered such things as what is meant by spirituality, the relationship between spirituality and religion, and Christian spirituality. In the following semester, the Year 11s were asked to reflect upon what it means to say that the Bible is the 'inspired' word of God, and what is the relationship between scripture and tradition. The students also examined aspects of selected Old and New Testament texts: social and historical setting, and the literary nature and meaning of theology, by using a straightforward interpretation template provided in Module 2: The Story. I commend the Year 11 Theology staff for setting high academic and behavioural expectations of students this year.



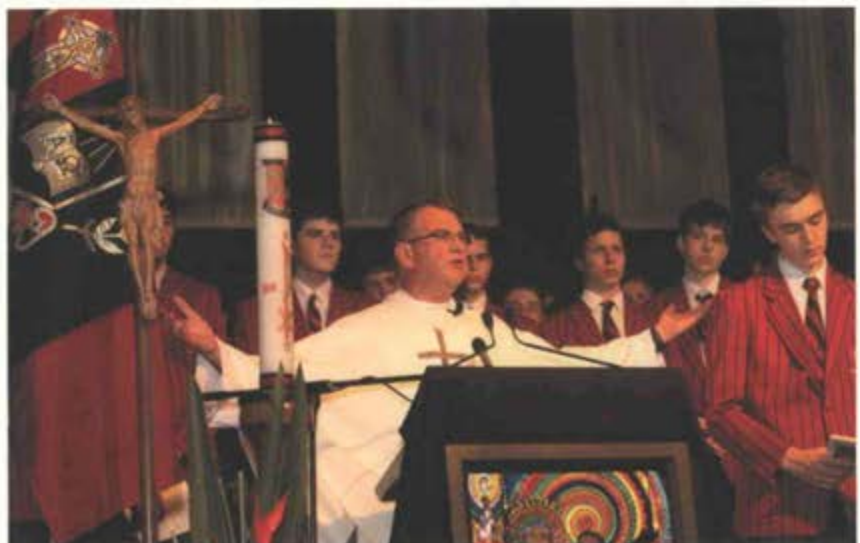
Middle School

The Year 8 and 9 students were the second cohorts to use the course modules revised in 2010. Reports from staff suggest that students found the work set out in these modules achievable and quite engaging, if not always relevant. Making Religious Education topics and activities relevant is probably one of the greatest challenges for teachers, no matter how experienced. Secularisation, the rise of militant atheism and the decline in authority of Christian churches in Australia and other western societies makes the job of convincing young boys of the importance of Religious Education in their day-to-day lives an almost herculean task.

How do the Faculty and its staff respond to such a challenging social context? One of the most meaningful ways is by providing high-quality teaching and learning resources to its staff and students. This includes using the Brisbane Catholic Education Office's excellent curriculum materials, ordering high-quality television documentaries and films, using video

content located on the web, and uploading unit resources on Moodle. The incorporation of the Dimensions of Learning pedagogy into the units, the use of information and communication technology, and regularly reviewing and revising units are some other ways staff make this subject relevant and interesting for students.

Science

Each year when I sit at my desk in my 'home office' to compile this report for the College Annual, I strain my memory to recall the educational experiences offered to our students during the day-to-day routine of College life and the excursions which were undertaken to support this classroom learning. Although there is constant change from year to year due to the implementation of new syllabuses, and the introduction of various approaches which enhance student learning, my latest effort may seem to be a rehash of accounts of previous years.

This year I will place my emphasis on the activities undertaken by our Year 9 and 10 students outside the Terrace science classroom.

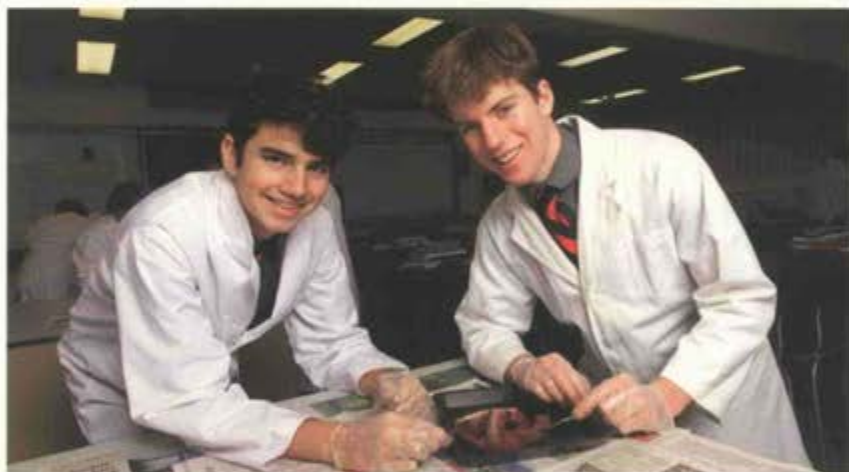
During the final week of Term 2, the Year 9 students completed five days of 'Exploration'. This year, of the units on offer to the Terrace students, two were totally based around science.

One of these was 'CSI - Forensic Science @ Terrace'. During their week, students who elected to participate in this unit undertook experimental activities where they were able to extract DNA from fruit. Other experimental-based activities included fibre identification, footprint and tyre casting, dental impressions, fingerprint analysis, chromatography, guns and projectiles, and bank note examinations. The boys were also afforded the opportunity to gain further insight into this branch of science through presentations by guest speakers in the area of criminal law.

The second of the science exploration units was simply called 'The Scientist'. Students spent the first day at the Queensland Science Centre and Museum where activities were based mainly around physics. Dr Michael Gattas delivered an informative presentation on genetics and medicine on the second day. The questions that the boys posed to Dr Gattas reflected that their thirst for knowledge in this subject had certainly been activated. The boys then spent two days at CSIRO where they performed experiments such as a DNA fingerprinting; they were able to determine if a breakfast cereal manufacturer's claims that a certain food product had been used in the production of the cereal was true. The students also employed advanced forensic scientific processes to solve criminal cases ranging from a situation where a person died of food poisoning to one where cattle were stolen then offered for sale at another location. The highlight for many students,

however, was their work in the robotics area of CSIRO. On the final day, the students travelled to The University of Queensland where they participated in tests which measured aerobic (endurance) and anaerobic (sprint) fitness.

Some of the other Exploration Units also offered participants the opportunity to gain an insight into various fields of scientific endeavour. The boys who travelled to Canberra on the 'National Explorer' unit visited the CSIRO facility where they studied Science in Society, Designer Genes and Forensic Frenzy. They also visited the Geo Science Centre, Qwestacon and the Canberra Deep Space Communication Centre. Students who travelled to Moreton Island investigated a variety of ecosystems ranging from sand dunes to fresh water lagoons and mangrove tidal flats. Those who camped at Carnarvon studied the geology of the area and examined the local flora and fauna.



At the end of Term 3, the Year 10 students participated in a 3 week Immersion Unit, one of which was facilitated by the Institute for Molecular Bioscience at The University of Queensland. The students who undertook this unit gained valuable research skills as they joined scientists to help with current projects. They also gained hands-on experience with techniques such as cell / tissue culture, protein / gene expression, electrophoresis, immunohistochemistry, fluorescent light microscopy, chromatography and spectrophotometry.

Another Year 10 group travelled to Fraser Island where they were able to study ecosystems such as rainforest, mangrove / mudflat, freshwater lake, sand dune and sandy beach. While on the island, the students also studied the effects of tourism on the natural environment.

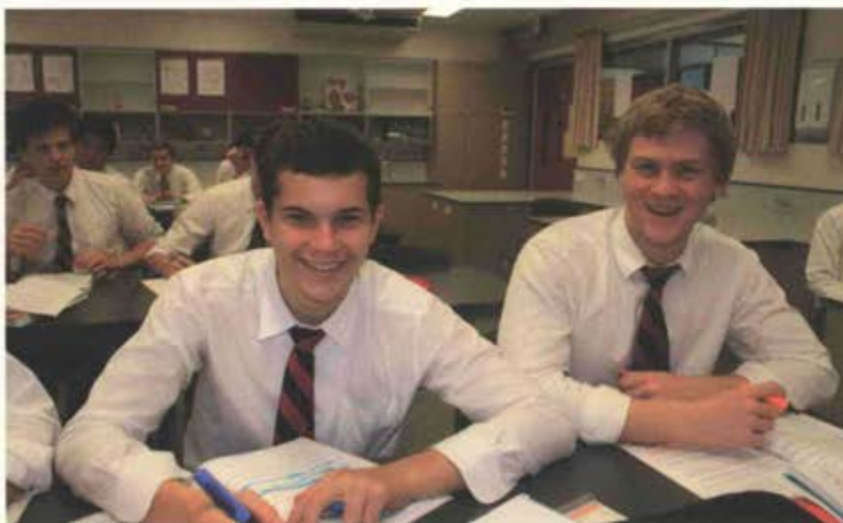
The School of Information Technology and Electrical Engineering at The University of Queensland offered a course on Robotics and Artificial Intelligence. The Year 10 boys who participated in this immersion were able to further develop their problem-solving and collaboration skills through designing, constructing and programming of robots. They also gained an understanding of electronics by building their own sensor.

Other students undertook the unit Come Fly With Me, an aviation immersion. During the three-week

period, they delved into all aspects of flight. The study culminated in the boys constructing and learning how to fly their own electric model aeroplanes.

On behalf of the boys who were afforded these exciting opportunities, I would like to thank Therese Kotzas, not only for all the hard work that she put into this program for 2011, but for the variety of educational experiences that she and the staff involved in the Explorations and Immersions have been able to develop and refine.

Economics

- how governments implement economic policies and objectives through contemporary economic management
- international economics such as trade relations, the balance of payments, and the stock market.

Our Year 11 and 12 Economics students are to be congratulated for their enthusiastic approach to the assessment tasks and for their lively discussion of current events and important economic issues. The high standard achieved is of course a credit to the students, but just as importantly it reflects the high calibre of teaching by experienced and enthusiastic staff members. I would like to thank Mrs Therese Kotzas and Mr Robert Varlow for their continuing support and professional approach to the subject.

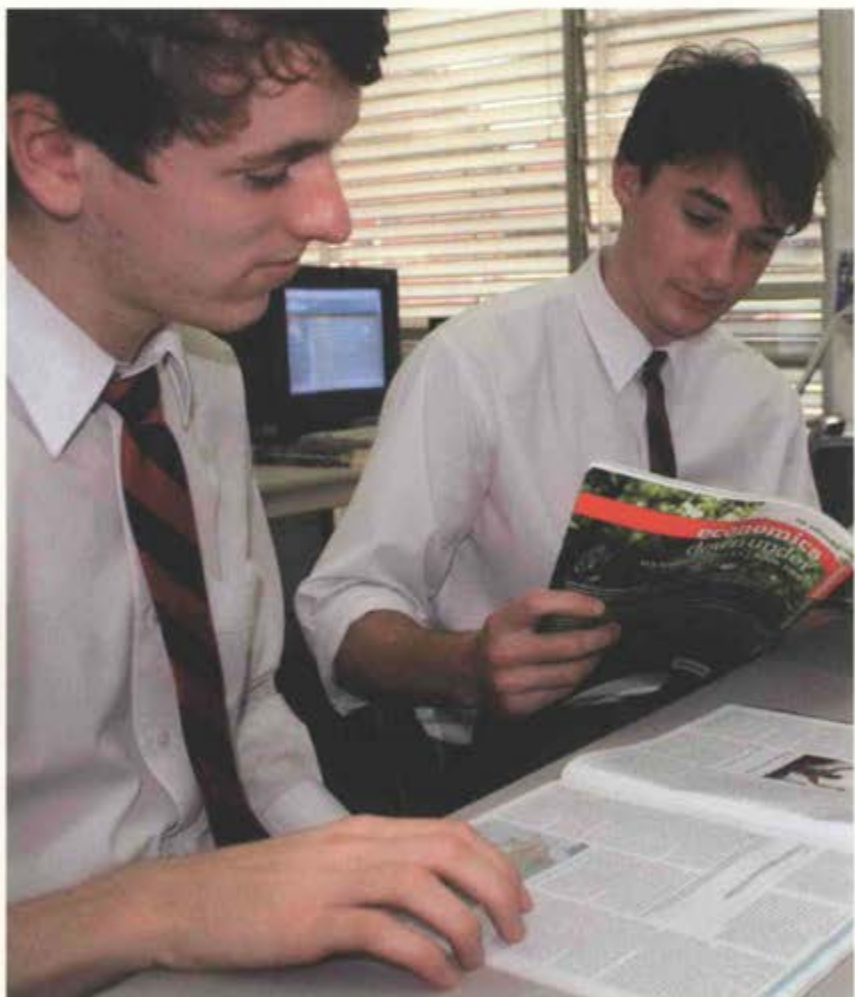

Counselling Services

THE COUNSELLING SERVICE IS DELIVERED BY THREE COUNSELLORS WITH POSTGRADUATE QUALIFICATIONS IN GUIDANCE AND COUNSELLING. ITS SUCCESS DEPENDS VERY MUCH ON THE INVOLVEMENT AND SUPPORT OF PARENTS AND STAFF. THE COUNSELLORS WORK CLOSELY WITH THE DEANS OF STUDIES, STUDENTS AND THE FACULTY OF EXCEPTIONAL LEARNERS TO IDENTIFY AND SUPPORT STUDENTS IN NEED, AND TO DELIVER APPROPRIATE PROGRAMS.

The focus of the Counselling Service is to work with students to develop their skills and knowledge, now and in the future, to make informed, achievable and healthy life choices, and to manage the personal challenges they experience. In 2011 we have continued this focus through individual and group counselling sessions and the delivery of personal development and career programs.

The activities other than counselling in which we have been involved this year include:

- organising social and emotional development activities for Year 10 students, including topics such as helpful thinking and self-talk, problem-solving, planning, time management and general wellbeing
- developing and resourcing a career development program – Your Next Step, delivered by teachers to all Year 10 students through their Formation classes. This program prepares students to develop their Senior Education and Training Plan and to select Year 11 and 12 subjects
- resourcing a mini-career immersion and career expo for Year 7 students, delivered by their teachers
- resourcing a short career-development program for Year 9

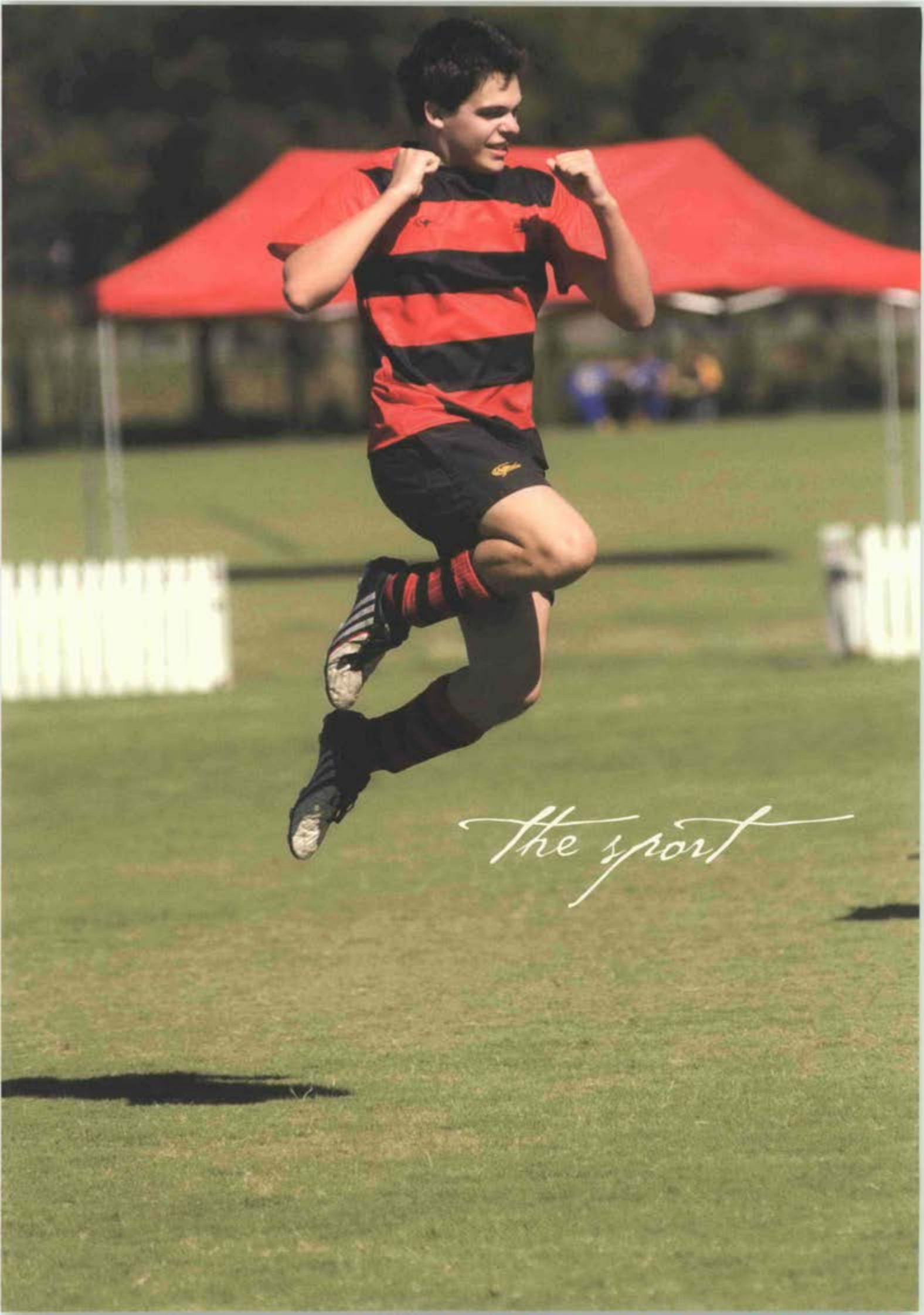


- students, delivered by teachers during Formation classes
- arranging career talks at a Year 10 parent evening, and maintaining a presence at College open days, parent-interview nights and subject-selection evenings
- organising and facilitating work experience of students during school holidays
- providing information to parents and students on topics, including emotional wellbeing, careers, tertiary pathways and application procedures
- organising the Terrace Old Boys' Career Expo, open to all students and parents
- developing and delivering the Year 10 'Try a Job' Immersion, which includes a week of work experience
- coordinating and mentoring students undertaking TAFE courses and other alternative educational pathways

- communicating to the Terrace community about child-safety issues during Child Protection Week. This included raising awareness of child protection and safety issues at assemblies

2011 was a difficult year for many of Terrace's sporting communities; however, upon reflection, I now consider the challenges brought about by the January flood as opportunities – to improve standards and question long-held preconceptions and beliefs.

The Terrace community rose to meet the numerous challenges in ways that allowed us to celebrate everything that is good about Terrace sport.

Only 10 days after the floods, it was a major effort to prepare nine cricket teams for Round 1 of Term 1. The number of teams increased every week until we had 29 teams (GPS and CIC) by Round 4 – a far cry from the 40 teams usually presenting every week in the cricket season.

The rowing community also had to be extremely flexible in its program – relocating to the Lourdes Hill Boat

Shed at Hawthorne. The Year 8 Learn to Row program and the Year 9 Junior Program were cancelled due to the reduced facility size, and the remainder had to stay out of the river due to health concerns about water quality.

Both the cricket and rowing communities need to be congratulated for preserving under such difficult circumstances.

The rugby and football communities then faced the challenge of reorganising schedules and locations to find venues for 900 boys to train. We hired rugby ovals at Ballymore, South's and North's as training venues. The football community were sent to Annerley, Whites Hill, Tarragindi and Holland Park for their training program.

A highlight for both codes was the opportunity to host a 'home' game at the BGS playing fields at Northgate. The 'Tennyson of the Northside' as it came to be known came to life on 14 May with the facility bathed in red. Sincere thanks and appreciation to the BGS community for allowing Terrace to host a home day.

The rugby community also celebrated its season with a home fixture at Ballymore – the First XV kicked off under lights at 6pm in front of a huge crowd of supporters.

Successes in terms of wins were a little harder to come by this year in rugby and football but when they did occur it was certainly a great time to celebrate.

A GPS Premiership in cross country was delivered to the College in August by an extremely hard-working group of athletes. Congratulations to all these young men on their fantastic performance.

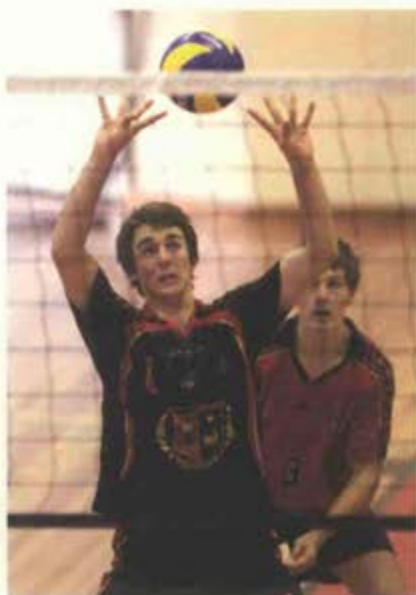

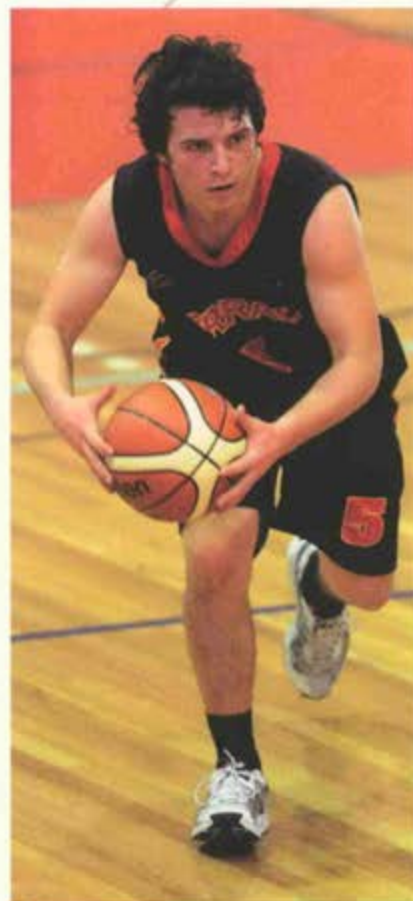

The 2011 Terrace cricket season will be remembered as one of the College's most challenging. The January floods that devastated Brisbane cast serious doubt on our hopes for playing either CIC or GPS cricket. All pre-season training, matches, clinics and tournaments, including the annual Christian Brothers' Cricket Week, were cancelled. More setbacks followed when our fields at Tennyson were ruled out for the season. Our only hope of playing was if each team could find an 'away' venue each week. However, resilience is built through adversity, and gradually we were able to field a number of teams for the Round 1 clash. Eventually, 373 cricketers from Years 5 to 12 represented the College in 2011.

The need to play matches 'away' each week meant uncertainty – we didn't know if our boys would get to play. As a result our playing numbers had to be decreased and our depth, which has been our strength for some time, was compromised. However, those boys who played in the face of such hardship represented the College with dedication and determination.

The program does not exist without the involvement of the staff, parent, old boy and senior student body. We had 13 teams from Years 5 to 7 competing in the CIC competition, with the 5C White, 6C White and 7B teams only suffering one loss each in the season. Our GPS contingent comprised 16 teams from Years 8 to 12, with the 9C team having the distinction of being the most successful Terrace cricket side for 2011, remaining undefeated for another season. The 9B and 9D teams only lost one match each, which allowed them to finish as 'unofficial premiers' for their respective competitions.

The First XI, under the guidance of Mr Brayden Teece, and capably led by Nicholas Meadows, deserves significant praise for their efforts in the GPS competition. In what was a most challenging season, the players' resolve was unquestionable. I pay tribute to the Senior cricketers who have represented the College for five seasons and, for some of these students, for eight seasons. For these teams, including the First XI, wins were hard to find, but this will be forgotten five years down

the track. What won't be forgotten is the resilience and great character these boys showed each week – this will be the lasting memory of the 2011 cricket season for me. I wish these young men the best of luck for their futures.

A successful cricket season requires dedication and commitment from many people. My sincere thanks to the Terrace Cricket Supporters' Committee led by Mr Mark Penberthy and assisted by Mrs Keryn O'Neill, Mr Greg Farrell and Mr Cary Clarke. The professional coaches, Terrace coaches, managers, scorers, umpires and parents who volunteer their time all deserve a vote of thanks for their dedication to the players and their willingness to help. Thanks also to Damian Wright for his support throughout the season.

I look forward to the 2012 season with great anticipation.

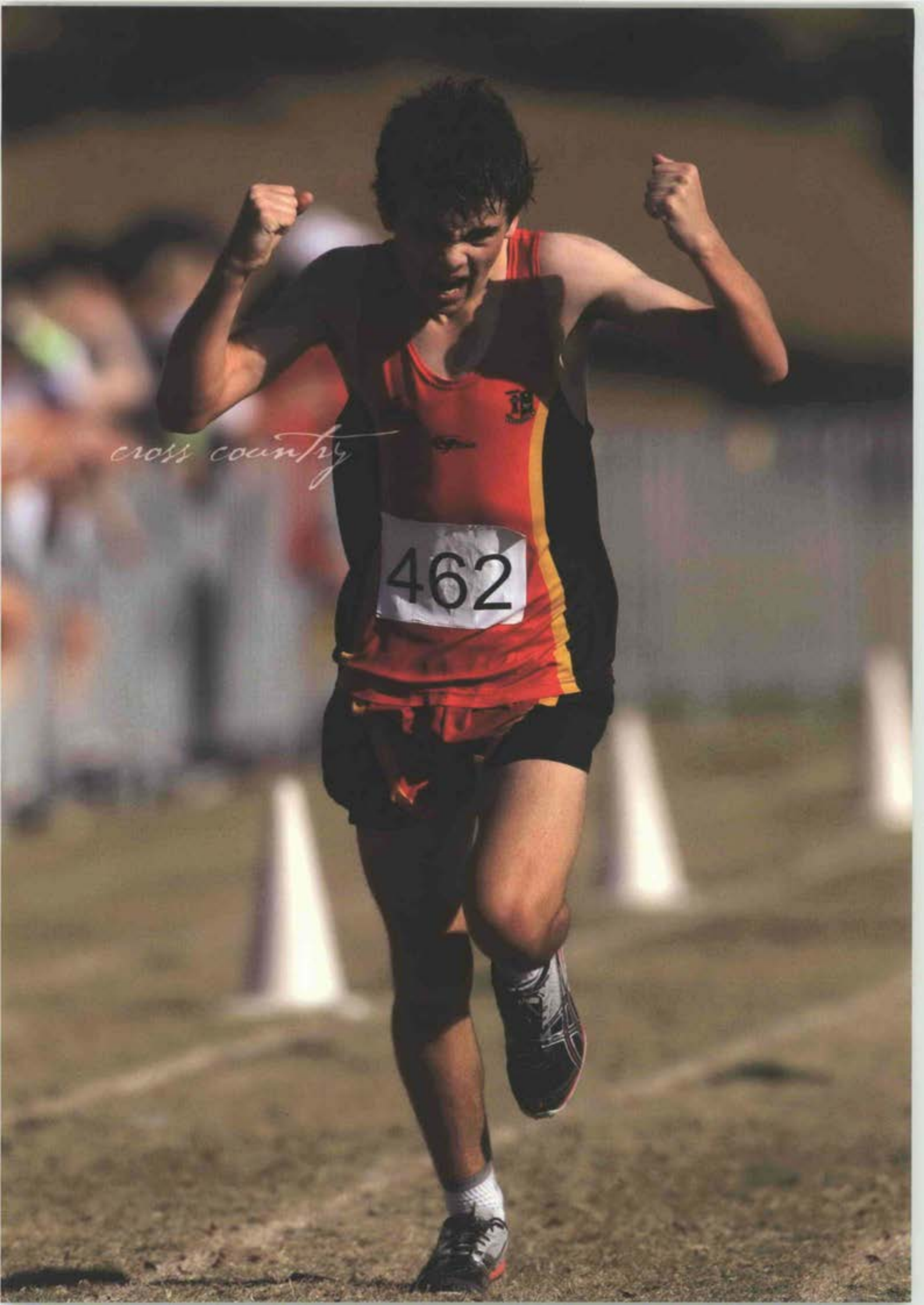

GPS Cross Country



The 2011 GPS cross country season was marked by enthusiasm, hard work and success. Achieving our seventh GPS premiership in the last 11 years speaks to the excellence of the team and the hard work of Head Coach Damien Coman. Enthusiastic participation in the Cross Country Shield this year saw the team winning its sixth title in a row. These results enabled us to continue 'The Long Red Line' and achieve our thirteenth consecutive finish in the top three at the GPS Championships.

GPS was a particularly testing day. The competition started with the U13s race. A wonderful 3rd place by Riley Kelly got us off to a solid start with the U13s getting 4th place. The U14s were brilliant, winning their age group with outstanding runs by Fergus Moore (7th), Jack Seawright (8th) and Lachlan Neill (9th).

Our U15s were under enormous pressure, having lost three runners to injury, but responded to the challenge and achieved second place, thanks largely to the efforts of Ged Windsor (2nd) and Sam Cross (10th).

Our U16s were superb, winning their age group, with Henry Coventry (9th) running his race of the season to lead the team home.

The Opens were left to finish the job and did it brilliantly, with team captain Morgan Windsor (6th) our first runner home. First-time top six runners Adam O'Kane (21st) and Henry Close (26th) deserve special mention for great performances in their final race.

This left Terrace in first place – the final winning margin was six points, the biggest in GPS for nine years, and our total of 42 points was Terrace's highest score ever. It was a gratifying team performance, rewarding a long season of training, with over 110 boys participating throughout the season.

Our new slogan 'Just Hit It' became central to the psyche of our players and was the belief they took onto the court.

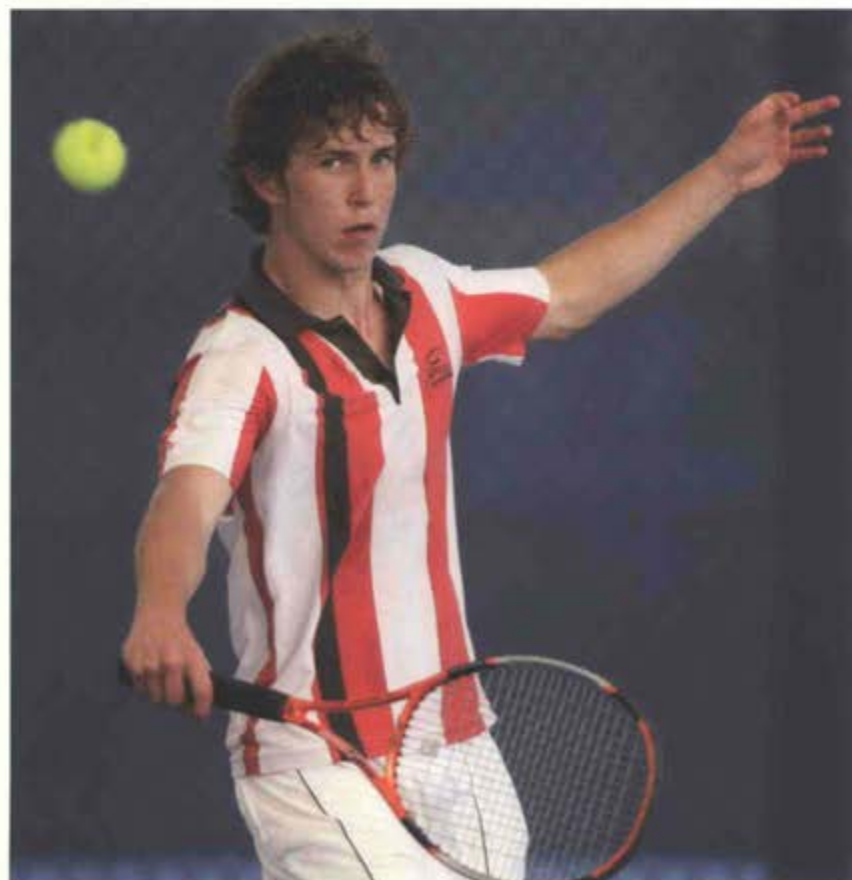
The CIC and GPS competitions delivered positive results and are improving every year. At our home games, Terrace is renowned for its food and I would like to thank all the parents for their generous offerings.

Terrace Volleyball soared to new heights in 2011. Our players commenced preparation with well-attended training clinics and a challenging tour to Melbourne for the National Volleyball Titles. We took two teams to this tournament and both placed in the top 10 in Australia.

In each of the GPS rounds we played with determination and a strong sense of unity. With 18 teams, Terrace had the largest representation in the GPS competition. Our GPS season was characterised by a 68% win ratio;

however, the most impressive aspect of the season was our players' work ethic and sportsmanship.

Key highlights for the season included the Open Second VI, Open Third VI Red, and Open Red Black, 11B, 11C, 10C and 9C teams winning their respective competitions. Teams that came second included the Open First VI, 11A, 10A, 10B, and 8B. Ross Field (Open Third VI) set a new record by winning 19 points in a row from his serve.

Our First VI performed exceptionally well and won six out of seven of their matches, placing 2nd in GPS competition. 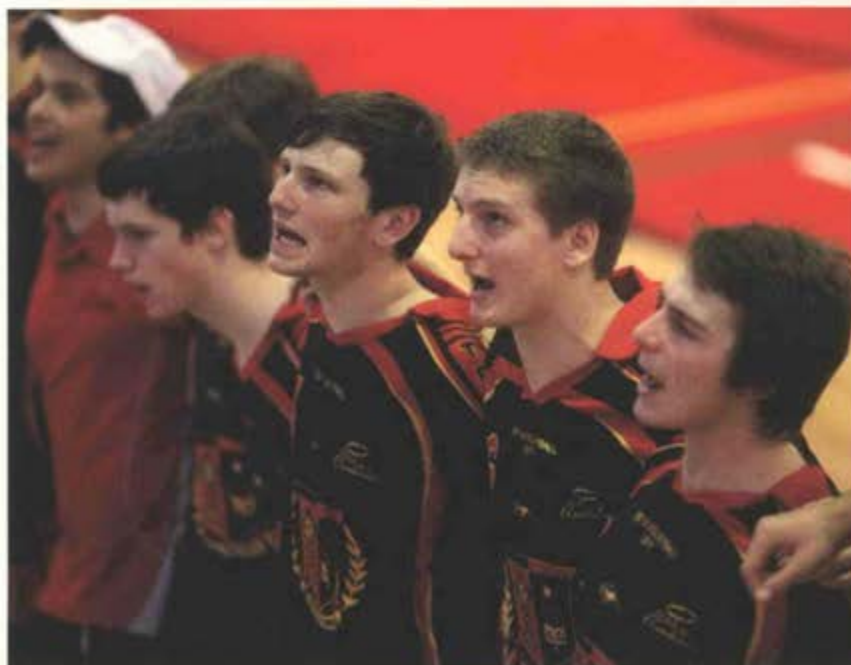

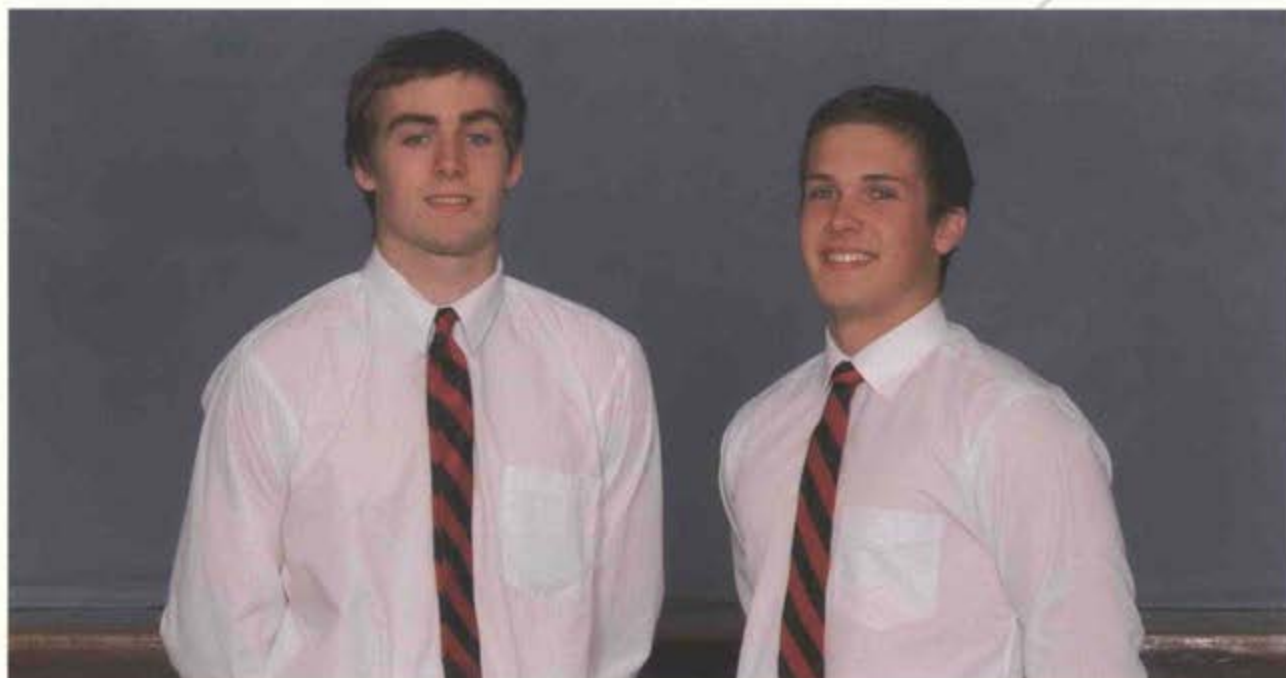

The 2011 cultural year produced some outstanding results that will be highlighted in the subsequent pages. Although the following reports will provide an insight into our programs, I am again overwhelmed by the effort given by so many to ensure our students' creativity continued to be nurtured and developed in so many positive environments. To provide a holistic education, it is important for us to nurture the creativity of all our students as it develops their self-awareness, self-confidence and interpersonal skills. Our cultural programs offer so many opportunities for our students to express these important aspects of their development.

I wish to recognise the significant contribution our staff have made to ensuring our boys were creatively challenged and extended throughout

the year. I know that our students thrive on organised opportunities to perform, and I thank our many teachers for their continued support of our cultural community.

How do you top something like this? What about performing at the dawn service at Gallipoli? Terrace, with the support of All Hallows', presented a successful Expression of Interest in response to a request from the Australian Government to provide choral music at the dawn services in Gallipoli for the next four years, including the centenary year in 2015. The honour that underpins this

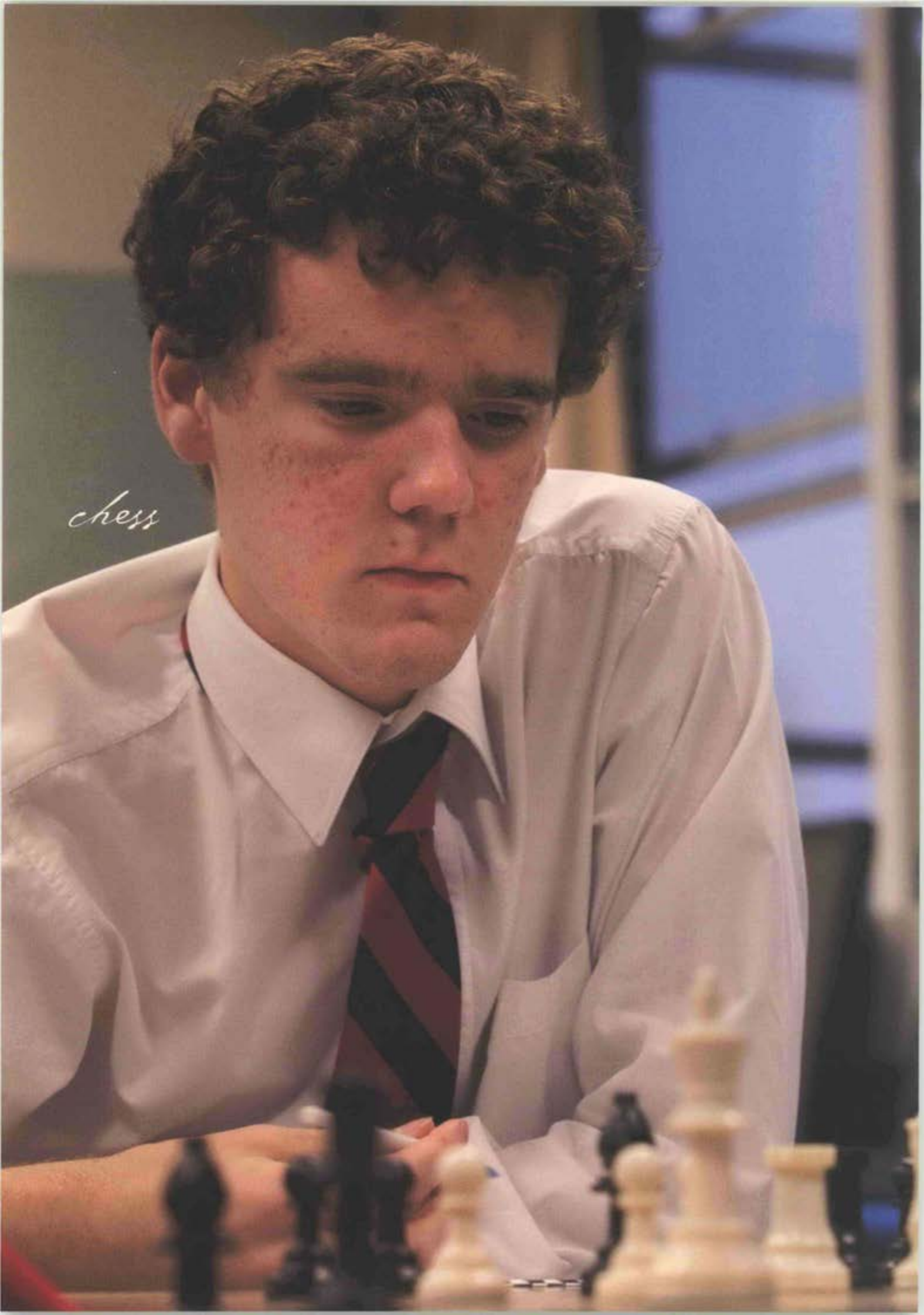
tremendous opportunity to be part of an occasion where we represent our country in paying tribute to the sacrifice made by ANZAC soldiers in 1915 will be another amazing experience for our students. It will be especially poignant for Terrace because some of our Old Boys were on the beach in the early days of the Gallipoli campaign. One hundred years later, Terrace boys will be singing where their Terrace brothers gave their lives for the freedom of our country.

Another great initiative in 2011 was the work of a debating reference group to investigate new directions for developing and delivering a stronger program for debating students. Mr Chapman accepted the reference group's recommendations, which included raising the profile of the coaching positions for our Senior A, and Year 10 and 11 teams, and appointing a Director of Coaching to support our existing coaching structures and investigate avenues for international exposure.

In closing I would like to thank the entire Terrace community – staff, students and parents – for their continuing support of our cultural programs. Whatever heights we may reach are the result of the combined efforts of all. Thank you for 2011.

exploring ways of heightening their voice and movement. It has also involved research into the history of Persia, the social conditions, rules, rituals and foods of the times.

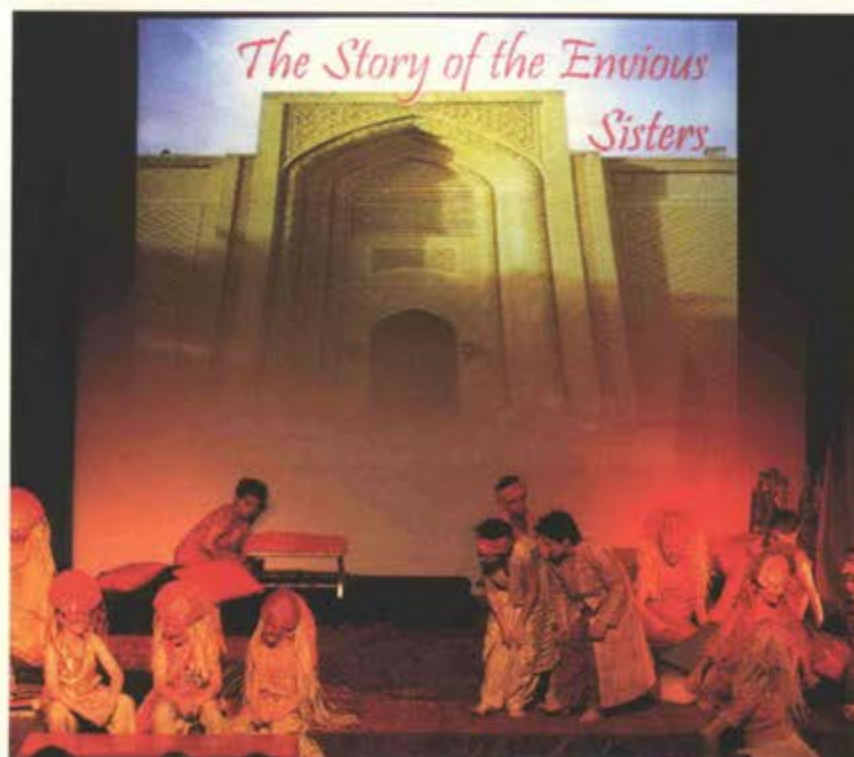
The Arabian Nights offered us not only a doorway into an enchanted other world, but stories as moral lessons for our time.

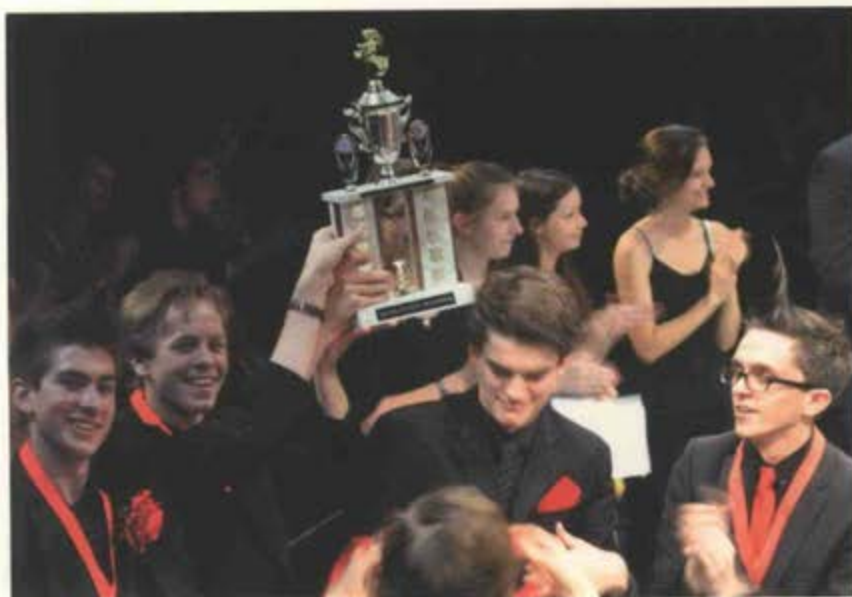
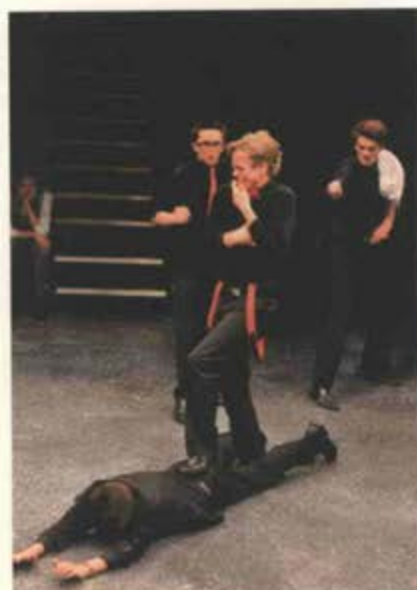

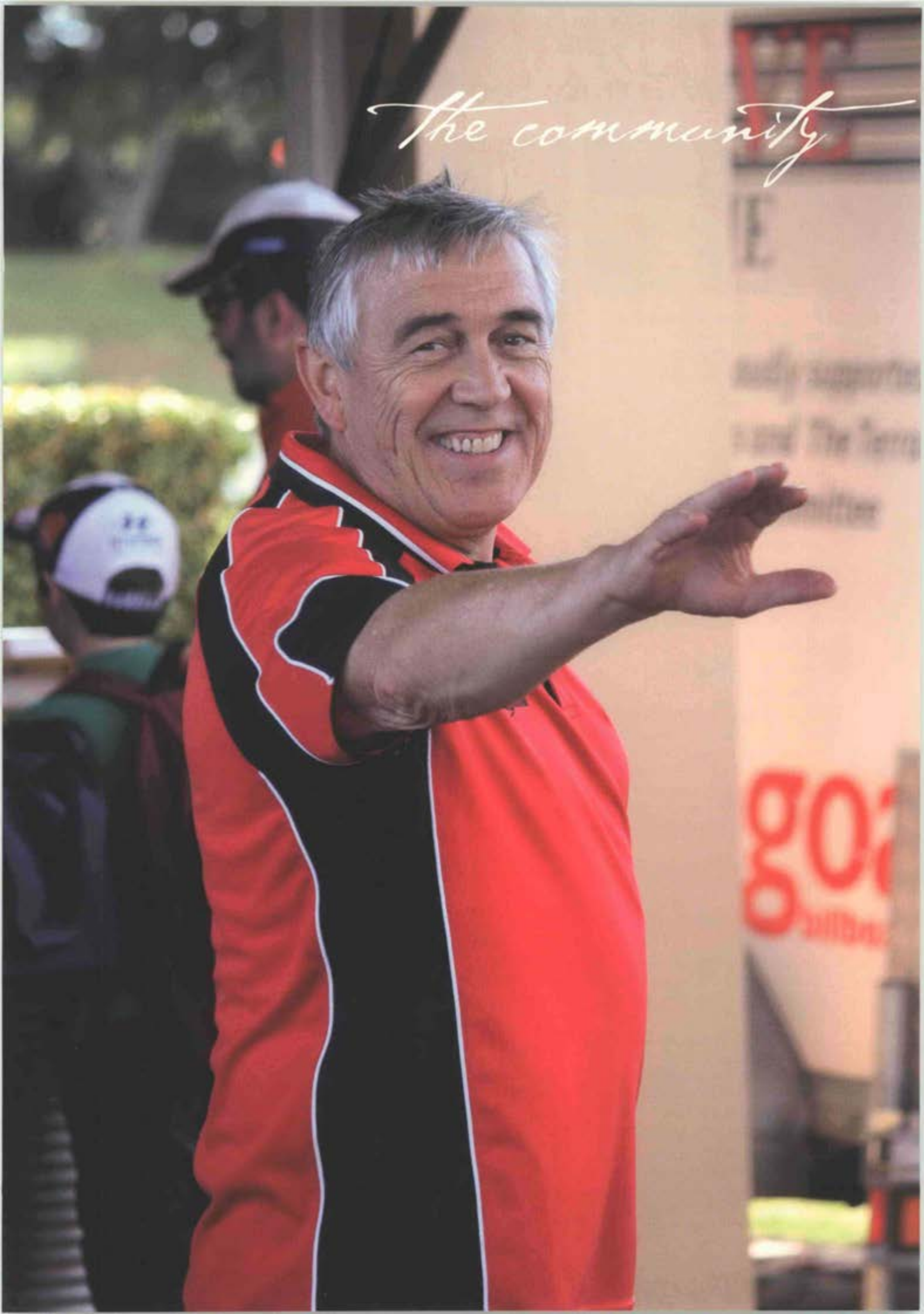

Again this year, the Foundation, through the Edmund Rice Scholarship Fund, provided \$100,000 to support 10 bursary students to attend Terrace. This needs-based program has increased from three students since its inception in 2008.

During the year, Mr Kieran Splatt and Mrs Andrea Splatt, Mr Peter Hackett and Dr Sharon Kelly, and Mr Geoff Rodgers and Mrs Christine Rodgers were inducted as Foundation Fellows on the honour board in College Hall. I congratulate these generous lead donors.

The Foundation's fundraising programs cover three main areas of philanthropy:

Pledge campaign – parents with boys entering the College are invited to a meeting with a Director to inform them of the Foundation's role and plans, and to ask them to consider a pledge commitment to the Building Fund during their son's time at Terrace. Over 1000 pledges are in place with over \$6.5million promised over the ensuing eight years – a new record and a wonderful result for the Terrace community.

Annual Giving – an appeal, run in conjunction with the Gregory Terrace Old Boys' Association, enables the entire Terrace family to contribute to either the Building Fund or the Edmund Rice Scholarship Fund. Again this campaign was well supported in 2011.

Bequests – the Foundation has received a number of bequests over the years

and was pleased to receive a final distribution from the estate of the late James Mahoney (GT 1958) this year. Bequests are a particularly effective method of providing for future generations of Terracians. Donors may specify in their will for their gift to be named 'in memory' of a spouse or family members to be perpetuated to the Edmund Rice Scholarship Fund.

I would like to thank all the donors to the Foundation's campaigns in 2011. Two exciting projects were opened during the year – the Br Tony White Building and the renovated Treacy Centre, which was fully funded by the generosity of donors to the Foundation.

With the catastrophic flooding of the Tennyson Playing Fields in January, the Foundation was pleased to join other Terrace support groups with a lead donation for the restoration cost to return these facilities to their former glory.

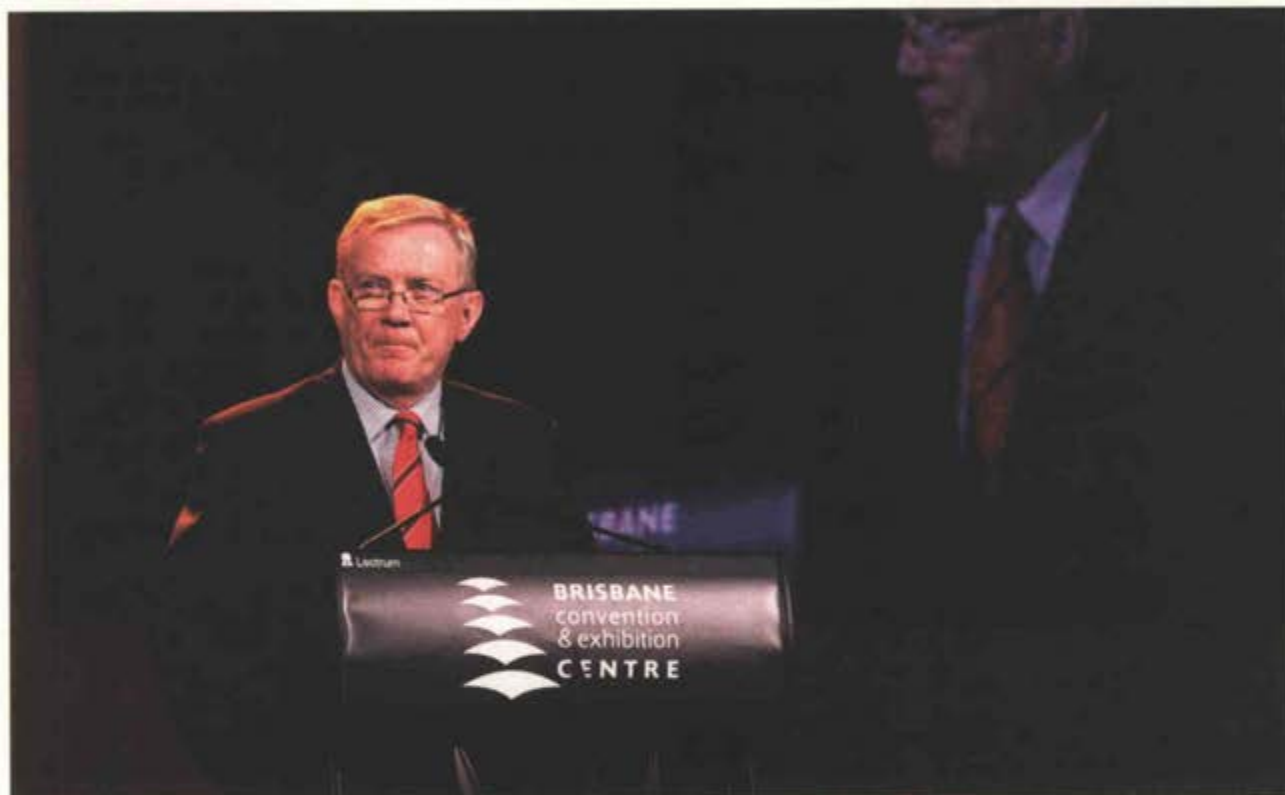

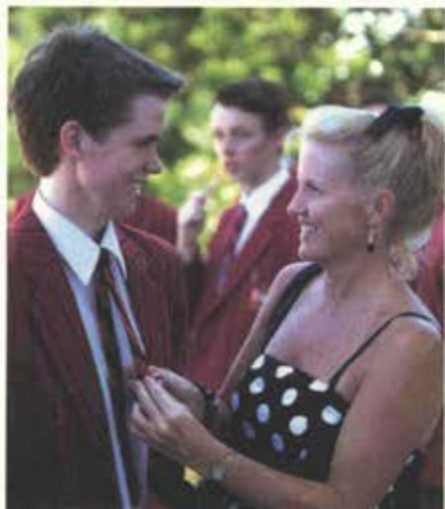

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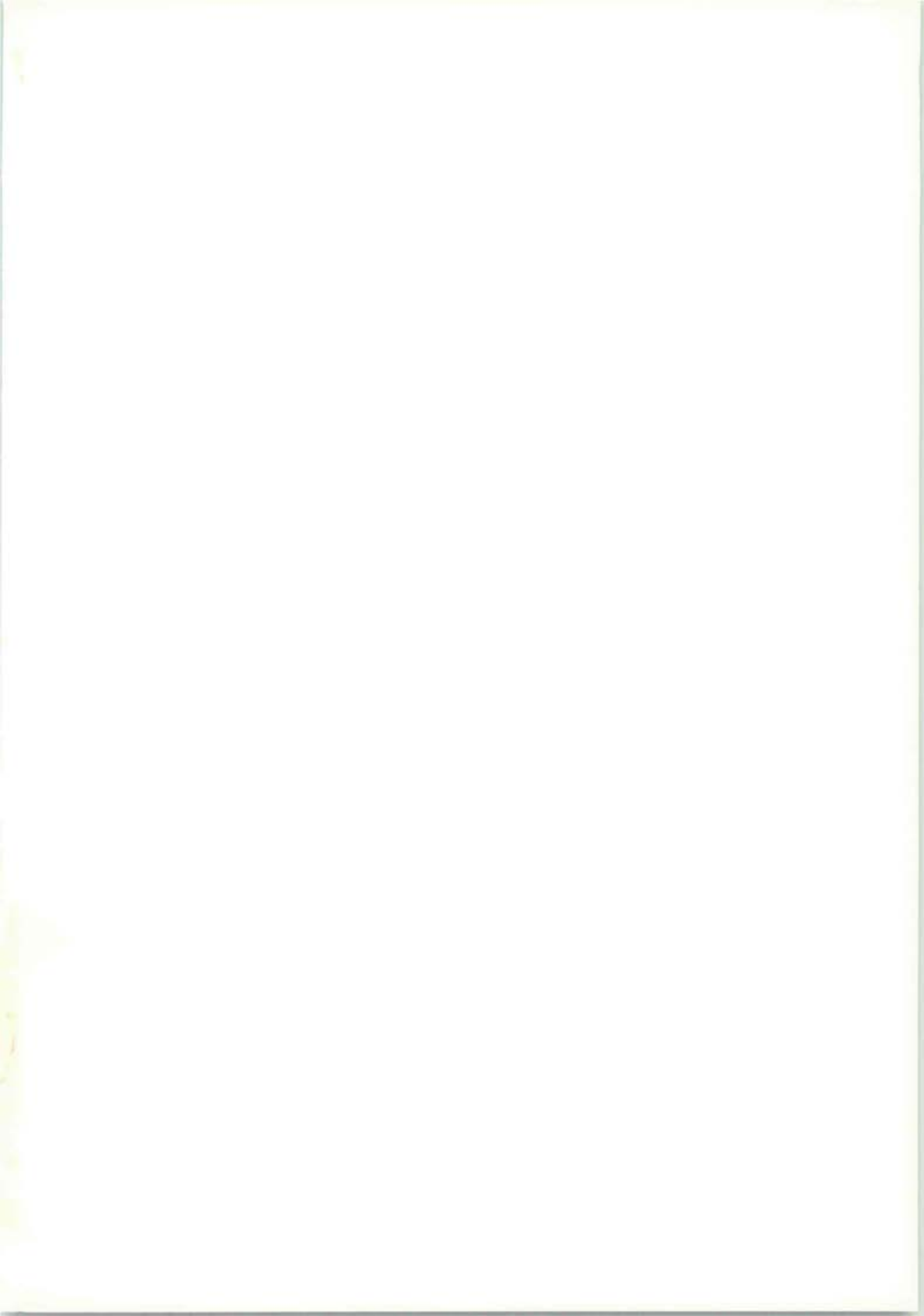
