PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE: DR MICHAEL **CARROLL**

I reiterate the importance of students being well prepared for exams.

Dear Members of the Terrace Family,

The Term 1 exam block has commenced and, as per my comments in last week's newsletter, I reiterate the importance of being well prepared. An important aspect of good preparation is the amount of sleep young people require. There is a significant amount of research and literature regarding this issue. Lauren Hale, from the National Sleep Foundation, asserts that sleep is important for survival and health; if you do not prioritise sleep, then a person may adversely affect both their body and mind (Hale, 2015). Hale's research recommends that teenagers require between 7 to 9 hours of sleep per night in order to function well. I have included a website that examines a range of information regarding the importance of sleep and includes a very informative video clip where Lauren Hale details vital information regarding the importance of sleep for adolescents. I encourage parents to view the video and to work with their sons in establishing good sleep patterns. The website is www.sleepfoundation.org/sleep-topics/teensandsleep

Students will be dismissed at 3pm. It is not an early holiday opportunity. I request that students do not finish the term early.

This weekend we move into the final round of Term 1 GPS sporting fixtures against Brisbane Boys' College. I wish all teams the very best for this final fixture. I also take this opportunity to congratulate and thank all of those involved in the Term 1 activities on what has been a very successful program. Well done to all involved.

In recent weeks, the College has received a number of reports from members of our own community, and the general public, regarding the lack of road safety being shown by some students. These reports relate to students crossing St Paul's Terrace and other very busy streets in the Valley area, not at crossings. This practice is extremely dangerous and my concern is that a student will be injured. Our Dean of Students, Mr Fall, spoke on this issue at Assembly and staff will be monitoring some of the "hot spots" in the coming weeks. I would ask parents to also reinforce with your sons the importance of road safety and crossing roads at the correct places. Students are placing themselves at risk by their actions. Thank you for your support of this important issue.

With our exams underway this week, many boys are embracing the opportunity to test the knowledge and skills gained this term. This is a time where the hard work invested by many boys can and should be rewarded.

This year student school reports will be delivered electronically only. This will be in the form of an email with the attached student report. This report will be sent electronically by the close of the day on Monday 3 April. Further to these reports, there will be information via the Parent Lounge explaining the process for booking the parent/teacher/student interviews that take place next term on 26 April and 3 May. These interviews will take place from 1.30 to 8.30 pm. Bookings for these interviews will open on Tuesday 4 April at 8am.

Below is a copy of the messages shared with the boys at our school assembly last Tuesday.

- You need to place your student ID cards on your desk in each exam- this allows us to mark the attendance roll without disturbing you.
- You must line up outside the exam room quietly and enter in silence. There is to be no talking once you are in the room and you are not to speak until after you have left the room.
- If you have a question, you must raise your hand during perusal and the teacher will come to your desk.
- At Terrace we aim **to be the best we can be** and as such we work until the final time allocated to the exam. If we finish early we check our work. We do not just sit with our paper closed.
- Attempt every question even if you are unsure of an answer- if we write nothing,
 we get nothing.
- Make sure you get adequate sleep the night before the exam.
- On the morning of the exam, make sure you have a good breakfast.
- On arrival at school do not get caught up in 'panic conversation' that could

undermine your confidence.

- Plan your strategy for time allocation prior to the exam. There is nothing more frustrating than knowing an answer and not having time to answer.
- Be positive and confident! If you have worked hard during the term this is the time when you deserve to be rewarded. Go into the exam feeling strong and confident do not doubt yourself.

DEAN OF STUDENTS: MR DAMIEN FALL

It is expected that personal presentation and manners are a high priority for boys when they are travelling to and from school.

This week at College Assembly, I raised two important points about students travelling to and from school. The first relates to the safety of students – far too frequently, we receive reports from members of the public who are concerned about our students crossing roads in a dangerous manner. Too often, teenage boys are in a rush and looking for a shortcut. When it comes to road crossing, there is a need to slow down and ensure the safest route is selected. I implore parents to push this message at home as no-one in our community wants to be dealing with a tragedy. My second point was about behaviour on public transport. Most boys make us proud by the way they conduct themselves, but a minority make poor decisions and this reflects badly on all students. Our standard expectation is that the Terrace Gentleman is **the first to stand** and offer his seat to an adult. It is also expected that personal presentation and manners are a high priority for boys when they are travelling. Again, the assistance of parents in emphasising these expectations would be appreciated.

Exams are well underway and, until Wednesday of next week, students from Years 11 and 12 are only required at school when they have an exam. Please note that Thursday 30 and Friday 31 March are both compulsory full days of school for all students, inclusive of Years 11 and 12. It is important that all students are in attendance until the conclusion of our Easter Liturgy at 3.10pm on Friday of Week 10.

While the weather is not yet showing signs of cooling off significantly, it is timely to give some advance warning about uniforms for next term. From the beginning of Week 3 (Tuesday 2nd May), all students will be required to wear their blazer to and from school every day. They must remain in the blazer at least until the 8.25am bell to start the school day. Long trousers will be compulsory for all students from Years 11 and 12. Younger students are permitted to wear long trousers, but they are not compulsory. Please note that the Terrace Shop does not carry much stock of smaller sizes of long trousers, and given

I knew he was there, however, I was yet to pause and consider why he was there. After a brief encounter with Gregory Terrace Old Boy Br Tim Scott last term, the next time I looked above the entrance to College Hall I did pause and consider the significance of St Joseph looking over our community from above. Our Patron Saint, St Joseph, is living up to his name and the hopes of our founders with being 'The Protector' of the Terrace Family.

The Christian Brothers chose the name "Joseph" for our school quite deliberately. They chose our name so that we could grow towards being like Joseph through following his example. DEAN OF WATERFORD: MR DAMIEN CUDDINY

We hope that the final preparations for the upcoming exam period will put the "icing on the cake" for what has been a very good term in the classroom.

It's been an excellent week leading into the exam block with the before school tutoring sessions attracting a great deal of interest from the boys. This cohort has certainly embraced the opportunity to access extra assistance with their studies over the past fortnight. One other observation that I would like to make is that assignment submissions, by in large, have been excellent from the group. We hope that the final preparations for the upcoming exam period will put the "icing on the cake" for what has been a very good term in the classroom.

In Term 2, we are offering two new service learning opportunities for the Year 10 cohort. The first is the "Head to Heart" program which is a modified 24hr Edmund Rice Camps program starting on a Friday afternoon and finishing on the Saturday at around 4pm. This program will be offered at the end of Week 2 next term. In short, our students are paired up with a primary school aged participant from the community who generally has struggled to undertake mainstream schooling. Later in the year our students will have the opportunity to participate in longer programs with Edmund Rice Camps Australia. Both programs have been strongly supported by the boys at Waterford with both programs being full.

The second opportunity is to join our **homework support club** being run at St Mary's of the Cross on Wednesday afternoons throughout the term commencing in Week 4. We are looking for a small group of volunteers who are prepared to travel to St Mary's in Windsor by College mini bus to assist students with homework after school. We still have spaces in this program. Students can collect information sheets from student services.

YEARS 7, 8 AND 9 PROGRAM LEADER: MR DAMIEN COMAN

I have challenged boys to think about the state of preparation that they are currently in.

A significant number of Terrace students participated in the University of Queensland's QAMT (Queensland's Association of Mathematics Teachers) competition. We look forward to seeing the results of this as a very large number of students participated across the state.

Whilst teaching many Formation classes across Years 7-9, I have challenged boys to think about the state of preparation that they are currently in, for this phase of the term where they enter exams. There were three main groups that I could classify based upon their responses. Some had completed all assignments, were well into revision and had been chipping away at this consistently throughout the term. Another main group said that they were nearly finished assignments. These would be handed in on time but later than they had hoped, they were doing some revision but most of the time had gone into assignments. The final group were pushing to complete the assignments and some were ready for some long nights. After Friday of Week 8, they would recover and face the facts that they were again starting to think about revising for exams in Week 9, whilst they were in Week 9!

The Year 9s viewed a wonderful TED Talk presentation during Formation where a PhD student shared his knowledge of procrastination. He highlighted that deadlines drive most young men to push through incredible barriers to complete an assignment but he also highlighted the stress that this can cause them (and their family). He also highlighted that whilst subjects require deadlines for assessment, life itself is not always like that. There are no deadlines for keeping in communication with friends, maintaining a good diet, saving money or exercise for example. These require self discipline.

Whilst holidays are near, boys need to stick to their current 'full time job,' and work as hard as they can until the end of term. Encouragement of adolescent men can go a long way.

CAPTAIN'S CORNER: VICE CAPTAIN, JACK KIMMINS

It's not always about how you finish the race..

Over my time at Terrace I have heard countless speeches offering advice and encouragement around our end of term exams. However, whilst all these speeches each had unique qualities that made them valuable, there is one that has stuck with me throughout my whole time at this College. Sitting as a wide eyed Year 8 in the Campbell Centre, back in 2013, the then School Captain Michael Wellington got up and delivered a speech which has helped define my positive exam block mentality. A keen fan of the horses "Wello" recounted to us the story of a race he had watched at Doomben the week before, "There were two favourites for a particular race Boban and Streamer, both beautiful horses and both expectant of a win. As the gates were flung open and the race began, the two horses couldn't have started more differently. There appeared a gulf in class between the two. Streamer got out to a perfect start, pulling out in front of the competition and gaining the inside track on the first bend. Boban on the other hand, got caught up in the pack and was pushed towards the back of the pack. These positions remained unchanged for most of the race. Streamer looking the sure winner as they came around the final bend. However, as they turned into the final straight, onlookers began to realise that the winner was anything but sure. Put in those final few hours to revise the trickier maths concepts, the chemical reactions that didn't quite make sense to you, the exact difference between the subject and the object of the sentence. A strong final sprint can make all the difference in whether or not you finish the term where you want to.
