Dear Parents, Students and Friends of St Patrick's College,  
Welcome to Week 3 of Term 3.

## SOCIAL MEDIA

Typically at this time of year, I like to look at an issue affecting our young people today and try and give some hopefully helpful advice to parents in this space.

Social media is the topic for today. Currently, the older generation's weapon of choice is mostly Facebook, Instagram and Twitter. For most young people, nearly all communication today is via Snapchat, Instagram, Tumblr and WhatsApp.

When used correctly and safely, these are extremely useful. Even the College has its own Facebook and Instagram pages for the dispersing of information. Recently I was away for the holidays and I had to communicate with the driver on WhatsApp. These communication tools make the global world much smaller.

As adults we apply a mature sense of reason and a general understanding of the consequences to our actions. The concern we contend with as educators and parents is that our children are making adolescent decisions that have adult consequences.

As a College, especially in the Middle School, we are dealing with students who are posting, requesting or looking at, and distributing inappropriate images on social media. Often these are

provocative images of young boys and girls either nude or in underwear.

It was such a positive move for Instagram to recently remove 'likes'. We need to educate our children that their worth can't be measured by the number of likes they have received.

However, in an effort to gain more notoriety, some children upload inappropriate images and posts, which have the potential for life-long consequences.

Adolescent decision. Adult consequences.

The question remains - what collectively can we do to help the situation? The simple solution would be to remove devices and return them when they are 25 years old, however obviously societies need to connect via mobile devices for a number of valid reasons.

At the College, we will continue to educate students about the responsible use of social media. But most importantly, as a parent, you have the greatest responsibility in this domain.

It is College protocol that no staff member is to check social media of students if we are informed of inappropriate images. As parents however, you can assist to reduce inappropriate content in the following ways:

Most inappropriate images are taken in the bathroom or bedroom, therefore consider 'a phone in the living area' policy of a night.

Check your children's social

media on a regular basis, with them present, to determine if the images and content of their posts are appropriate. This certainly provides the opportunity for constructive conversation.

Have knowledge of social media so you can understand how your children are communicating.

Concerns with social media are occurring far too frequently. We all need to work collectively to ensure our children avoid adult consequences because of their adolescent decisions.

## APPROPRIATE WEARING OF PE UNIFORM

This is a notice for all parents of the College regarding the appropriate days, and occasions, for wearing PE uniform.

PE uniform is only to be worn for the entire school day for students in Year 7 and 8 on Thursdays. If a student has Health & Physical Education on their timetable for the school day, they need to wear their formal College uniform to school, and then change into their PE uniform at the beginning of their Health & Physical Education lesson, and then change out of their PE Uniform at the end of the lesson.

The expectation is that all students wear their formal College uniform at all times other than those occasions listed above.

The College acknowledges that there may be exceptional circumstances where a student is not able to wear their full College uniform, and instead attends school in their PE uniform. The only occasions where this is acceptable is if there is an item of uniform that is damaged, needs replacing, or is lost and is unable to be worn.

On these occasions when students wear their PE uniform to school, a note must be provided by their parent/guardian that explains the reason and duration for the incorrect uniform being worn and then is dated and signed by the parent/guardian. This note must be shown to their Tutor Teacher during

morning Tutor Period. The Tutor Teacher will then advise the student to attend the Uniform Infringement Office where an entry is placed on their student record that they are out of uniform.

To present at school in PE uniform without reason is unacceptable, even if a note is provided by the parent/guardian. Again, it is only on those occasions where an item of uniform is damaged, needs replacing, or is lost and is unable to be worn - and a note must be provided.

If a student attends the Uniform Infringement Office three times without a note provided by parents, or without legitimate reason for being in PE uniform three times, they are issued a Tuesday After School Detention as per the College's Uniform Protocol, which may be accessed at the College's website in the Policies & Protocols section:

Students can only make changes to their online choices once, so they need to be sure of what they are selecting before going online.

## ASCENT: YEAR 12 MELBOURNE EXPEDITION

During Week 1 of Term 3, our Ascent Year 12 team travelled to Melbourne to participate in a program called Urban Camp. Urban Camp is run by the Brotherhood of St Lawrence, an Australia wide organisation that works with and for people of all ages and stages who suffer from disadvantage. The team of 19 Year 12 leaders and eight staff explored issues of refugees, migration, generational poverty, homelessness, indigenous disadvantage, youth disadvantage and the plight of the disadvantaged elderly. We explored ways of combat these issues and include and uplift everyone in community. Here are some Expedition reflections from our leaders:

"It was such an eye-opening experience and I can honestly say that it changed the way I view my own life goals. I learned about so many amazing organisations that serve the community and it gave me an insight into how I'm able to make a difference for others in the future."

"The Melbourne Expedition full of a range of powerful, meaningful and diverse activities throughout the whole week. Urban Camp exposed us to a wide range of ethnic, social, cultural and financial backgrounds of individuals in our community. Experiencing activities and being present with these different groups of people allowed us to understand their stories, and suffer with them. We all developed a level of compassion, and an urgency to do something about the suffering out in the world. Personally, I have made a promise to myself to never underestimate the power of a warm conversation. We may not be able to fix everything, but every small action counts for something. Melbourne also exposed us to a range of post Year 12 volunteer options that

we may wish to continue with. This was a lovely experience and really helped us as an Ascent group to consider our futures and who we plan to be as compassionate people in the community."

Not only did our students gain much from this experience, but they also gave much of themselves in serving others. Here is a reflection from a volunteer at Breakfast Club, on the quality of our St Patrick's College AY12 Team:

"The St Pat's kids were so confident and lovely. They seem a lot more well-adjusted than city kids. They stepped forward into the situation confidently and seemed self-assured. Sometimes city kids just stand there gawking awkwardly at the little Sudanese kids. The St Pat's students showed natural leadership which was extremely refreshing to see."



### YEAR 11 PRESENTATION TO RE TEACHERS

While our Year 12 team was busy in Melbourne, Ascent Guide Mrs Lyn Haberle and three of our Year 11 leaders presented at the TCEO Religious Education Colloquium. Their task was to explain Ascent to some people both within and beyond our community, sharing their experience and growth as part of Ascent. A huge thank you to Ben Williams, Olivia Jeffrey and Ava Drew. Here are some



responses from people who attended their workshop:

"The highlight was the workshop which involved our very own Ascent students. They were remarkable. All the teachers who attended that workshop were very inspired by our Ascent program. Lyn provided some context and outline of the program, but the personal testimonies of the students were very moving. So much so, some of the RE teachers were moved to tears, when Ava Drew spoke emotionally of her experience at St Paul's Bridgewater. This speaks volumes of the impact our mission and outreach programs have not only on our students but those they serve."

"Both Lyn's presentation about the Ascent Program and the great witness and sharing of St Pat's students were very well received by all of the participants in the workshop. I know that some of the southern RECs were very engaged and are interested in learning more about this program. The students were such a credit to both the program and to your College - fine examples of missionary disciples who are engaged head, heart and hands!!"





## Book Your Senior IP Session Now!

In **term 3** senior students studying level 3 **Psychology, Sociology and English** will be working on their major **Investigation Projects (IPs)**. Every year the Mary MacKillop Library offers these students one-on-one research sessions focusing on their individual topic. We help students develop their library, database and internet research skills which gives them a solid starting point for their IP.

These sessions usually last a double period, either during a study line or during class time for the related subject after negotiating with the teacher, and they are extremely valuable. We look at how to access and use databases of academic journals, a range of pre-tertiary level textbooks and resources and any other credible research to help our students build their literature reviews and research methods.

## SENIOR SECONDS XVIII FOOTBALL GRAND FINAL REPORT – 28 JUNE 2019

After the bus trip down, a great team dinner and less than ideal accommodation in Hobart on Friday night, Saturday dawned overcast but fine as the St Patrick's College Senior 2nd XVIII attended to their final preparations for the grand final against the undefeated The Hutchins School side.

With 57% of the team coming from Years 9 and 10 and only four Year 12s in the side, the St Patrick's College team was undoubtedly considered, by many, as the underdogs. However, within the team there was a knowing air of confidence that 100% commitment from all would see us victorious.

The start of the game saw Will McKenzie and Coby Chugg prominent, with Michael Stingel capping of his great work in the mid-field with a roving goal to kick the first of the match.

Jock Heazlewood-Snell was providing our mid-fielders with first use of the ball and Marcus Darko and Sam Cullen were doing a good job in defence repelling Hutchins' forays forward. Mid-fielder Matthew Saunders' crumbing goal, our second for the day, was good reward for his creative work across the ground.

Small forward, Ryan Fraser, with his pace and work rate, was causing the opposition head aches, as was the silky Daniel Van Noord.

A chiselling pass from Alec Roberts to Cooper Warren, who had pushed up the ground from half back, gave the boys in green and gold their third unanswered goal for the quarter and the beginning of a healthy buffer.

Spurred by his couple of shots at goal, Cooper Warren was providing plenty of drive from defence, whilst Alec Roberts gave a target across half-forward. Angus Robertson and Joe Robinson were attacking the contest and Callan Ryan

began to have an influence with his intercept marking and sweeping across half-back.

As a result of matching Hutchins on the inside and being crisper and cleaner on the outside, the quarter time siren saw the scoreboard read SPC 3.1.19 Hutchins 0.0.0.

The start of the 2nd quarter saw Hutchins kick their first goal to narrow the margin and attempt to get back into the game but our backline held up well with Oliver Cocks and Tom Freeman working hard and being effective. Michael Stingel and Daniel Van Noord continued their excellent work through the midfield with the latter crumbing a Kiran Solomonsz marking contest and delivering to Ryan Conway who kicked truly for our fourth goal.

For the remainder of the quarter, Ryan Conway continued to present and provide a forward target, Michael Stingel remained arguably the most influential player on the ground. Year 9s Cooper Warren and Ryan Fraser continued to have an influence, Oscar Mansell began working his way into the game and both Callan Ryan and Marcus Darko were proving almost impenetrable.

At the half time siren the scores were SPC 4.2.26 to Hutchins 1.0.6
