# **CHRIST IS ALIVE**

#### INTRODUCTION

This year, Pope Francis released his Post-Synodal Apostolic Exhortation, Christis Vivit, which translates from Latin as, 'Christ is alive'. This communication to entire people of God, is addressed specifically to young people, and he exhorts them to know and embrace that: "Christ is alive and he wants you to be alive!" It seems an obvious and tautological statement. But it is not an expression of the Pontiff's desire to check in on the mortality status of our young people. Rather, it is a call to action, a call to be fully alive, to live a full life. Renowned theoretical physicist, Albert Einstein, is regarded by the intellectual and scientific communities as the model for how we should understand our world, and our role in it. However, his musings on our purpose in this world stretch far beyond the realms of mathematics and quantum physics and into the quality of life for which we should strive. The following quote is attributed to him: "Only a life lived for others is a life well lived". And indeed, the living of a full life for the Christian person is centred on service. The two initiatives that I wish to share with you in this newsletter are at the heart of how our young people at the College live a full life and are of service to others.

#### **FOUNDERS' DAY**

Founders' Day is a marquee celebration in the life of the St Patrick's College community, as it presents an opportunity for the whole College to be engaged in servant leadership, fundraising and awareness building for those who are less fortunate in our great global community. Through our fundraising efforts of the last decade (on the final day of Term 3) we have raised over \$90,000. This has enabled the College's sister school in Arusha, Tanzania, the

Edmund Rice Sinon Secondary School, to develop into a self-sufficient educational institution that no longer requires our support. The Edmund Rice Sinon Secondary school was established by, and is run by, the Christian Brothers, which is one of the founding orders of our College. After nine years of support for the Christian Brothers, the College will now seek to support our other founding orders and their work in our global community and closer to home, here in Australia.

The funds we raised this year for Founders' Day were donated to Mary MacKillop Today, a non-profit charity organisation founded by the Sisters of St Joseph. The guiding values and principles of Mary MacKillop Today align with our own Mission and Vision and the Catholic Social Teachings of Human Dignity, the Common Good, Participation & Subsidiarity, and Preferential Option for the Poor. There is a broad scope of projects and initiatives to which Mary MacKillop Today is committed, and the focus of our charitable donation was to their First Nations Tertiary Scholarships program. This program provides financial support to students from disadvantaged backgrounds and works to address systemic barriers to education by increasing access to tertiary studies. The 2019 Closing the Gap Report indicated that Indigenous students comprise less than 2% of the domestic higher education student population, and that only 1% of the Australia higher education workforce are Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people. Therefore, it was our aim, by our contribution from Founders' Day this year, that we may increase pathways and opportunities for Indigenous students and close the gap.

The College community was able to raise \$13,470 to donate to Mary MacKillop Today. We were pleased to be able to present a cheque for this amount to Ms Madeleine Gough, the Community Partnerships Coordinator at Mary MacKillop Today, at our College Assembly on Wednesday 30 October.



This amount was raised through Tutor Groups running food stalls and activities on Founders' Day, and also through the Founders' Day raffle. The College wishes to thank all those members of the community who contributed prizes to the raffle, who bought raffle tickets, and who sold raffle tickets. Every raffle book, every ticket, every dollar, and every cent counted.

The annual Staff vs Students Soccer Match was held on the day with the staff determined to return to winning ways after being humbled in defeat for the past two years. Both teams braved the inclement weather and determination and physicality of the opposition. However, again, the students were the hungrier and more skillful team in 2019. At the end of the game the students reigned supreme, 3-1.

The third annual SPC: Live Aid! Concert was held in the Nano Nagle Gym in the spirit of the Live Aid! concept devised and made famous by Bob Geldof in 1985. The platform of the concert is used to raise awareness of where our fundraising monies go, and also the difference it makes in the lives of others. And it is an opportunity for our College's contemporary musical acts to showcase their talents to the community. And the talent on display was exceptional! Congratulations to Mr Alex Wadley and the groups in the Rock Band program for their polished, professional and rocking performances on the day, and to Mr Leigh Ratcliffe and Mr Jonathan Warwick for lending their expertise to make this occasion a success.

I wish to thank all community members, parents, staff and students for their participation in Founders' Day.



All of your efforts in preparing for, participating in, and entering into the Christian spirit of the day are greatly appreciated. If the smiles on the faces of our students on Founders' Day are replicated on the faces of our Indigenous brothers and sisters as a result of our fundraising and awareness building, then we have accomplished our goal.

#### STUDENT WELLBEING COMMITTEE

In late 2018, the Australian Government partnered with MindMatters, BeyondBlue and Headspace to produce a new education initiative. Be You is a national program that is aimed at promoting and protecting positive mental health in young people by providing schools with a comprehensive framework to manage their approach to positive mental health. This includes online professional learning, framework implementation documents, online survey tools, and curriculum resources. This year the College conducted a largescale survey, using the Be You framework to gather mental health and wellbeingrelated perceptions and information from parents, staff and students in the community.

There were two key areas identified as a challenge for the College in the surveys. One was the student body's sense of empowerment and voice in the decisionmaking processes that affect their mental health and learning. The other was that parents, staff and students felt there needed to be greater promotion of positive mental health initiatives within the community. To address both of these challenges, the Student Wellbeing Committee was formed. The purpose of the committee is to empower students to be involved in the development and decision-making processes of programs, structures and initiatives relating to the mental health



climate of the College. The task of the committee is to be responsible for promoting positive mental health in the community and raising awareness of the impact of mental health issues, how they impact on individuals, and how people can find support. This amounts to raising the profile of mental health in the community through hosting events, making speeches and communicating with the parents, staff and students in the College on a regular basis.

In Week 2 of Term 4, the Student Wellbeing Committee hosted Wellness Week, in which the entire College community was engaged in series of activities in each lunch time which were designed to promote positive mental health. This included Support Ribbon Day, Meditation Day, Yoga Day, Gratitude Chalk Day, and culminated in our annual Bandanna Day celebrations. The challenge for the community was to raise over \$2,000. If the community were able to exceed this amount then Principal, Mr Tony Daley would shave his head, and over \$3,000 was raised! Also, putting their hair on the line was 2019 College Captain, Liam Hollingsworth and 2020 College Captain, Thomas Dwyer, along with Year 11 students, Lachlan Brown and Patrick Donald. Also, Year 9 student, Chelsea Whitchurch, and Year 12 students, Ella Boxhall, Hannah Cole, and Amy Street, all cut off 30cm of their hair to donate for the making of wigs for young people undergoing chemotherapy to treat their cancer. I wish to express my sincere appreciation for the work of the students on the Student Wellbeing Committee: Kaleb Watts (Year 8), Laura Bye (Year 9), Amy Baillie (Year 11), Gabrielle Dewsbury (Year 11), Madison Johnston (Year 12), and College Captain, Sasha Massey (Year 12). I also wish to thank Mrs Kim McInnes, who has been the key support person and facilitator for the committee.



### CONCLUSION

Chritis Vivut is Pope Francis' call to the young people of today to live a full life, indeed, a life that is lived in service of others. This sentiment echoes the words of Christ himself, as written by the Gospel writer, John (10:10): "I came that they may have life and have it abundantly". But a full life is not merely a busy one. A full life for our students is one in which they understand their own purpose, one in which they are inspired, one in which they find their spark, and they live their life as an expression of that purpose, and have an understanding of the role in which education and a relationship with God plays in their lives. In closing, this is my exhortation to you, the community of St Patrick's College. As we anticipate the holiday break ahead, and embrace the opportunity for renewal and recreation, I encourage the staff, parents and students of St Patrick's College to use this time to seek stillness and quiet reflection. The rhythm of busyness in our lives tends to persist as we transition from school days into holidays; the season of giving brings with it a season of organising, budgeting, travelling and buying. Rather than giving in to our preoccupation with the external pressures of agendas, demands, and requests, may we make the time in silence to discover the truth of what drives us from within: the love of God and the love of our family and friends. To finish I would like to express my most heartfelt and sincere gratitude to all those who have contributed to the pastoral care of all students at the College and the task of learning and teaching in the Middle School in 2019.
