Dear Parents, Students and Friends of St Patrick's College,

Welcome to Week 9 of Term 3.

This week is the annual award presentation week - Hockey on Monday, Netball on Tuesday, AFL on Wednesday and Soccer next Monday.

While every player receives recognition for their contribution throughout the year, it is also pleasing to recognise other qualities like extra effort, improvement and skill.

In my time in education and as a parent, I have witnessed the shift to every child receiving an award and individual awards are not presented in case somebody gets upset because they don't win.

These presentations are the perfect opportunity to develop resilience in our young people. Students are provided the opportunity to celebrate the success of others as well as developing resilience in themselves.

In all my years of coaching and playing sport, what has been most important is not how you celebrate the win, but how you cope with a loss.

In my early years of coaching first squads, I would give the students 60 seconds of grace to feel sorry for themselves after a loss and then remind them of the gifts they were given to be able to play the game they love to such a high level.

I am always a great believer in the saying "the joy is in the journey". The training, the friendships, the games, the opposition, the recovery and finally the presentations. The joy of the whole journey is what should be celebrated, not the disappointment of not being voted 'best and fairest'. Be resilient, be dignified and be pleased for your team mates. This is what developing resilience is all about, for this is life.

Our students need to be able to handle rejection as they will be faced with much in their life. From not getting that job they wanted, or in my case, not inheriting faster twitch fibres in order to run quicker.

One way to develop resilience is through the process of helping and giving to others. One of the highlights of the school year is to witness the enthusiasm of students in Lap it Up, the Year 12 fundraiser, that this year raised over \$20,000 for charities.

The next big event is the Founders' Day festivities, where the College raises money for the education of our indigenous students across Australia. This is a great day of celebration and care at St Patrick's College. None of this would be possible without the dedication of all the staff, students and sponsors involved and the generosity of the St Patrick's College community.

This week, Pope Francis said, "we need to open our hearts to God and open our hearts to others". I see no better way than through Lap It Up and Founders' Day.

Finally, as we near the conclusion of Term 3, please join me in wishing the Senior School students all the best in their study leading up to the examinations.

NOTIFICATION IF NOT RETURNING TO COLLEGE

The College is currently developing classes for 2020 and an important part of this process is to notify if any current students in Year 7-11 are **not** returning because they are transitioning to another educational institution or workplace.

An email has been sent to parents/guardians containing a form to complete when students are not returning to St Patrick's College next year. This notification is required by the final day of Term 3, on Friday 27 September. If notification is not received by this date, the 10-week late notification fee (as noted in the Terms and Conditions of Enrolment) will be imposed unless there are extenuating circumstances, such as students leaving for full time employment or geographic relocations, as approved by the Principal.

A response is only required if your child is not returning to St Patrick's College in 2020.

Students continuing their enrolment next year will have this progressed automatically. We do, however, request you read the College's Terms and Conditions of Enrolment and Student Health and Safety Agreement to ensure you remain familiar with these important documents.

PASTORAL CARE

INTRODUCTION

The College's Strategic Plan (2018-2022) is not a passive and static document, but a very active and dynamic living out of the College's Mission. Core Strategic Priority 3: Student Wellbeing and Leadership identifies the importance of providing opportunities for students

to demonstrate Christ-centred servant leadership across all schools. Servant leadership is a term that is often bandied about in the praxis of student leadership, and there is a glut literature: books, articles and journals devoted entirely to exploring and explaining what servant leadership means. When working with our student leaders at the College from all grades, I emphasise to them that the model of Christ-centred servant leadership that they are called to is simple, and is evidenced in the Gospel, and boils down to this: saying 'yes'. There are many opportunities for our students to live out the College's Mission through servant leadership and say 'yes'. There are key events upcoming in the life of the College over the next few weeks that engage our students in this model of leadership, from special days that engage every member of community in servant leadership, to those students just embarking on their journey of servant leadership, and to those students concluding their journey of servant leadership at the College.

FOUNDERS' DAY

(Last Day of Term 3 – Friday 27 September)

Founders' Day is a marquee celebration in the life of the St Patrick's College community, as it presents an opportunity for the whole College to be engaged in servant leadership, fundraising and awareness building for those who are less fortunate in our great global community. Through our fundraising efforts of the last decade (on the final day of Term 3) we have raised over \$90,000. This has enabled the College's sister school in Arusha, Tanzania, the Edmund Rice Sinon Secondary School, to develop into a self-sufficient educational institution that no longer requires our support. The Edmund Rice Sinon Secondary school was established by, and is run by, the Christian Brothers, which is one of the founding orders of our College. After nine years of support for the Christian Brothers, the College will now seek to support our other founding orders and their work in our global community and closer to home, here in Australia.

The funds we raise this year for Founders' Day will be supporting Mary MacKillop Today, a non-profit charity organisation founded by the Sisters of St Joseph. The guiding values and principles of Mary MacKillop Today align with our own Mission and Vision and the Catholic Social Teachings

of Human Dignity, the Common Good, Participation & Subsidiarity, and Preferential Option for the Poor. There is a broad scope of projects and initiatives to which Mary MacKillop Today is committed, and our intention is to focus our charitable donation to their First Nations Tertiary Scholarships program. This program provides financial support to students from disadvantaged backgrounds and works to address systemic barriers to education by increasing access to tertiary studies. The 2019 Closing the Gap Report indicated that Indigenous students comprise less than 2% of the domestic higher education student population, and that only 1% of the Australia higher education workforce are Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people. Therefore, it is our aim, by our contribution from Founders' Day this year, that we may increase pathways and opportunities for Indigenous students and close the gap.

The annual big raffle has been the major contributor to the funds we have raised over the past decade. Therefore, could I please stress the importance of all students and families selling and returning their raffle books. We are approaching the \$5,000 mark of money raised through the raffle. Every raffle book, every ticket, every dollar, every cent counts.

On Founders' Day students are able to wear casual clothes in exchange for a gold coin donation that will be collected during Tutor period that morning and the festivities begin at lunch time. In their Tutor groups, our students lead, organise and run stalls selling a variety of foods and a range of games, activities and challenges for students to participate in. Also, in the Nano Nagle Gym will be the annual SPC: Live Aid! Concert. The concert will feature a range of musical acts from the College. In the spirit of the original Live Aid Concert in 1985, the SPC: Live Aid! seeks to raise awareness about the lives of the people from whom we are raising money, and how the funds we raise help change their lives. Following that will be a whole school assembly, with the drawing of the raffle, and there are plenty of prizes to be won.

And again, whilst there are many activities, food stalls and other events, these should not distract from the focus. Our focus is standing in solidarity with our brothers and sisters in need, knowing that in each small contribution we make here changes the lives of those in need. The very premise of Founders' Day is servant leadership.

STUDENT EXECUTIVE 2020

Our Senior School leaders are defined as engaging leaders. Engaging student leaders, through their experience and development of practical and personal leadership skills, recognise that their continued growth and development as leaders is achieved through the growth of the people around them and the flourishing of the College community. Their key task is to engage authentically with all members of the community.

In the first week of Term 4, on Tuesday 15 October, the College will announce its Year 12 Student Executive for 2020. This group of students represent the most influential and skilled leaders in our student body and are responsible for driving a positive, welcoming, safe, supportive and inclusive student culture. Every year, the Student Executive is comprised of our two College Captains, 16 House Captains and 14 Community Captains. In 2020, the College will be introducing specific portfolios of responsibility for its Community Captains, they will be assigned roles that will require them to drive, lead and serve certain dimensions of life at the College: Diversity Captains, Sustainability Captains, Wellbeing Captains, Mission Captains, Connection to Middle School Captains, Connection to Croagh Patrick Captains and Connection to Senior School Captains. These roles will provide an opportunity for our Community Captains to be responsible for the organising and promotion of events and initiatives that celebrate their portfolio.

Recently, on Tuesday 3 September, the Student Executive 2020 Workshop was held in the Edmund Rice Centre for the 60-odd students whose names are on the Student Executive ballot. These aspiring leaders are engaged in a series of activities and discussions that not only aim to test their understanding of servant leadership, but also aim to develop, strengthen and grow their capacity as student leaders. There is no question that the role of Student Executive member is demanding on our Year 12 students, and it should be. It is not always easy to say 'yes' to leadership and responsibility. I was impressed and humbled by the maturity, conviction and commitment of each of the students at the workshop and wish them all the best in their election as members of Student Executive in 2020.

YEAR 7 SOCIAL

Our Middle School leaders are defined as aspiring leaders. Aspiring student leaders, by virtue of their youth, do not have a depth of experience in leadership as their older peers, but will instead possess a range of raw qualities that indicate potential as a leader: composure, confidence, organisation, motivation, and initiative.

Upcoming on Thursday 19 September, is the annual Year 7 Social in the Barrett Gym at the College. It is set to be a

fabulous event full of loud music, laughter, fun, games and some excellent dance moves. To the latter of which I am not capable of contributing. It is always a pleasure to be witness to the joy and spirit of our young people as they strengthen relationships with their peers, and engage with their year level in a less formal and more social environment. A large debt of gratitude must be paid to Director of Pastoral Care – Middle School, Mr Simon Austen and the Core Captains who are working feverishly in their organisation, preparation and decoration for this wonderful event. This, and other similar events, provide an opportunity for our Year 7 student leaders to engage in servant leadership by providing this forum for their peers to celebrate the night of all nights for our Year 7 students.

CONCLUSION

As evidenced by the events and initiatives that occur frequently in our College community, our students are constantly engaged in opportunities for servant leadership. We are so very grateful that we have a range of young people who are prepared to 'yes' to the challenge and responsibility of leadership. And every time they say 'yes', whether that task be the most simple and mundane or the most complex and difficult, they are living out the College's Strategic Plan, the College's Mission, and their calling by the Gospel. In the first chapter of the Gospel of Luke (26-38), the Angel Gabriel informs Mary that she would have a child and that: "he will be called Son of God". And what was Mary's response?

"Here I am, the servant of the Lord, let it be with me according to your word".

That is a pretty strong and courageous 'yes' to a pretty incredible task of service. It is to this model of servant leadership that our community is called. It is my most sincere prayer that we each find the strength and courage we need to say 'yes' to acts of love, compassion and hope in our homes, in our school, in our community, and in our world.







The Youth Speakout is an event run by Reconciliation Tasmania that gives students a platform to share their voice on Aboriginal reconciliation in Tasmania. Students were to submit a work, of any medium, that addressed this year's theme of Voice, Treaty, Truth. Last Wednesday, students who submitted an entry were invited to come together and share those voices in Hobart.

When arriving in Hobart the students then made their way to Parliament House where they were given the opportunity to present and share their works with Members of Parliament. As a keynote speaker, I was able to address attendees such as The Honourable Will Hodgman MP, Premier of Tasmania; The Honourable Rebecca White MP, Opposition Leader; The Honourable Roger Jaensch MP, Minister for Aboriginal Affairs; and the many Honourable Members of the Lower and Upper House. The final stop of the day saw students and schools thanked and acknowledged for their efforts towards reconciliation at Government House. The day opened up an honest and diverse space for many thoughtful discussions about what our future can look like and the steps that both individuals and communities can take towards reconciliation with our First Nations people. For those interested there will be an exhibition featuring our artworks and pieces at Academy Gallery, Inveresk, during Term 4.

We look forward to seeing more events and programmes, such as the Youth Speakout, that gives opportunity for all students to engage in the social justice and compassionate aspects of College life.



VISUAL COMMUNICATIONS CLASS REDESIGN CITY FLAG

On Tuesday, Mayor van Zetten visited the College to meet with a Year 8 Visual Literacy class that has taken up the challenge set by their teacher, Mr Troy Ridgway, to redesign Launceston city's flag.

The class has been exploring how to effectively design a flag with the simple use of colour, shape and symbolism. The students also had the opportunity to identify interesting flags and talk about the symbols and their historical contexts.

The students presented their designs and discussed how the elements symbolically represent features of the Launceston municipality.


So what did the class learn about the city's flag?

The current Launceston flag design is based on the city's Coat of Arms granted by the College of Arms, London on 11 June 1957. The Brisbane Street Mall, the War memorial at Royal Park, atop the Council Chambers and on top of the Albert Hall are places in the city where the flag is regularly flown, flying the flag is restricted to use on Council property.

In the flag design, shown topright, the three intersecting lines in the flag represent the city's three rivers, the North Esk, South Esk and the Tamar. The yellow disc at the centre of the flag represents Launceston city, and the two rectangles over the blue lines of the rivers represent tin ingots, with the ingots included because Launceston used to be a large tin-smelting centre.

At the top of the design, the green strip across the top with the repeated A-line edge represents the city's parks, gardens and surrounding countryside, and the waratah flowers symbolise all flowers and similar beauties of nature.

It was interesting to see that





the students redesign of the flag incorporated many of the features in the original flag but in all of their designs there was one element missing, which was the reference to our industrial past, which made for an interesting discussion point for the class.

We thank Mayor Albert van Zetten for taking the time to visit the College and respond the creative efforts of our students.
