Carbine Club of Hong Kong Cricket Luncheon 2025

On 31st October 2025, the Carbine Club of Hong Kong hosted its annual Cricket Luncheon at the Hyatt Regency Hong Kong, Tsim Sha Tsui. A capacity gathering of 260 guests filled the ballroom, creating an atmosphere buzzing with anticipation for an afternoon of storytelling, entertainment, and shared passion for cricket.

The Carbine Club's Cricket luncheons have long been known for their lively character and ability to bring global sporting heroes closer to fans. This year's edition built on that reputation, highlighted by guest appearances from two renowned cricket personalities: Graeme Swann, former England spinner and Ashes winner, and Simon Katich, the gritty former Australian opener turned coach and commentator. Their presence alone promised both humour and insight—and the afternoon delivered that in abundance.

A Warm Welcome: Setting the Tone

The luncheon formally began with MC Jake McCauley taking to the stage. Jake welcomed the guests and invited President Peter Glanville to address the room.

Peter recalled that a year ago, the Club had hosted its cricket lunch under Typhoon Signal No. 8 a day where venturing out required both determination and a strong umbrella. Yet, even under extreme weather conditions, the room was fully packed, and we had a full house once more.

The President started off by offering best wishes to the Hong Kong Men's Cricket Team, who were preparing to compete in the upcoming Cricket Sixes tournament. He also took the opportunity to recognise the invaluable partners who make the event possible year after year. He extended "a massive thanks" to Cathay Pacific, represented at the luncheon by Sebastian Hue, and to Hyatt Regency, represented by General Manager Per Kredner. Their ongoing support, he emphasized, made this such a successful event.

Peter then introduced the distinguished head table. In addition to Sebastian and Per, guests also included Burji Shroff, Chairman of Cricket Hong Kong, China, and Chair of the Cricket Hong Kong Community Foundation.

A Deep Dive with Simon Katich

The first speaker of the afternoon, Simon Katich, made his way to the stage to enthusiastic applause. Rather than a traditional speech, Simon's segment was structured as a Q&A with MC Jake McCauley.

Jake began by charting Simon's journey through the Australian cricket system: from his resilient early years to his breakthrough in the Test side, to his transformation into one of Australia's most dependable top-order batsmen. Simon discussed the honour of representing his country, the challenges of competing in a fiercely talented team, and the lessons learned from both triumphs and setbacks.

But the room's curiosity was clearly piqued by the mention of one of cricket's most publicised internal dramas: the Michael Clarke incident. When Jake gently nudged the conversation toward that notorious locker-room confrontation, the crowd leaned in. Simon—never one to dodge a question—handled it with admirable balance and sharp humour. Without indulging in sensationalism, he offered context, recalled what happened from his perspective, and reflected on the tensions and competitive pressures within elite sporting environments.

Sensing the crowd's engagement, Jake opened the floor to audience questions. Immediately, numerous hands shot up. Guests asked Simon about everything from his toughest opponents to the differences between today's cricketing environment and the era he played in. He spoke generously and with insight, even weaving in a few behind-the-scenes stories that drew both chuckles and nods of admiration. By the end of the session, it was clear the audience had enjoyed not only the content but the candor with which it was shared.

A Spirited Auction: Generosity at Play

Following Simon's well-received session, it was time to transition from storytelling to fundraising. Taking command of the stage was auctioneer George Lacey, whose lively style and quick wit made him an immediate crowd favourite.

The first item on the block was a golf four-ball at the Clearwater Bay Golf & Country Club, generously donated by Peter Downie, the Club's General Manager. The bidding opened with enthusiasm, quickly escalating as several guests battled for the sought-after prize. With George expertly stirring excitement, the bids climbed steadily until the hammer finally fell for a winning bid of HK\$26,000 (AUD 5,120), awarded to George Loup.



Graeme Swann Takes the Stage



With the crowd warmed up and spirits high, it was time for one of the marquee moments of the afternoon: Graeme “Swanny” Swann taking the stage. True to form, Swann wasted no time in igniting the room with laughter. His comedic timing, trademark mischievousness, and ability to weave humour into every cricketing tale made his session one of the highlights of the luncheon.

He dove into his Ashes experiences, particularly reminiscing about playing in the 2010/11 series, where England secured their most recent Ashes victory in Australia. His retelling of dressing-room antics, pressure moments, on-field rivalries, and unexpected mishaps had the room fully captivated. Swann’s stories often blended self-deprecating humour with keen cricketing insight, a combination that resonated with long-time cricket fans and casual followers alike.

The laughter rolling across the ballroom made it instantly clear: Swann was in his element, and so was the audience. Whether recounting the challenges of bowling to the world’s best batsmen, reflecting on leadership dynamics within the England team, or poking fun at the Australians in the room, he left everyone thoroughly entertained.

A Surprise Auction: Irish Whisky for a Cause



Just as guests thought the surprises might be done for the day, Hyatt Regency GM Per Kredner added a new twist by generously donating a rare bottle of Irish whisky. George Lacey was invited back to conduct a second auction.

Despite being unplanned, the bidding was just as lively as the earlier golf auction. Guests raised their hands with enthusiasm, knowing that proceeds would support the event’s charity benefactor: the Cricket Hong Kong Community Foundation Limited. Eventually, the prized bottle was secured with a winning bid of HK\$10,000 (AUD 1,970)—a wonderful result that underscored the community’s willingness to give.

Luck of the Draw: Raffles and More



After the excitement of the auctions, the mood softened into eager anticipation as the lucky draw portion of the luncheon commenced. A selection of prizes awaited their new owners, but the standout was certainly the Macallan 18-year-old whisky, generously donated by Progeny.

Closing Remarks and Gratitude



As the afternoon approached its close, President Peter Glanville returned to the stage to offer final thanks. He expressed sincere appreciation to all attendees for supporting both the luncheon and the Club's wider mission. He once again acknowledged the invaluable contributions of sponsors and partners, whose involvement ensures the event's continued success.

Peter then invited the two star speakers, Simon Katich and Graeme Swann, back to the stage for a final round of applause. On behalf of the Carbine Club, he presented each of them with engraved Carbine Club memorabilia, a token of gratitude for their time, stories, and contributions.

RECORD ATTENDANCE CELEBRATES 2025 QLD CARBINE CLUB BILL BROWN MEDAL AT THE GABBA

The 2025 Carbine Club of Queensland Bill Brown Medal Luncheon drew a record attendance on Tuesday, 2 December, with more than 237 guests filling the Cricketers' Club at The Gabba for one of the leading events on the Queensland sporting social calendar.

Cricket royalty was in the room, with special guests Ian Healy, David Boon, Barry Richards, and Greg Ritchie (MC), along with former Australian players Carl Rackerman, Geoff Dymock, Martin Kent, Nathan Hauritz, Ray Phillips and John Maguire.



Celebrating the Bill Brown Medal, the award — was presented by esteemed cricket writer Crash Craddock. The 2025 recipient, Lucy Hamilton, was unable to attend, and her mother, Claire, accepted the medal on her behalf. Crash and Tina Brown, granddaughter of Bill Brown, shared heartfelt reflections on the Hall of Fame opener's legacy.

Insights from David Boon Australian Cricket Board Director David Boon offered valuable perspectives on Australia's Test side, including discussion of the injury to Usman Khawaja, which forced selectors into a late reshuffle. Boon also reflected on his own celebrated career, drawing warm applause.

The luncheon honoured Barry Richards, celebrating his 80th year in 2025. A pioneer of World Series Cricket, Richards remains one of the most revered figures in the sport. Despite playing only three official Tests, his legend was cemented in world and domestic circuits, raising the question: What might have been without apartheid restrictions?

A moving tribute was delivered for the late Patron Ian Hollindale. His daughter, Arlie Walsh, honoured his legacy as a pioneer of the Gold Coast's rural development and founder of the Coomera Cricket Club.
