I'm happy to report that at our June meeting, our members benefitted from the extensive knowledge of two highly qualified local residents, Deidre Krausgrill (our club President) and Ben Taig. Together they presented on all things soil and compost, which are fundamental to what we do as gardeners and more broadly how we grow our food and sustain ourselves! It's fascinating to consider how our soil is derived from the weathering of rocks over millions of years and that the soil in our gardens is 'terrestrial' as opposed to that under the oceans.

On 4th of July, local historian and long time club treasurer, Mr Phil Taig, will share his insights into the public gardens and other places of interest here in our beloved Clunes. We will go in convoy from place to place, stopping to hear of times past and awaken our interest in history. Non members are welcome to join us. Some tips for July gardening:

- Vegetable wise, you could try some spinach, carrots, sweet peas, broad beans, leeks, spring onions, radish and parsley.
- For some colour, try bare rooted roses, viola, snapdragons, impatiens and dianthus, aquilegia, daisies and daphne.

It's bare root season! Time to put in your deciduous fruit trees, including apples, pears, peaches, plums and nectarines.
 When planting, you need to prune them back hard – you should have as much plant above the ground as the roots below the ground; they are in their dormant phase and will get going in the spring!

Now on with the thermals, coats and hats and out into that garden! ... Have fun!

With a combined spirit of friendship, creativity, and enjoyment, Quiltessentially Clunes has become a highly sought-after event on the calendar and the recent 2022 event was no exception. Tickets sold out within four hours. Approximately 70 women came together, old friends and new acquaintances alike, to share four days of regional hospitality, local shopping, and creative fun.

Hosted by local textile artist and tutor Christine Lethlean along with business partners Judy Newman and Rae Telfer (both noted quilters and tutors from Melbourne), each day offered a range of activities to enhance the 'retreat experience' from mini tutorials, roving support, a pop-up-shop, stalls, resident masseuse, guest presenters and show-and-tell quilting stories. There's an annual quiz and lots of gifts kindly donated by our sponsors. This year's raffle fundraiser reached \$855 which was handed over to Lana de Kort, Coordinator of the Clunes Neighbourhood House.

Attendees loved visiting our local shops and cafes and interacting with Clunes folks.

Likewise, the reciprocal feedback along Fraser Street indicated the same; following on from the Booktown Festival, locals welcomed the influx of ladies who were keen to learn more about Clunes and local initiatives.

In every area of our lives, whether raising kids, looking after family, making a living, wrangling pets or getting through the day alone, we're feeling the pressure. But there are things we can do to ease that feeling, and some are unexpected.

Helping others to help yourself

Many studies show that people who volunteer or actively support others are happier. Last year, the University of British Columbia found that older people who volunteered or supported others during the pandemic reported higher instances of positive emotions, lower rates of negative emotions and generally more satisfaction with their personal relationships. These feelings of wellbeing applied to formal volunteering as well as informal emotional support, such as being a listening ear to those who needed it.

Some pre-pandemic studies showed that receiving help - particularly unsolicited help - could lead to feelings of incompetence and powerlessness, and heightened symptoms of depression. However, during the pandemic, reaching out and accepting help became normalised and, on the whole, welcomed. We found that during this uncontrollable and unpredictable event, having someone listen to us vent - and not rush in with suggestions or fixes - made us feel better. And this was amplified when that role became reciprocal,

such as a conversation with a friend where we could both provide and receive support.

In Clunes we're spoiled for volunteer choice. You can register your skills at www.clunesnh.org; browse the volunteer roles available (for example, at the Clunes Football and Netball Club, the Clunes Museum, Attitude and Clunes Neighbourhood House); or ask us to introduce you to one of the many groups in town looking for volunteers.

The pandemic changes

The pandemic impacted on some of our usual support systems and structures perhaps especially for those of us outside Metro areas where services were already stretched. But that impact hasn't solely been negative, and these structures are still adapting and evolving with the changes brought about by the pandemic. For example, telehealth appointments look as though they're here to stay as GP services struggle with the sheer number of patients across Australia in winter. Psychology telehealth appointments were virtually nonexistent a few years ago; now, geography is not necessarily a barrier to accessing good mental health care. Find it hard to do this? Maybe your internet signal is bad? Or you don't have a smartphone or internet at all? Call Clunes Neighbourhood House on 5345 4078. We have rooms you can use for telehealth appointments and free 24-hour wi-fi access that you can register for. Ref:www.greatergood.berkeley.edu/article/item/helping_o

MORE SUPPORT OPTIONS

ADAVIC - Anxiety Disorders Association of Victoria

ADAVIC (www.adavic.org.au) has a mountain of helpful resources, and their moderated and very active Facebook Group (www.facebook.com/adavic.org.au) has become a touchstone for those looking for extra encouragement, suggestions and different perspectives on anxiety and depression people. Members can also directly message admins for more specialised and concentrated support. ADAVIC holds regular online support groups for agoraphobia, generalised anxiety, and depression.

Anonymous phone support is also available. Though membership is encouraged, phone and Facebook services are completely free.

• eGROW

The GROW program provides mental health support, similar to a 12-step self-help program for people with anxiety, depression or other mental and emotional distress. The eGROW (www.grow.org.au/egrow) program connects small groups via Zoom to provide and receive mental health support and is free of charge.

• Mental Health Online

Mental Health Online

(www.mentalhealthonline.org.au/) provides free and comprehensive online services and programs for those experiencing mental distress. Creating an account offers access to their online mental health assessment, treatment programs, and eTherapists.

• Maintaining a Mindful Life

This short course from Monash University (www.futurelearn.com/courses/mindfulness-life) teaches how to apply mindfulness techniques to improve communication, relationships and emotional health. The self-paced course takes place online over several weeks through a series of readings and videos. The course can be accessed for free, or purchased for unlimited access. Interested, but not sure you want to do it alone? Clunes Neighbourhood House is organising a 'group' session - call 5345 4078 to express your interest.

• LifeLine - 13 11 14

Lifeline (www.lifeline.org.au) provides free crisis support via phone, online or text chats. This service is available 24/7 providing support for those who are experiencing severe emotional distress, or are concerned about someone who is.

So what are the takeaways here?

If you're feeling lonely or disconnected, reaching out to a friend you haven't spoken to in a while, or finding opportunities to connect with others (e.g. through formal volunteering), is worth the effort. The statistics say so.

Further help is always at hand, maybe in places or ways you haven't considered, no matter where you live or what time of day or night. Connecting with these groups might also teach you new skills or tools which you can carry into the future once the pandemic is a long, distant memory.
