

Tonal delight

Dispensing with a second bedroom meant the owner of this harbourside Sydney apartment gained more space to enjoy during her waking hours. The result is a larger, relaxed living area that combines a study nook and a comfortable lounge area. The furniture in each zone is arranged to capitalise on the water views.

WHY IT WORKS "By opening up this space, we were able to create a room with generous proportions and gain an extra window to the view," says interior designer Meryl Hare. We installed a mirror on the wall in the study to reflect the views and the airy nature of the room. The palette is muted and tones are natural to enhance the sense of calm and relaxation.

Refined dining

This dining room connects to the kitchen of a penthouse on Sydney's northern beaches and is used for both formal and informal occasions. The materials used were chosen to both reflect and withstand its coastal position, without compromising functionality and aesthetics. WHY IT WORKS The room exudes conviviality and personality, thanks to the medley of textures and unique pieces. The timber table, with inlaid geometric pattern, is the central conversation piece in the room, while the comfortable linen-upholstered wingback dining chairs encourage guests to linger. The sheen of the Moroccantiled wall makes a gorgeous backdrop for the bold textural commissioned artwork by Joanna Kitas. The feminine twist of the Luau pendant lights by Kenneth Cobonpue, made from salago pulp fibre, are an elegant flourish and serve to define the dining zone.
