


# What is voluntary assisted dying?

- Voluntary assisted dying gives people who are suffering and dying, and who meet eligibility criteria, the option of requesting medical assistance to end their lives.
- Medical practitioners who meet the eligibility criteria and undertake approved training will be able to assist a person with the voluntary assisted dying process as coordinating / consulting / administering practitioners.
- Nurse practitioners and registered nurses who meet the eligibility criteria and undertake approved training will be able to be administering practitioners.

# Conscientious Objection



# A registered health practitioner:



A speech pathologist:



Has a right to refuse to participate in any stage of the voluntary assisted dying process

Who refuses to participate because of a conscientious objection must:

- Immediately inform the person of their refusal to participate and the reason for their refusal
- -Inform the person that other health practitioners, health service providers, services or the Queensland Voluntary Assisted Dying Support Service who can assist them

Has a right to refuse to participate in any stage of the voluntary assisted dying process

Who refuses to participate because of a conscientious objection must:


- Inform their employer or person seeking requesting their services of their conscientious objection
- Advise of another speech pathologist or speech pathology service who they believe is likely to be able to assist
- Not intentionally prevent someone's access to speech pathology services

#### Entities:


Do not have to provide or participate in voluntary assisted dying

Must not hinder a person's access to voluntary assisted dying – the Act sets out requirements for each stage of the process

May be required to allow reasonable access to the facility by practitioners who are willing to participate, or facilitate a transfer to another facility








# Eligibility Criteria

- 1. Have an eligible condition:
  - · is advanced, progressive and will cause death, and
  - is expected to cause death within 12 months, and
  - is causing suffering that the person considers to be intolerable
    - This is subjective and individual to the person
- 2. Have decision-making capacity
- 3. Be acting voluntarily and without coercion
- 4. Be at least 18 years of age
- 5. Fulfil residency and citizenship requirements
  - Have been ordinarily an Australian citizen for 3 years
  - Have been ordinarily living in QLD for 12 months






# Authorised VAD Practitioners

Role	Functions	Who can act in this role
Coordinating practitioner	<ul> <li>Coordinates the voluntary assisted dying process</li> <li>Primary voluntary assisted dying contact for the person</li> <li>Conducts eligibility assessment</li> <li>Prescribes the voluntary assisted dying substance</li> <li>As a default, acts as administering practitioner (if practitioner administration)</li> </ul>	Eligible medical practitioner who has completed mandatory training and been endorsed as an authorised voluntary assisted dying practitioner
Consulting practitioner	Conducts eligibility assessment	Eligible medical practitioner who has completed mandatory training and been endorsed as an authorised voluntary assisted dying practitioner
Administering practitioner	<ul> <li>Only involved in practitioner administration (not self-administration)</li> <li>Administers the voluntary assisted dying substance</li> <li>Disposes of any unused or remaining voluntary assisted dying substance</li> </ul>	By default, this will be the coordinating practitioner, but the role can be transferred to another eligible medical practitioner, nurse practitioner, or registered nurse who has been endorsed as an authorised voluntary assisted dying practitioner

# Practitioner Participation in Voluntary Assisted Dying



## Role of Medical Practitioners

#### A medical practitioner can:

- Act as the coordinating practitioner
- Act as the consulting practitioner
- Act as the administering practitioner

#### The medical practitioner:

- Holds a specialist registration and has practised for at least 1
  year as the holder of that registration; or
- Holds a general registration and has practised for at least 5
  years as the holder of that registration; or
- Holds a specialist registration and has practised for at least 5
  years as the holder of general registration; or
- Is an overseas-trained specialist who holds limited registration or provisional registration.

AND they meet approved voluntary assisted dying medical practitioner requirements

## Role of Nurses

#### Nurse practitioner

#### Can

- Initiate a conversation about voluntary assisted dying in the course of talking about all end-oflife options
- Act as the administering practitioner if the coordinating practitioner transfers this role to them
- AND they meet the approved voluntary assisted dying nurse practitioner requirements

#### Cannot

Act as a coordinating or consulting practitioner

#### Registered Nurse

#### Can

- Act as the administering practitioner if the coordinating practitioner transfers this role to them and they:
- have five years experience as a registered nurse
- AND they meet approved voluntary assisted dying practitioner required nurse

#### Cannot

- Act as a ordinating or consulting practitioner
- Initiate a conversation about voluntary assisted dying in the course of talking about all end of life options

# Projected Demand - Queensland

Projected demand in the first 12 months of voluntary assisted dying in Queensland:

800-1100 first assessments

380-430 deaths

These are projections only, actual numbers may differ.





# Voluntary Assisted Dying and Advance Care Planning

The Rules

The Reasons

To access VAD a person must have

decision-making capacity

**ACP** documents = loss of capacity

A person cannot request VAD in an ACP document

eg. Advance Health Directive



A substitute decision-maker cannot request VAD on behalf of another person



All requests for VAD must be made by the person accessing it

### Information Available for Consumers

#### Voluntary assisted dying Mackay Hospital and Health Service

This fact sheet provides information for people receiving care in the Mackay Hospital and Health Service who ask about voluntary assisted dying.

Voluntary assisted dying is one of several choices that a person may have at the end of their life.

Voluntary assisted dying is about choice. It isn't a choice between life and death. It gives people who meet eligibility criteria and who are suffering and already dying the option to ask for medical help to end their life. It won't be for everyone.

Voluntary assisted dying is voluntary. The law respects the rights of healthcare workers to not provide voluntary assisted dying, while making sure people wanting to access it can do so.

Voluntary assisted dying is not emergency healthcare. People may take weeks or months to work their way through the process and make the final decision to administer the substance.

People can stop the voluntary assisted dying process at any point, for any reason. People who are assessed as eligible for voluntary assisted dying may never choose to use it.

#### Eligibility criteria

There are strict eligibility criteria for accessing voluntary assisted dying. This is one of the safeguards in place to protect vulnerable people.

To access voluntary assisted dying, the person must meet all the eligibility criteria:

- 1. Have an eligible condition.
- advanced, progressive, and will cause death
- expected to cause death within 12
   months
- causing suffering that the person considers to be intolerable.
- 2. Have decision-making capacity.
- Be acting voluntarily and without coercion.
- 4. Be at least 18 years of age.
- 5. Fulfil residency requirements.




