

ABOUT THE ARTWORK

This piece was envisioned by Peter Bartlett and brought to life by nephew, Hayden Bartlett. The painting depicts the St Brendan's community, represented through the green and yellow 'meeting place' which stretches over the Central Coast region where Yeppoon is situated. Meeting places signify the gathering of people (communities), visualised in the white u-shaped symbols that link together. The white lines which travel across the land, connect to smaller meeting places (communities) within Australia. This represents the journeys taken by Indigenous students to gather and comprise the St Brendan's community. Surrounding the St Brendan's community are the totems of the traditional land owners of the region; a green tree frog (Darumbal) and the hump back whale (Woppaburra). The remaining patterns and colours represent the various aspects of the land of the surrounding environment. When observing this painting, envision the connection of people and communities on country where learning and sharing of knowledge has occurred for thousands of years.

St Brendan's College is a proud Catholic Boarding School in the Edmund Rice tradition located in Yeppoon, Central Queensland. The College hosts one of the largest Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander populations in a Queensland Catholic Boarding School with 150 Boarding and Day students in 2022. It is with a genuine sense of gratitude and respect, that we are blessed to support, continue to build connections and learn from the largest number of Indigenous students in the history of the College.

Our school is based on the four touchstones; Gospel Spirituality, Inclusive Community, Liberating Education and Justice Solidarity. We open our hearts to the poor and those at the margins and desire to bring hope and change to our world through prayer, formation and action.


We value and support the gifts of each member of our family and celebrate our diversity as a source of strength and a sign of hope.

St Brendan's College will commit to providing opportunities for our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students to celebrate their cultural identities. These opportunities create an understanding of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures, identities and histories in the wider St Brendan's College community.

CULTURAL COMPETENCE FOR STAFF

St Brendan's College will continue to commit to providing staff with a range of opportunities to build and extend their knowledge and understanding of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures. We also commit to supporting staff to independently seek out and participate in a variety of cultural awareness experiences that assist them on their own journey of understanding.

BUILD RELATIONSHIPS WITH COMMUNITY

St Brendan's College commits to building relationships with our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. We value these relationships and their role in helping to create opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and non-Indigenous staff and students to further build relationships based on mutual respect, trust and inclusiveness.



WELCOME TO COUNTRY

Welcome to Country is performed at the beginning of significant College events by either Darumbal Elders or Darumbal students with permission. Protocols for welcoming visitors to Country have been a part of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures for thousands of years. Being inclusive of these cultures within our community, St Brendan's College acknowledges and pays respect to the Darumbal Elders past, present and those of the future.







TEACH ABOUT RECONCILIATION

The St Brendan's College community is actively committed to the ongoing journey of reconciliation. The teaching of reconciliation is for the purpose of strengthening the relationships between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and non-Indigenous peoples in our St Brendan's College community. At St Brendan's College, we actively and authentically engage in conversations around the histories and progress of the reconciliation journey. This understanding also helps to strengthen engagement with our College's RAP by positioning it within the broader story of reconciliation in Australia.

EXPLORE CURRENT AFFAIRS AND ISSUES

St Brendan's College remains committed to the ongoing awareness of current affairs and issues in the public domain that are of particular significance to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and the process of reconciliation. This will be implemented through curriculum delivery, policies and procedures.

TAKE ACTION AGAINST RACISM

Our goal is to commit to increasing professional development for all members of our St Brendan's College community to better inform them in their awareness of the diverse representations and experiences of racism.

RAP LAUNCH

The St Brendan's College RAP will be ratified and launched in person with the indigenous communities across Queensland and the Torres Strait. The RAP will also be launched throughout the St Brendan's College community at our opening Commitment Mass.



CELEBRATE DAYS OF NATIONAL SIGNIFICANCE

St Brendan's College will continue to engage and participate in events to celebrate or commemorate the national significance for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and the reconciliation movement to show our pride in, and respect for, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories, cultures and contributions. We also commit to including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives when we commemorate other national days.

ABORIGINAL AND TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER FLAGS

St Brendan's College proudly displays the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander flags daily, as a symbolic acknowledgment of the respect our College holds for the histories, cultures, and contributions of Australia's First Nations Peoples.

RECOGNISE AND RESPECT RIGHTS

St Brendan's College is committed to recognising and respecting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples' rights under the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. We acknowledge that working within the frameworks of both declarations is important in reducing discrimination and promoting equality and equity in the educational and wider community.

VISIBLY DEMONSTRATE RESPECT FOR ABORIGINAL AND TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER CULTURES

St Brendan's College commits to demonstrating our respect for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories and cultures in the physical environment of our College. We understand the positive impact of making our respect visible, in particular through traditional dances and art.



ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF COUNTRY

An Acknowledgement of Country is a way to acknowledge and pay respect to First Nations peoples as the Traditional Owners and ongoing custodians of the land. St Brendan's College actively recognises Darumbal, the traditional owners of the land in which our College is situated. We promote reconciliation and pay respect to the Elders - past, present and those of the future. Acknowledgement of Country occurs before all significant events and rituals, scheduled meetings, year-level meetings and College gatherings.





CURRICULUM PLANNING St Brendan's College commits to embedding Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories and cultures in curriculum

Torres Strait Islander histories and cultures in curriculum planning, development and evaluation processes. A significant Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander focus has been embedded into the College Arts and Humanities curriculums, as we continue to identify opportunities for strengthening indigenous representation across the curriculum.

INCLUSIVE POLICIES

St Brendan's College operates on the philosophy of the Edmund Rice touchstones; Liberating Education, Inclusive Community, Gospel Spirituality and Justice and Solidarity. These principles guide the College's inclusive practices based on respect and mutual understanding. Staff are aware of processes and procedures that sustain an equitable approach to all relationships.
