

As we begin this new school year, we ask for your blessing on all who work and learn here.





Reading is the means by which students access the academic curriculum.






















How to support your child's reading at home:







 Points are awarded for good behaviour, effort and the completion of homework tasks. A tally is kept on the whiteboard.


