Why is the QCA setting prices? We have been delegated to undertake this task by the Minister for Natural Resources, Mines and Energy (the Hon Dr Anthony Lynham MP).

How does the QCA set prices? We set prices based on the requirements under the Electricity Act and directions provided in the Minister's delegation. We use a cost build-up methodology and assess each component making up the total electricity

each component making up the total electricity price. This includes using regulated network charges set by the Australian Energy Regulator and the latest information on competitive wholesale and retail electricity markets.

Who can access notified residential electricity prices? They are only available to residential customers outside of the Energex Distribution area in Queensland (that is, the Ergon distribution area and the Essential Energy distribution area).

Does the QCA consider affordability when setting electricity prices? The Queensland Government has a Uniform Tariff Policy, which means the QCA sets regional small customer prices at broadly the same level as prices in South East Queensland. This

reduces the cost of electricity to regional customers—because the Government pays the gap between the price we set and the actual cost of supply for these customers (the gap is in excess of \$460m each year, which the Government pays to the electricity retailer).

Why will notified prices change in 2019–20? Residential customers should see a drop in their electricity prices. This is primarily due to reduced wholesale energy costs (one cost component in the cost build-up of notified prices).

How will the final determination affect residential customers? This depends on the tariff you are on and your consumption. We have worked out the impact for a typical household on the main residential flat rate and controlled load tariffs (tariffs 11, 31 and 33) to use as a guide—see customer bill impact chart below.
