Parish News

FR DARIUSZ OSINSKI PP - Northern Beaches Parish

News from the parish this year is very positive!

A new Parish Pastoral Council has been selected – comprising existing members as well as some new members. The aim is to broaden the membership to ensure all areas of the parish community are represented. The new members have undergone training and information sessions to ensure members know what's expected as well as share what they can bring to the table.

The Sacramental team at the NBP consists of Coordinator Liesl Illesinghe, Jacinta Roberts (APRE from Holy CrossSchool), Rohan Lee (St Andrew's Catholic College) and Fr Dariusz Osinski, with significant support from Anh Nguyen (SSRI) and Jason Pennisi (APRE, SACC).

On 20th April 2023, we celebrated the Sacrament of First Reconciliation for 53 children and had another gathering on the 27th May for 4 children who had missed the 20th. We still have another 4 children who completed the program but have not completed the Sacrament due to family schedules. A total of 61 children completed the Reconciliation preparation program this year. We had about 20 children at St Andrew's at 3pm where Rohan Lee and Jason Pennisi organised the day and then at 6pm at Holy Cross where Jacinta Roberts organised everything with a little help from Rohan. Anh made lovely rosaries for the children which they received with their Certificates. Many thanks to all involved. After the holidays we will commence preparation for the Sacraments of Confirmation and First Holy Eucharist which will take place on the 14th & 15th of October.

The parish has also introduced some new initiatives to encourage families and children to be involved in parish life. We have commenced monthly Family Masses at Holy Cross at 8.30am. These special Family Masses are held on the 1st Sunday of the month. As part of the family focus, the Children's Liturgy has been recommenced at 8.30am mass at Holy Cross. There has been a good attendance for this group but there is always room for more children to participate in this liturgy.

Religious Life

St Andrew's Catholic College is a thriving learning community that acknowledges its role as a provider of holistic education.

The education of the whole person, emotionally, socially, cognitively and spiritually is at the heart of our vision and mission. We are called to follow the discipleship of our patron St Andrew, the first called to follow Jesus' mission and live out the gospel.

Our focus this year has been on our College charism pillar of Stewardship. Just as St Andrew called Jesus' attention to the boy who had the loaves and two fish (Jn 6: 5-9), we too are called to take responsibility for our resources and to nurture our physical world. We are also stewards of our gifts, to nurture our talents and use them for good.

Our mission statement at St Andrew's acknowledges the uniqueness of each individual and we as a result seek to nurture each student as made in the likeness of God to achieve their best. We do this in a context where a diversity of viewpoints, beliefs and traditions co-exist. St Andrew's Catholic College seeks to honour the cultural distinctions that make us human, yet embrace the Catholic story as privileged in our context. Our religious education program has served our students in moral development, knowledge and understanding of religious beliefs, practices, sacred texts and history.

These learning opportunities follow guidelines that are age and stage appropriate, academically rigorous and offer students the opportunity to enhance their analytical and inquiry skills.

The weekly celebration of Mass at the College, either through whole-College Masses or Parish Masses in the All Saints' Chapel has been the continuing heartbeat of the religious life of the College. Throughout the first semester of the year, year levels from Year 1 through to Year 12 have gathered to celebrate the Eucharist with Fr Dariusz Osinski and Northern Beach Parish parishioners in attendance. The College is grateful for the ministry of Fr Dariusz to support the College community through the regular celebration of the Eucharist.

Our Primary community have been living and celebrating life as stewards through the leadership of the Primary Years' Journey Leaders and Primary Student Representative Council (SRC). The eight Journey Leaders, representing Mackillop, Ozanam, Chisholm and Hollows houses, have led Primary Years' Assembly prayer and read at whole-College Masses and been leaders. Joining with the Primary SRC, the motivated Primary leaders have worked to collect items for recycling, worked to ensure the College grounds are tidy and led feedback processes to ensure student voice is sought in important issues affecting the Primary Years. Assemblies have been a central part to ensuring dialogue between staff and students about important elements of student formation including recognition of student achievement, teaching about the St Andrew's College Values, acknowledging country and allowing time to pray together.

The Secondary Years have been blessed with an active group of captains and prefects. College Captains, Rhea Joshie, Brody Boerboom and Jamie Wunsh have led a dedicated group of Mission and Outreach, Student Wellbeing and **Engagement and House Prefects to** lead whole-College Masses, liturgies and be on hand for College events including College Open Days. This work has been complemented by the coming together of the Secondary Student Representative Council (SRC), which has been formed out of the new house groups in Secondary. The positive contributions of each of the students in these leadership roles are an outstanding display of the St Andrew's College Values: Compassion, Respect, Justice, Inclusivity, Outreach and Service. PRIMARY YEARS UPDATE



It's been a busy start to 2023 for St Andrew's Primary Years, with lots of new and exciting changes happening.

The Science of Reading is something you may or may not have heard of. It is not a 'reading program', rather it refers to a vast amount of research that has shown how best children learn to read. From this research it has been found that the brain must develop essential neural systems in order to learn to read, and for the majority of children this is something that needs to be explicitly taught.

Phonics and morphology are linked to many areas of the Australian Curriculum, and are the foundations for all other areas of children's learning. The Australian National Inquiry into Literacy found that systematic phonics instruction (rather than unsystematic or whole language phonics instruction) led to the greatest improvements in reading, writing, spelling and comprehension for children.

This year, at St Andrew's, sees the beginning of our journey in adopting an integrated approach to reading that explicitly teaches phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary knowledge and comprehension. We are very committed to being guided by scientific research to ensure that we deliver on the promise of literacy for every student. We are placing a strong focus on building our staff capacity and shifting our teaching practices to an evidence-based approach, which is Structured Literacy.

We've also been busy visiting kindergartens in the area to meet and greet prospective Prep families to welcome them to our growing St Andrew's community.

We look forward to seeing you around campus.

"A journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step."


This common saying which originated from a Chinese proverb, teaches that even the longest and most difficult ventures have a starting point, beginning with **one first step!**

Thank you all so much for your support, time, and love at this years' Rising Stars Concert! Our staff at our beautiful College has traditionally been outstanding at caring for our young musicians, and our 'Rising Stars' concert was evidence of this.

This year, we had 26 teacher helpers – backstage, and in the auditorium (and so many more supporting from in the audience). There were more than 200 young musicians, the music committee, friends of the music committee - including alumni parents, and alumni students.

Our music community has worked tirelessly before and after school, in breaks, and on weekends to reach the polished standard that was on show. This intensive work starts in Year 2 or 3 and continues daily for 9-10 years until the last Year 12 STACC Ensemble's Last Notes are sounded in our procession for the Leavers Assembly.

How did you decide to start playing an instrument?

How did you decide to start playing an instrument?

Both of my brothers played instruments, and it looked cool so I wanted to play one too. I was very excited when Ms Cameron asked me if I wanted to play the cornet! What is your earliest music

What is your favourite thing about playing an instrument?

I have played at National Competitions and even done a couple of semiprofessional gigs. gives you this really cool feeling because you're part of something bigger than just yourself. There are a lot of fun opportunities you get too, like big concerts and the eisteddfod, I have so many great memories of those.

How do you find the determination and drive to keep going when it gets tough?

Honestly, there was a point last year where I just wanted to give up clarinet because I wasn't really enjoying it anymore. I'm glad I did, because I soon started to enjoy it again.

How many times do you attend

How often do you practise your instruments?

I try to practise every day but because I play two instruments, I have to prioritise depending on what event I am working for. How do you find the determination and drive to keep going when it

My teacher, family & friends are always there supporting me, and I love the feeling of accomplishing something hard.

How many times do you attend

extra rehearsals during the week? Monday, I have Cairns Brass, Tuesday - Brass Band, Wednesday - Concert Band, and Thursday - Cornet and piano lessons. I also have chosen music as my year 10 elective, so we work on performance and composition in that time as well. What is your favourite STACC music memory?

Jazz Band performances, especially – Jazz On The Deck. We did a full 2 hour set for friends and family and raised money for a primary school in the Solomon Islands.

If you had any advice for students wishing to take up an instrument – what would you say to them? Do it, you'll have the best fun you'll ever have. It is difficult, but the rewards are huge. So, the challenge is the best part and the most satisfying.

What is your favourite St Andrew's music memory?

Stuffing ourselves at a sausage sizzle while playing handball with everyone is pretty much a tradition of music community day every year. It's probably one of my favourite things to do with music. There are people from grade 3 to people who have already graduated, and it's so much fun. It's really cool to see how music brings so many people together. If you had any advice for students wishing to take up an instrument – what would you say to them?

I'd say go for it. Sometimes it's tough to really get started but once you get it, it's good fun. There's a lot of ups and downs and sometimes you'll feel like giving up, but it's definitely worth sticking with it.

Do you think playing an instrument helps with your academic studies?



Chef Brandon's Tom Yum Gai – Hot and Sour Chicken Soup

Ingredients (in order of preparation):

- 👂 1 kg chicken breast, cubed
- 8-10 kaffir lime leaves
- 3-4 stalks lemongrass, bruised
- 10-12 large dried red chillies
- 4-5 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 large onions, sliced
- 2-3 tbsp. chopped ginger3-4 tbsp. chopped galangal
- 500 g cherry tomatoes, halved
- 2-3 I chicken broth
- 2-3 tbsp. fish sauce 1-2 tbsp. palm sugar
- 200 g button mushrooms, sliced 1 cup chopped coriander
- Juice of 2-3 limes
- Fish sauce, to taste

Instructions:




- In a large pot, heat chicken broth and add chicken breast, kaffir lime leaves, lemongrass, dried red chillies, garlic, onions, ginger, galangal, cherry tomatoes, fish sauce, palm sugar and mushrooms.
- 2) Let it boil and then reduce heat to low, simmer for 10-15 minutes until chicken is cooked through.
- 3) Add coriander and lime juice.
- 4) Season with fish sauce to taste.
- Serve hot with your choice of toppings such as chopped coriander, sliced chillies, crushed peanuts, lime wedges, etc.
- Chef B's hot tip:

For a richer and creamier taste, add 200-300 ml coconut milk to the soup in step 2, before reducing heat to low.

Jocational Education

In 2023, the College's VET program continues to expand.

Currently we have 315 VET enrolments across Years 10-12, with many students undertaking more than one qualification. Additionally, there are many students who are combining their VET studies with their ATAR subjects, providing them with an opportunity to create a balanced approach that opens doors to alternative university entry options.

Our College offers a wide range of certificates including Certificate II in Furniture Making Pathways, Certificate II in Engineering Pathways, Certificates I and II in Hospitality, Certificate II in Cookery, Certificate III in IT, Certificate III in Business, Certificate III in Fitness, Certificate IV in Crime and Justice Studies, Certificate III in Allied Health Assistance, and Certificate III in Health Services Assistance.

Our students are not only limited to certificates offered at the school; they are also exploring opportunities with external providers. We have students taking certificates through TAFE, Major Training, Aviation Australia, CQU, and Demi International College of Beauty. This means more diverse experiences and a broader range of expertise for our talented students.

The Year 10 Work Experience program is in full swing, with placements scheduled for Week 4 of Term 3. We've also embarked on a number of excursions so far this year to Hutchies Try a Trade, Ergon Energy, Breakfast with the Tradies and more!



Our Year 11 & 12 Hospitality and Cookery students are also about to immerse themselves in an aweinspiring culinary tour of Japan to learn more about Asian cuisine. We wish them well for a safe and enjoyable trip!

One of our talented Year 11 students (Lily Corbett) made it to the top five in the prestigious Queensland Training Awards this vear. Lilv is undertaking a School Based Traineeship in Childcare and is certainly making an impression with her employer and the families and children she is working with. Let's not forget our very own Chef Brandon, who has clinched a spot in the top three for the coveted title of "VET Trainer of the Year" in the Queensland Training Awards. We'll be cheering him on as he vies for the State Award!

We are also preparing for our Annual Career and Trade Expo to be held on Thursday 22 June from 5.30pm to 7.30pm. With a remarkable line up of 55+ stall holders, ranging from trades to universities (including accommodation providers), there's something for everyone.

BSB30120 CERTIFICATE III IN BUSINESS

Did you know you can work towards a Business Qualification in Year 10?

Year 10 students at St Andrew's Catholic College have the option to choose Certificate III Business BSB30120 as part of their senior subject choices in 2024. This program is offered through a Third-Party arrangement with Binnacle Training. This qualification reflects the role of individuals in a variety of Business Services job roles and is delivered over a two-year period. The program is delivered through class-based tasks as well as both simulated and real business environments at the school - involving the delivery of a range of projects and services within the school community. Major projects are competency based and practical in nature. Students can connect with industry professionals and gain industry exposure for future employment.

Graduates will be competent in a range of essential business skills including personal management and effective communication techniques, customer service, leadership and innovation, critical thinking, business technology and documents, financial literacy, workplace health and safety, inclusive work practices and participating in sustainable work practices.

This program also includes student opportunities to design a new product or service as part of our (non-accredited) Entrepreneurship Project – Binnacle Boss. A Language, Literacy and Numeracy (LLN) Screening process is undertaken at the time of initial enrolment (or earlier) to ensure students have the capacity to effectively engage with the content and to identify support measures as required.

Successful completion of the Certificate III in Business will contribute a maximum 8 QCE credit points and may contribute towards a student's Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR).
