Joanne Andrews

Joanne Andrews is the Teacher of Students with Disabilities at Good Shepherd Catholic School, Rasmussen. Joanne actively engages with professionals to support students' needs and noted an increasing frequency of sensory processing difficulties being reported by these professionals. Her personal research led her to establish a sensory room at the school.

Joanne provided professional learning sessions to all staff about how the sensory room could be used and provides regular updates about new equipment being installed. The sensory room has provided much needed support to many students who have previously demonstrated disruptive behaviours. These students are now engaging with the sensory room and anecdotally, they are calmer, more engaged learners. Student's parents have also noted improvement in the child's behaviour and capacity to focus.

The success of the sensory room has meant other schools and organisations have visited the room to find out more about the project. Joanne is to be congratulated for establishing the school's sensory room which has assisted many students by giving them opportunities for improved future learning outcomes.

Juanita Tighe

Juanita has engaged in exceptionally life-giving relationships with students, colleagues and families during her long association with Ryan Catholic College. Juanita is often seen outside classrooms working with small groups of students assisting them with their literacy skills and encouraging them to reach their full potential. He developed genuine relationships with the P&F, which transformed the culture of the school into a family-focused, supportive and joyful place. Tim's personal faith is lived every day. He has given significantly of his personal time and resources over the past eight years to turn our school into one of the best-resourced learning environments in the Diocese.

Tricia approached the Hospital to continue to visit some of the elderly who were relocated to the Hospital.

Tricia is an outstanding member of our school and wider community. She exemplifies what it means to be a volunteer in our community, and is a role model to students as she shows by her behaviours and interactions the importance of caring for others, by simply taking the time to sit, chat and interact with people. The visits to these organisations have built long lasting friendships.

Uncle Peter tells his powerful story of Indigenous Reconciliation, through his own journey from the policies of the past which impacted on his mother, and their subsequent loss of connection with the family. Uncle Peter shows how to heal from the hurts of the past to overcome, connect, and reconcile within, to be able to make positive contributions towards Indigenous issues on a local, national and global scale. Uncle Peter embraces his cultural heritage and is an inspiration to many. He epitomises the word 'reconciliation'.
