DIRECTOR'S

2013 has been an important year of planning as we prepare for the historic move of Year 7 into the secondary setting in schools across Queensland. Townsville Catholic Education has worked closely with our secondary colleges to ensure buildings, facilities, specialist teachers and pastoral care programs will be available for the start of 2015 and the smooth transition for students and their families

Another key development in our Diocese this year was the announcement that Southern Cross Secondary School will expand to offer secondary as of 2015. This announcement has been met with great enthusiasm by the local community and we look forward to expanding our Catholic secondary education offering to families in the southern suburbs of Townsville. As demand for our Catholic schools grows, St Joseph's Catholic School in Cloncurry also announced an expansion to offer junior secondary (Years 7-9) as of 2014.

During the Term 1 school holidays, teachers and staff from our Catholic schools throughout the Diocese gathered for our Year of Grace event at the Townsville Entertainment Centre. This two day program was a major professional development experience for our schools, with more than 1230 people attending. The two day program looked at the gift of God's grace from perspectives including education, spirituality, social justice, Indigenous culture, the arts, media and the environment. The guest speakers were inspiring and enlightening and the closing Mass, concelebrated by Bishop Michael Putney and Archbishop Mark Coleridge, was very moving. From the feedback we received, it seems our teachers and staff left the event feeling motivated and refreshed.

We were also very pleased to welcome more than 260 children to our four new kindergartens that have been built on Catholic school sites including Ryan Catholic College, St Clare's Catholic School and St Anthony's Catholic College in Townsville and at St Joseph's Catholic Primary School in Mount Isa. We welcomed the first intake of year eight students to St Catherine's Catholic College in Proserpine – another historic occasion for Catholic education in the Townsville Diocese.

Some of our schools celebrated significant milestones in 2013 – St Margaret Mary's College (50 years), Burdekin Catholic High School (60 years), St Teresa's College Abergowrie (80 years) and St Joseph's School, The Strand (140 yeas). It is milestones such as these that remind us how connected and entrenched our Catholic schools are in the many communities throughout our Diocese.

Mulkadee was an outstanding success this year, with our use of social media engaging a widespread audience and connecting the event with families throughout the Diocese.

As 2013 draws to a close, we have much to be thankful for as we look toward the future and a new educational landscape in Queensland. Townsville Catholic Education remains strongly positioned to continue to deliver quality education for families in our communities.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The three main goals highlighted for particular focus in Religious Education (RE) in 2013 were:

- Introduction of the new Curriculum in Religious Education.
- To celebrate the Year of Grace event and to take up the Diocesan initiatives for the Year of Grace (e.g. Celebration of Repentance).
- To continue the Meditation Effectiveness on Wellbeing in Schools (Mews) project.

The following are focus areas that were developed in 2013:

GOSPEL VALUES PROJECT COMPLETED (SD 1 & 7)

- The school completes the 10 hour process of Professional Development (RE accreditation) around the new Gospel Values project, has the presentation of framed poster (Director or Representative) displays posters in classrooms and integrated the work on Gospel Values into the culture of the school.
- School Boards/Parents and Friends to consider the implications of Gospel Values in the context of their school and policy procedures.
- Encourage teachers to use the Gospel Values material (on SharePoint) in their classrooms. (Most schools in the diocese have all but completed this process)
- To celebrate the Year of Grace in a culminating diocesan / school event.
 - Promote the spirit and meaning of the Year of Grace.
 - Ensure full school/teacher involvement in the event.

The event was held and the feedback from official feedback surveys was particularly positive.

SPIRITUALITY FORMATION PROGRAMS

In 2012 we concentrated on making the Spirituality application process more streamlined and the information contained in the booklet easier to follow. The Spirituality Formation booklet was made easily accessible online for those who have difficulty accessing SharePoint and so it was sent out with a link to Google Docs. All staff was sent an individual email with a link provided to the booklet.

There was great feedback on the formation programs provided. There was excellent take up of programs provided. All attendees were captured on Kiosk and we were able to capture data for staff in relation to Professional Development and Accreditation purposes.

CHAPLAINCY ORGANISATION AND SUPPORT

 New schools and chaplains were processed and professional support and network opportunities were provided.

- New processes put in place by DEEWR were successfully navigated.
- All chaplains were informed of the new study component for their role.

Generally Chaplains continue to be appreciated in schools and provide valuable service as per their roles.

LEADING TEACHER CHRISTIAN MEDITATION IN EVERY SCHOOL

Two in-service days were held with Leading Teachers Christian Meditation. This very enthusiastic network of professionals continues to help promote, cement and deepen the practice of Christian Meditation in our schools.

New projects and initiatives

CURRICULUM IN RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

New Curriculum in RE was introduced to all APRE's successfully. A Shape Paper that outlines the philosophy, practice and theory that envelope the new RE Curriculum was developed and endorsed by Bishop Michael Putney.

NEW EVANGELIZATION (RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN SCHOOL, PARISH AND HOME SD $4\ \&\ 9)$

A paper was developed "Sharing the Mission" that focused on developing "Right Relationship" between Schools and Parishes was completed and endorsed by the Bishop, and the Priest's council. It will be a working document that will be unpacked at School Board level in 2014.

LEUVEN PROJECT ON CATHOLIC IDENTITY

A process of Identifying and Enhancing Catholic Identify using Methodology developed by Leuven University has been introduced into three new schools in 2013. A process was entered into to gather vital data that will help schools enhance the Catholic Identity of their communities by analysing vital data.

This project will be extended in 2014 and will become a part of School Improvement processes. This annual RE report can attest to the fact that all goals, new projects and initiatives were successfully implemented in 2013. The Year of Grace event was a highlight for the year and the new initiatives implemented will provide impetus for further development in the areas of catholic Identity into the future.

CURRICULUM

The following were the main priority goals for the Curriculum team in 2013:

- The implementation of the Australian Curriculum
- Productive Teaching/Powerful Learning: a multi-dimensional approach to pedagogy
- PD Online
- · Data analysis to improve learning

TEAM GOALS 2013 - CURRICULUM SERVICES

Areas of department work that need to be further developed:

- Continued communication between teams around initiatives and projects such as Australian Curriculum, IBL, Learning Enrichment, PD On-line, Electronic Resource Collections, etc., to enhance the capacity of teachers and schools to develop and implement best practice models of teaching and learning.
- Further provision of technologies that facilitate communication and PD. For example video conferencing, elearning modules, blogs, wikis and PD Online.
- Provision of clear guidelines on assessment and reporting referencing to the Australian Curriculum Achievement Standards and QSA Standards Collaborations.
- To guide and support schools in their implementation of the Australian Curriculum.
- Review and revise the Learning Framework and Literacy and Numeracy plans.
- Renewing/revising the curriculum audit tool.
- Continued development of a coherent framework for care and education in our system from the early years through to the senior years
- Continued vigilance and response to a very active national and state educational agenda. Provide assistance and guidance to Principals on the possible outcomes and impacts from this agenda on schools for example, Flying Start, National Partnerships, AITSL.
- Particular KLA Panels will focus the development of work programs to support schools in the implementation of the Australian Curriculum.
- More targeted investigation with schools of their data to improve outcomes.

New projects and Initiatives

- The planning and development of Trade Training Centres (Abergowrie, Burdekin, Gilroy, St Anthony's, Ryan and St Margaret Mary's).
- The publication of Teaching Learning Curriculum each term to highlight and celebrate the good practice and initiatives in our classrooms and schools.
- Curriculum developers to work in a mentoring role with teachers, particularly beginning teachers providing guidance with planning, resource selection, teaching and assessment in implementing the Australian Curriculum.

- Increased provision of coaches and mentors to provide school based professional development, intervention, resource development and support to targeted school across the diocese through the National Partnerships: Improving Literacy and Numeracy programme.
- IBL Project to continue in 2013 with focus on Australian Curriculum and the National Professional Standards of teachers: Active Teaching Powerful Learning.
- With the implementation of the Australian Curriculum, PD will be developed, delivered and accessed to assist in its implementation.
- Development of data base of resources for teachers to include Scope and Sequence documents, Units of Work, Assessment tasks and worksheets.
- Development of an action plan and professional learning opportunities and resources focussed on identified areas of concern e.g. Functional Literacy.
- Implement Destiny within all schools which will enable better resource management, federated researching which integrates external resources from the internet databases and TCEO subscriptions.

New knowledge and skills required to ensure the department goals are achieved

- Interconnect expertise in service areas and work together on various projects to ensure an integrated approach particularly in relation to the Service Team model.
- The delivery of new professional development methods. e.g. PD online.
- Use of data to improve outcomes for students.
- The use of technology in the delivery of the curriculum.
- Implementing the full capacity of Destiny.

RESOURCES

During 2013, the main focus of the Resources department was the implementation of a unique, two year project to provide a cloud-based centralized library management solution. This project will culminate in 2014 with the TCEO iLibrary and our 28 School Libraries using Destiny Library Manager to connect 21st century learners to quality print and digital resources. At the end of 2013 fifteen libraries are now part of the Destiny District system with fourteen still to be integrated during 2014.

The District configuration of Destiny has assisted the fourteen District school libraries to start to implement more efficient and effective processes for both managing their libraries and collections, and for supporting more active resource-based teaching and learning. The Destiny portal provides one place where teachers and students have 24/7 mobile access to a vast variety of resources that include library titles, print and eBooks, media, digital and web-based content. The digital content includes an eBook collection of 64 Britannica titles and 265 Follett titles, Australian Curriculum matched resources as well as access to free and subscription based databases such as our current Diocesan subscriptions Britannica and eLibrary Australasia.

Steps for implementation included:

 Setting up the Destiny District server at CENet Sydney and establishing centralised library management protocols for managing data, patrons, access levels, library policies and circulation. Although centralised, the system still allows individual libraries to change the configurations to suit their school context, including different setups for primary and secondary libraries.

- Converting and importing fourteen school libraries from Libcode into Destiny. The data conversion processes were mainly completed over vacation periods to minimize library disruption.
- Configuration of District and local school resources into a common database and the setting up of the modules that provide access to digital content and eBooks - Digital Resources, One Search, FollettShelf and Britannica E-Stax.
- Configuration of the mobile apps for desktop and mobile device access to Destiny District and its resources - Destiny Quest, Follett Destiny Mobile Library, Enlight K-12 Reader, iPublish Central Reader.
- Linking of Destiny to social media curation tools such as Pinterest.
- Support and training of school library staff to effectively use Destiny through provision of online support, onsite training and four Destiny PD days.

On completion of this project at the end of 2014, all teachers and library staff across the Diocese will be able to use the Destiny District platform to collaborate and enrich their teaching with a variety of curriculum-aligned resources, while also making a wealth of content and tools available to students to support their learning. Along with the integration of the remaining fourteen schools, the main focus for 2014 will be the promotion of the use of Destiny to teachers and students.



INDIGENOUS EDUCATION

The Indigenous Education Team identified the following three priorities for 2013:

GOAL 1 | To collect and use Aboriginal and Torres Strait islander student and community data at a school and systems level to inform decision making, the setting of high expectations and the delivery of effective educational learning experiences.

GOAL 2 | To support schools to implement the Gospel imperative of Jesus for all people to live life to the full; promoting the place of Aboriginal and Torres Strait islander students and their communities within the Catholic Education system, within the Catholic community.

GOAL 3 | To effectively employ human resources so as to maximise the school achievement for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students both individually and as cohorts.

New initiatives for 2013

There were a number of specific new initiatives established for the Indigenous Education Team for 2013, which included:

IDENTIFY STRATEGIES TO IMPROVE OUTCOMES FOR INDIGENOUS STUDENTS ACROSS OUR DIOCESE.

This included entering into partnerships with James Cook University (JCU) into research centred on positive teaching practices that enhance Indigenous student's achievements. This was a wonderful opportunity to work with Dr Brian Lewthwaite from JCU to develop hands on teacher based research program with all our schools. Dr Brian Lewthwaite received funding via Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER) grant to conduct this research which will continue into 2014.

ESTABLISH A SCHOOL BASED WORKING PARTY

The working party was established to implement the Townsville Catholic Education Office (TCEO) Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander strategic plan 2012 – 2011 and support planning for professional development. This initiative was achieved and the plan accepted.

UTILISE THE TOWNSVILLE CATHOLIC EDUCATION OFFICE FOR INSTRUCTIONAL PRACTICES

e.g. Accelerated Literacy, classroom walkthroughs as well as Cultural Awareness for staff.

Resources available in the Plan, on SharePoint etc. (AITSL website).

The Indigenous Education Team highlights for 2013 included:

• Success Awards event for Indigenous Youth Leadership Program (IYLP) and Sports Academy.

- Expansion of accelerated literacy to schools.
- Successful functioning and running of the Diocesan Indigenous Education Committee (DIEC).
- Successful running of "Exploring Indigenous / Spiritualties teacher formation" program.
- Embedding of Role M, Maths / Numeracy program for Indigenous students
- Ensuring focus schools identified in the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Education Strategic Action plan 2010-2014 were fully supported to achieve required outcomes through:
 - Dare to lead professional development
 - Cultural Awareness sessions
 - Bridging the language gap
 - ESL Essential workshopsNext step support
- Successful support for schools implementing Australian Cross Curriculum Priority – Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Histories and Cultures

FUTURE ACTIVITIES

The indigenous Education budget reported a surplus at the end of 2013 and this surplus will be used to support an Indigenous Education Conference in 2014, as well as supporting the appointment of further literacy support for St Michael's Palm Island.

All new projects were seen as successfully being implemented and all focus goals were achieved.

DIOCESAN EDUCATION COUNCIL & ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

The first meeting of the Diocesan Education Council (DEC) 2013 took place on Wednesday, $20^{\rm th}$ March at the Townsville Catholic Education Office.

The DEC met six times in 2013. The Council also travelled to St Michael's School, Palm Island, where the members were entertained by the children, had a tour of the island, were able to see the staff quarters and the new school buildings. The Council also convened a meeting at St Margaret Mary's College where they were able to meet the staff and students.

These visits form a strategic part of the DEC operation, providing an opportunity for staff, students and parents to meet the members, share their good news stories and talk about the future for their school community.

In 2013, the major initiative of the Diocesan Development Council was to recommend to the Bishop that St Joseph's Catholic School in Cloncurry extend to Years 8 and 9 and from 2015, to include Year7 as part of their junior secondary.

Father Michael Lowcock outlined the benefits of the change to the Bishop and the Council. The move of Year 7 to secondary school would lead to a decline in numbers in the schools, and many parents were unwilling or unable to send their children to a Catholic boarding

school at that age. Their only choice would be the state high school. The addition of the junior high school at St Joseph's would ensure the viability of the school, and would encourage families to remain in Cloncurry.

The Council also discussed the method of reviewing policies and whether all policies listed pertained to the DEC. To that end the Council consulted Brisbane Catholic Education office to investigate their policy management. It was recommended that the DEC consider having a small policy committee.

During the year, the Council received input on religious education programmes, mediation in schools, funding issues, the budget, staffing and the St Mary MacKillop Early Learning Centres centres from the relevant heads of department from Townsville Catholic Education.

Mrs Kim Bellert, Mr Paul Ould and Mr Alan Newman resigned at the end of 2013. They were thanked for their contribution to the Council.


In 2014, the DEC plans to visit Cloncurry, where the move to secondary will be observed, and also to Mount Isa.




