Indeed, not only has Monique and her dedicated staff been able to turn around the financial performance of the College during the second half of 2021 but with the addition of extra qualifications the College is well placed to deliver the type of skills training which is in great demand in Western Sydney. The future is looking bright.

Financially the College did suffer an operating loss in 2021. Whilst not surprising in the circumstances, the efforts of Monique to strictly manage the cost base of the College has meant that this position was managed as effectively as possible. In addition, the College is grateful of the support provided by both the State and Federal Governments through the various packages which were available to business during the height of the pandemic.

I wish to thank our CEO, Monique Knight and all the staff at the College for their tireless efforts through what was an extraordinary year. Their passion and commitment to the College is without peer. Indeed, their work above and beyond to help service the Community of Western Sydney was recently recognised by the College being announced as the winner of the "Most Outstanding Education Services" category in the Parramatta Local Business Awards.in February 2022. The people of Western Sydney are well served by the College.

I wish to close by thanking all my fellow Council members. Their commitment of time, and passion for the College and its purposes is inspiring and indeed it is a pleasure and honour to be part of such a committed and talented Board. We will continue to work together to progress the College and to expand its horizons over the coming year.

## PARTNERSHIP WITH ROSEHILL PUBLIC SCHOOL

The BDM visits the Rosehill Public School to meet with parents of the school community who are informed about the training opportunities available through government funding and the eligibility criteria for accessibility. The community liaison officer encourages parents to engage in learning to upskill in personal and professional development especially for those who are wishing to transition into the workplace, though short course, skillsets and full qualifications, to become better resourced for the Australian labour market.



### **TECH SAVVY SENIORS**

Funded through a partnership between the NSW Government and Telstra, our Tech Savvy Seniors program helped seniors build the skills and confidence to use computers, tablets and smartphones. It included face-to-face training, how-to guides and training materials in over 14 languages.

The benefits of our Tech Savvy Seniors programs:

## SELF-PACED FLEXIBLE LEARNING

Self-Paced Learning provides a more flexible approach to training delivery. This learning style is popular for busy people who wish to accomplish a qualification but who are time poor. This proved popular during COVID lockdown.

The College has found this strategy successful to address this issue. Learner's work through the learning materials independently which can take place at work, in the home or within the classroom environment, with the flexibility to study at times that fit the learners' lifestyles particularly those with heavy work schedules, engaged in tertiary study, and/or family commitments.

The trainer/assessor meets up with the student at a mutually suitable time over zoom for 1hr or at the College premises. This is arranged by appointment, providing the learner with facilitation and guidance of the assessment tasks along with the supporting paper-based and electronic assessment resources.

Any issues or concerns can be aired and resolved. Individual Learning Plans are structured to help keep students on track with their assessments by setting predetermined assessment times and/or students can advise when they are ready to be assessed.

Self-Paced learning is often competency-based and proves to be a popular option with many courses including Certificate III Business, Certificate IV Business for those seeking promotion whilst continuing to maintain their current full-time employment, and Diploma in Business for those ready to seek supervisory roles.

## BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT (COMMUNITY PROGRAMS)/STUDENT RECRUITMENT

The BDM is passionate about delivering customised training solutions within an enriching and supportive learning environment and attends industry events to promote college offerings. The role ascertains training based on demand by building relationships with industry.

Initiatives are implemented to equip learners to accomplish accredited outcome success, employability skills and practical skills knowledge required to build a completive portfolio to attract sustainable employment. Industry mentoring is offered to skilled migrants seeking a career reflecting their professional qualification and to help understand the Australian workplace culture and any challenges that may arise during the recruitment process and as a new employee in Australia.

Learners are inspired to utilise digital literacy when completing assessments and are systematically monitored on their progress and encouraged to explore alternative employability opportunities such as volunteering and further study options. ## **INFORMATION SESSIONS AND ENROLMENT DAYS**



## WORKSHOPS FUNDED THROUGH ACE


