Fr Michael's Reflection...

Saint Peter to Rot

In Rome on Sunday, 19 October, a young martyr from the island of New Britain was recognized as a saint. He is Papua New Guinea's first saint, and also another saint for our region of Oceania. His name is Saint Peter to Rot.



Catholic missionaries of the
Sacred Heart were
ministering on the island. Peter's father,
Angelo was the chieftain of his village. He and
his wife Maria, along with other powerful
tribal chieftains and many villagers, converted
to the Catholic faith, leaving behind polygamy
(having more than one wife) and cannibalism.
Angelo and Maria welcomed the faith into
their village, gave land for the church, school
and house of the Missionaries of the Sacred
Heart, and raised their children in the faith.

Peter, one of six children, was trained as a catechist. He was humble, and listened to the older catechists, and soon was a leader among them. He married Paula, and they would have three children, though the last would be born after Peter's martyrdom.



Peter's work as a catechist increased dramatically, when the Japanese invaded during the 2nd World War, driving out the Australian defenders. The missionaries were killed or imprisoned. Peter, now had greater responsibilities baptising, witnessing marriages and going on long journeys through the bush to secretly receive consecrated hosts from the missionaries, so that he could take Communion to people. Soon the Christian faith was not allowed. Peter built a hidden chapel from foliage to continue to teach .


Near the end of the Second World War, the Japanese began to encourage the islanders to go back to the practice of polygamy (having more than one wife). Peter boldly opposed this. He was arrested for continuing to practice the faith and teach against polygamy.

Peter's elderly mother and wife Paula often visited him in prison, and he told his mother, "The police have

told me that the Japanese doctor will be coming to give me some medicine. I suspect that this is a trick. I am really not ill at all and I cannot think what all this means". Hours before his death, he said, "I am in prison for those who break their marriage vows and for those who do not want to see God's work go forward. That is all. I must die. I have already been condemned to death." Peter dressed in his best clothes and put on his catechist cross.

Another prisoner witnessed Peter poisoned and smothered to death.

Many people gathered for the burial. The burial was silent, because they were afraid of the Japanese soldiers. However, the faithful were confident that Peter had died a martyr for the faith and was with Jesus in heaven. He is shown with his Bible, which he often carried about for teaching, and holding two wedding rings.








