year, we have set about adapting and responding to the new world we are living in. While it is true that in South Australia we have been luckier than most, we have all been impacted.

When we take the time to look at 2021 through the eves of our students, we see the added challenges they have faced whether it be the wearing of masks, fewer social, sporting and musical opportunities or the general uncertainty and restrictions on their movements. Despite this, the boys have remained largely optimistic and positive and have demonstrated a determination to be the best they can be.

Academic Success

Our academic results remain excellent, with Rostrevor continuing to outperform co-education schools, and our highest academic performers ranked amongst the best scholars in the state. A quarter of our 2020 graduates achieved an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) above 90, which is well above the state average, and two students received Governor of South Australia Commendations - a first for the College.

Student Wellbeing

While our core business at Rostrevor is the teaching and learning, great emphasis is also placed on student wellbeing. In a recent national study of parents of primary- and secondary-school-aged children about the priorities for choosing a school, student wellbeing topped the list. This is re-affirming for me because this is something that I know we do extremely well at Rostrevor and have done so for many years. As our enrolments continue to rise, I strongly believe that families are not only choosing Rostrevor because of the great academic and Co-Curricular opportunities the College provides, but because we put student wellbeing especially success in education and learning.

The Year of Empowerment

Our Prefects have been exemplary role models for our younger students and have represented Rostrevor with great pride. The selection of the 'Year of Empowerment' as the theme for 2021 demonstrated a selflessness and awareness that makes me very proud.

With the guidance and support from Nicole Laube (Deputy Principal – Dean of Faculty) and Mark Simpson (Deputy Principal – Dean of Students), our Prefects have all willingly and enthusiastically accepted the challenge given at the beginning of this year and that is to be servant leaders.

I would like to commend Head Prefect Manish Augustine, Deputy Head Prefect Alastair Lord and all of our student leaders for the way in which they have









listened to their fellow students, given a voice to many and brought many of our students closer together.

While we may not have had as many opportunities to engage with the wider community in 2021, the sense of service and spirit in our College remains as strong as ever, with numerous Social Justice initiatives driven by the boys and many fundraisers in support of those less fortunate than ourselves, as well as our Year 11 Service Learning program, Marian Day and Edmund Rice Day celebrations and retreats for our Middle and Senior Years students.

To our teaching and support staff, thank you for your professionalism and dedication to your roles. It is this dedication that provides for the opportunities and successes of our students. I would like to acknowledge the dedication and commitment of the Executive Leadership Team that has worked tirelessly and supported me and the College community as we have delivered many important initiatives and advancements throughout the year.

in undertaking the role of Acting Principal this year, but also for what he accomplished in just a short time as Principal at Rostrevor. It was no surprise to me, nor many others, when he was seconded and then appointed to the position of Edmund Rice Education Australia (EREA) Regional Director. At the beginning of the year, the Rostrevor Board was replaced by the Rostrevor College Advisory Council, albeit with the same membership. The name change was determined by EREA to better reflect the role of those members – advising the Principal, not deciding or governing.

Earlier in the year, members of the Rostrevor College community were invited to submit an expression of interest in joining the Council. From that process we gained two new members, David Hall and Darren Lynch, who both have sons completing Year 10 and, in Darren Lynch's case, another completing Year 12.

Both have brought great experience to the Council – David Hall in government and local council leadership and company ownership and all that comes with those experiences, and Darren Lynch in aged care financial leadership and consultancy with both financial and human resources foci. We have been pleased to have them join the Council and they have made significant contributions already.

Rostrevor Master Plan

An important focus for the Council during the year was the master planning for the site and improvements in

the facilities we have. We are pleased that we now have a contemporary boarding house that provides comfortable private and community facilities for our boarders.

The College's architects, Edge Architects, have undertaken consultation with the leadership, staff and with the Council in the development of a masterplan that can guide the College's physical development into its next century. It provides for a much better connection between the buildings, organises the site better and provides some needed facilities. Because of projected cost, it will take a number of years to achieve and will require the community to support the

College Foundation in meeting some part of the cost.

Rostrevor Centenary

In that regard, I chair the College Centenary Committee, which is well advanced in its planning for the community celebrations of our centenary in 2023. We intend that the centenary will also launch a capital-raising program to effect a facilities development that will commemorate the centenary. Another outcome of the centenary will be a special commemorative book which, with photos and story, will capture the history and life of the College over the past 100 years.

During the year, the Council has received input from several staff on how their programs are contributing to the carrying out of the Edmund Rice Charter and touchstones. Apart from Nicole Laube and Kerry Hodkinson already mentioned, they have included: Richard Sachse, Assistant Principal Religious Identity

that he will continue to do so as he returns to his substantive role of Deputy Principal next year.

New Principal Appointment

As chair of the Council, I was a member of the appointment panel for the new Principal of Rostrevor College. The successful appointee, Shana Bennett, was a standout in a wellcredentialled and significant group of applicants. She brings extensive leadership experience with a focus on positive education, leading the community in the creation of a positive learning and wellbeing culture.

Shana Bennett's extensive educational background brings to Rostrevor College a strong philosophy of education that brings about success for each student. She is well placed, therefore, to continue and build upon what the staff at Rostrevor College have achieved in this area.

Shana Bennett puts great emphasis on collaboration, partnership and inclusivity within the community. She has the relational qualities

The College motto, Palma Merenti (The reward to the one who earns it), encourages boys to strive to be the best they can in every aspect of school life. This means each student should reach his academic potential, become a responsible member of the community and be a self-motivated and reflective lifelong learner in the 21st century. We know from research that the positive relationship that the boys have with their teachers is fundamental to boys developing the confidence to grow these skills.

Updating Wellbeing Programs

While Rostrevor College has offered comprehensive Student Wellbeing programs for students for many years, considerable evidence has led the College

During this year, we have built upon the existing positive school culture, wellbeing leadership and tradition of 98 years of care in the education of boys as we sought to improve the quality of Pastoral Care at the College. As part of our commitment to the touchstones of Liberating Education and to providing an Inclusive Community and the Rostrevor College Strategic Priority of Student Wellbeing, we have developed a range of initiatives including creating the Rostrevor College Wellbeing Framework that will provide a construct through which we can conti nue to offer wellbeing for years to come. Thanks to the team who created this document – Evan Pezos, Bill Trewartha, Tom Hodkinson and Sharyn Darrell. From this, we have begun to work on updating the R-12 Student Wellbeing program that includes all the activities and presentations we provide for students during their time at Rostrevor. Additionally, we have discussed the importance of the Pastoral Care teacher (Years 7-12) and Junior Years classroom teacher (R-6) as the primary providers of Pastoral Care for our students.

Clarity of Expectations

The research of Lyn Sharratt, practitioner, researcher, author, and presenter, emphasises the

importance of providing clarity, and we know that boys are more likely to thrive when they have clear guidance. Mindful of this need, we have created Codes of Conduct for students both at College and for Co-Curricular activities. Thanks to the staff, students and parents/caregivers who contributed through the extensive consultation process to the development of both a Junior Years and Middle/ Senior Years Code of Conduct. All these initiatives and others have started us on a journey, aspiring for Rostrevor College to be regarded as a college of choice for student wellbeing in the future.

Co-Curricular Opportunities

I acknowledge the significant work done by all staff, parents/caregivers and volunteers in providing a wide range of Co-Curricular opportunities for our boys. Thanks is extended to Luke Manuel, Director – Co-Curricular Programs; and Tim Baccanello, Junior Years Co-Curricular Coordinator, for the work they do in overseeing these programs, and Peter Waterman who ably leads our Music Department to provide opportunities for our Music students to learn and perform despite the challenges of COVID-19.

Camps and Carnivals

In addition to Co-Curricular, our boys love the chance to participate in sporting carnivals and camps, and recent research has highlighted the importance of these opportunities in enabling students to develop skills such as resilience. Thanks to the staff who gave their time to support these events.

Faith Formation and **Community Service**

Faith formation, community service and fundraising continue to be central to the development of our students' personal identity. Listening to the graduating students, it is profound to hear how strongly they reflect upon the impact of retreats and Service Learning on their formation and in developing their leadership skills. Thanks to Ric Sachse and Adam Whitefield for providing these opportunities.

Special thanks to Julie Pratten for her support and extraordinary commitment to the College.

I am grateful to have had the opportunity to work closely with Frank Ranaldo and Nicole Laube; I admire their leadership as educators and their kindness as individuals.

In closing, thank you to our parents/caregivers for working in partnership with us this year in providing good guidance for your sons.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL -DEAN OF FACULTY (R-12)



Rostrevor has been preparing our students for a life beyond school where they thrive, make active contributions to society and maintain a strong moral compass to empower themselves and others for nearly 100 years. These core values remain as important in the year 2021 as they did when Edmund Rice first started his schools. The methods in how we do this have changed dramatically, particularly as our schools respond, adapt and evolve to the global pandemic.

We are blessed to live and work in a community that values respect, inclusion, rich collaborative interactions, empowerment and human dignity. It is these foundational touchstones that give us a sense of calm and predictability when so much in our world seems uncertain.

Online Learning and Innovation

Our online learning management tool SEQTA and the vast array of podcasts, clips, screencasts, forums and surveys allow us to rapidly evolve to changing situations and allow our students to access a plethora of information rather than simply participate in a traditional classroom setting. Students can access individualised material, they can go back and reread, find new connections or accelerate through concepts as they choose. Our workplaces, society and governments have become highly adaptable, and our schools also need to reflect these skills to equip our boys for our contemporary world.

There have been many educational innovations over the past 20 years but the role of education in the economic, social and political prosperity and stability of our communities has become well understood by the general population. The visibility in our classrooms became seamless through the power of technology and connected learning between school and the wider world.

Edmund Rice created a new vision for learning and education to cater for young people in his community that needed a fresh view. It is our ongoing challenge to chart a vision and work with our Rostrevor students to provide an education that can emerge stronger from this global crisis than ever before.

The SACE and Australian Curriculum have a key focus

on capabilities and our learning programs at Rostrevor are shaped to support and adapt to the learning that takes place beyond our walls, regularly assessing students' skills and tailoring learning opportunities to meet students at their skill level. Our partnership with the University of Melbourne has highlighted the importance of these capabilities.

Contemporary Curriculum

Kerry Hodkinson has expertly led the Heads of Faculty to work with their teams to develop curriculum units that reflect evolving educational practices. Julie Pratten has provided unwavering support in her role as Executive Assistant Teaching and Learning to maintain strong connections between the College and home. Teachers at Rostrevor College have continued to seek new information, learning and networking online with our counterparts in EREA, Catholic Education, SACE and our extended professional networks. Learning is social and we all have the expertise to collaborate.

Literary Focus in the Junior Years

Our Junior Years have focused on giving our boys the emotional literacy to describe themselves as a learner and create greater self-efficacy. These skills are taught in a wide range of subjects and provide the toolkits for the boys to know areas of growth, challenges of learning and plan the next steps to assist in their development.

The teachers plan interactive, open-ended lessons where the boys are actively involved in the learning process and encouraged to question, explore, debate and ponder. These skills are invaluable in problemsolving, risk-taking, self-awareness and actively supporting the growth of all individuals both within our immediate community and, indeed, the wider Mrow

Success is measured in many ways but one of the most obvious and delightful measures of our success at Rostrevor is when visitors to our College speak of the insightful, respectful, inquisitive interactions that they have with our young Rostrevor men. Our students are empowered to learn and use these skills to make a visible difference and we are proud of the ways in which they accept these challenges to develop as strong, capable young men who are aware of their intrinsic gifts yet freely share these to contribute to create a just and inclusive world.

ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL -RELIGIOUS IDENTITY **& MISSION**



The Edmund Rice family is a community that thirsts to know God and longs to work with God in caring for creation and building God's kingdom. Every day a student arrives at Rostrevor College there is the possibility and invitation to experience God through a love that is 'creative and liberating, healing and invigorating'. The purpose of this love is the full flourishing of the child.

Four Touchstones

Much work was done this year viewing and structuring the Student Wellbeing program around the touchstones of Gospel Spirituality, Justice and Solidarity, Inclusive Community and Liberating Education. This will continue to guide and form much of the daily life of the College.

For many of our new students, their first, muchanticipated moment of encounter came with the Welcome Ceremony for the new school year.

This was followed soon after by their Enculturation Day where they experienced firsthand the story telling, sacred places and undying traditions of wearing the red and the black. It was the first year that it was offered for the Year 7s, recognising the increasing numbers and significance of the cohort.

Curriculum

It was another busy and fruitful year for curriculum development. Building on some outstanding Stage 2 results once again, 2021 saw the development of the new Crossways R-12 curriculum. In addition, a new Made in the Image of God Human Sexuality draft curriculum was released. The design of new units in both curriculums gives the Religious Education Faculty the opportunity to address contemporary issues and review pedagogy and content. I would sincerely like to thank all who have contributed to development in these areas with genuine creativity and energy, in particular Adam Whitefield in his role as Head of Religious Education. Further work will continue next year as we transition from the old SACE Stage 1 Religion Studies to a new course: Spiritualities, Religion and Meaning.

Celebrations

While key liturgies again celebrated Edmund Rice Day and Marian Day, the greatest development came

with the Confirmation program moving to a parishbased, school-supported format. A huge emphasis on this diocesan-mandated program is the role of parents and families in the formation sessions leading up the celebration of the sacraments of Reconciliation. Eucharist and Confirmation. While the celebrations themselves are joyous events of faith and family, the depth of preparation and the key roles of parents in that preparation was hugely significant and will continue to add meaning and purpose to these celebrations. Our deepest thanks go to the College, parish and diocesan team that organised and prepared the boys, particularly Lisa Clark whose deep commitment continually sought to bring family, parish, College and faith together in constantly changing circumstances.

Retreats

Another development this year saw the Years 11 and 12 retreats offered in a different format. Both year levels enjoyed the three-day retreats at a range of venues during Week 10 of Term 1, with each venue hosting two Houses. The retreats offer students significant moments for reflection and fellowship at key times in their formation of young men of depth and character.

The Year 10 Youth Ministry students again offered Confirmation retreats in neighbouring parishes as well as for the Rostrevor students who received the sacrament in Term 3.

The Year 11 Youth Ministry classes hosted the Survivorthemed retreat for the Year 8 cohort. The retreat explores relationship dynamics, how we understand friendship and God's desire for all to have thriving relationships through Gospel-centred values and Jesus' own gift of friendship.

Our Year 9 cohort were the only COVID-19 casualty this year with unfortunate timing being early in Term 3.
















Key moments of encounter continued late in Term 2 when our Service Learning program was restored after last year's COVID-19 cancellation. Adam Whitefield and Amanda Harfield worked tirelessly to meet all the safeguards and compliance which allowed our young men four days of community service, ministering to, and being part of, our broader community, especially those who experience isolation and disadvantage in one or more of its many forms. Coming face to face with the vulnerabilities and challenges of ageing or supporting disadvantaged learners in local schools were some of their experiences.

To complement the Service Learning program, an enormous range of activities was offered by the Social Justice Group throughout the year. Many of the Prefect group gain memorable experiences from their roles as mentors on the Edmund Rice Camps, which held a holiday experience for disadvantage youth who may have never experienced a holiday before. In recent years, the Social Justice Group has embodied the Pope's call to care for the marginalised in our society and for the Earth itself. Never has the need been greater or the cause more relevant. It's little surprise that so many of our College leaders emerge from this group.

As I pause for a moment to consider the entirety of the year, I am drawn to an appreciation of the great generosity of so many in the planning and participation of numerous transformational 'encounters'. I know of many instances when both staff and students, particularly our student leadership group this year, have disadvantaged themselves and perhaps their own personal goals in preference for opportunities of service to their College and broader community. The students' desire to live as Men for Others has been sacrificial and sustained.

DIRECTOR -STUDENT WELLBEING (JUNIOR YEARS)



As a new member of staff at Rostrevor, the Welcome Ceremony in the Valley on the first day of the school year was such a settling, welcoming celebration of new beginnings. The highlight of the ceremony for me was watching the Reception boys wave to the Year 12 boys across the Valley, acknowledging the journey that Rostrevor boys embark on in a connected community.

The Welcome Ceremony also provides a positive environment for new students and staff. In 2021, the Junior Years welcomed a number of new students across all year levels and also four new staff including Victoria Romeo (Year 1), Ellen Daniels (Year 3), Rosemarie Cavaleri (Italian) and myself.

Year 6 Leaders

Meeting regularly with the Year 6 leaders has been an enjoyable experience, with discussions around Assembly, lunchtime activities, behaviour policy review and ways to communicate with the community being a focus. The Year 6 leaders for 2021 were Oscar Crafter (Junior Captain), Miles Fotheringham (Junior

Vice-Captain), Jack Isaac (Barron House Captain), Zack Faraonio (Egan House Captain), Thomas Hancock (Gurr House Captain), Joe Kernahan (Murphy House Captain), Luca Condina (O'Brien House Captain), Marcus Hopgood (Webb House Captain), Riley Holling (Music Captain) and Konstantinos Valakos (Music Vice-Captain). We started the year determining some areas of focus, discussing the roles as leaders being like members of parliament, and, as a result, we determined areas of focus for each of the leaders to support any Junior Years initiatives. These areas of focus included community, sport, environment, spirituality, music and learning.

The first item on the student leadership agenda was

discussing ways to enhance the Junior Years learning community. It was decided that the format for Junior Years Assemblies would change and they would be hosted by a year level that would introduce Assembly items and invite classes to share their learning. COVID-19restrictions meant that, unfortunately, parents could not attend Assembly and so the Year 6 leaders rostered themselves to write a recount about Assemblies to include the community. This demonstrated commitment and true leadership by the boys.

At one meeting, we determined the need for a new flag as we had been informed that the Australian flag being used in the Junior Years had been repaired numerous times. Miles Fotheringham and Oscar Crafter contacted our local Federal Member for Sturt, James Stevens MP, who attended an Assembly to present Rostrevor Junior Years with new Australian, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander flags.

It was also arranged for a couple of music performances to occur at Assembly. This was fantastic and added another interesting element to our Assemblies, while also providing both Years 3 and 5 students the opportunity to perform in front of an audience, demonstrating their learning in Music.

Lunchtime Clubs

To support boys to have more options in the yard at playtimes, lunchtime clubs were developed. These clubs included Soccer Club, Chess Club and Stop Motion Club and were supported by both Year 6 leaders and student volunteers from the Middle Years and Senior Years.

The Year 6 leaders have demonstrated enthusiasm and positive leadership throughout the year, and it has been great to see them develop their leadership skills.

The Junior Years were fortunate enough to watch two performances this year to support the College's commitment to wellbeing, one being The Hunchback of Notre Dame. With a focus on inclusivity, the play engaged the boys through jokes, music and drama. At the end of the play, there was an opportunity to ask questions of the actors and some well-considered questions were asked. The performance fit well with the Harmony Day activity that all students completed and enabled further conversations about bullying to occur during Junior Years Assemblies.

Sports Day and Swimming Carnival

Team spirit has been demonstrated throughout the year in a number of events including the Swimming Carnival, Cross Country and Sports Day. On each of these days, the boys worked well in their teams and showed bravery to participate. Even if the events were not their

preference or strength, they gave it a go and focused on doing their best. Barron House had a successful year, winning both the Swimming Carnival and Sports Day.

DIRECTOR -STUDENT WELLBEING (MIDDLE YEARS)



In many ways, this year started as 2020 concluded - with uncertainty about the ongoing pandemic and how that would affect the wellbeing and general day-to-day life of our students. Time would show that the resilience shown by all our students and their adaptability to the new 'normal' of face masks, lockdowns and social distancing would be a real strength and a quality of which they could feel very proud.

Largest Year 7 Intake in Recent Years

Our Year 7 intake at the start of the year was the largest in recent history, with 112 boys joining the hustle and bustle that is the Middle Years. This included 80 students who stepped foot on the grounds of Rostrevor College for the first time. It was clear from the Transition Day and the Orientation Day that our new students would add to the energy and vibrance of the Rostrevor College community.

Middle Years Camps

The Middle Years Camps program, under the guidance on Mark Roberts, took place in Week 2 of Term 1 and immediately allowed our Years 7 and 8 students to develop friendships with other students, learn new skills, particularly being independent, and, importantly, become educated about environmental aspects as they camped in and explored the scenic areas of Hindmarsh Island, Morialta Conservation Park, Port Noarlunga and the vast expanses of Middleton beach. The relationships formed between staff and students in these early weeks also cannot be understated, and many staff returned from the camps with a greater appreciation and understanding of the students they teach. The memories that students bring home from camps are the topic of conversations for many years to come, well and truly after they have left the College.

Student Wellbeing

One of the foci this year was to develop a new Wellbeing Framework that will aid in the oversight of the growth and development of all students across all year levels. This project encompasses modern day pedagogy and will allow boys to explore programs that are closely linked to the EREA touchstones of Gospel Spirituality, Justice and Solidarity, Inclusive



Community and Liberating Education. A selection of students from the Middle Years were invited to be a part of this process to outline what they consider to be strengths of the College when it comes to wellbeing and ways we can improve moving forward.

Our Pastoral Care program had a number of highlights throughout the year including Harmony Day where we recognised and celebrated the rich cultural diversity we see day in and day out at the College. At the same time, we also stopped to acknowledge other significant occasions such as Close the Gap and the National Day of Action Against Bullying and Violence.

Guiding Teenage Boys

Rostrevor College has had a longstanding connection with a number of external providers who frequently come into the College. These include Brainstorm Productions who performed about the dangers

of social media. On a similar theme, we welcomed The Carly Ryan Foundation to the College in Term 2 for the first time. Their presentation took an alternate method where being safe online was the primary focus, rather than discouraging students to use social media platforms. Empowering students to make the correct decisions has historically proven to be a much more effective way of helping raise the wellbeing levels of students. Similarly, Life Education came into the College and delivered sessions to our Year 8s on Smoking/Vaping, to our Year 9s on Alcohol and Safe Partying and a unique session to our Year 7 cohort in small groups which looked at Respectful Relationships.

Building Confidence and Reslience

Resilience is spoken about at length when it comes to boys it the Middle Years. South Australian teacher, counsellor, author and public speaker Mark Le Messurier ran a parent session in Term 1 where he outlined the importance of resilience, but also that it is not a quality that people are born with, rather it develops through experiencing challenging situations in life. Our Resilient Kicks program, run by qualified counsellor and Old Scholar

Peter Terminello ('13), allows boys to engage in physical activity in a non-competitive environment and develop self-regulation, social skills and coping strategies, all of which will go towards improving resilience. The boys who took part in these sessions on a Friday morning all saw improvements in their friendships, physical fitness and, importantly, their overall wellbeing and resilience.

Academic Success

One of our four pillars at the College is Academics. This is an area where the College continues to grow. A special congratulations to O'Brien House for winning the Academic Shield, however it must be noted that Grade Point Average (GPA) scores across the board for all students are increasing over the years. While there were some excellent results from many individuals across the Middle Years, what was especially pleasing was the strive for excellence from so many students who were simply not satisfied with being satisfactory.

Caring Staff

My role is made much easier with the help and support of the wonderful Pastoral Care teachers and teaching staff who spend countless hours across the week meeting with students, talking to them and showing an interest in what they are up to. This is wellbeing at its core developing relationships - and we are so very fortunate at Rostrevor College to have such an inspiring and caring staff who go above and beyond for our boys.

To the Heads of House in Matthew Footner (Barron), Tom Hodkinson (Egan), Elias Degeorge (Gurr), Marnie Tiggemann (Murphy), Lee-Anne Genner (O'Brien) and Belinda DeConno-Coward (Webb), your support throughout the year has been unwavering. The time you spend nurturing our boys and delivering positive messages shows your strength as leaders. Finally, to my Student Wellbeing (Senior Years) colleague, Evan Pezos, and to our Deputy Principal (Dean of Students), Mark Simpson, I continue to learn from you both and our daily interactions and discussions on how we can better serve the needs of our boys are what makes this role so enjoyable. I look forward to 2022 with less face masks, lockdowns and home learning!

DIRECTOR -STUDENT WELLBEING (SENIOR YEARS)



The four guiding principles at Rostrevor College - Gospel Spirituality, Justice and Solidarity, Inclusive Community and Liberating Education – help foster sound teacher-student relationships which are the foundation on which the social, emotional, personal and moral aspects of a student's overall development will flourish.

The building of meaningful relationships, against a background of our teachers' care and support, creates an ethos in which students' self-confidence and selfacceptance flourish. In this way, the students' progress towards being Men for Others is likely to be enhanced. Contemporary research suggests that Pastoral Care has taken on a more inclusive function, one that is indistinguishably linked with teaching and learning and the school's structural organisation - promoting students' personal and social development and helping develop positive attitudes. This is achieved through the quality of teaching and learning; through the nature of relationships amongst students, teachers and other trusted adults; through structures and processes for monitoring students' overall progress (academic, personal and social); through specific pastoral and support systems; and through extra-curricular activities.

Consequently, Rostrevor, through the quality of care and support which it affords its students, places relationship building at the very heart of its Pastoral Care provision. Opportunities are sought both in formal and informal school settings to initiate and nurture sound and durable bonds between teacher and student. Underpinning the rationale is the emphasis placed on the enduring role of the Pastoral Care teacher and the student's Head of House. This 'wraparound' approach to wellbeing encourages students, staff and families to recognise how much they can contribute to a positive, safe and supportive school culture. Subsequently, I would like to take this opportunity to thank our wonderful staff for their concerted efforts and dedication to the wellbeing of our boys.

Rostrevor's Counselling Team

In addition to our Pastoral Care team, Rostrevor has added a third member to its counselling team with

the arrival of Leah Schultz, complementing the great work already done in this area by Karolina Pasierbek and Adrian Terminello. In doing so, Rostrevor has recognised the importance of staff capacity and resources which are needed to effectively align and integrate the outcomes of a Pastoral Care review into the College's vision and Strategic Plan.


Rostrevor regularly reviews its Pastoral Care policies and practices to help the College community to systematically assess our Pastoral Care resources, strengths, needs, threats and opportunities. In 2021, as part of our Strategic Priorities plan, we are pleased to announce that we have:

- developed a Wellbeing Framework
- · commenced an audit of our Child Protection curriculum
- reviewed and subsequently rewritten the Student Code of Conduct
- initiated a review of Pastoral Care initiatives.

The vertically structured Pastoral Care system, made up of six Houses with five Pastoral Care classes consisting of students from Years 7-12, continued to provide great support to our students. They made strong connections with others by involving themselves in House-based, service and Co-Curricular activities. Furthermore, extended Pastoral Care was an opportunity for students to participate, be exposed, watch and prepare for multiple wellbeing initiatives. One such school-wide occasion that promotes the integration and assimilation of boys across the campus is the combined Harmony Day, Say No To Bullying and Close the Gap initiative. On this day, our Junior Years boys are thrilled with the opportunity to 'mix it' with the big boys while, at the same time, our Senior Years boys thrive given the chance to showcase good role modelling, offering support, counsel and friendship.

While Pastoral Care occurs on a daily basis with every student/staff interaction, its simply not possible to make reference to all wellbeing offerings. Among many others, the following are examples of initiatives within our Pastoral Care system fostered at the College in 2021.

Year 12 - Prefects Focus on Men's Mental Health & Blue Week

On average, one in eight men will experience depression and one in five will experience anxiety at some stage of their lives. With this in mind, the College, through the Prefect body, engaged in a series of educational and promotional activities during Blue Week, designed with the intention of removing the stigma of men's mental health within an allboys school setting.

After a whole school Assembly, all students broke off into House groups and engaged in an activity acknowledging and writing down their support network, made up of anywhere

between 1-5 individuals, groups of individuals or organisations which they feel comfortable to reach out to.

Years 10 & 11 - Prevent Alcohol and Risk-Related Trauma in Youth Program

In 2015, the College was asked to participate in an innovative pilot program. Not only did we accept at the time, but we have since enrolled up to 40 students per year in the one-day program. Aimed at Years 10, 11 and 12, the P.A.R.T.Y. (Prevent Alcohol & Risk-Related Trauma in Youth) Program is a fullday hospital-based program (due to COVID-19 it was held at Rostrevor this year) which provides information about trauma, with the aim of giving young people the skills to recognise potential injury-producing situations and make better choices to minimise their risk of being involved in a trauma situation. P.A.R.T.Y provides an opportunity for students to visit restricted trauma areas within the

Royal Adelaide Hospital and learn about the consequences of preventable traumatic injuries through meeting young trauma survivors.

Year 10 - Save A Life - Road Awareness **Program**

A relatively new addition to the Year 10 Pastoral Care program has been the Save A Life - Road Awareness Program. This presentation was aimed at Year 10 students because they will either be on their learner's permit or are close to getting it by the end of the year. The cohort responded well to the message and especially the use of a virtual reality educational driving simulator that is connected to a real car. The student presentation was preceded by an online parent presentation the night before, highlighting the three-way partnership between Rostrevor, students and their families.

DIRECTOR -**TEACHING AND LEARNING**



This year was another year during which we celebrated so many exciting success stories, and the aptly named Year of Empowerment was something our students and staff clearly embodied. It was a year that required flexibility and resilience, and the Class of 2021 was certainly aptly rewarded for their efforts.

'You can, you should, and if you're brave enough to start, you will.' This quote by popular author Stephen King seems applicable to our boys this year more than any other. They had already experienced disruptions throughout 2020, and the uncertainty surrounding events in 2021 required a degree of bravery and pragmatism, for which our Rostrevor community is so well renowned.

SACE Results Summary

The results obtained by the Class of 2021 are an accurate reflection of the persistence, diligence and academic deftness of the young gentlemen who formed the cohort. Whilst celebrating the easily quantifiable outstanding results, such as ATARs above 90, Merit scores and A grades, it is prudent to note the numerous success stories not captured in these illustrious numbers. So many of our students exceeded their own expectations whether by attaining their SACE, achieving their highest individual GPA or continuing to show up to

a subject which they found challenging. The Class of 2021 consisted of a diverse group of young men who continually supported each other to 'show up.' They were led admirably by Manish Augustine and Alastair Lord who achieved brilliant results whilst balancing numerous competing priorities. Manish Augustine's commitment to disadvantaged and marginalised youth saw him awarded a Governor's Commendation in December.

100% SACE Completion

There are too many individual success stories to detail here, yet, in the face of significant adversity, all students rallied in a collaborative fashion and approached their final year with a genuine sense of practicality. We were thrilled that 100 per cent of our Year 12 students achieved their SACE, completing the various requirements including successful attainment of 200 SACE credits and C- or higher grades in English, Mathematics, Research Project and Personal Learning Plan (PLP).

Of the eligible cohort, 13.3% achieved an ATAR above 95. Twenty-seven students received an ATAR of 90 or more (25.7% of the eligible Year 12 cohort cf. 24% in 2020, 23.1% in 2019 and 26% in 2018). This is an outstanding achievement and offers great confidence to those in lower year levels who aspire to such academic excellence. Furthermore, 38% achieved an ATAR above 80.

Additionally, 83% of all grades were in the A or B band which is well above the state average (cf. 78% in 2020). These statistics suggest our student-centred subject selection and counselling processes are working successfully to support students to study courses which not only suit their personal strengths and abilities, but ones which they enjoy and will thrive in.

Academic Excellence

Sincere congratulations to Dux Jordan Zorzi (99.85) and Proxime Accessit Jack Basso (99.4). Having personally taught both students during 2020, I can attest to their inquiring minds, their commitment to their studies, their superior intellect and also their unequivocally humble and kind natures. Their successes in 2021 extend beyond the classroom, with both students contributing extensively through the Co-Curricular program, to the Music Department and in various leadership roles during their 13 years at the College.

In 2021, a total of 29 Merits were attained (cf. 29 in 2020, 31 in 2019, 26 in 2018, 18 in 2017 and 15 in 2016). An additional 46 A+ grades were attained (without Merit cf. 26 in 2020) which is simply incredible. Merits were achieved in a wide range of faculty areas - Flexible Learning (Research Project), English (English and Essential English), Science (Chemistry and Physics), Health and PE (Physical Education), Mathematics (General Mathematics and Mathematical Methods), Technology (Industry and Entrepreneurial Solutions and Digital Technologies), Arts (Music Performance Solo and Music Performance Ensemble), Humanities (Business Innovation) and Religious Education (Integrated Learning 10 and 20 credits). The varied subjects in which our students demonstrate excellence is certainly reflective of the diversity of our cohort and the teacher expertise possessed in a range of areas.

Learner Profile Project

The key focus of our work on the crosssectorial Learner Profile Project culminated in a presentation at the National Wine Centre of Australia in November 2021, quantifying the demonstration of the critical and creative thinking capability as part of the Australian Curriculum's General Capabilities SACE Thrive Projects. Our students spoke eloquently about their learning and how

different pedagogical approaches supported their learning. Many thanks to the students in Tom Hodkinson's Year 11 Pre-English Literary Studies class for their assistance with this.

Faculty Council

Many thanks to our middle leaders, Heads of Faculty, who form Faculty Council. They have demonstrated great support of the teachers in their faculties, which subsequently leads to improved student outcomes for our boys. We have a few new faces joining Faculty Council in 2022, and we thank the departing members for their valuable contributions over a number of years. Thank you also to Julie Pratten and Nicole Laube for their collaborative work in supporting Teaching and Learning at Rostrevor

Finally, thank you to all the members of our Rostrevor community for your continued optimism, trust and support as we conclude another year which has been somewhat hampered by disruptions. The inherent pragmatism associated with working at an all-boys College is one of the things which I cherish most about working at Rostrevor, with the students consistently demonstrating an air of confidence, calmness and clarity.

This year has been a great year of growth and development, but it has not been without its difficulties.

The snap lockdown at the start of Term 3 saw a short-notice return to online learning for our students. While this situation was difficult for many in our community, returning home meant returning somewhere significantly further away from the College for many of our First Nations students. As many of our First Nations students come from the Northern Territory, returning home also meant a short quarantine in a medi-hotel before being able to stay with their families. Despite the bumps in the road in 2021, these young men continue to demonstrate their resilience and determination and met the challenges head on. I would especially like to acknowledge Geoff Aufderheide's guidance and support throughout the year during his time away from the College working at Catholic Education

South Australia (CESA). Without his existing program in place, none of what happened this year would have been possible, and the College looks forward to his return in 2022.

Welcome to our New Students

Four new First Nations students were welcomed into the College community throughout 2021. The new students hail from various places, from remote areas of the Northern Territory to South Australia's west coast. While living away from home presents a number of difficulties for any student, for our First Nations students, moving away from their country presents another layer to the challenges. However, at Rostrevor, we are fortunate to have a tight knit and overwhelmingly supportive group of First Nations

Reconciliation Week

The highlight of the week's events was a Reconciliation dinner for the boarders, organised by the College's First Nations students. Each student played an instrumental role in the organisation and running of the event which was keynoted by the wellrespected Ngarrindjeri elder Major 'Moogy' Sumner AM. Major Sumner is a world renown performer and cultural ambassador and provided powerful insight into his rich and varied life experiences in a lifetime seeking reconciliation.

Further highlights include the annual Mabo Day football match. It was a hard-fought affair with the Gurrumul Goannas just narrowly beating the Lingiari Lizards. Both teams were cheered on by the spectators and the match was accompanied by a fundraising barbecue which even included some kangaroo sausages.



While there was much fun and celebration during the week, there was also some class time during the week dedicated to learning more about reconciliation. In the Junior Years, students were helped by our senior First Nations students in designing and displaying linked hands decorated with Indigenous inspired art. In the Senior Years, each Pastoral Care class participated in a lesson inspired by

Rostrevor Old Collegian Paul Kelly ('71) and his song From Little Things Big Things Grow, which told the story of Vincent Lingiari and the events of the Wave Hill walk-off. The lesson culminated in each class making a poster reflecting on the values of meaningful reconciliation. These posters were then displayed in the Equity Hub.













Student Achievement

While all our First Nations students have enjoyed degrees of success throughout 2021, special mention needs to be made to our students who have shown their excellence. Tristan Hunter's work as Social Justice Captain has contributed not only to the College community, but to the community at large throughout the year. Ray-Keam Kells had an exceptional 2021. Firstly, Ray-Keam Kells was voted by his First Nations peers to be the inaugural Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Vice-Captain, a role that provides cultural support and leadership to all of our First Nations students. For his efforts and leadership during the overwhelmingly successful planning and running of the College's Reconciliation Night dinner, Ray-Keam Kells was awarded the Campbelltown City Council

2021 NAIDOC Youth Achievement Award. Ray-Keam Kells was presented this award at the Campbelltown City Council Chambers where he was given a commemorative plaque and \$500!

Graduating Class of 2021

COORDINATOR -SOCIAL JUSTICE



In the Year of Empowerment, a key focus of the Social Justice Group was empowering the next generation of Social Justice leaders.

Despite COVID-19 impacting some of our planned activities, 2021 was highly productive from a Social Justice perspective. Every Wednesday lunchtime, the Social Justice Group met to discuss the issues of the day and plan for upcoming campaigns. Meetings always began with a student-led reflection and covered a range of themes including media analysis, gardening, respectful relationships, political climate action and the prevalence of online sports betting.

Deep-Diving into Justice - Year 8

The Year 8 Social Justice unit in Religious Education is the first real insight our students get into foundational concepts such as Charity vs. Justice, the See/Judge/Act methodology and Catholic Social Teachings. Students are grounded in the idea that justice is about respecting and celebrating the dignity and worth of others and our Earth. These themes are then reinforced throughout the Religious Education curriculum from Years 7-12, and this provides a parallel understanding of why our student Social Justice Group sacrifice so much of their time for this important work.

Junior Years Activity Day

With the Prefects' Year of Empowerment in mind, the focus in Term 1 was the planning and delivery of a Junior Years Social Justice Activity Day with the Year 4 cohort. Supported by the Rotary Club of Morialta and led entirely by 25 student Social Justice leaders, the theme was 'Men for Others who Care for Creation.' A key aim was to inspire and empower the next generation of Social Justice leaders to take action in their homes and community. The day included a range of activities, from small group sessions and games to recycle relays, nature walks and tree planting. This peer-to-peer approach has become important at Rostrevor, and our Social Justice leaders walked away fulfilled, knowing they had, in the words

of Edmund Rice, planted 'the good seed' in the hearts and minds of our younger boys.

ERA for Change

Represented superbly by Year 12 student Alessio Masullo, Rostrevor was engaged in a number of national 'Edmund Rice Advocacy (ERA) for Change' initiatives in 2021. The online 'Launch Day' in March involved 20 of our boys participating in a day of online workshops and guest speakers - all centred around the theme 'How to be a Changemaker.' In September, students participated in the '28 Days for Climate' campaign which involved daily notices, the production of a video that was published on the national Facebook page and an online Zoom call

with the Honourable Chris Bowen MP, Shadow Minister for Climate Change and Energy, to discuss the Australian Labor Party's climate policies.

Detention for Detention

In support of Refugee Week at the end of Term 2, the Social Justice Group planned a silent vigil and lunchtime performance in the Valley. The vigil was in response to Australia's cruel and ongoing indefinite offshore detention regime. The action involved daily stories in the morning notices, as well as the signing of a petition which calls 'Game Over' (https://www.amnesty.org.au/ gameover/) on this dark chapter in Australian history. As it stands, there are still 233 men trapped in Papua New Guinea and Nauru.

Partnership with St Vincent de Paul

Rostrevor values its partnership with St Vincent de Paul Society immensely. This year, our students led the annual Lighten the Load campaign in Term 2 and filled around 10 blue bins with quality second-hand items. We were fortunate to cook two barbecue lunches at the Vinnies Men's Crisis Centre before it was sadly closed in June. Chatting with these men experiencing homelessness is always a powerful experience for our boys. In early Term 2, Umes Acharya from Vinnies came in to speak with us about some of the issues that have emerged in the community due to COVID-19, and a few weeks later we had five of our Year 11 students accompany Umes Acharya to Parliament House

to speak with some MPs and assist at the Mercy House of Welcome in Kilburn.

Maintaining Connections with India

Despite not being able to offer our biennial Indian Pilgrimage or Red & Black Discos this year due to COVID-19, it has been important

to stay connected with our friends at MITHRA (rehabilitation centre) and the Reverend Brother Patrick Foundation (RBPF). Both were hit incredibly hard by COVID-19 and have expressed gratitude knowing Rostrevor has not forgotten about them. A video call with the Sisters at MITHRA in August was really wonderful, not to mention special, seeing the children's smiling faces. We are also in continuous dialogue with the RBPF who send regular reports and photos. Rostrevor stands in solidarity with all our brothers and sisters in India at this time.

Service Learning experiences are a fundamental component of our Catholic Identity and faith formation offering for our students. Along with the Indian Pilgrimage and Edmund Rice Camps, the Year 11 Service Learning program is a fundamental component of a young Rostrevor man's spiritual and educational journey.

The Year 11 Service Learning Program

Every year as part of the SACE Stage 1 Religion Studies course, our students have the opportunity to participate in a form of service, giving practical application to their studies of Christianity and living out the Rostrevor College Men for Others philosophy. This deepens a critical awareness of the values of Presence, Compassion and Liberation – values that are at the heart of a Catholic School in the Edmund Rice Tradition. Despite COVID-19's best efforts, we were incredibly grateful to be able to deliver the program in 2021.

In the final week of Term 2, we had around 120 Year 11 students venture off to a range of community placements around the country. After months of preparation and more compliance requirements than ever before, our boys were ready to go. No doubt, as they set off on that first day, there were feelings of trepidation and excitement, and plenty of butterflies. Little did they know it at the time but, once they got through those awkward first few moments, the experience would be significant.

From Coolalinga to Campbelltown, Trinity Gardens to Tumby Bay, Naracoorte to Newton and Port Lincoln to Paradise, there was a genuine diversity of experiences and locations on offer. Many of our boarders went home and volunteered at their old primary schools. Here in Adelaide, a majority of students volunteered in various residential aged care facilities.

Whether it was playing bingo with elderly residents at Bene Aged Care, surviving four days of childcare at Stepping Stone, singing songs on an Edmund Rice Camp, cooking hot meals at the Hutt St Centre, reconnecting with staff and students at St Joseph's School Hectorville, delivering Meals on Wheels in the hills, providing classroom support to children with disabilities at Adelaide East Education Centre and





Trinity Gardens School, assisting our boys in the Junior Years, running English classes for refugee adults or even attending Parliament House to chat with our MPs - our boys had no idea what they were getting themselves into!

The Rostrevor Young Men Impress!

I had the pleasure of visiting a number of students during the week and was so proud at the way each student was engaging with the residents, children and staff. Students were showing their initiative, listening and following instructions. Every single piece

















of feedback I received – whether it be during or post-placement - was overwhelmingly positive. This is important because it demonstrates a level of maturity our boys have developed over time. It also ensures the Rostrevor name remains strong in the community, especially for a program which relies on many wonderful community partnerships.

When the students returned in Term 3, various class debriefs took place and the boys were required to present a reflection on their experience. Students really enjoyed sharing their stories and hearing about the diversity of experiences from their peers. This element added such a richness to the program and was an important way of helping to bring the experience to a sense of completion.

For many of our boys, this was their very first taste of what it truly means to be Men for Others. For some, this was the first opportunity they had had to give everything of themselves for multiple hours a day and not necessarily to receive anything financial or tangible in return. As Jesus and Edmund Rice modelled, it is in serving others that we truly experience the existence of the Holy Spirit. Our boys were humbled. They saw the face of God in those they served and worked alongside. They found happiness. Some of them even discovered their calling.

What a privilege it is to be able to facilitate such an experience.

Edmund Rice Camps

The Edmund Rice Camp experience continues to be one of the most transformative offerings we provide our students. This year, Manish Augustine, Darcy Holmes, Tristan Hunter and Booth Cassidy all sacrificed their holidays to serve on a camp and represented the College with pride. In addition, Luke Signorello, JoaoPaulo D'Assumpcao and next year's Social Justice Prefect Wyatt Pisani also participated in a camp as part of their Service Learning program and will no doubt use their experience as a guide for their own leadership in 2022.

Acknowledgements

Finally, I would like to thank Amanda Harfield who was an incredible support for myself and our boys in helping them get to their placements. This year, our compliance requirements effectively doubled, and Amanda Harfield spent hours fielding phone calls and trawling through paperwork. The program simply would not have happened without her support. I am also grateful to the community service providers who agreed to take our boys and ensured they were safe and well supported.

We cannot wait to do it all again in 2022.

COORDINATOR -INCLUSIVE EDUCATION



A key touchstone of Edmund Rice Education - Inclusion - is woven within each of the College's classrooms and faculties and is evident throughout these pages. Inclusive Education is when all students, regardless of any support needs they might have, are placed in mainstream classes.

They receive high-quality instruction, intervention and adjustments that enable them to experience success with the curriculum. At Rostrevor College, each student is considered on an individual basis to ensure best practice is implemented so that all students can effectively access school life and flourish.

Support for All

This year, just over 20 per cent of our boys at Rostrevor College required support to access learning on the same basis as their peers. For some of these students, they achieved success with quality differentiated teaching practices. For others, they required a substantially modified and personalised approach to their learning to achieve their individual learning goals such as gaining a Modified SACE.

The Inclusive Education program at Rostrevor College caters primarily for students with learning difficulties

and students with additional support needs. We provide a holistic approach to supporting the students where there is a clear collaborative partnership between the class teacher. Inclusive Education team, allied health professionals and parents/carers. This collective responsibility is recorded on our Personalised Plan for Learning, and a key feature of this documentation is student agency. An area of growth within this documentation framework in 2021 has been student voice and family consultation. Students continue to be supported to express their views, make decisions and set goals on their personalised learning journey. Self-advocacy is valued and developed, with students continuously participating in decisions that affect their education at Rostrevor College.

Brickfield House

Situated in the centre of the College, along the heritage trail, is Brickfield House. Brickfield House

is a welcoming place where we celebrate each person. In Brickfield House, the Inclusive Education team support learning, emotional regulation and personal growth. Surrounded by the Br Coughlin Sustainable Garden, Brickfield House is the home of our targeted intervention programs. In addition, it provides a breakout space for individuals and small groups throughout the day.

Inclusive Education at Rostrevor College - Our Team

Rostrevor College is blessed with dedicated and highly experienced Education Support Officers. The Inclusive Education team supports students with physical, cognitive, sensory and social/ emotional disabilities or identified difficulties across all three tiers of intervention as described in the Response to Intervention Model.

The diverse talents and skills of the Inclusive Education team assist academic staff to provide support to students in their classrooms in Tier 1 situations. Tier 2 small group targeted support is facilitated through research-based intervention programs such as MiniLit and MacqLit. In collaboration with the subject teacher, the Inclusive Education team provides intensive and extensive individualised Tier 3 support to students in a 1:1 or 2:1 setting.

In response to student need, the Inclusive Education team grew in 2021. During this time, we welcomed an Old Scholar and preschool educator, a pre-service teacher and an Education Support Officer who recently completed their



intensive learning placement at Rostrevor College.

Professional Development

Old Scholar Bruno Cocca ('10) presented to the Inclusive Education team at the end of Term 2. Bruno Cocca, an Educational Facilitator at Autism SA, imparted his knowledge of current research-based interventions to the Inclusive Education team. During the workshop, Bruno Cocca covered the impact that executive functioning and sensory processing has on students with autism spectrum disorder. His

hands-on strategies have been successfully implemented by our team in the classroom and Brickfield House.

On a personal note, I would like to thank the Rostrevor College community for their warm welcome during 2021. I am truly blessed to be working within an inclusive community and look forward to watching each boy reach his potential with the right support strategies in place.

Ray-Keam Kells was awarded the Campbelltown City Council 2021 NAIDOC Youth Achievement Award for his contribution to the community, and this Purton demonstrates his commitment to ensuring that young Indigenous voices are heard. Below are the introduction and conclusion of his Purton Oratory, which

he delivered as a personal letter to his audience.

Dear white people,

There's something that I would like to do. Just for a moment, I would like to place you in the shoes that I wear, which are the same shoes that many other people of colour wear. I want to reverse the roles, the roles of history, the roles of discrimination, oppression and of systematic racism. Now $\ensuremath{\mathrm{I}}$ know this might scare you or make you slightly uncomfortable, the thought of being oppressed or being in the crosshairs of racism is chilling. Believe me, I would know. To be honest, I don't really care. I want you to feel uncomfortable and you should feel uncomfortable with the bitter truths I am going to expose. But you have no need to worry because it will only be for a couple of minutes, incomparable to what myself, my loved ones, and those who are dear to me in my community have had to endure for the entirety of our lives. So, let us collectively take a breath before I begin. I am not a person who is filled with hate, I had to dive down deep into my emotions to be able to write these words. This was difficult to write and speak. I am one of the first nations people, I am a proud Adnyamathanha (uj-i-mut-na), Arabana and Waka Waka man. I live with the terrifying reality that 'I could be killed for being black' but I don't want to live with that reality for the rest of my life. But I can't change it alone. We need to do this together, as one. But we need to start with realisation and acknowledgement of the problem known as discrimination and racism. Acknowledgement

creates understanding, understanding creates unity, unity creates strength, strength creates power and power creates action and change. A change we need to start now so that the future generation won't be forced to live with hate, with prejudice. If Martin Luther King Jnr. was right when he said, 'The ultimate measure of a man is not where he stands in moments of comfort and convenience, but where he stands at times of challenge and controversy', then the question becomes, where will you stand? Ridheypreet Grover was awarded The Owen Sheppeard Memorial Award for Writing, which celebrates creativity and excellence in writing, for this piece of work at Presentation Night this year.

The essence of pleasure rests in the palm of my hand. I imagine the euphoric sensation

surging through every fragment of my being, a tingling ecstasy to enliven my vapid, colourless soul, to extinguish the fire of dread. For thirty seconds, I could live. The strangling silence of the white-walled room is futile in quelling my seething desire. Nothing external could. I know where I am, but I don't care. I committed a crime, an action that offended the state. The man in the long white coat outstretches his arm, offering a glass of water. I meet his eyes, the shade of a metallic rust, emotionless yet still weighted. I take the water. I can still hear the impulsive hustle of the outside world, a meaningless hive of activity, like insects sprawling and searching. I am one of those insects. Even though I can't see it, I can picture it perfectly in my mind. Bodies pressed together, sharing breath. Men in suits glancing at their watches and attempting to weave through an ocean of humanity, always failing. The destitute and addicted discarded in gutters, like skeletal figures, trampled and overlooked, begging for more Life Recuperation Packs. They have not yet reached the decommissioning age. Shouts of anger and frustration. Aggressive shoves and explicit slurs. A backdrop of millions of minuscule homes, lining the horizon, arranged in rows and columns. Each shares a wall with its neighbour. My own home isn't too far from here. It has two rooms and a toilet: a coffin.

'Do you know what you have done?' The voice pierces my thoughts. I stare at the pill, rolling it between my thumb and index finger. 'Illegally sheltering a senior is a class 3 crime.'

Them finding my mother was inevitable. We were just playing with time, savouring those final few moments of sanctuary. Nevertheless, I endeavoured to keep her hidden from the authorities, and yet the thought of her decommissioning lingered, an ever-growing shadow. I knew it wouldn't be

long before we were discovered. My mother was a kind woman, striving to re-ignite the flames of our dying society, her efforts in vain. But on that day, her time came to an end. Her value as a human had been exterminated, a noble sacrifice to gratify the influx of the new generation. A life for a life. 'It is the only solution,' they claimed. It had only been a week since her 70th birthday, and I had managed to deactivate the tracker that was embedded into her left forearm, an electronic stamp that marked the date of expiration for a decaying member of society - an alert of sorts. Each night we would sleep unsettled, anxious of destiny finally catching up. Then it happened. I remember the last time I saw my mother's face. It was so gentle, the wrinkles of time slowly sweeping across her soft skin, yet the sadness in her eyes was unmissable; a longing for more time, for peace. As the guards with armoured rifles dragged her across the carpet, gripping her hair that still had strands of gold and auburn amongst the frosty grey, I stood there, powerless.

'We are on the verge of a global crisis.' The voice is angrier now. 'And people like you that cannot adhere to the rules will not be tolerated.'

I examine the pill once again. It's identical to the one in the Life Recuperation Packs that are delivered weekly. The anaesthetic to despair provided as rations by the state. I take one every morning. We all do. It makes me feel... lighter. It alleviates the burden of my unrelenting despair, an escape from the cruel reality in which I am constrained. For those short moments, I feel free. We feel free.

"Take the pill." The voice is commanding, stern, as I am forced into compliance. I know what this is about. A choice, a test. A governmental filter – to live or die? An institutional joke – transgressors, deniers, must take the pill to demonstrate their trust in the state's benevolence. Sometimes, life is yet granted, sometimes early decommissioning. A small gamble...It's just another sick game, a way they can have some fun.

I place the pill into my mouth. It has a strange taste, like rough cardboard. My body yearns for the familiar sensation of relief. I swallow. I take a deep breath, exhaling slowly. My throat rasps dry and sore. Suddenly, I feel my breath escaping like a fleeing wind. An agonising current stemmed from the depths of my stomach unleashes into the rest of my body. I gasp desperately for air. Clutching at my throat. Again. Nothing. My vision blurs and collapses. Perhaps now I am truly free.

HEALTH & PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Teaching students in Physical Education and Outdoor Education amidst the continuing pandemic proved to be a real challenge once again.

The nuances of online learning from last year continued to make us even better experts in the worlds of Microsoft Teams (we thought 'teams' was only a sporting term), Zoom (which we thought we did around the ovals), Screencast-O-Matic – the list goes on.

The turbulence caused by a lockdown and the challenges it threw at us was alleviated thanks to the staff who devoted their time to the development of innovative ways to engage in practical elements of the course in a home-learning environment in 2020. Congratulations to Darcy McKenny on his consistently high-quality work throughout the year in relation to assessed work submitted, eventuating in his


achievement of the Stage 1 award for this year.

HUMANITIES



In a world that is increasingly culturally diverse and interconnected, the Humanities Faculty continued to develop students' ability to understand their world, past and present, and develop a capacity to respond to future challenges in innovative, informed, personal and collective ways.

The plethora of subjects within the Humanities Faculty include Accounting. Business and Economics, Business Innovation, Civics and Citizenship, Economics, Geography, History and Legal Studies. The study of these subjects provides students with the skills, behaviours and capabilities that



will, hopefully, equip them to face challenges in their lifetime and to participate in, and contribute to, the wellbeing and sustainability of the environment, the economy and society.

Geography

The Australian Geography Competition is a contest for Australian secondary school students, assessing their geographical knowledge and skills. The competition aims to encourage student interest in geography and to reward student excellence. In March, we had 110 students participate in the competition and their achievements included four High Distinctions, nine Distinctions and fourteen Credits.

In Year 7 Geography, the students explored the important liveability elements of their local community and compared them to the greater world. Students were invited to analyse three major cities of their choice and research and compare the elements which make one city more liveable than another. Subsequently, students visited our surrounding council areas, speaking with council members to assist them in devising

recommendations which will improve our community for all who use it.

History

In May, Year 10 History students from Rostrevor College, along with Carelyn Robinson and Paul Deegan, had the honour of attending an excursion to St Paul's College as part of the 2021 Holocaust Memorial Week Focus Seminar Sessions

Participants were very lucky to hear from many guest speakers on the events surrounding the Holocaust, two of which were Holocaust survivors. The presentation from Andrew Steiner OAM was found to be particularly interesting as he recapped his personal stories of life in Nazi occupied Europe and his memories of those days and the impact of this time on both him and his family.

Excursion participants took away much information and a greater understanding of the times and, in particular, Mr Steiner's forgiving nature and passion for developing an empathy for those who lived and died during this time in human history.

Seventeen students from Years 7-10 chose to participate in the Australian History Competition in June. With a focus on testing interpretation and analysis, rather than prior knowledge, the competition gives every student the chance to excel. This year's results included three High Distinctions and five Credits. We hope to have more students register for the competition in 2022.

Business Innovation

Stage 2 Business Innovation was undertaken by Year 12 students for the first time this year. This subject aims to equip students with the knowledge, skills and understandings to engage in designing, sustaining and transforming business in the modern world. Students enjoyed learning to innovate and think like designers to find and solve problems that matter to specific people in a business environment characterised by change and uncertainty. There were some sensational business ideas explored by students, and the feedback provided by visiting teaching staff and Education Support Officers, was fundamental to the progress of the students' business proposals.

Legal Studies

The Year 12 Legal Studies students participated in an online question and answer session with a panel of enthusiastic University of Adelaide lecturers responding to their questions relating to the Year 12 Inquiry task. Moreover, these students undertook the first electronic SACE exam for Legal Studies. Computers are routinely used in students' studies and moving to electronic examinations reflects this changing way of working.

LANGUAGES





MATHEMATICS



Mathematics is not just about numbers, equations, computations or algorithms. It is also about being able to solve problems effectively.

The Mathematics Faculty was given the task of showing students the enjoyment in learning Mathematics by making classrooms a fun space, with engaging activities that allow students to make real-life connections. It is important for our students to understand the mathematics, but it is crucial that they also understand its importance in the real world.

This year has delivered some excellent opportunities and results for the boys of Rostrevor College in their Mathematical studies. It has been rewarding to see the benefits of the Extension program and the acceleration of student learning in 2021. Congratulations to the many Year 11 students who partook in Stage 2 Mathematics courses this year. Also, a special acknowledgement to all our Year 12 students for their hard work and dedication in a challenging year.

ICAS Mathematics Competition

A total of 70 students participated in the International Competition and Assessment for Schools Mathematics Competition, which was open to students in Years 8 to 10. Of these students, nine achieved a Credit and two, Carlen Becker and Domenico Zappia (Year 9), achieved Merits. Congratulations to all the students who took up the challenge, especially those who achieved outstanding results.

STEM Football - Year 7

The Year 7 cohort participated in the Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) football program facilitated by the Adelaide Football Club - STEMfooty. The program was well structured, providing teachers with a list of useful resources to aid in delivering the Year curriculum to students. The connection of mathematics to real life allowed the learning to be effortless and enjoyable. A highlight of the program was the Adelaide Football Club running interactive sessions at the College, where students were able to apply prior knowledge in new contexts and applications for continued learning. The students were highly engaged and learning Mathematics in a different way.

Probability Fair - Year 8

We use probability in our daily life to make decisions. Most of the time, we won't perform actual probability problems, but use subjective probability to make judgment calls and determine the best course of action. So, we set the challenge to our Year 8 students to create their own probability game to be played at our College Fair. The students had to create an honest task, explaining the theoretical probability. It built on their problem-solving skills but also allowed for students to work as a team to achieve the best possible outcome.

Ingenuity - Year 10

Our Year 10 students were invited to attend the Ingenuity exhibition, which featured a range of interactive, STEM-focused activities. It provided an insight into the variety of career opportunities available across architecture and built environment, science. technology, engineering and mathematics. Our students always ask, 'When am I going to use this?', so it was the perfect opportunity for students to see the mathematics come to life and to also ask questions to those who are currently studying in the field.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge the hard work and dedication of all Mathematics staff here at the College. It is their energy, passion and enthusiasm that enables the students to undertake so many opportunities.

RELIGIOUS **EDUCATION** (MIDDLE & SENIOR YEARS)



Educating, inspiring and supporting our students to deepen their knowledge and understanding of our Catholic tradition, as well as their own spiritual self-awareness and potential for Christian leadership.

A New Curriculum

In 2020, the Catholic Identity Team developed a Scope and Sequence for the new Crossways Religious Education curriculum from Years R-12. In 2021, this led to the development of new units of work, including Edmund Rice & The Christian Brothers (Year 7), Saints (Year 8) and Touchstones/Plenary Council (Year 12). Crossways implementation also allowed us to look at existing units of work through a new lens, which has ultimately led to clearer sequencing of teaching and learning programs, more engaging content and assessment tasks for students, as well as improved learning outcomes.

Faith Formation & Leadership Development

Religious Education plays an important role in nurturing and enriching the spiritual development of our students. This year, students explored their faith and deepened their understanding of our Catholic tradition through prayer, celebration of liturgy and sacraments, faith formation and Social Justice/ecological activities.

In Year 7, students enjoyed learning from Br John Ahern about Edmund Rice and the Christian Brothers, as well as participating in centring prayer and meditation. Our Year 8s reflected on the power of Jesus' teachings through parables and developed innovative Social Justice campaigns to address issues of injustice and inequality.

At Year 9 level, students took a deep dive into the sacred narratives and themes running throughout the Old Testament. They were affirmed and empowered in their new understandings of sexuality and respectful relationships. In Year 10, students began to explore their 'calling' in life through a unit on Vocations. The Indigenous Spirituality course was particularly popular, as was the opportunity to participate in the sacrament

of Reconciliation. Some students choose to participate in the Youth Ministry unit to develop their faith and Christian leadership skills, and there is no surprise that the majority of our future Prefects and student leaders emerge from this course.

At Stage 1, highlights included a trip to the Wandana Mosque and St Francis Xavier's Cathedral as part of an Islam/Christianity comparative study, as well as the Year 11 Service Learning program in which students spent a week volunteering in a range of community placements across the country. Units on Peace and Nonviolence, as well as Sacred Earth continue to be relevant and necessary in the holistic development of our young men.

Religious Education in Year 12 is the time in which our boys are able to articulate their faith perspectives and demonstrate their many years of religious knowledge and experiences. They are even encouraged to create new rituals in the form of liturgies and retreat programs, some of which would rival anything their teachers like me could produce! In 2021, many of our Year 12 students received their highest grades in the subject, and it is a credit to them - and their subject teachers - for the way in which they have applied themselves.

Religious Education in the Junior Years is a combination of prayer and liturgical celebrations, participation in Social Justice actions and a rigorous new Crossways curriculum.

Mother's Day | Easter Liturgies

Our Junior Years Mother's Day liturgy was a delightful celebration as we gathered to pray and sing in celebration of mother figures in our lives. Each class created a pot of flowers filled with messages of love to centre our celebration. The boys wrote and read aloud their prayers of gratitude and love for the special people in their lives. We are grateful that we were able to gather at this time and finish with the beautiful blessing song.

Easter Holy Week liturgy was prepared by Junior Years students and delivered to the whole school in the form of the Stations of the Cross. With the assistance of Jayden Gale, the boys made connections between the events of Holy Week and the calling in our daily lives to live out the Gospel values.

Junior Years classes met regularly for liturgy in the Chapel. Liturgy is a time for us to listen to scripture, reflect on the connections to our world and pray for those around us. The boys spent time planning and preparing meaningful celebrations based on the readings. We have been blessed with a variety of prayerful liturgies led by classes, with enthusiastic singing.

Mini Vinnies

Our large group of passionate Mini Vinnies should be very proud of the service work they have initiated this year. Mini Vinnies take a pledge at the start of their term to serve others in the community, think about what is best for the broader community and care for our common home that God created.

The Cereal Box Challenge asked the boys to recognise the importance of a healthy breakfast for all people. The boys were able to identify how useful cereal is as a food item to donate to St Vincent de Paul Society – it is a healthy breakfast, a great snack and a long-life item that many people can use. Provocations such as 'When we donate, do we give something we don't want?' or 'Can we donate something that someone really needs?" were raised.

This led into our next calling to support the St Vincent de Paul Society with the Lighten the Load appeal. In the Junior Years, the boys created posters to promote the types of items needed by St Vincent de Paul Society – toiletry items. These items are not often thought about, but we listened to the people working in this area and responded to the calling with generosity and thoughtfulness.

Part of the development that we see in our Mini Vinnies throughout the year is their ability to listen and see a need and respond. A request for warm socks for all ages was made and the boys delivered. An incredible 444 pairs of socks for all ages were donated. The boys discussed what it means to have clean, warm socks. Their empathy showed through as they pictured what it would be like to have holes in socks or for them to be threadbare and not warm. For those less fortunate than us, this would make big difference to their daily lives and their wellbeing.

Sacraments

Congratulations to the boys who celebrated the sacraments of Initiation into the Catholic Church in their parish communities this year. Families gathered for workshops at St Joseph's Parish Tranmere or in their local parish to prepare through family prayer, reflection, discussions and shared experiences. The celebrations were able to go ahead with restrictions in place and it was a privilege to share in this moment with our families.

Christian meditation continued to be practiced regularly in the Junior Years. Students build their stamina for meditation through regular practice, and it then becomes a tool and strategy for them when they need to ground themselves in their daily life. Rostrevor boys' value this practice throughout their school life, and it forms a strong base on which other prayer experiences are built.

SCIENCE



Science as never before has come to the fore in 2021, where, in my mind, there has never been such emphasis on scientific fact or knowledge.

Seeds in Space

The six 'alien' seeds and six control seeds (this means they did not go to space) will be grown and the results reported back to NASA. It will be interesting to see if there is any difference in the growth of the golden wattle seeds!

Curriculum Updates

As a faculty, curriculum updates are paramount, ensuring that the learning is catered to student needs and any areas that need improvement are addressed. This is particularly pertinent to 2022 where version 9 of the national curriculum is implemented which will see some minor changes for Science, as such much of the faculty time is spent on improvement as well as the implementation of new ideas. This ensures a relevant, modern Science curriculum which is accessible to all students.

Science Building

The Science building saw some additional beautification with the installation of some large stickers which adhere to the windows of all four Science laboratories. You might have caught a glimpse of them; they are used



quite commonly in Rostrevor promotional material. These not only look great but address some interesting science concepts through the generic themes of chemistry, physics and biology addressed in these images. This theme will continue in the coming years to ensure that the Science building sparks imagination and looks great.

Year 12 Success

It is with great anticipation that I write regarding the Class of 2021. Few groups of students have dealt with so many challenges academically than this group. They have dealt with online learning, lockouts and the fear that exams would not even take place. However, they have risen to the challenge. TECHNOLOGY

Sustainable futures focus



Technology education focuses on investigating, designing and constructing solutions. Courses at Rostrevor College provide opportunities for students to develop more than just problem-solving, engineering and practical skills.

Students also form understandings of sustainability and economic issues within product design to enable them to design solutions that have a positive impact on society and the environment.

After many staff and SACE curriculum changes over the last three years, 2021 proved be a year of consolidation. Vlad Baclagian-Raicu continued teaching Senior Digital Technologies as well as Middle Years Design Technologies. We welcome Daniel Torode who joins Connor McNamara and Elias Degeorge teaching Middle Years Design Technologies. Anthony Lagos and I continued delivering the Senior Material Solutions and Industry and Entrepreneurial Solutions courses.

Digital Technologies

In Digital Technologies, students developed skills related to the use of technology and creation of software. The

focus in Year 7 was learning programming concepts while designing a game. The Year 8 focus was on Excel automation, producing a GPA calculator and budget logbook. In Year 9, students developed websites, with one of the projects involving research on how to minimise the effects of playing video games, with the findings published in a personal website. At Years 10 and 11 level, students are introduced to Python programming language, Java and server technologies. The Year 12s created a diverse range of personal projects, one example being the development of an application to keep track of the hours in a driving journal.

Material Solutions

Our Material Solutions courses have Woodwork and Metalwork focuses. Students in Year 11 Metalwork produced a two-seat outdoor park bench. Year 10

Woodwork students produced a side table and researched the sustainably of the timber industry. The Years 7-9 Technology classes experienced a range of introductory Woodwork and Metalwork projects to develop their skills. This included an LED lamp and metal robot in Year 9.

Industry and Entrepreneurial Solutions

The Industry and Entrepreneurial Solutions (IES) courses proved popular in 2021 after some outstanding results last year. The subject is offered from Year 10 to Year 12 and is a fantastic opportunity to develop knowledge in design process and drafting principles. The focus of these courses is product design, and students have a wide scope to choose what application they will design their solution task for. Students began the course by completing skills tasks using Fusion 360 (3D modelling and engineering drawing), Arduino electronics and C++ coding. Product prototypes are produced using the College's Computer Numerical Control milling machine, 3D printers or within the materials workshops. Projects this year included: Jayden Iuliano's crane game, Kyle Smith's bedside cabinet with a touch activated electronic lock and Kanwartej Singh's Arduino touch screen clock radio.

The construction of a timber side table with a drawer and metal legs is the starting point for the Year 12 Material Solutions course. The external assessment for this course is a Resource Study where students test the properties of materials and conduct research into the sustainability and economic issues relating to their chosen project. The course culminates with each student designing and producing their Material Solution

and presenting the process in a folio. Projects this year included Nash Richman's resin table with adjustable metal legs, TV units by Zachary Tripodi and Daniel Conroy and a study desk by Dion Meggetto.

VISUAL ARTS & DESIGN

Fostering creativity, conceptual thinking and visual expression

Visual Arts aims to foster the creative talents of the students at Rostrevor College. It provides them with opportunities to develop and showcase their talents outside of the physical, mathematical and linguistic learning undertakings in other curriculum areas.

Amongst some of the chaos and uncertainty over the last year or so, Visual Arts serves as a release for many, and its unique content prompts students to think creatively and express creativity through representations and interpretations of themselves and the world around them. Using a range of different media, processes and application techniques, another fantastic collection of art and design pieces were produced by students from all year levels.

Middle Years

Middle Years Visual Arts classes continued to serve as an introduction to the fundamental principles of the Visual Arts, exposing the students to new artistic media and processes.

Across the many classes of Year 7s this year, students undertook projects in a variety of media, including graphite pencils, colour pencils and watercolours. Despite being new to the techniques, many students produced some fantastic pieces of work, particularly

with their colour pencil still-life drawings.

The Year 8s explored a range of applications and techniques within their landscape unit, with a particular focus on perspective drawing, watercolours and digital painting. Given the opportunity to begin exploring their own personal style, students presented a range of vibrant and dramatic depictions of the world around them.

Once again, Visual Arts at Year 9 level centred around facial features and portraiture. Detailed facialfeature studies, dramatic charcoal self-portraits and whimsical caricatures were showcased throughout the year, with many students justifiably proud of their creations.

Senior Years


Year 10 Art students were introduced to figure painting as an extension of the portraiture unit covered in their previous year. The resulting artworks

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND CAREERS





The Vocational Education and Training (VET) and Careers Department provides senior students a flexible and adaptable curriculum that serves to enrich their lives through a variety of different opportunities.

VET

Through the SACE framework, Rostrevor offers a wide variety of full-time (1 day per week or equivalent) VET courses to students in Years 11 and 12. The SACE is designed to give students increased flexibility, including greater opportunities to have diverse forms of learning and achievement recognised. In 2021, students were engaged in over 15 different industry areas, including: Construction, Fitness, Electrical, Animal Studies, 3D Animation, Screen and Media etc. Staff work in partnership with the student and parents/guardians to ensure the direction that is planned is specific to the student's individual needs. Students choosing VET courses are provided with education and training that imparts them with skills

and knowledge for the world of work. VET operates through a national training system, and is delivered, assessed and certified by Registered Training Organisations (RTOs).

All senior students (including Year 10s) have the opportunity to participate in short courses that can build their skills to assist in gaining casual employment or start planning pathways into VET courses in their next educational year. For example, in 2021, there has been an increase in students obtaining their White Card qualifications, First Aid certification and their learner's permit through short courses offered at Rostrevor or off-site through other RTOs.

This year saw over 70 students undertake studies in VET across Years 10-12, ranging from Certificate I

introductory courses to Certificates III and IV. All courses will enable our students to achieve accreditation which is nationally recognised and project them on to an exciting career pathway before leaving school.

Curriculum-Based Learning

SACE curriculum-based subjects are offered within the framework of the school timetable. These subjects exist to give students a range of opportunities to customise their learning to their individual needs. Subjects include Community Studies, Integrated Learning, Workplace Practices and Research Project. These subjects give students the choice of what they want to learn and how they want to learn. For example, in Community Studies students have the ability to choose the activity that they wish to undertake, by writing up a plan and a contract, undertaking research and then delivering the activity. The teacher assists with guiding students in the right direction.

Students in Year 10 undertake PLP, which is delivered as a Pathways program across the year. At the end of Term 1, students participated in four full days, where they were introduced to PLP and undertook a variety of activities that can help them to decide on their life and career direction. Over the initial four days, students were involved in a variety of presentations including University of South Australia, University of Adelaide, Flinders University, Australian Defence Force, Australian Taxation Office, CareerMatch etc. Old Scholars also presented to the students,

advising of their different career paths, study pathways and life experiences after leaving Rostrevor. Students also took part in the Tertiary Studies and Careers Expo which allowed them to talk to a variety of education providers and industry groups, enabling them to gather more information about potential career pathways. Throughout the remainder of the year, PLP was delivered at different times to ensure that the students were continually reflecting on their personal and learning goals, making appropriate subject choices for 2022 and reflecting on their learning experiences.

The College again attained 100% SACE completion with:

- 13.3% of students achieving an ATAR above 95
- 25.7% achieving an ATAR above 90
- 38% achieving an ATAR above 80
- 29 Merits
- 46 Additional A+ grades
- 83% of all grades in the A or B band well above the state average.

Head Prefect Manish Augustine (ATAR 98.25) was awarded a Governor's Commendation. Manish Augustine's incredible support of all Rostrevor students and his commitment to Edmund Rice Camps and numerous Social Justice initiatives made him highly worthy of the prestigious prize. Deputy Head Prefect Alastair Lord realised his dream of joining an AFL club when he was drafted by Essendon in the 2021 AFL Draft while also achieving an impressive 98.95 ATAR.

Merits

Merits were achieved in a wide range of subjects including Research Project, English, Essential English, Chemistry, Music Explorations, General Maths and Religious Education. A+ grades were also achieved in Physical Education, Business Innovation, Music Performance Solo, Music Performance Ensemble, Physics, Mathematical Methods, Industry and Entrepreneurial Solutions and Digital Technologies. The breadth and depth of teacher expertise and students thriving in their learning is expansive and admirable.

With 18 Merits or A+ grades for Research Project and other subjects, many of our Year 11 students have set themselves up well for a successful 2022. Special mention goes to Sebastian Rapuano who achieved three Merits in Research Project, General Maths and English ahead of Year 12.

HEAD PREFECT'S SPEECH

Presentation Night Speech

Good evening Principal Mr Frank Ranaldo, Chair of the College Board Dr Vin Thomas, esteemed and invited guests, families, staff, students and, especially, all those tuning in from home.

In 1974, an unassuming professor named Erno Rubik invented a puzzle, one that even he thought couldn't be solved. For many years of my life, I thought the same. To solve even one side seemed unfathomable. However, recently I discovered that a simple search of how to solve a Rubik's Cube on YouTube goes a long way. There, I was exposed to a few algorithms, sets of directions that help navigate the multi-coloured chaos. Yes, it took time to learn these directions. Yes,

it took perseverance, but it also required a bit of faith. Strangely, something as simple as this cube - a toy my Year 6 buddy class fiddle with daily - strangely, it has taught me a few lessons about life.

As I solve the cube, you may question why I turn a side a specific way when it clearly looks wrong. It seems to only make the situation messier. Often in life, we have to trust the process, understanding that through pushing ourselves out of our comfort



zone, we are able to find who we truly are. This year, that took many different forms for all of us, whether it be learning an instrument, participating in a new sport, surviving a thankfully brief lockdown, remaining persistent with face masks. Perhaps, it was continuing our collective advocation for mental health, understanding that true strength and courage lies in the ability to be vulnerable and reach out for help when we need it.

As you can see, with a sense of faith in the process of life, things always find a way of slowly getting better, and we are able to achieve that which would otherwise be considered impossible.

I can fondly recall an interaction I had earlier this year. As Alex Iasiello, a wise Year 7 student from Mr McManus' PC, and I headed over to the Webb lockers, we were greeted by Br Coggs who, in his casually endearing tone said, 'Walking with the HP aye?' He then asked Alex, 'Do you know what HP stands for?' To my surprise, he provided the immediate and astute

answer of, 'It stands for human person.' Little did he, or even I, know, but, in that moment, Alex empowered my perspective.

And that's the essence of empowerment; it occurs best when it is understated. As you may or may not know, this year was the Year of Empowerment, something we perhaps did not talk about on a regular basis. Likewise to the inventors of algorithms that help us solve Rubik's cubes, often we don't know who precisely empowers us in any given moment. Often it doesn't matter because empowerment at Rostrevor is not a one-way transaction. Rather, it is an intricate network, a web of mutuality, a red and black blanket that everyone contributes to in order to lift up others.

Contributions to this is not dependent on if you have a badge or not, it merely requires you to be a human person. Someone willing to be compassionate, to be empathetic. Above all, it requires love; the intangible stitching that connects each of us through our differences. With this in mind, I would like to thank all my amazing HPs this year.

Thank you for becoming a part of my fabric.





In the Year of Empowerment, Egan House was challenged to find strength in vulnerability, strength in ourselves and strength from those around us.

Inspired by the works of American professor Brené Brown, I challenged the students in Egan House to be vulnerable this year as per her words: 'Vulnerability is not winning or losing; it's having the courage to show up and be seen when we have no control over the outcome. Vulnerability is not weakness; it's our greatest measure of courage' in an attempt to promote resilience, a growth mindset and emotional intelligence. I have been incredibly impressed with how each boy has demonstrated development in areas that, historically, not been synonymous with masculinity.

Pastoral formation is of the utmost priority at Rostrevor, and it has been fantastic to work alongside professionals within my Pastoral Care team who endeavour to manifest a culture that destigmatises mental health issues in men, addresses/confronts toxic masculinity and promotes

empathetic behaviours. Remaining consistent with the charism of Edmund Rice, I have been proud to see the fruits of the 2019 Empathetic Egan Initiative contributing to the holistic development of boys in the House. Palpably, every year I am pleased to admire the dedication shown by the team in Vlad Baclagian-Raicu, John Coop, John Kelly, Luke Salini and Glen Urbani, who invest so much in the support of the students in their care.

At the fore of emulating such holistic maturation, Egan were blessed to have Tyson Walls as our House Captain. In addition to being an exemplary athlete and academic, Tyson Walls tirelessly promoted inclusion and compassion across the House and College through a surfeit of initiatives, namely spearheading the Lighten the Load campaign with the Social Justice team.



Throughout another complex year, peer leadership and support proved crucial, which Tyson Walls and I were aptly afforded by Morialta Citizenship Awardee and Prefect - Community Activities Jayden Iuliano, House Vice-Captain Oliver Piro and all other year level Vice-Captains. It has been wonderful to witness the proactivity and dedication of the House in 2021 via fundraising, Athletics and Swimming Carnivals, House addresses and academic endeavour. It is my genuine hope that returning students have gained as much as I have from these young role models and have cultivated a connection and embodiment of the Rostrevor ethos.

On the field, Egan House again proved to be a dominant force, convincingly taking home the Middle, Senior and Overall Athletic Shields, bringing the unprecedented run of form to nine consecutive victories, notably a tenth straight victory for the Middle Years. A day at the pool in Term 1 featured comparable energy and determination - I lost my voice halfway through the day - and, despite falling just short of the silverware, I could not have been more impressed with the collective efforts of the group.

In another year hampered by COVID-19, the Friday morning barbecue for St Vincent de Paul did not run as frequently as we would have liked, though a largely uninterrupted Semester 1 allowed many new faces to hone their culinary skills in cooking up one of Adelaide's finest breakfasts. The longstanding relationship between Egan and our charity remains a vital part of what makes Egan House distinctive, and I am looking forward to forging greater bonds in the future, namely offering students more authentic opportunities



to serve and partnering in the emergence of a Winter Sleepout with Christian Brothers College and St Paul's College.

My sincerest thanks to Mark Simpson, Deputy Principal - Dean of Students; Bill Trewartha, Director of Student Wellbeing - Middle Years; and Evan Pezos, Director of Student Wellbeing - Senior Years, for their support throughout the year, as well as that of my fellow Heads of House.

It is an exciting time to be at the College, and the work being undertaken by the Student Wellbeing team is inspiring and motivating.

Wrapping up another year leading Egan House, I am looking forward to 2022 and working alongside House Captain Luke Signorello.

The Year 3 boys have engaged in many different learning experiences this year to discover and grow their knowledge about the world around them.

Year 3 Black started off Term 1 by welcoming seven new students into the Rostrevor College community. We explored the school together through regular trips to the farm and outdoor activities to get to know our new friends.

Reader's Workshop

The students engaged with Reader's Workshop where they explored the CAFE model to develop their comprehension, accuracy and fluency and expand their vocabulary. Through mini lessons where they learnt a new skill while reading our focus text, the boys enjoyed reading independently for 20 minutes each morning to improve their reading skills. The boys shared what they discovered and learnt after each reading session and all worked hard to complete the Premier's Reading Challenge.

Writer's Workshop

The boys enjoyed learning about different text features through our writing sessions this year. They planned, drafted and created books to share their knowledge and understanding of different text types. The students explored how to add speech and descriptive language to bring a personal narrative to life. They wrote poetry and created Haikus and rhyming poems through understanding onomatopoeia and how to rhyme different suffixes. They learnt about the history of Rostrevor and shared their knowledge through an information book. Lastly, they researched a famous person and wrote a biography about their life and accomplishments.

Mathematical Investigations and Games

This year, the Year 3 students engaged with different mathematical games to improve their fluency and understanding of number. Each lesson, we practised our rapid recall through dice games such as Greedy Pig and Race to 100. We played card games where we practised our quick addition, subtraction, multiplication and division

The boys applied their mathematical learning through investigations and worked in teams to share their knowledge in an area of Mathematics we had been learning. The students made a PowerPoint presentation on their favourite fraction and displayed it in several ways. They created a set of playing cards to share how time can be represented in multiple ways and used their knowledge of money and budgets to buy presents for all their friends.

These games and investigations were a highlight for the boys and offered them an opportunity to share their understanding of a topic in a different way.

Science

This year, the Year 3 students enjoyed our Science units and our trips to the Science Laboratory. In Term 1, the boys explored how animals can survive in different habitats and created a model of a local habitat. In Term 2, they created a cooking segment to show how adding heat can turn a solid into a liquid and removing heat can turn a liquid into a solid. During Term 3, the boys learnt about the connection between the Sun, Moon and the Earth, and in Term 4 they explored how heat can be created move and insulated.

Morialta Conservation Park

A highlight for the year was our class trip to Morialta Conservation Park. We went for a long walk through the nature playground and along the river, and went exploring to find Indigenous art and engravings around the park.

As the boys move into Year 4, it is with great pride that I look back on how far they have come. They have pushed themselves as readers, writers, mathematicians, scientists and artists. I wish them all great success as they move into Year 4.

to our peers?

Writer's Workshop

During our Literacy blocks, reading continued to be the foundation upon which everything else is built. A whole school reading focus meant every class was building a love of reading at the same time. Writer's workshops used mini lessons based on mentor texts for students to model their writing on and to identify text and language features that would help them to write engaging pieces to entertain, inform and persuade. Class novels helped introduce the boys to

different styles and genres of writing and they studied their first historical narrative. The finals of the Purton Oratory were a spectacular example of the work all the boys had done to craft a speech that was both persuasive and engaging. Congratulations to Oscar Crafter, Year 6 winner, and all the boys for their heartfelt speeches.

A focus in Year 6 was student agency and voice. Through this, the boys came to experience and value the importance of making decisions and choices that help place them in the best environment to learn.

DIRECTOR -BOARDING





After an extensive period of consultation, 2021 saw the transformation of Duggan House into a modern boarding facility.

The staged refurbishment was completed throughout Semester 1. Anyone who has renovated knows the process can be disruptive, however, as each stage was completed and the boarders were able to begin using the new spaces, the disruptions became a small price to pay.

Duggan House is now a best-practice boarding facility boasting the privacy of individual rooms that are secured with an electronic key system, enhanced breakout and common rooms for socialising and recreating and an extended dining room with booth seating for a casual dining experience.

The boarding community is very grateful to the College Foundation, CESA, EREA and all the supporters of this year's Giving Day.

The refurbished facility has enabled further change in the day-to-day routines and running of boarding created a home-like environment that positively supports the boarders while they engage in a Rostrevor education.

2021 Highlights

Our College Athletics team was crowned State Champion in its division of the All Schools Cup in Term 1 and also claimed outright victory in the prestigious Achilles Cup Group B in Term 3. For the second year running, our Swimming team claimed the School Sport SA (SSSA) Championship in the B Grade, as well as finishing fifth in the Open Schools meet in Term 1, which will now see them rightfully compete in the A Grade in 2022.

The Year 10 Soccer team achieved the title of State Champions in the SSSA Knockout Competition in an incredibly competitive fixture against Parafield Gardens High School. All other Soccer teams, including Open, Year 8/9 and Year 7, progressed to at least the semi-finals in their respective competitions. Our Year 11 Squash team reaped the rewards of a more focused approach to training and won their Grand Final in the High School Squash SA Tournament after a long, yet impressive, season. Our Year 6/7 Knockout Football team also progressed to the State Final of the SSSA Competition but were unfortunately unable to defeat a rampant Sacred

Heart College. In Term 4, our Under 13 Mountain Biking team also performed admirably and were State Champions in the SSSA Mountain Biking Championships.

An exciting indication of the future, and current status, of respective programs, we have reached near record numbers in Badminton, Basketball, Pedal Prix, Soccer and Water Polo. Additionally, due to fantastic responses and proactivity from staff and students, we witnessed the reemergence of Chess, Golf and Rugby along with our first involvement in the Mountain Biking discipline. With all this positive energy and enthusiasm, I would anticipate our program will extend even further in 2022.

A heartfelt vote of thanks and gratitude is offered to every single individual who supported the Co-Curricular program in 2021. The level of excellence we are striving for, and tirelessly aiming to achieve, does not come easily without the support of many others and myself, along with the entire Rostrevor College community, are eternally grateful for such.

This has enabled our youngest students with the chance to further develop their basketball skills through Co-Curricular and help with their transition to games from Year 2.

One of the biggest highlights this year was the rejuvenation of enthusiasm for Athletics. Our Junior Years Athletics team competed at the Catholic Schools Athletics competition in Term 4. The team of 38 students from Years 3–6 represented Rostrevor with immense pride and effort while supporting one another throughout the competition. At the end of a successful day where all boys did their best, the boys almost burst when they heard that the Rostrevor team came first in the boys' section, while Year 5 Ryder Dalton and Year 6 Joe Kernahan were age champions. The Year 5 group also won the age group pennant. Congratulations to all students involved!

With many other Co-Curricular activities growing in participation, we now have the opportunity to steadily grow our range of activities offered in the Junior Years. A trial program of Water Polo was extended to our students in Years 4–6 and this was met with great enthusiasm. As a result, we are hoping to offer Water Polo in 2022 and are looking for other schools with similar interest in creating a primary competition. Additionally, we are now offering Touch Football as a Co-Curricular activity to our Year 6 students in 2022, following their participation in the Catholic Schools Touch Football competition in 2021 which many of the boys enjoy thoroughly.

Athletics at Rostrevor has had a huge year with the team competing in two major team events and some athletes competing at the Schools State Championships in October.

Term 1 started with an air of positivity and the Athletics team hit the training track in Week 4 to prepare for the SA All Schools Cup which was held in Week 10 of Term 1. The last time we competed in this event we ran a very close second to eventual winners Marryatville High School so we were keen to go head-to-head against them once again. In another very close contest, we came away victorious by just six points in what was the first Rostrevor Athletics team victory in any competition for the past 20 years. There were many impressive performances on the day but special mention goes to Jayden Gale, Harrison Wright, Christian Corbo, Ethan Ferreira, Wieu Duang Deng, Thomas Griffiths, Arjun

Malhotra, Massimo Cerracchio, Vincenzo Leopardi, Cooper Swain and Athletics Captain Thomas Snowball for their contributions to the team's success.

In Term 3, following a two-year absence, Rostrevor made a return to the Achilles Cup Competition, conducted between SAAS member schools. For the first time in the history of the College, we were entered into the B Grade and took the competition by storm, winning the event from Sacred Heart College by a massive margin of 228 points. This performance should now see us promoted back into A Grade for 2022.

The occasion was littered with outstanding performances



where Rostrevor Athletes dominated many events to help amass such a huge points total. In the Under 13 age group, the team was best served by Jordan Schirripa and Vincenzo Leopardi who combined to perform well in the sprints and middle-distance events respectively. In the Under 14 age group, Noah Sampson and Ethan Ferreira were the strongest representatives, and in the Under 15s, Thomas Griffiths was absolutely sensational, winning the 100 metres, 200 metres, 400 metres, Long Jump and Triple Jump. He had great support from Jacob Newton and Alexander Spencer. Wieu Duang Deng, Darci Best and Benjamin Spehr competed across many of the Under 16 age group events with excellent results, and in the Open age group, Thomas Snowball, Nash Richman and William Rowlands dominated. Overall, it was a great result, and the College war cry was belted out with great gusto at the end of the day.

The 2021 involvement of our athletes culminated when three of our athletes competed during Term 4 at the VIVA SA All Schools Games which were held at SA Athletics Stadium over the weekend of 22 and 23 October. It is very pleasing to report that the boys achieved great success at this event, with outstanding performances coming from Thomas Griffiths, Riley Craig and Wieu Duang Deng.

Riley Craig competed in the Under 18 2000-metre Steeplechase and won a bronze medal for his excellent performance. Wieu Duang Deng competed in the Under 18 400 metres and the Triple Jump before unfortunately having to miss his other events due to injury. The highlight of the event came from the performances of Thomas Griffiths who, despite being an Under 15 athlete, competed in the Under 16 age group, winning the gold medals for the 100 metres and the 200 metres, a silver in the Triple Jump and bronze in the Long Jump events. Special mention must be made of Kalan Bohlin who ended up in fifth position overall for Year 5 and above, as well as Daniel Piteo who achieved sixth position, Sahyl Soodan who achieved ninth position and Amay Salaria who achieved tenth position for Years 3 and 4. Aekas Soodan achieved eighth position for Reception-Year 2, while James Morton won the award for the best game of the tournament. Many of our students were in the top 20 so the tournament was a fitting end to a very enjoyable and rewarding season of Chess.

Senior Years

This year saw the re-introduction of Chess into the Senior Years curriculum. Eight fully committed students participated on a regular basis in the Inter-School Chess

Tournament held at the Chess Centre of South Australia on Friday evenings. Their commitment to the game was phenomenal and they were more than happy to squeeze in Chess practice at lunch times and deal with my many changes to the coaching regime!

In Term 3, we were invited to participate in the Inter-School Chess Competition and Fundraiser hosted by Adelaide Botanic High School. It was a truly inspiring day! Our students were a credit to themselves and the College. It was an individual-based tournament and five students have to be mentioned for their overall performance: Jordan Caperna, Braydon Bohlin, Arnav Kothari, Connor Bohlin and Mark Seneca. The experience reinforced that students can be agents of social change even when engaging in Co-Curricular activities.

I look forward to 2022 and the expansion of Chess in the Senior Years.

Over 250 teams compete in the Australian Human Powered Vehicle Super Series in up to six races each season.

The aim of Pedal Prix is to complete the most laps of the circuit in the given 6-hour, 8-hour or 24-hour race. Over many years, the pedal powered vehicles have become highly efficient and scrutinised for safety. Rather than being built in schools, they are generally purchased from specialised manufacturers and the students participate in maintenance, safety and physical training, ready to be selected into race teams.

After a cancelled season in 2020, the Rostrevor students were eager to get back in the vehicle to compete. The College entered two teams into four races this season. The first race was a 6-hour event at The Bend Motorsport Park, Tailem Bend. It was impressive to use the new garage facilities and the professional 3.4 km track. Our Middle Years team, Eddy, was almost at capacity with 13 students participating. For many, this was their

first Co-Curricular experience, yet they took it in their stride, competing with great spirit, working well as a team and looking after the vehicle for the duration of the race. Team Eddy finished 29th from 46 teams, completing 167 km. The Senior team completed 230 km, finishing an impressive 6th - Rostrevor's best race result.

The second event was another 6-hour race at Victoria Park. This circuit was 1.15 km, shortened due to the COVID-19 testing site. Team Eddy finished 33rd out of 62 teams, completing 159 km. We assembled a small Senior team consisting of Khye Madex-Hefford, Patrick Crowley, Ciaran Byrne, Jack Rudolph, Joshua Smith, Charlie Haynes and Jake Smith to suit the short track race format. They finished 8th, completing 217 km – a result only bettered by their previous race. It was fantastic seeing this small group compete

together; they have driven the development of the sport at Rostrevor College and set an outstanding example for the young upcoming team members.

Unfortunately, the other two races, including the second round at Tailem Bend and the two-day event at Murray Bridge, were cancelled. We look forward to returning to the prestigious 24-hour Murray Bridge event in 2022. Congratulations to our Most Valuable Participants: Jack Rudolph and Zak Lewis. Thank you to Joshua Smith and Connor Bohlin for their fantastic contributions to the sport.



For the second year running, the Rostrevor boys put in a phenomenal performance across all age divisions. Year 9 swimming sensation Jordan Martin achieved new personal bests (PBs) in the 50-metre Butterfly and 50-metre Backstroke and was 0.40 seconds off the Under 15 50-metre Freestyle state record set by Olympian Kyle Chalmers. 


