Rue Neuve was a street in Rheims, France where the first house of the Brothers of the Christian Schools was located. The humble and modest abode which the Brothers occupied on June 24, 1682, was where all the transformation happened; teachers became Brothers, seculars turned into consecrated men, human work became the work of God. As Blain put it, the house on Rue Neuve is considered as the cradle of the Institute.

A symbolic puzzle of the Novitiate's facade served as the ritual, with each community member receiving a puzzle piece, signifying the role of each in building the household of faith.

The arrival of Br. Myron marks the near completion of the Residential Community in Lipa. Now, the Brothers patiently anticipate the arrival of Br. Peter The Anh, sub-director, who is still in Vietnam.

The Harvest

The arrival of the new batch of Novices, despite the hiatus, is a much-welcomed sign that there is still much to be harvested. The Novitiate Board chair and PARC General Councillor, Br. Ricky Laguda FSC, together with the concerned visitors of PARC, had decided not to start a new batch of novices in 2019.

Planting and Nurturing

An opening prayer service with the theme "The Seed of Formation" marked the PARC La Salle Novitiate's official opening on August 9, 2020. Br. Rey Mejias FSC, the Director of Novices, emphasized the significance of not only planting the seeds of vocations but also nurturing it throughout the year. He added that the end goal is to integrate identities aligned with Jesus Christ and St. John Baptist De La Salle.

The new Novices then shared their reflections with the whole community, signifying the initial planting of their seeds of formation, hoping to help one another in letting each plant grow towards God's plan.

COMMUNITY ANNUAL PLANNING

Due to the quarantine restrictions, the Community and Personal Annual Planning (CAP/PAP) of the PARC La Salle Novitiate were held inside the property's premises on August 20, 2020. The CAP gave the community the avenue to discuss and create its Vision-Mission Statement, which would serve as the community's foundation.



DAY OF REFLECTION

As part of welcoming the Novices to their new home, the community had their first Day of Reflection, focusing on Prayer and their Spiritual Reading books as reflection help, on August 11, 2020.

COMMUNITY BUILDING

The community commenced and celebrated their CAP with a community-building activity on August 21, 2020. The day-long event began with the traditional Visita Iglesia (following safety protocols), visiting the Redemptorist Church, St. Sebastian Cathedral, the Lady Mediatrix Church, the Capilla de San Juan Bautista de La Salle, and finally, the Novitiate's own House Chapel.

In the evening, the community celebrated its Brotherhood through an extended community gathering filled with singing, dancing, and merriment. It symbolized the on-going community building of their household of faith, with the guidance of St. John Baptist de La Salle.

The community building was done at such an opportune time as it would be the Novices' Reception of the Holy Habit the next day.





THREE-DAY SILENT RETREAT

To prepare the Novices for their upcoming Reception of the Holy Habit, the Brothers-in-formation went through a threeday silent retreat on August 17 to 19, 2020. The retreat focused on the Memoirs of the Habit, and the Ten Rules I Impose Upon Myself by the founder, himself. Moreover, the event also served as the community's personal annual planning where they were tasked to create their own version of the 'Ten Rules.' Finally, the community was given an opportunity to have confession with Fr. Philip Ibasco, Novitiate Chaplain, to close the retreat.



LEAD 10TH ANNIVERSARY **OPENING**

The community participated in the the first Lasallian East Asia District Online Community (LOC) virtual meetup on August 14, 2020. The first LOC, "envisioned to be a quarterly gathering of Lasallians to create opportunities for meet-up, prayer, and formation (LEAD Story 342), placed emphasis on the need for the Lasallian Community to pray and share their experiences.



MALAYSIA DAY

In solidarity with Malaysia, the hometown of Br. Joshua, and the Malaysian Brothers, the community commemorated the 63rd Independence Day of Malaysia on August 31, 2020. It was a double header event as the community also celebrated the arrival of Br. John Myron. The evening was highlighted with a prayer service with the theme "Malaysia Prihatin (Concerned Malaysia), and followed with a presentation by Br. Joshua about Malaysian culture and cuisine.

Communication is vital in the life of a Brother and teacher. Thus, it is imperative that as early as now, the Novices get to practice and improve their skills. The Novitiate Program offers two courses related to language - English and French.

The Brothers-in-formation have their French classes every Friday and Saturday with Br. Sebastien Matundu FSC. For almost one month, the Novices are learning basic conversations like comment ca va. This is a good avenue to broaden their means of communication using different parlance.

On the other hand, the Novices attend English classes with Br. Edmon Viroomal FSC every Thursday. So far, the focus of their classes is more on giving clear directions and instructions, a skill that is necessary for the future teachers.

OFFICE AND CHANTS

The Brothers-in-Formation from the Residential and Gujranwala communities went through a series of sessions on the chants for the Liturgy of the Hours from Br. Michael Broughton FSC on August 24 to 26, 2020, through online conferencing. Order of the house, community assignments, Exodus, and the new-normal apostolate. These were just some of the topics tackled during the month-long orientation of the Novices of the day-to-day operations of the formation program. These were done to ensure the Novices' smooth transition to their new home for the year.

The first set of orientation sessions on August 12 to 14 focused on the community's statutes, guidelines, and assignments. Each Novice was invited to prepare and propose new policies for their respective assignments as part of the customization process.

The second set of orientation on August 27 to 29 introduced the Novices to their Apostolate activities through remote learning programs and applications. These programs are then used for the Novices' online classes with the Brothers, Exodus, their new apostolate, and other pertinent matters.



The Reception of the Holy Habit marks a significant moment as the Novices cross the threshold and officially begin their journey in the PARC Novitiate. It is during this occasion that the budding Brothers receive the Holy Habit, the Rule of the Institute, and the six-decade Rosary – sacramentals that would prove to be essential in the yearlong journey in the Novitiate.

The uniqueness of this year's Novitiate batch brought to light three different, yet equal in solemnity, Habit Taking ceremonies all the way from Gujranwala, Pakistan, to La Salle Green Hills, and to the PARC Novitiate's own Parmenie Cloister Chapel, with 11 newly-robed Novices from Myanmar, Malaysia, Pakistan, The Philippines, and Vietnam.

Apostolate for the New Normal

The pandemic may have halted the Novices from having a face-to-face apostolate, but it has opened up for a new kind of program appropriate to the new normal. This year's apostolate is called the Novitiate Virtual Formation Initiatives (NVFI). It is a formation outreach program of the PARC Novices aimed to "cater the needs of Lasalliansyoung men and women, students, and professionals – who wish to find answers to questions about their calling in life. The program brings in the experience of God through prayer and discernment from the cloistered Novitiate compound through virtual or remote learning means.

In order to prepare the Novices for this new kind of set-up, they underwent a series of remote learning sessions and orientations with Br. Rey Mejias, Novitiate Director, starting last August 29, 2020. Every Saturday, the Brothers are tasked to present their programs to the community for critiquing and commenting, to ensure that the webinars provided to the target audience are well prepared and are of great quality.

On the other hand, the NVFI is expected to enable the young Brothers-in-formation to be exposed to the Lasallian Family, albeit virtually; trained in facilitating sessions through remote learning; developed as good public speakers; and lastly, able to articulate and share the Lasallian Spirituality.

It is a challenging project for everyone, yet with constant accompaniment and guidance, it is hoped that the program will cater the needs of the Lasallian community, despite the community quarantine set in place. The program will cover modules that will deal with the Experience of God in the context of Christian Spirituality, Transformation, Self-Awareness, Discernment, Surrendering and Letting Go, Presence of God, and Motivation, and finally, acquaintance with the womb and tomb experience of the Brother's life.

Fast Tracking New Normal Technologies For The Novitiate Formation

"Brother, you are on mute." "What's the Meeting ID?" "I can't see your face."

I'm calling it right now. Oxford's word of the year will be 'new normal' or a term similar to it. New normal, work-fromhome, social distancing, flatten the curve – these are just some of the new terms that we have accustomed to.

Nobody expected it, yet here we are. Living (and discerning) in the New Normal. Instead of seeing the Brothers in person for our in-house classes, we are in front of a computer, having to click a button on the screen just to be able to speak. The usual apostolate that we are accustomed to has been revamped to a form of service that is more oriented to the new normal. The photo above, a-la Zoom Meeting, is how our usual meetings and sessions look like (albeit, wearing more casual clothes).

This is our reality now. The re-adjustment has been a challenge for almost all of us, especially those who are more comfortable with the traditional. The quarantine and lockdown restrictions have already made this cloistered life more secluded, due to minimal contact and interaction from people outside our community.

It's so easy to complain. Yet, I remember the words of the priest who celebrated one of our Saturday anticipated masses. Speaking in staccato, the priest said "count your blessings, not what you lack." It's an age old adage, we've heard of it countless times before, yet now, it seems to be very appropriate. Again, it's our reality now. Our new normal demands us not only to adjust, but also to fully adapt. It is imperative that we adapt wholeheartedly so that we can channel our creative energies more efficiently using the new normal technologies, especially with our NVFI apostolate. Just this month alone, we have been introduced (or re-introduced, for some) to Zoom, FlipGrid, Google Classroom, and Canvas for our remote learning and apostolate. It was a humbling experience of orienting ourselves to these new methodologies as it meant there is always more to learn. Our Saturday sessions with the Director, where we focus on discussing our NVFI outputs, are very enriching as we get to be challenged in terms of our creativity. Our work is constructively critiqued, and we are always dared to think outside the box, to go beyond the traditional.

Of course, adjusting to this new reality will also have its growing pains. First, the distraction – as we are able to access the Internet. It's a legitimate concern and to be frank, I've had my bouts with it also. The structured lifestyle in the Novitiate does not allow much room for distractions, if you want to get your work done. Another concern, again, is the learning curve in adapting ourselves with the new styles of learning and teaching. We have to learn how to run webinars, how to present ourselves in front of a camera, and how to keep our audience engaged virtually.

This is where our formation, and it's full integration, comes into the fore as we fast track ourselves to the new normal. Instead of allowing the Internet to distract me, I should utilize it to improve myself and to read more techniques on how to become a better virtual teacher. In terms of the learning curve, letting go of the 'old wineskin' is important here. The values of discipline and zeal, and its full integration, truly, are of the essence.

Our formation, despite the new normal, is still very much grounded on the solid foundations of its values and virtues that are instilled in us. We may be living in a new, virtual world, but our formation, with all its growing pains, is still very much real.

THE SHACK by Br. Joseph Pham Van Anh nFSC



The Shack was more than a movie. It was an experience.

From an early age, we are taught that the Almighty God knows everything in advance, and since He loves all of us, we have this expectation that we receive only good from Him. That's why when bad things come to us; we feel we are being abandoned – we wonder why He didn't stop crime or why He caused good people to suffer or die. In those moments, the most convenient thing to do is just to stop believing.

This is the initial message that the movie conveyed to me. The Shack may have some content that deviated from Christianity's traditional beliefs in general and Catholicism in particular. However, for my part, I appreciate the film's significance in giving viewers a new perspective on God and in its response to the concerns between man and God.

The film begins with pain and loss but ends in happiness. Genuine happiness is seen as a beautiful result of forgiveness in The Shack. Life will always be full of sufferings and pains. What matters is how we deal with that pain. Do we allow it to drown us, or do we know how to take 'control' of it and find love again?

The movie reminded me of the importance of forgiveness – learning to forgive myself and others. Just like when Mack was on a boat in the middle of a lake, we are reminded not to look down at the sinking boat, but rather, look at Jesus – the image of love, for it is with His guidance that we can walk on water and leave the tangle.

Whether you believe in God or not, you will overcome all your extreme difficulties if there is hope for goodness in you. From a relational perspective, pain helps us understand the meaning of happiness, and it helps us understand the importance of love.

Prayer: Does it make any difference?

An hour of spiritual reading is part of our daily schedule in the Novitiate. An hour seems exceptionally long, but it goes by fast when you are engrossed in an activity. In this article, I would like to share with everyone an excerpt of my reflections on the book entitled "Prayer: Does It Make Any Difference" by Philip Yancey, assigned for my Spiritual Reading for August.

The book is fit for me as it helped me to learn more about how prayer works. The main point of reflection from the back is the question, "how do we pray to God?" People like to pray only for what they want to ask from God. We fail to listen to God most of the time. This leads to selfishness, since we only think about what

we want, and not what God wants to tell us. This is why when we ask God for graces, and we also need to listen to him. I have learned that prayer should be like a conversation with a friend.

A line that struck me was, "Christian discipleship is not a question of our doing. It is a matter of making room for God so that he can live in us (p. 52). Honestly, it is my first time to hear that line. Looking back at my daily prayer experiences, I have never thought about it either. We begin our prayers by saying, "God come to our assistance," yet I am not aware that I am inviting God to my heart, and I am making room for Him. I need to allow Jesus to live in me at the start of the day and remain aware that He is with me. Through that mindset, I can honestly say that my day will become more fun, beautiful, meaningful, and fruitful. Through that awareness, I will also become more mindful of the things and people around me, like my co-novices, who I see every day. This is how genuine appreciation of God's beautiful creations begin.

SILENT THOUGHTS ON GRAND SILENCE

The Novices anonymously share their silent reflections and realizations during the Grand Silence period.

"Your mind is more powerful than your emotions. The mind constructs what will be your next emotions. Scientifically, this is a real fact that I have understood so far. In my silence, there's a clash of thoughts that I try to balance - mind and heart. Now, I understand that the mind surpasses the heart."

"The silence is the time when I can be most attuned to the presence of God. During this time, my senses are sharpened and my spiritual life becomes active. I feel God as my spiritual companion, who walks with me and guides me. Silence is the strength of a good interior life."

"First is the refocusing and aligning of oneself at the present moment. Second is the constant practice of self-awareness. Third is discerning one's inner movements to the various tasks under the different situations. These are only the points of reflection that I have through the initial experience of Grand Silence."

"Grand Silence is a time for self-reflection which helps me to develop my personal relationship with my own God. Further, it helps me make my prayer and spiritual life firm. It is a grace from God that I am able to contemplate and count all the blessings which I have received throughout the day." "Grand Silence is a good time for me. During Grand Silence, I can think about what I have done during the day. Besides that, I can for the next day. Moreover, this is the time where I think and try to listen to God's voice."



"Here's a realization during Grand Silence: Your ability to help other people depends on their willingness to be helped. You can give your best shot at trying to "change" one person but if that person is not willing to be helped, your effort is close to nothing."

"Grand silence is a spiritual practice for me in my religious life. It helps me to achieve a state of spiritual purity. This practice helps me to contemplate the grace of God in my life and to discern in my vocation as well." "Grand silence is a time for self-encounter where we can see our real selves in the bottom of our hearts. It helps us to be aware of our thoughts. It is also a great time to plan what we want to change. Lastly, it is a time to give thanksgiving and to remain in God."

"It is good that I can experience Grand Silence as it gives me a time to relax and reflect on my relationship with God. Silence makes me aware of God's providence. It also creates the atmosphere of recollection and openness towards God and others. Silence is very effective for me to experience God's Providence in my life. Personally, it helps me out to grow spiritually."

"Grand Silence is an essential part of our novitiate program. As a novice, it is essential for me to have silence in my life. After spending a few weeks in my Novitiate program, I feel it's very helpful to keep silent. When we are in silence, we know about ourselves, we can talk with God, and we can observe more. Finally, When we are in silence, we can discover and seek the will of God."

"Grand Silence is more than just not talking or speaking. It is interiority that is vital here. It is becoming aware of the ruminations and rumblings of the heart and soul. Grand Silence is the opportune time to discern, deepen, and discover."
